

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Diehm ranks fifth

Gladstone-born Olympian Natalya Diehm fell short of a bronze medal on Saturday after she finished the BMX freestyle final with a torn ACL and dislocated patella.

Diehm placed fifth in the Olympics and registered an 86.00 out of a possible 100, however, appeared to be hobbling after the run on the same knee she has had surgically reconstructed four times.

Diehm's mum, Tam, said her daughter went overseas already carrying an ACL injury she ruptured two weeks ago for the fifth time.

"Her pure strength and determination would not stop her from competing in Tokyo," Tam said.

"Unfortunately after the first run her knee did not hold up. She will be okay and is very overwhelmed with love and support."

Diehm said she knew the risks in going to the Olympics but her injury was not going to stop her.

"I knew that could happen, but it's felt pretty strong coming into this and every practice day. Today it just didn't want to hold out."

Diehm already broke records when she became the first female Australian to compete in the Women's BMX Freestyle at the Olympic Games.

Lucky to be alive

A Biloela family are lucky to be alive after a massive fire completely destroyed their home last month.

Tia Stone, Nathan 'Boxy' Box, his son Jayden and Tim Frost were asleep in their Orange Street home when an electrical fire tore through the home in a matter of minutes

It was the early hours of Saturday morning, 24 July when three Queensland Fire and Emergency Services crews battled furiously to protect neighbouring homes after the fire claimed the 15m by 15m home.

Ms Stone said she and her partner Boxy went into 'autopilot mode' when the fire initially started.

'By the time it took my partner to get out of bed, wake up his son and flatmate, and get the extinguisher ready - the entire lounge room was on fire," Ms Stone said.

"The roof was caving in seconds."

Ms Stone said it was only luck police were driving to a nearby noise complaint that they had spotted the fire and called firefighters.

A Queensland Fire and Emergency Services spokeswoman said flames were visible from all windows of the house when crews arrived.

"By the time the fireys were there, the house was caving in and there was no saving it," Ms Stone said

"It was terrifying, it's nothing I could have imagined.

Although Ms Stone and Mr Box were trained in fire safety, Ms Stone said there was no preparation for what her body did in a state of crisis.

"In all your training, you know you can't be in the smoke but there was a moment of realisation that my partner could have been out the back of the house," she said.



Donations are being raised to help the family after losing their Biloela home.

"We recently had a gas stove installed, and there was a moment where I did not know where he was.

'If your person is inside the house, everything tells you not to go in but there was no way I was going to leave him.

"That has been the most frightening part for me, knowing that my body has its own brain in an emergency especially when somebody you love is in danger, you will do everything you can to save them.

Ms Stone and Mr Box were later taken to Biloela Hospital for minor burns.

Now with nothing, the family are finding

their feet again with help from the community. The Biloela community has come together by donating clothes, food and toiletries to the

family Batchfire Callide Mine, Mr Box's workplace, had also shown support for the family.

"When you lose everything you have to start from the beginning," Ms Stone said.

"Biloela is an amazing community, we have absolute gratitude to Callide, Workpac, Com-

mercial Hotel and friends and family that have supported us."

To help raise money for the family, Ms Stone's volunteer group 'The Wild Grace Movement' has started a fundraiser.

The fundraiser will help the family replace items such as kitchen appliances, linen, clothes, phones and personal care items to get them back on track.

Ms Stone hopes to raise \$100,000 through the initiative so the family could also buy a new home.

So far \$2,618 has been raised.

"Just when you think you are getting ahead and if you asked me two weeks ago I was on top of the world," she said.

"But we have each other and my partner is so positive and he was so happy when we were all together."

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

Attracting specialists

Boyne Island and Tannum Sands residents will have access to more health professionals by the end of the year.

BITS Medical Centre is expanding with a plan to attract more specialists to the area.

At BITS Medical Centre on Thursday 29 July, Doctor Gaston Boulanger said the surgery was about to start construction on an expansion to the already-established building on Hayes Avenue.

It will mark the second expansion the centre has undergone.

Dr Boulanger said the new building would create additional space for the 12 doctors at the clinic as well as create a training space for junior doctors. "We want to train registered and junior doctors to become doctors and you can only do that if you have good facilities," Dr Boulanger said.

"The last few years we expanded to 12 doctors at the centre, we just need more rooms.

"The other thing is we want to recruit people internationally to come work in Central Queensland and learn to be GP."

Dr Boulanger said the lack of GPs in Central Queensland was 'always' a problem but recruiting them wasn't the issue.

