Boyce vs Burnett

State LNP member for Callide Colin Boyce will contest the federal seat of Flynn at the next election after securing the support of LNP members across the electorate.

Mr Boyce officially launched his campaign on Monday evening at the Central Lane Hotel in Gladstone alongside Flynn's retiring LNP representative Ken O'Dowd, Queensland LNP Senator Matt Canavan and Deputy Prime Minister Barnaby Joyce, who flew into Gladstone to salute Boyce's candidacy and meet with local Party members.

In an interview with Gladstone Today on the night, Mr Boyce expressed his gratitude to

have secured pre-selection and emphasised his support for the electorate's pervasive mining and agricultural sectors.

"Flynn is all about the mining, resource and agricultural sectors. That's what makes the world go around for most people in the electorate of Flynn," he said.

"I'm a big advocate for the mining and resource industry, for the coal industry, for coal-fired power generation."

Mr Boyce will front up against popular Gladstone Mayor Matt Burnett, who was announced as Labor's candidate in April.

The contest with Mr Burnett will likely be a fierce one.

At the 2019 election, the LNP's success

across Queensland electorates secured it another term in power.

At present, Labor holds just six out of 30 electorates in the state. To return to power, Labor must engineer a dramatic reversal of its fortunes in the state and the comparatively marginal seat of Flynn will be a key target in that enterprise.

The Deputy Prime Minister acknowledged the importance of Flynn in his speech to supporters on the night.

"It's so important that we clearly understand that if we don't get Col across the line, we might not be in government either. So it's a big task ahead of us," he said, his voice booming across the bar.

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When asked why electors should choose him over Mr Burnett, Mr Boyce highlighted his wide-ranging and extensive work experience and said Mr Burnett, by contrast, did not have the experience necessary to lead and advocate for the region.

"I'm a businessman, I'm a boiler-maker, I'm a high-pressure pipe-welder in the gas industry, I've been an earth-moving contractor in the coal industry, I'm a farmer and a grazier and a businessman, so I think I have a few more business and life-skills that perhaps Matt does. Matt in my view is an administrator, that's what he has been doing for the greater part of his life."

Residents be mindful of swoopers

Gladstone Regional Council is advising residents the breeding season for most swooping birds is approaching and to take precautions where necessary.

The breeding season for most swooping birds including magpies, plovers, crows and butcherbirds, is July to November, peaking between August to October.

Gladstone Region Councillor Rick Hansen said Council receives swooping bird reports each spring and it is important that our community take precautions for their safety.

"Nesting parents are protective of their eggs and chicks and some will swoop to scare away what they believe to be threats,' Councillor Hansen said.

"The swooping zone around a nest can be up to 150m, but this varies depending on how protective the parents are."

Cr Hansen said only a small proportion of birds swoop and the intensity of swooping is dependent on where the nest is located, what the parents are fearful of and how close the chicks are to leaving the nest.

"Parents are most protective right before the chicks are about to leave the nest as this is when they are most vulnerable," Cr Han-

"It is important to avoid threatening or scaring nesting birds, as this will increase the intensity of swooping. "Most swooping birds found in the Glad-

stone Region are native animals, and it is an offence to harm, interfere or relocate them without State department authorisation."



Beware of swooping birds in your neighbourhood.

Cr Hansen added that Council manages swooping birds by providing information, undertaking swooping bird assessments and implementing an appropriate response on Council controlled land, such as installing warning signs.

"Generally, it is the male parent that swoops. It is important to acknowledge that relocating the bird often does not resolve the swooping behaviour as another male will join the nest, who is also likely to swoop," he

"The best thing concerned residents can do is jump on Council's website where they'll find a heap of information about swooping birds including an easy-to-understand animated video, tips to avoid being swooped, a 'Living with Magpies' fact sheet and an interactive swooping bird hotspot map.

"The interactive map allows residents to view hotspot areas for that season and add their own hotspots so that alternative walking or cycling routes can be made."

The best way to avoid being swooped is to:

- Avoid swooping hotspots by finding an alternative route
- If you are riding your bike, dismount and walk when passing through a swooping zone; birds view fast-moving persons such as cyclists as a threat
- If walking, keep an eye on the bird; most birds swoop when your back is turned
- Protect yourself by wearing a broad brimmed hat or using an umbrella, or holding your school bag above your head
- Wear glasses to protect your eyes
- Team up with others and walk in a group
- Attach a flag on a long pole to your bike. Council does not monitor the map for new reports, to report swooping birds con-

Works begin on lookout

A world-class vantage point will support 55 jobs in the Port City as works have now officially started on a contemporary viewing platform on Auckland Hill. The Marina Viewing Platform project is tipped to capture the natural beauty of Gladstone for residents and visitors and will also provide a fresh and modern outlook over the region, taking in the harbour views.

After its completion, you will see ample seating, shade structures and a new staircase to the summit that will connect Auckland Hill to the Gladstone Ports Corporation's waterfront parkland precinct, East Shores.