"The problem here is retainment," he said. "A lot of overseas doctors come here not to

work in rural areas, they want to live in a city. "It always has been like that, we are always flying doctors from overseas...but for some reason a lot of doctors don't stay." Dr Boulanger said it was important that the region appealed to doctors in order to make them stay.

"You really have to look at the region and create a nice atmosphere for people to want to live there," he said.

"And if that is having a good hospital with support, services like shops and restaurants, good schools - that's all important.

So the whole region should be lifted if people want to come and stay there.

"If you live in Central Queensland, you are in one of the most beautiful spots in the world.

"Our lives are really good, there's a lot of reasons for people to come here but for some reason a lot of people don't stay."

Dr Boulanger said BITS Medical Centre was yet to secure more GPs in the area.

Claims expensive healthcare's affecting residents

Labor candidate for Flynn Matt Burnett has claimed regional Queenslanders were paying double the amount for healthcare since the Liberal National Party took power in Australia.

At BITS Medical Centre on Thursday 29 July, Mr Burnett joined Australian Senator Murray Watt to discuss the impact expensive healthcare was having on regional Queensland.

"The price to go and see your GP has doubled since the Liberal National Party took power in Australia," he said.

Mr Watt said the cost of obtaining 'basic' medical care was becoming more expensive for the average person.

"What we have seen, even from the Department of Health's own figures, is that the cost of obtaining basic medical care is becoming more and more expensive for the average person," he said.

"Since the Liberal government was elect-



ed in 2013, the average out-of-pocket cost of a visit to the GP has also risen by 20 percent to \$40.

"In Capricornia, patients are also paying more, with the cost of seeing a specialist now averaging \$88.64 – an increase of 51 percent – and GP appointments rising to \$42."

Mr Watt said Australians were entitled to good quality medical care without having to pay for it.

"That is what Medicare is all about, but unfortunately under this Government people are having to pay more to go and see a doctor and we don't want to see a doctor," he said.

"The Morrison Government's decision to freeze funding for doctors means many GPs and specialists in Central Queensland who decide to bulk-bill are unfortunately left out of pocket. Labor Candidate for Flynn Matt Burnett, Australian Senator Murray Watt and BITS Medical Doctor Gaston Boulanger

"They are left with no choice but to pass on more costs, leaving patients out of pocket. "Affordable healthcare should not be treated like a luxury in Central Queensland."

Member for Flynn Ken O'Dowd said contrary to Labor's claims, bulk-billing rates under the Liberal-National Government were at a record high – 88.7 per cent for the period from July 2020 to March 2021.

"This is 6.7 percentage points higher than the same period in 2012-13 (82.0 per cent) – when Labor were last in government," he said. "Providing Australians with affordable access to universal health care is a key pillar of the Australian Government's Long Term National Health Plan.

"Through the 2021-22 Budget, the Government is investing \$125.7 billion, an increase of over \$6 billion, over the forward estimates as part of its ongoing commitment to guarantee Medicare."

Mr O'Dowd said it included \$204.6 million to extend the Medicare Benefits Schedule (MBS) telehealth arrangements until 31 December 2021, bringing the total investment

in telehealth to \$3.6 billion.

"This is continuing to provide access to health services for all Australians regardless of where they live," he said.

"Importantly patients whose movements are restricted by a State or Territory public health order can continue to access support through telehealth."

Greens gun for Senate

Australian Greens Senate candidate Penny Allman-Pavne launched her campaign for power in Rockhampton last Thursday alongside Queensland Greens Senator and Deputy Leader Larissa Waters, pitching a wealth tax on billionaires and a massive home building scheme to convince Queenslanders to propel her into the Senate and give the Greens some additional sway over the next government.

"With more Greens in the parliament, we have a real chance of holding the balance of power," Senator Waters said on the day.

"And with the polls being the way they are, it's looking like a change-of-government election. So if we are in that position of the balance of power, like we were in 2010, we can push the next government to go further and faster on the issues that matter to ordinary people.'

Ms Allman-Payne, a state high-school teacher based in Gladstone, emphasised her connection to regional Queensland and redistributive inclinations.

"From my experiences living and working right across Queensland, I know that fully funding our schools and hospitals, making sure that we have a roof over our head and food on the table and tackling the climate crisis are not niche inner city concerns, they're existential challenges that affect each and every one of us, no matter where we live in Queensland, she said

"Australian politics needs a shake up because both major parties keep putting the interests of their big corporate donors ahead of our communities. But it doesn't have to be that way, we can end corporate donations. We can end dirty donations and we can make big corporations and billionaires pay their fair share.'

During a question and answer period, Ms Waters detailed what a Greens wealth tax might look like in practice.

'We'd love to see billionaires, and there's 122 of them in Australia, taxed an additional 6 per cent on their extremely large amounts of wealth and the parliamentary Budget Office has costed that, and it would raise a whopping

\$40 billion over 10 years," she said.

"Now that's money that could really be put towards improving people's lives. That could fund a roof over everyone's head, it could make sure our schools are properly resourced and teachers are properly paid and kids get the best quality education. And it could be a down payment on getting dental and mental care into Medicare.'

Ms Waters and Ms Allman-Payne also spoke at length about their affordable housing plan for Queensland.

'We want to see a massive investment by the federal government to build a million social homes over 20 years, about 20 per cent of that here in Queensland," Ms Waters said.

"We could make sure that everyone has a roof over their heads if the billionaires and the big corporations paid their fair share."

In regards to the state's pervasive resources industry, Ms Waters said the Greens would support mining for critical minerals, under strict conditions, but would work to phase out thermal coal in the short-term and metallurgical coal in the medium and long-term.

The Greens hope to transition away from thermal coal by 2030.

CQ Today pressed Ms Waters on how this transition might be enforced, and Ms Waters said:

"We'll be launching some very detailed policies about how we would manage that transition but it's pretty clear, the science says we need to act now, because we are imperiling the health of our older people, the productivity of our agricultural sectors and of course the very biodiverse values of nature that sustain all life.'

Ms Waters raised the possibility of a carbon price and a levy on thermal coal to push the transition.

"Many of the big coal companies themselves, big energy companies have already started to ramp down production, some have exited coal completely. This is happening, it's not just something that the Greens are warning about. This is reality. And if we don't plan for it, then workers would be the ones left to suffer," she said.

Local residents urged to sign up and donate to life

Senator Matt Canavan joined with Jo Reoch from Donate Life, and Lee Briskey, a recipient of a liver transplant 10 years ago to urge residents to sign up to be an organ and tissue donor as part of DonateLife Week.

'Without organ donation, we wouldn't have be standing here next to Lee. 10 years ago he received his new liver, and I'm sure he's eternally grateful for that chance to create more moments, to continue to run his business, and spend time with his family." Senator Canavan said.

"Lives like Lee's are the reason it's important to have this discussion and make this decision now while you're able to make that decision. I didn't even realise I wasn't registered this morning because I ticked a box on my license long ago, but I did it this morning and it only took a minute.'

DonateLife Oueensland's Jo Reoch said while the 2020 figures were encouraging given the uncertain times the region was facing last year with the start of the pandemic, she would like to see double that number register during this year's campaign.

"When Queenslanders are registered, their family have one less decision to make during the highly emotional time in their lives," Jo said.

"I wouldn't have seen my daughter graduate if it wasn't for the transplant," Lee Briskey, a recipient of a liver transplant 10 years ago, said

but when you're sick you can't do anything.

You've really got to get it out there to let people know you need to register. While I feel very sorry for the donor people's families because they've lost someone very dear to them, the person who helped me he helped seven people.'

Jo Reoch says the biggest barrier to families saying "yes" to donation is not knowing their family member was willing to be a donor.

"In a hospital setting, discussing organ and tissue donation comes at an intensely emotional time for families, usually associated with the unexpected death of their loved one.'

There are currently 1,800 Australians on the transplant wait list and an additional 12,000 people on dialysis for kidney failure.

The number of Australians signing on to become organ and tissue donors dropped by 16% last year as the Covid-19 pandemic grew.

"When donation is a possibility, it helps when families know what their loved one wanted. Across Australia we know that 9 in 10 families give consent to donation when their loved one was a registered donor, and this number is halved when a person is not registered and has not discussed donation with their family." Jo said.

"With a consent rate of 62 per cent in Queensland I urge residents to join the Great Registration Race for DonateLife Week to register if you haven't already, or to check you're registered if you think you are. It only takes one minute online to do either."

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Local Covid scare

Queensland Health says no transmission has been detected locally after a Brisbane woman diagnosed with Covid-19 travelled to Rockhampton.

The woman, an external contractor working on the Rookwood Weir project, tested positive to Covid-19 on 31 July after returning to Brisbane and is believed to have been infectious since 28 July.