Gladstone Ports Corporation's Chief Operating Officer, Craig Walker said the new platform would add an exciting element to the precinct.

Boyce in race for Flynn

State LNP member for Callide Colin Boyce will contest the federal seat of Flynn at the next election after securing the support of LNP members across the electorate.

Mr Boyce officially launched his campaign on Monday evening at the Central Lane Hotel in Gladstone alongside Flynn's retiring LNP representative Ken O'Dowd, Queensland LNP Senator Matt Canavan and Deputy Prime Minister Barnaby Joyce, who flew into Gladstone to salute Boyce's candidacy and meet with local Party members.

In an interview with Gladstone Today on the night, Mr Boyce expressed his gratitude for pre-selection and emphasised his support for the electorate's pervasive mining and agricultural sectors.

"Flynn is all about the mining, resource and agricultural sectors. That's what makes the world go around for most people in the electorate of Flynn," he said.

"I'm a big advocate for the mining and resource industry, for the coal industry, for coal-fired power generation."

Since its drubbing across regional Queensland in 2019, the Labor party has moved to more forcefully re-affirm its support for Central Queensland's coal industry and Gladstone Today pressed Mr Boyce on whether merely supporting coal presented electors with a sufficient contrast to Labor.

Mr Boyce responded by arguing that Labor's support for coal was not genuine.

"Mr Albanese says one thing in Melbourne and a different thing in Gladstone," he said.

"I've got a team of mining and resource supporters, Barnaby Joyce, Matt Canavan, Michelle Landry, so we're great advocates for the mining and resource sector."

Mr Boyce argued that his background as a farmer and grazier meant that he understood the interests of the agricultural sector and said he would push to develop water infrastructure to support food production across Flynn.

"Water is life, water means prosperity, so I'd like to see more water infrastructure built," he said.

"More dams, more weirs, more high-value agricultural expansion."

Mr Boyce also said water was key to securing Gladstone's incipient hydrogen industry.

"Obviously if we're going to have industrial hydrogen production in the Gladstone area, we need to have a big supply of fresh water. To produce industrial quantities of green hydrogen, you need large quantities of fresh water."

Mr Boyce will front up against popular Gladstone Mayor Matt Burnett, who was announced as Labor's candidate in April.

The contest with Mr Burnett will likely be a fierce one.

At the 2019 election, the LNP's success across Queensland electorates secured it another term in power.

At present, Labor holds just six out of 30 electorates in the state. To return to power, Labor must engineer a dramatic reversal of its fortunes in the state and the comparatively marginal seat of Flynn will be a key target in that enterprise.

The Deputy Prime Minister acknowledged the importance of Flynn in a speech to supporters on the night.

"It's so important that we clearly understand that if we don't get Col across the line,

we might not be in government either. So it's a big task ahead of us," he said, his voice booming across the bar.

Mr Joyce's speech adumbrated the general themes the LNP will take to voters across Flynn.

"If you're wondering which way you're going to vote, you can't quite make up your mind, here's my tip," he said.

"Vote for your job, vote for your business. Keep the money coming into this city, keep the money coming into this part of Australia."

In 2019, Mr O'Dowd secured a comfortable victory against Labor challenger Zac Beers, leading in the first preference count and securing 59 percent of the vote after preference distribution.

However, LNP supporters have told Gladstone Today that the contest with Mr Burnett may well present a more difficult challenge for Mr Boyce.

Tony Goodwin, formerly the chairman of the LNP in Gladstone, expects a Burnett victory.

"In order for him (Mr Boyce) to win, he has to win Gladstone, and at the moment I think the numbers are against that happening. Outside Gladstone, he's well known, but he's hardly known at all in Gladstone. I think that the result will be that if we can't win Gladstone, we can't win the seat."

Mr Goodwin, however, expressed confidence in Mr Boyce and said he was an excellent candidate.

"I think he's excellent material, who believes in standing for what he believes in, not what seems to be good for himself and his future," he said.

"I think he's a very principled man."

When asked why electors should choose him over Mr Burnett, Mr Boyce highlighted his wide-ranging and extensive work experience and said Mr Burnett, by contrast, did not have the experience necessary to lead and advocate for the region.

"I'm a businessman, I'm a boiler-maker, I'm a high-pressure pipe-welder in the gas industry, I've been an earth-moving contractor in the coal industry, I'm a farmer and a grazier and a businessman, so I think I have a few more business and life-skills that perhaps Matt does. Matt in my view is an administrator, that's what he has been doing for the greater part of his life."

In an open letter to the Gladstone region, Mr Burnett said he offered Central Queenslanders a fresh start.

"I want to see no one held back, no one left behind. We need better health and aged care, a future made in Australia, more social and affordable housing, the same pay for the same work, and more jobs in more industries," he writes.