After travelling to Rockhampton Airport at 8.30am on Wednesday, 28 July (Flight QF2362) the woman stopped at the Gracemere Shoppingworld Caltex service station before travelling to the Rookwood Weir worksite, returning to Rockhampton for the 6.40pm flight to Brisbane on 30 July (Flight QF2365).

In a statement on their website, project leader Sunwater said all employees on-site at Rookwood Weir were isolating in individual rooms and would remain in quarantine for 14 days.

"Each ensuite room has an individual airconditioning unit and workers are allowed outside by themselves for fresh air but there is no congregating," they said.

'Sunwater appreciates the impact on site staff and their families and is working with project partners to alleviate these impacts where possible."

Everyone at the camp completed Covid tests over the weekend and Sunwater provided contact details to Queensland Health for all other workers and visitors to the site between Wednesday 28 and Friday 30 July.

A group of students and teachers from Mt Morgan State High School is also isolating after visiting the Rookwood site on Friday. They have so far returned negative tests.

On Tuesday, Member for Rockhampton Barry O'Rourke said advised anyone who felt sick to get tested.

'Queensland Health tells me the close contacts of the worker have been identified and quarantined according to the health advice,"

"Sewage testing in Rockhampton has not revealed any positive results so far, which is very encouraging.

"Thank you to everyone who has gone out and been tested in the past two days. I know many of you have faced lengthy waits, which isn't ideal, and I know we're all very grateful for your patience.

"If you feel sick, please get tested - we can't afford to be complacent."



"We are a bit pissed off but it's life, you can't do much about it," Mr Viljoen said.

Mr Viljoen said organisers were going to go ahead with the event but soon realised it would have lost too much money

"After we did the number crunching, we just weren't going to get the numbers without those main acts," he said. "We made the decision instead of trying to recover from a weak start, we rather postpone and make sure we get it right."

While he was disappointed, Mr Viljoen said the cancellation presented the opportunity for next year's festival to be bigger and better.

Gladdy Council adopts Uluru Statement

In a general meeting on July 20, Councillor Natalia Muszkat raised a Notice of Motion regarding the Uluru Statement from the Heart. which calls on the Australian people to walk with First Nations in a people's movement for Voice, Treaty and Truth.

Cr Muszkat said the Uluru Statement was an invitation to the Australian people, from First Nation Australians.

"It asks us to support a First Nations voice in the Constitution and begin our journey to a better Australia," Cr Muszkat said.

'This is a proud moment on our reconciliation journey and aligns with the pillars of our Reconciliation Action Plan, launched in May 2018, and the work we have already undertaken as a business. As a Council, we've made our voice count to enable a First Nations voice to be heard and we support a First Nations voice to Parliament protected by the Constitution.

'We are a proud Council that truly values inclusiveness and equality and while the Uluru Statement from the Heart has been adopted state-wide by the Local Government Association of Queensland, and nationally by the Australian Local Government Association, it is wonderful to have it adopted at a local level," She said.

Cr Muszkat said council has also written to the current Prime Minister, the Federal Leader of the Opposition and local candidates in the next federal election for the Flynn electorate,

to express Gladstone Regional Council's support for the Constitutional Recognition for Aboriginal people and Torres Strait Islander people.

Gladstone Regional Council invites everyone in the Gladstone Region - home of the Byellee (Bailai), Gurang, Gooreng Gooreng and Taribelang Bunda people - to walk in a movement of the Australian people for a better future.

"We will go back to a drawing board and see where we can beef it up a bit more and bring something really worthwhile to the table.'

Mr Viljoen said he was in conversations with local artists to see if they could still bring a festival this year.

"We were talking to the guys and seeing if we can still put on a concert just for the hell of it because we were still looking forward to it," he said.

Mr Viljoen said tickets for next year's festival would be available soon, and he was lining up additional headliners.

This year's headliners Adam Harvey and Amber Lawrence are still locked in to perform at next year's festival.

Blackwater mine revived

Independent coal exploration and mining company QCoal Group will revive the Cook Colliery underground metallurgical coal mine south of Blackwater in partnership with ASXlisted Mastermyne, with operations expected to begin this year.

"Mastermyne have got a very good reputation in the industry to supply a full mining service, so that's why we have engaged with Mastermyne," QCoal Chief Operating Officer Peter Kane said in a telephone call with Gladstone Today.

"We haven't used them before. We're typically an open-cut metallurgical coal business, so this is our first underground, albeit a brownfields, an existing operation that we're restarting."

QCoal has held the mine in care and maintenance since purchasing it from Bounty Mining last year.