Covering over 132,000 square kilometres, Flynn takes in the coal mining towns of Tieri, Blackwater and Rolleston and the mining and agricultural services town of Emerald on the Capricorn highway, and then edges towards outback territory near the border of Maranoa out west. It takes in a substantial portion of the Rockhampton region, moves east to cover the export behemoth of Gladstone, moves south along the coast towards Bundaberg and then covers the North and South Burnett and Banana Shire districts to the south and southwest

The division holds 103,000 electors.

Barnaby backs project

Deputy Prime Minister Barnaby Joyce has confirmed that he supports an extension of the federal government's mammoth Inland Rail infrastructure project to Gladstone.

Mr Joyce made the remarks in a face-to-face interview with CQ Today on Monday night in Gladstone and his position heralds something of a departure from his predecessor Michael McCormack, who had supported a rail line into Brisbane but had demurred on whether a line should extend into Central Queensland from Toowoomba.

Mr Joyce, by contrast, argues that a line to Brisbane and a line from Toowoomba to Glad-

stone will both be necessary.

"We're building this thing out for a number of years," he said.

"My view is, once we get to Toowoomba, we start driving for the bulk commodities to go into Gladstone, because in the long term, it's not going to work taking (them) through the centre of Brisbane. And your container traffic will probably still be coming out of Brisbane."

"So my first discussions, it's not about either/or, it's 'and', it's both."

"Your container traffic will go into Brisbane, but your bulk commodities are better suited for Gladstone," he clarified.

Mr Joyce said he had had discussions on the subject as recently as last week.

Mr Joyce also noted that an extension to Gladstone could generate competition with the Port of Newcastle.

"If Newcastle was to be completely and utterly outrageous, you give the people on those coal mines the chance to say, 'well, if you're going to be completely outrageous, we do have somewhere else to go. We have another port. And that's why Gladstone is so widely important. Because if you've got places like Newcastle that start really screwing the market, then yes, it's a task, but it's a task we can say to them, 'I've got another venue.' And that's why Gladstone is so important."

Extending the project into Central Queensland would transform economic life across the region and the project will likely fea-

ture as an election issue between Flynn contestants Colin Boyce, the LNP candidate, and Matt Burnett, the Labor candidate.

Though Mr Burnett has declared his support for an extension of Inland Rail to Gladstone, Mr Joyce argued that Labor had not provided adequate support for the mammoth enterprise in recent years.

"The Labor party never started building Inland Rail, the Labor party did not put \$10 billion on the table for Inland Rail, the Labor party hasn't backed it up as we have," he said.

"They are very late to the party and therefore you have to take what they say with a grain of salt."

True believers raise up Boyce for seat of Flynn

A lively crowd of LNP faithful gathered at the Central Lane Hotel in Gladstone on Monday night to congratulate Colin Boyce on his preselection to contest the federal seat of Flynn.

Gladstone Today was on hand to survey opinion.

Lane and Sue, from Emerald and Gladstone respectively, voted to elect Mr Boyce as their candidate.

"He's well known and he's country," Sue said when asked why she had decided to plump for Mr Boyce.

"He supports jobs, coal, small business. Why wouldn't we support him?"

Sue and Lane travelled around Queensland to listen to candidates make their pitch before voting.

"It's good to hear the speeches a couple of times," Sue said.

"So you know who you're voting for and you've got the right candidate."

Valerie Atkinson, meanwhile, said Mr Boyce would follow in the path established by retiring LNP member Ken O'Dowd.

"He's going to have some big shoes to follow and he's got the right pedigree. And I don't think people here, or certainly not out West, want a dramatic change. I think they want to keep going on the path where Kenny has started, and keep on that highway" she said.

"He ticks more boxes, literally, as well as figuratively."

Ms Atkinson said the selection process was fair and democratic.

"The procedure was down to the last dot correct."

Mr Boyce's fellow LNP contender Tracie Newitt did not succeed in locking in pre-selection.

Nonetheless, Ms Newitt told Gladstone Today that her personal disappointment over the result was secondary to her desire to maintain LNP control over Flynn.

"One thing that we all are is Party faithful," she said.

"I was out with Colin last night celebrating and then here tonight to support him."

"It is all about winning Flynn. It is nothing other than, and that's what the intention is."

Ms Newitt travelled around Flynn throughout the process and said she would pass on her knowledge of the electorate to Mr Boyce to help him get across the line.

"It's all about listening and serving," she

Mixed in with committed Liberals and Nationals were some regular voters who had decided to attend the get-together to hear from Mr Boyce and better gauge his commitment and vision for the region.

Gavin Hofstetter, a member of the Gladstone Engineering Alliance, was one such voter.

"What's coming to Gladstone, and what's in the future for us?" he said.

Gladstone Today asked Mr Hofstetter what Mr Boyce needed to do to secure his vote, and Mr Hofstetter replied:

"Keep things going. Gladstone fluctuates a lot, like every other small town. So I just want to know if we can keep an even path."

"How are you going to stabilise Gladstone?" he asked.

The gathering presented a jovial atmosphere. The drinks flowed freely, Ken O'Dowd beer mats adorned the tables and wait staff served up platters of spring rolls and lobster rolls.

Aside from Mr Boyce, the star of the night was Deputy Prime Minister Barnaby Joyce, who offered up a pugnacious speech in support of Mr Boyce and the traditional industries that characterise the electorate.

"We've got the positive vision, in the things we've got to do. We're on the record standing behind your jobs and your businesses," he said.

Mr Joyce said his first trip outside of Canberra and his own electorate had been to Flynn because the electorate would be vitally important to the outcome of the general election.

"If this fella (Mr Boyce) is not elected on election night, there's a very good chance that we're called the Opposition. And that's going to be a very bad day in the office for this part of the world."

Mr O'Dowd and Queensland LNP Senator Matt Canavan were also in attendance and both gave speeches.

Before leaving into the night, Chris Struik, a Gladstone local of 22 years shared his firm support for Mr Boyce.

Mr Struik said Labor's "alignment to the Greens" presented a threat to Gladstone's industries.

"An absolute threat, regardless of what they try to say," he said. "It's hard to believe that they will some-

how come up with a scheme that supports aluminium, supports coal."

Mr Struik is a close friend of Mr Burnett and speaks highly of Mr Burnett's character.

"I love the guy, he's one of my very good friends. I don't agree with his politics, but as a

person, a great guy."

However, Mr Struik argued that Mr Burnett would not be able to exert sufficient influence over the Labor party to adequately protect and serve the interests of Flynn.


"I think Matt is going to go into the ALP and he is not going to have a voice," he said.

Property price rise

A new CoreLogic report has found the Gladstone dwelling market has seen an extraordinary rate of growth over the recent financial year of 20.5 per cent.

Head of Research, Eliza Owen showed the metrics for the Gladstone housing market and how it had performed to June 30 2021. The statistics were compared with a five-year average annual change in dwelling values of minus 4.8 per cent.

One significant feature of the uplift across Gladstone markets is the increase of rental prices, which has outpaced value increases in the past 12 months. The result is a relatively strong gross rental yield, which was 5.9 per cent across all dwelling types and 5.5 per cent across houses.

Meanwhile, one notable trend is that while the annual growth rate continued to accelerate over the year, the quarterly growth rate has started to slow down. Dwelling value changes in the three months to June were 5.1 per cent as opposed to a growth rate of 7.7 per cent in the March 2021 quarter.

Many resource-based markets have seen an upswing through late 2020 to 2021 off the back of increased commodity values and private mining investment. For some of those markets, this has been exacerbated by a pivot from fly in, fly out (FIFO) to resident-based workers.

Data to June 30 shows the median value for dwellings was \$351,931, houses \$376,825 and units were \$188,175.

"There are a lot of reasons young people can't get their hundred hours up," she said.

"With limited public transport, difficulty getting to work or training, and jobs being further out, it's a big deal in our little town.'

The aim of the program is to provide young people with increased employment opportunities, community connection, and driver education.

Ms Cole said the program has been a huge success so far, with dozens of learner drivers completing their training.

"As the programme is extremely popular, and there is a lengthy waiting list, we ask that applicants be committed," she said.

"They must really want their licence and have a genuine reason for needing our help.

"We also ask that they do about ten hours before they come see us because we work with volunteer driver mentors, who will be their su-

With the support of government, community and corporate partners, Braking the Cycle is currently offered at 42 PCYC clubs across Queensland and has received numerous awards since its inception in 2012.

"To be eligible for the program, applicants must be aged between 16 and 25," she said.

'To apply, they can visit our Gladstone PCYC office, website or Facebook page.

"The approval process can be a few weeks or a couple of months as we only have a certain amount of young people we can put through, but the earlier they apply the better."

"If you can spare an hour or more a week, we'd love to hear from you," she said.

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Major makeover

Gladstone PCYC has secured \$2.5 million from the Australian Government's Stronger Places, Stronger People funding to expand its services and programmes.

PCYC Management Committee Chairman Glenn Churchill said this will deliver a major refurbishment and upgrade of the facility.

"This will not only allow us to expand our services and our programmes but also create a source of revenue for our not-for-profit organisation." he said.

Mr Churchill said the PCYC has been on this path for approximately six years and the time has arrived to get underway with the major construction and redevelopment.

"From this, we will deliver, in my opinion, one of the best gymnastics centres and one of the best fitness centres in regional Australia, that's our aspiration," he said.

"The new upgraded facility will also strengthen what we already have. It will provide a youth space, a musical rehearsal area and an increased area for our fitness centre."

Youth Club Manager Dominic Richardson said when he arrived in 2018 the concept of the Memorial Park plan was already underway to improve services for local youth.