Re-starting Cook Colliery will take place

over two phases and an ASX announcement from Mastermyne on July 29 spells out the process in some detail.

"The project will be restarted over two distinct phases with the first phase commencing immediately," the statement reads.

"The Stage 1 works will see the Company re-commence the underground operations including bringing the operation out of care and maintenance and transitioning back into production. Stage 1 works will include re-commissioning of underground infrastructure, overhauling of mining equipment, establishment of production panels and all other associated administrative and procurement works. Stage 1 works is scheduled to commence immediately and be completed by late this calendar year. In parallel to the Stage 1 works, the parties will finalise a Mining Services Contract ("Contract') for the underground operations (Stage 2). The expected Contract value will be determined and communicated to shareholders once negotiations for Stage 2 are complete.'

Reviving production at the mine is expected to create some 160 jobs.

Mr Kane said the earlier challenges the mine experienced would be overcome this time around.

"Underground mining typically is more difficult than open-cut, in general terms. And added to that, the very poor run on coal prices in the past made that mine unviable. And QCoal bought it seeing potential for the future, which we're now in. So it's a pretty simple story," he said.

What's more, the company plans to deploy innovations in bord-and-pillar mining to make the enterprise a more viable one.

"By modifying existing bord-and-pillar mining methods, we're looking to make the mine more viable into the future," Mr Kane said.

Coal mined from Cook Colliery will be transported to a wash plant for processing and then railed out to the Port of Gladstone. From there, it will be exported to steel mills around the world.

The company expects to produce roughly 1 million tonnes of metallurgical coal per annum.

"What we're going to do is mine in the same area where the mine ceased for six years or seven years, and that gives us plenty of time to review the further reserves that are down there," Mr Kane said.

The Queensland Resources Council (QRC) has welcomed the news.

"When resources companies choose to invest millions of dollars into Queensland, this means more jobs, more royalties for the state budget and more money flowing through our economy," QRC Chief Executive Ian Macfarlane said in a press release last week.

"The fact that the two companies involved in bringing the Cook Colliery mine back into production are both Queensland-owned and based makes this announcement all the sweeter, and we congratulate QCoal and Mastermyne on this exciting new venture," he added.

Pensioners encouraged to apply for reduced rates

Ratepayers, who have recently been granted the pension, are encouraged to apply for Gladstone Regional Council's 2021/22 Pensioner Concession.

The concession has been increased since the 2020/21 financial year and provides a maximum amount of \$310 per annum for eligible pensioners.

Gladstone Region Mayor Matt Burnett said the Queensland Government also provided Pensioner Concession recipients with a maximum subsidy of \$200 per annum and a 20 per cent rebate on the State Emergency Management Levy. "Council's Pensioner Concession and the Queensland Government Pensioner Rate Subsidy Scheme greatly assist pensioners," Councillor Burnett said.

"Council recognises the unique needs of pensioners who want to continue to be independent and live in their own home and the concession is provided to encourage pensioners to do this where possible."

To be eligible, a person must hold one of the following concession cards:

High funds fly in

Four airports in the North Burnett Regional Council LGA are among 89 regional airports nationwide which will benefit from grants totalling nearly \$30 million under Round 2 of the Australian Government's Regional Airports Program.

Works start

The next stage of the Lake Awoonga Water Mains Renewal Project commenced on the weekend with works on water mains servicing Aerodrome Road from J. Hickey Avenue to Clark Street taking place.

The works commenced on 31 July, with residents notified in advance, and are expected to last until 20 December.

Construction work times will be Monday to Friday, 6.30am-6pm; and 8am-4pm Saturday and Sunday.

Some night works may be considered. Gladstone Region Councillor Chris Cameron said the Lake Awoonga Water Mains Renewal project would aim to deliver a more reliable water supply for our residents with the new infrastructure expected to help reduce unplanned water interruptions.

"The project includes removal of existing water mains, installation of temporary above ground water lines, installation of new water main and new water main connection, testing and activation of the new water main and removal of temporary water lines," Councillor Cameron said.

"These works will require some disruption to water supply and there may be some machinery noise generated by the works as well.

"Council advises motorists, pedestrians and cyclists to please be mindful of these works as they take place and progress along Aerodrome Road between J. Hickey Avenue to Clark Street."

Works have commenced at the J. Hickey Avenue end of Aerodrome Road.

The Lake Awoonga Water Mains Renewal project forms part of Council's 2021/22 Capital Works program.