"We're not-for-profit, but we still need to raise an income to deliver successful youth development outcomes.

"That's why it was great that my predecessors had support to get a commercial quality gym on board that is attractive to the community and profitable.

"We're also very fortunate to have a really great working relationship with Gladstone Gymnastics who are housed under the same roof."

Mr Richardson said stage one of the redevelopment will commence by the end of this month, which will see the tender process starting.

"What is currently our multi-purpose hall, where basketball and other things are housed, will be refurbished to be the new gymnastics space," he said.

"The new gymnastics space will be substantially bigger than they've currently got and allow parents and friends to view the kids doing their activities.

"It will also allow them to do much bigger competitions, such as state level competitions, so they're incredibly excited that it will be fit for purpose for them.

"As soon as they relocate, which is expected by the end of the year, the current gymnastics building will be refurbished to be the new gym and fitness centre."

The gym and fitness centre will be divided into two halves. The first half will offer strength and aerobic equipment and the second half will offer a functional training area.

"This means that we can offer activities that we have never had the ability to offer before such as Pilates and yoga," he said.

"Our outside of school hours care and vacation care will also have a permanent space in what is currently being used as the gym.

"Furthermore, we will also have another space that will allow us to deliver youth programmes such as music or art programmes and a whole range of other activities.

"Regrettably, there won't be any space for some activities that have been here in the past, such as the basketball, but there has been a long stakeholder process around that.

The expected completion date for the project is Easter 2022.

"Back to Work will give businesses the confidence to take a chance on the new staff they need to grow, and I am so pleased the Palaszczuk government is making this investment.

"This program helps all Queenslanders, but especially our young people here in Gladstone looking for their first job.

CQ Taxation Services is one Gladstone employer who has given young people in the community a chance and has since grown with the Back to Work program. Owner Allison Totorica said it only took three months for Back to Work employee Nita to have proven herself invaluable to the company.

"Nita will be an even greater asset as she continues her Certificate III in Business Administration studies," Allison said.

"Nita's overseas qualification was not recognised in Australia and the Back to Work program has given me the funding to help her transfer her skill set and learn to meet our industry standards.

"It's really great to be able to give her a chance and also help my small business grow at the same time.

"Without Back to Work this would not have been possible and I am grateful for the assistance," Allison said.

Meanwhile, Mr Butcher welcomed the additional support for employers and jobseekers to achieve long term, sustainable employment in the region. Support payments worth up to \$15,000 will be offered to eligible businesses who employ an eligible jobseeker including the long-term unemployed, an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander person or someone with a disability.



'Fitting' career for women

Qualified mechanical fitter, Brianna Pidgeon is proving anything is possible for women who work in what was once called a stereotypical man's world. Ms Pidgeon's skill set has grown from strength to strength since being the first female to complete a fitter and turner apprenticeship at CS Energy in the Callide Power Station at Biloela in January,

This month, the 24-year-old started her first shift with Queensland Alumina Limited (QAL) which opened a new chapter with endless opportunities.

"If industrial companies want to find more female employees, they need to induct them from the beginning," Ms Pidgeon said.

"I'm really passionate about female workers in the industry however, I'm also passionate about the right person for the right job.

"I've found bigger companies set a quota, if they are only asking for females to apply for these specific roles, they are going to get a lot of applicants who aren't interested in the role, not having safety as their first priority or the right incentives to work for the company."

Born in Brisbane into a family of great role models, Ms Pidgeon moved to Biloela when she was 10 years old where she lived for one and a half years. It didn't take long before she moved with her mother to Gladstone where they lived for nine years where she completed her high school studies. A twist of fate would take her in a new direction.

"At the time, moving to their campus in Townsville wasn't a possibility so I kept on deferring," she said.

"I spent some time with an acquaintance's father who was a fitter and turner, so when I was about 18 or 19 years old, I applied for various apprenticeships.

"Watching him inspired me to feel that I could do a trade too."

After being successfully chosen to complete an apprenticeship as the first female mechanical fitter at CS Energy in the Callide Power Station in Biloela, it prompted her to pack her bags once again.

Ms Pidgeon was always empowered by her late mother (who worked as an environmental scientist) to believe she could do anything if she tried.

"She was a single mother of five children, I grew up with just her as I was the youngest child, she was always wearing high-visibility

clothing on the field while having played the role of both mother and father to me," she said.

"I am lucky my mum was driven and very strong-willed. I would love to be a role model for young women."

Ms Pidgeon lost her mother at a very critical point in her life, before she approached Year 12. "I looked up to her a lot, and dad passed away only one and a half years after she did," she said.

"They're [her parents] the biggest things that have motivated me." Through all of her loss, she powered through the pain to achieve her goals.

Once she closed the chapter on her apprenticeship, Ms Pidgeon moved to Rockhampton where she found a role with Schenck Process who manufactured coal vibration screens for wash plants.

She also completed inspections on the screen floor of the wash plant at Curragh Mine and Caval Ridge Mine, and after her brief stint in the company she returned to Gladstone this month.

There she commenced her new role as a mechanical fitter at Queensland Alumina Limited (owned by Rio Tinto). Ms Pidgeon said the family-owned business was a great fit for her as they really cared about their workers and provided a stable working environment.

"I'm working with the boiler house maintenance team so I'm really looking forward to learning more," she said.

The Gladstone resident is now glad to be living back in the town where she shared a lot of memories with her mother and high school friends. Living in closer proximity to her auntie, everything seems to have fallen into place. Ms Pidgeon's boyfriend (an employee of Rio

Tinto Yarwun) is also not too far away from reach.

Sharing her story with Gladstone Today earlier this week, Ms Pidgeon spoke about how readily available properties were to rent in the port city before she made the move.

"Finding a home was relatively easy for me, I heard that Rockhampton had a vacancy rate of 0.4 per cent while Gladstone's was 1.7 percent," she said.

"Gladstone had a lot more options for me which came from the pop-up estates from a recent property boom."

Paying \$340 per week for a three-bedroom, two bathroom townhouse has allowed for more space to be utilised. Meanwhile, her positive dealings with a local Ray White branch proved to make the transition an easy one.

Labor can't grasp CQ

When you vote at a Federal election there are two things next to the box you tick. There is the name of the candidate and there is the name of the candidate's team, or political party. It is best to have a good bloke as your local member, but it is better to have a strong team.

There are large parts of our bureaucracy and academia who want to put thousands of Central Queenslanders out of work. If they get their way our kids won't have the same job opportunities we enjoy.

Repairs close one lane

Gladstone Regional Council will commence repair works to a sewer main pipe located along the Auckland Creek Bridge on Hanson Road from Monday 12 July. These works will also see the temporary closure of the inbound lane on the Auckland Creek Bridge from Monday 26 July until Wednesday 11 August, with traffic management in place during this time.

Gladstone Region Deputy Mayor Kahn Goodluck said the pipe connects to the A01 Pump Station, located on Chapple Street, and Council first identified that several supporting brackets had failed in September 2020.

"As this bridge is an asset of the Department of Transport and Main Roads (DTMR), Council were required to negotiate approval from DTMR to undertake works on the bridge," Councillor Goodluck said.

"Negotiations have been underway since September 2020, with the DTMR issuing approval for the repair works on 14 June 2021."

Cr Goodluck said Council took immediate preliminary action in September 2020 to minimise any further damage or any potential harm to the environment.

"Structural engineers secured the pipe to the header of the bridge in order to minimise potential movement and risk of the pipe falling from the header," he said.


"A reduction of the pump flow rate from the A01 Pump Station was also actioned to reduce pressure and weight loading through the affected main."

Cr Goodluck said the overall repair works timeline will commence on 12 July with a practical completion date anticipated by 20 August.

"The lifting of the pipeline will be completed gradually over the course of five days, in order to closely monitor the structural integrity and performance of the pipe, and to minimise risk of damage to the ductile iron pipe sections." he said.


"Specialised clamps will be installed around the pipe joints prior to lifting to prevent potential leakage from these interconnections and reinforce them for the lift."

50 years at Tartrus

This week CQ Today continues looking at cattleman Sir Graham McCamley's recollections from his book, Roads in the Sky.

In our 27th excerpt we look at the early 2000s and the 50th anniversary of Graham's original property, Tartrus.

"When Shirley and I started travelling, we started going around Australia, up to Cape York and so on," Graham said.

"In 2002 we went on a two week camping trip to Cape York with four other cars on a catered tour.

"In 2003 we had a trip through the Kimberley for three weeks - but then Shirley decided I was far too well and fit to retire.

"So that was the end of our retirement - and we were then busier than ever at Hopevale, after the selling of North Curtis Island."

Hopevale, which had been part of Harrogate prior to its sale, had been completely bare of any improvements, so Graham had to start from scratch; a house, men's quarters, shed, tool room, cattleyards with an automatic fiveway draft and weighing and irrigation (by Greg Cross) were subsequently installed.

Graham started spending a great deal of time at Hopevale, mustering and developing the property.

Tartrus turned 50 in 2004, and in May Graham and Shirley held a grand Tartrus 50th anniversary display and celebration sale on the property.

There were cattle inspections, trade displays, presentations and sharing of scientific data


Almost 500 cars and up to 1800 people flocked to Tartrus to pay tribute to this incredible stud operation - and to snap up some purebred, astutely-mated red and grey Brahman cattle.

It was an extraordinary spectacle and the sale lanes were crammed with eager bidders, buyers and watchers.

In a clear endorsement of the Tartrus product, up to \$30,000 was paid for a sire, and the same for a stud heifer - and the compilation of 1245 lots grossed a whopping \$1.648 million.