This project commenced at New Auckland in early July (encompassing Sandpiper Avenue from Lorikeet Avenue to Cockatoo Drive) and those works are expected to be completed later this month. Water mains renewal works in the Gladstone Central area are set to commence later this year (covering Auckland Street from Tank Street to Short Street) and are expected to be completed by February 2022.

'Family owned, community focused'

Group here for Gladstone

Here for Gladstone is backing the Coordinated Community Response to Domestic and Family Violence (CCRDFV), a not-for-profit community group dedicated to conquering the pernicious effects of domestic and family violence (DFV) across the Gladstone region.

The support comes at a crucial moment as statistics on DFV present a troubling trend across the region.

Domestic Violence Protection Orders (DVO) lodged via the Gladstone Magistrates Court numbered 536 for the year 2019-2020, and 596 for the year 2020-2021, an 11.2 per cent increase.

CCRDFV Secretary Wendy Morris told CQ Today that in order to arrest and roll back this dark thread of violence, beginning difficult conversations out in the open was the necessary first step.

"So what we say to people is, for things to change and for the culture around domestic and family violence to change, we have to have some hard conversations, and we sometimes have to have some uncomfortable conversations. But we have to start conversations," she said.

The month of May is DFV Prevention month, symbolised by the colour purple, and CCRDFV's Paint the Town Purple campaign is designed to help trigger those necessary conversations.

"By asking people to paint their premises or their homes or their business purple, it has the potential to start that conversation," Ms Morris said.

In addition to emphasising the colour purple as a conduit to engagement with DFV, Here for Gladstone helped to finance the production and distribution of some 50 large-scale corflutes, each carrying critical messages related to DFV.

The corflutes, measuring 90cm by 1.2m,

were put up across the region, from Calliope to Boyne Island.

"The idea being that again, there was the potential for conversations to be started," Ms Morris said.

The journey out of DFV can be a difficult one and CCRDFV works to shepherd both victims and perpetrators into a brighter future.

The distribution of GLAD Packs is a small measure of support designed to ease that journey.

The packs include person care items such as

shampoo/conditioner, body wash and moisturiser but also have a few extra items such as a hair brushes, hair ties, lip balm, make-up, manicure kit earrings, reusable water bottle, socks and slippers.

Over a 12-month period, some 500 packs are distributed via CCRDFV, the local DFV women's shelter, DFV support services, faithbased agencies and even local schools.

The glad' in Gladpaks stands for 'Gladstone Life After Dark,' and Here for Gladstone also helped to organise items for the packs. Here for Gladstone is a community support program propelled by contributions from Rio Tinto Yarwun, Boyne Smelters Limited and Queensland Alumina Limited.

The program offers a sweep of support services across a range of sectors, from business and healthcare to childcare and licensing support.

Ms Morris said securing the support of Gladstone's industrial behemoths had greatly benefitted the work of her volunteer association.

"I guess for us, it's really exciting that Here for Gladstone and Rio are listening to what their staff are saying about what they think is important in the local community," Ms Morris said.

The work of the CCRDFV is crucial, and it is organisations such as these that generate the kind of empathy and concentration necessary to maintain a decent democratic society, in which everyone can get the chance to move out of dangerous circumstances or a second chance to move from negative behaviours into something more positive and life-affirming.

"That's what's most important to us, making sure that people know that no matter which sort of domestic family violence you're in, you're supported," Ms Morris emphasised.

"If you are a victim, yes, you need to be supported. But if you're a perpetrator, I guarantee you, you have had some life experience that means that aggression is the only communication that you understand. And we need to support those people to change their behaviours, because domestic family violence won't stop until perpetrators actually stop."

"We are here to support men and women, perpetrators and victims. Working towards a community free of violence, requires our whole community to be supported."

Gladstone Regional Council is exploring ways to get more travellers into the CBD.

Residents will be encouraged to have their say in a series of engagement activities regarding RV friendly parking in the region.

Gladstone Region Mayor Matt Burnett said Council had an interest in exploring parking opportunities within Gladstone CBD.

"Council would like to see more RV tourists turning off the Bruce Highway and exploring all that our region has to offer," Cr Burnett said.

"The Gladstone City area has plenty to offer for tourists and in February 2021 a black and grey water RV dump point was installed along Cemetery Road in West Gladstone. It will also have a positive economic benefit by allowing more local parents to get back into work or to take on additional hours if they chose. "The funds will support services in areas such as Mundubbera and Blackwater that may be need support to keep operating, or to fund capital projects to improve services and increase the number of places available."