The keen bidding was the ultimate tribute; it was a reflection of the commitment, drive

and initiative that Graham and Shirley had brought to the cattle industry since the 1950s - showcased this day in the fine Tartrus Brahman.

And it set a new industry benchmark.

Beef, naturally, was on the menu - fine dining for 1200 people with rib fillet at a sit-down lunch and more steak, barbecued, in the evening.

Gold coin donations benefited a number of charities, including the Variety Club, helping out young Queenslander Corey Lawton, who was born with cerebral palsy.

In March 2004, just before the Tartrus anniversary, Shirley and Graham had been approached by Chris Evans of Rural Management Partners.

"He wanted to find out if we were prepared

to lease Tartrus, Kaiuroo, Eskfield, Tooloombah and Lot 2 of Royles to AA Co (Australian Agricultural Company) and EnviroVest," Graham said.

"The AA Co board of directors wanted to raise their annual return on their invested capital, which was very low, so instead of buying any further freehold land, they would lease the good freehold land they needed with livestock,, plant and machinery.

"A 10-year lease was negotiated for land, livestock and plant, plus taking over our staff, for a total cost of \$3.2 million a year.

"Our son Russell, who owned Royles Lot 1, known as the Royles homestead block, did not want to be part of the AA lease."

A final meeting was held in the GE McCamley Group office boardroom in Rockhampton in December 2004.

"Jennifer was there with her accountant, Michael Walsh, who believed it was a wonderful opportunity for all of our family, but over Christmas Jenny became unhappy about us going ahead with the lease, so to keep harmony in the family we decided to pull out."

Winter flowers for birds

Is it hard to establish a Bird attracting garden in Central Queensland? The answer is that it is not that hard to construct a garden to attract birds to your garden. Even a Winter flowering garden that attracts birds is feasible.

These are some simple ways of ensuring a greater number of birds in your garden which will in turn, bring many hours of pleasure over many years.

There are his 4 simple needs for a bird-attracting garden.

- 1. Water: Provide a constant source of water, such as a pond, birdbath or dripping tap into a bowl.
- 2. Food: Provide a variety of native trees and bushes that become a suitable food source.
- 3. Protection: Never let your cat roam the garden and actively discourage neighbour's cats from entering your garden.
- 4. Safety: Provide a safe environment for the birds by not using any poisons like snail bait in your garden.

There are literally hundreds of plants available to the home gardener these days that will attract large numbers of birds. Then there are many other shrubs that will create a protective bird haven in your own back yard. The following are some of my favourite plants to attract birds to the garden.

A local Bottlebrush that always makes a spectacular display around Central Queensland is the Mount Wheeler Bottlebrush. Melaleuca hemisticta the Mount Wheeler Bottlebrush was sold as Callistemon polandii var. Mt Wheeler for many years. Melaleuca hemisticta is a very bushy shrub to 2m high with dark green leaves and pink new growth. Masses of small bright red brushed tipped with gold appear most of the year. This plant is suitable for most conditions and is very bird attractive. This Bottlebrush grows naturally only at the base of Mount Gawula between Rockhampton and Yeppoon.

With stunning foliage and flowers the Graptophyllum excellsum or Native Fuschia is looking a treat at Kershaw Gardens. It is a native plant species found within the Berserker Wilderness, and is a small dense shrub growing on average to 1.5m high. It has small bright green shiny leaves and large red tubular waxy flowers that form along the branches. This shrub will grow in a sunny or lightly shaded position and is able to be pruned and shaped for even the most modern garden styles.

Flowering early this season in the Melaleuca Snowstorm, with masses of white flowers cover the whole shrub, like snow. This medium sized hybrid Melaleuca will become a very dense shrub 2 - 2.5m x 1.5m with fine light green leaves and soft pink new growth. It

requires a sunny, moist position, is frost hardy and suitable for coastal planting. It makes an excellent screen plant and is hardy and fast growing.

Then there is the plant Promoted as "a natural food bar for parrots and honey-eaters", Grevillea Fires Sprite is in my mind the best plant for seeing birds in there dozen will flock to its flowers. This plant would have to be one of the most suitable new hybrid grevilleas for

local conditions that has become available in many years, with both parent plants uniquely found in Central Queensland. One is the Grevillea venusta or Spider Flower, and the other is Grevillea longistylla, a native of Blackdown Tablelands. It will grow 2 to 3 metres high and up to 2 metres across, forming a dense shrub for average to well drained positions, and is quite suitable for screens or hedges. The flame-red flowers occur on and off throughout

the year and is extremely bright and eye-catching, making it an ideal choice for a bird-lovers garden.

These Bird attracting plants would well make a spectacular specimens, so check with your local nursery now. One last point to establishing a garden to attract birds to the garden is reading books like "Attracting Birds to Australian Gardens" by Graham Pizzey and "Bird Attracting Plants" by Wrigley and Fagg.

Looking after livestock

By AgForce Cattle Board president Will Wilson

Australian agriculture is often talked about as being the envy of the rest of the world, one of the main reasons is because we produce such high-quality food and fibre is the health of our livestock.

AgForce is always at the forefront of advocating for continuous improvement in animal welfare and was recently part of a consultation process with the State Government to regulate the Australian Animal Welfare Standards for Cattle, Sheep and Livestock at Saleyards and Depots into codes of practice.

The AgForce Cattle and Sheep & Wool Boards advocated for these new codes to be an exact copy of the national Animal Welfare Standards, and we are now in discussions with the State Government's Department of Agriculture and Forestry (DAF) about how the codes are implemented, including associated accreditation schemes and how they should operate.

In particular, AgForce supports the accreditation requirements for cattle spaying to be the same as in the national standards and we are

working with DAF to develop an implementation process and time frame that will reflect this in the context of industry current practice and seasonality.

The new codes are in force now, replacing previous voluntary codes with fines and, in some cases, even imprisonment.

We know Queensland producers already maintain incredibly high standards of animal welfare, but these new codes ensure consistent legislation and enforcement across all states and territories of Australia.

Importantly, they send a strong message to industry, governments, the Australian public and the rest of the world, that there is zero tolerance for animal cruelty in Australian agriculture.

It is now a requirement for every single person employed to manage or handle livestock to ensure the requirements of the new codes are met.

But I'm sure you'll agree, strengthening the already high standards we have come to expect for animal welfare in Queensland can only be good for everyone.

Last Friday and Saturday we enjoyed two superb days of first-class racing at Callaghan Park under magic Winter weather.

Weather conditions make or break outside sporting and entertainment venues and activities and the club was certainly blessed with two fabulous days.

Of course, it commenced last Friday with the Real Group's Rockhampton Newmarket race meeting.

I was delighted with the large turnout Friday's meeting drew to the racecourse with patrons galore.

They were not let down either.

Local jockey Ashley Butler in some ways dethroned Noel 'King' Callow with racegoers chanting Butler is king after he landed the \$100,000 Real Group Rocky Newmarket (1300m) on the Olivia Cairns trained Last Chance.

In all, Ash rode three winners during the afternoon with the others being local trainer Craig Russell's Way Back Then (\$8.00) as well as hotpot Busted Up (\$1.40).

Busted Up trained by Clinton Taylor at Callaghan Park is really going places and his emphatic win in the BM 65 Handicap (1050m) was something special.

He finished strongly late and I believe won with something in hand.

Lightly raced, he has already been placed in Brisbane and is capable of winning there again should his clever trainer choose that option.

Newmarket winner Last Chance (\$18.00) is a very smart horse being the winner of 14 races with prizemoney totalling over \$300,000. He collared the very brave Master Jamie in

the closing stages after the latter had led from barrier to the shadows of the winning post.

At the finish Last Chance prevailed by three-quarters of a length from Master Jamie.

They both carried 58kg in the Rocky Newmarket and they are both due to clash in the \$75,000 Mackay Newmarket (1300m) on Fri-

In that race Master Jamie (58kg) will meet Last Chance (60kg) some two kilograms better at the weights.

Once again there will be little between them at the finish but there are a few track specialists among the other entries as well.

Regardless, both are as honest as they come and for certain will give great showings in Mackay's top sprint.

Callow made it a winning double, scoring on former Rocky trainer but now the Sunshine Coast's Darryl Hansen's Sista Elenore (\$3.30) which firmed appreciably in betting markets.

Another relocated Melbourne jockey Ben Thompson, who now calls Brisbane home, won on Caloundra trained Tom Bourke's Bet-

Can't forget the Darling Downs combination of training partnership, Corey and Kylie Geran, and Skye and Me which won the 0-55 Handicap (1600m) on Friday.

The same combo won on Saturday - Cup Day - with Vinasta (\$4.20) in the Class 3 (1500m).

All in all, it was a day of mixed results on Friday but what a top day's racing it turned up to be.

The same has to be recorded about last Saturday's Pavscorp Rocky Cup program.

What a terrific promotional tool occurred when Sydney's Gai Waterhouse and Adrian Bott trained Regal Stage won the \$150,000 Rockhampton Cup (1600m).

In some ways this really put the Rockhampton Cup on the map when Regal Stage (Matt McGillivray, \$5.50) scored.

The last time it happened was in 1991 when Sydney trainer Terry Ryan was successful with Bongo Rhythm ridden by his apprentice An-

To my knowledge Bongo Rhythm and Regal Stage are the only two Sydney-trained winners of the Cup since its first running in 1908.

Mind you New Zealanders have enjoyed success but I won't be surprised at all if the 2022 Rocky Cup lures more interstate horses to Callaghan Park.

Jameson McMullen stood out for our local ladies with an 18-point performance as well as eight rebounds and three steals.


Unsurprisingly Savannah Au was also up there with our team's best performers with 17 points, nine rebounds and a handy three steals.