Minister for Education and Youth Alan Tudge said more than 640 child care services around Australia would share in more than \$100 million through the program.

"We are committed to giving every Australian family access to quality child care, regardless of where they live or their circumstances," Minister Tudge said.

"In some remote areas, there may only be one or two child care services operating and it is critical we keep these open and help improve and expand facilities so more kids can attend.

"This program also helps services to run initiatives that reduce barriers which may oth-

erwise prevent local kids from accessing care.

Minister for Regional Education Bridget McKenzie said the CCCF would help ensure child care continued to be available for many families in Flynn.

"These grants will have tangible benefits for child care providers that will flow to local children and their families," Minister McKenzie said.

"It means more families in Flynn can take advantage of our Child Care Subsidy if they choose to work, learn or volunteer."

Including Thursday's announcement, the Government allocated more than \$220 million to over 1,000 child care services through the Community Child Care Fund since 2018.

The Morrison Government is investing around \$10 billion in child care this year to support around 1 million families. Our Budget delivered further support to reduce the out of pocket costs for parents with multiple children aged under six in care and a commitment to a \$2 billion preschool funding agreement for access to early learning for all children in the year before school.


Community engagement sought for rail trail project

Thoughts on National **Homelessness Week** Sir,

It is National Homelessness Week, which gives The Salvation Army, and other NFP organisations in the community, an opportunity to highlight the key issues affecting people experiencing homelessness in Australia. These issues can go unnoticed, they are often hidden but their impact can be devastating, and something needs to be done about them.

As the Salvation Army National Homelessness manager, I have seen and heard some heartbreaking stories. From mental health issues to alcohol and drug misuse, gambling addiction, family breakdown and cultural and economic intergenerational poverty. However, the most horrific trend we are seeing is the issue of premature deaths amongst those experiencing primary homelessness.

New research is showing that primary homelessness increases your risk of an early death between three and seven times, amounting to a life expectancy average of only 50 years of age. The most distressing part of this story is that many of these premature deaths are preventable.

These are not just numbers on a page. There are real people; someone's son or daughter, someone's mother or father, someone's friend or colleague. People forced into homelessness are dying too young due to a range of factors including the high cost of rental accommodation, shortage of social housing, job loss and ill health which can lead to poor physical and mental health outcomes.

I recall a man named Matthew, who was supported by The Salvation Army in Tasmania as a result of his primary homelessness experience. He was housed and tried to access mental health services to get back on his feet. Matthew experienced poor mental health as a result of his experience of homelessness, and he subsequently passed away from an accidental overdose as he tried to self-medicate.

It is because of people like Matthew, and so many others like him across Australia, that The Salvation Army want to bring this issue to light during National Homelessness Week. The Salvation Army are here for the most vulnerable people in our society. We work to care for and support those experiencing homelessness, not only to help them find affordable and secure rental housing, but to also journey with them to provide support and achieve positive outcomes.

We cannot do this alone. Housing and support are not the only issues required by people experiencing homelessness. The Salvation Army is calling for more support from the Commonwealth and State governments to ensure that all facets of homelessness are resourced, including the important issues of social housing supply. As we saw with Matthew, housing was not the only factor at play in his overall wellbeing, but with increased mental health and case management support we would hope to see a reduction in the number of premature deaths across the country.

Before the Fairbairn Dam was built in 1972, the town of Emerald had a population of just 650.

In the same year the town of Collinsville had a population of 2000.

Following the dam's construction, Emerald's population has grown by almost 20 times to be at 13,500 today. Collinsville's population has instead halved and sits at just 1000 today.

This shows the power of dams. Dams store water and they create jobs. Dams provide confidence in the future of a town because once built, people know that there will be an economic resource of water consistently available. This gives confidence to farmers to invest in centre pivots and channels to grow high value crops. Those crops require more labour, which creates more jobs. And the extra wealth must be managed creating even more jobs for accountants, lawyers and other professionals.

The LNP Government is building dams because they create jobs. It is just fantastic to see the Rookwood Weir project come out of the ground after Michelle Landry, Ken O'Dowd and I fought for that for a decade. The wall is currently being poured and within a year or so, water should start backing up behind the wall for 50 kilometres opening up an enormous amount of Central Queensland country.

But we are not stopping there. I joined Michelle Landry and George Christensen, at the other end of the Capricornia electorate, last week to announce further funding for the Urannah Dam project near Collinsville. The Federal Government has already funded the business case for this project and that shows that it stacks up.

The Urannah Dam project would create over 1000 jobs in construction and 600 jobs would be created long term in the Collinsville region. Around 20,000 hectares would be opened to new farming, Moranbah would be provided with a more reliable option for town water and a 1400 megawatt pumped hydro

system would help backup solar power at night in North Queensland.

The water will also help provide water security for coal mines through the northern Bowen Basin so they can expand on the back of booming demand for our coal. Once again defying the doomsayers, coal prices are at record highs.

We are now investing a further \$12 million to get the project through all its approvals and to its final design. That will make the project "shovel-ready" so that the proponents can attract private capital to help build the almost \$1 billion project.

The Federal Government's National Water Infrastructure Development Fund can help fund the capital costs. I am confident we will get this project built thanks to the tireless advocacy of Michelle Landry and George Christensen.

Australia has been built on the back of dam and water infrastructure construction. From the famed Snowy scheme to the Perth-Kalgoorlie pipeline, major water projects have built new areas and helped grow job opportunities. These projects have created lots of "Emeralds" right across Australia.

The biggest beneficiaries of these projects are the local country people that will see their town given a shot in the arm from the investment. People like Marrisa, who owns the local Collinsville post office, who was excited about our announcement when Michelle and I spoke to her last Friday.

That is ultimately why we build these things. To give back to those hard working Australians who deserve a better future given all the hard work and heartache they put in for their local towns.

Prayers answered: faith helps recovery after crash

This week Gladstone Today continues looking at cattleman Sir Graham McCamley's recollections from his book, Roads in the Sky.

In our 30th excerpt we look at the aftermath of Graham's life-threatening helicopter crash in 2007.

It had been a long day. Dr Sue Roberts from the Royal Flying Doctor Service accompanied Graham to Brisbane, and in the ambulance, to the emergency department at the Royal Brisbane Hospital, where Graham, on an ambulance gurney, was put in a queue with other injured patients.

It was just before midnight.

Jenny organised for Graham to be shifted to Greenslopes, a private hospital.

Here, senior neuro-surgeon Dr Ross Gurgo saw him briefly, although he never came



"As I was still alive with just an ambulance brace around my neck, obviously God was going to keep me alive for the rest of time. Shirley agreed that it was our prayers to our God that had made the difference.

"They later said I never should have never made it to the hospital. All the doctors and specialists who examined me said there was no way I could have been dragged away from the wreck of that chopper the way they did it, letting my head fall back and putting a log under my neck, then getting me into a rescue chopper, which was shaking like hell all the way to Rockhampton Airport - then into the road ambulance to the Rockhampton Base Hospital, where they wheeled me in and out of x-rays.



His eyesight had returned, his voice was in fine fettle and he had a list of orders he wanted to work through with Shirley.

While he had slept, he recalled, he had a marvelous dream, which to him simply confirmed that all was right in the world.

"I could see myself restored to full health at Tartrus, taking to Jenny," he said.

"And then I saw myself on Glenprairie and everything was looking great there too. Justin, my manager, was there and I said to him, 'It looks like you and Jenny don't need me -I'll head off back to Shirley at Yeppoon'.

"I got in the white Toyota Sahara and then I woke up."

Graham and Shirley's newly built home on the beachfront at Wattle Grove, Yeppoon, was ready for them to move into when Graham was released from hospital - but they would still spend regular time at Tartrus. It took some months of convalescing and rehabilitation for Graham to get back on his feet, but nothing would stop him from taking to the skies again.

past the doorway.

He informed Graham that he would need more x-rays, followed by a metal halo screwed into his head, or an operation. He felt that the only feasible plan was to operate and 'plate it all'.

"Your chances of surviving the operation are 50/50," he said, as he turned and walked off. The air felt icy.


When Dr Gurgo left for four days break,. Dr Bruce Hall took over.

He was older and more experienced. A lovely man, said Graham. He ordered one high density x-ray of the neck break and decided that Graham would only need a brace for 16 weeks.

"He said that whatever it was that had kept me from being totally crippled or dead by now would continue to save me. "I only had to move a fraction, a couple of millimetres, and I would have lost everything."

But Graham actually had more to put up with than a restrictive brace. the pain he was suffering was excruciating. He had split his pelvis and broken his ankle and shoulder but the worst injury was the neck.

They gave him a massive dose of morphine, but it made no difference. For two nights and three days, he was unable to sleep. Graham's voice was also affected, and his

eyesight. But he could still hear. Shirley took his hand and prayed. Her faith was always very private, but it was strong.

Graham, believing that he was dying, clung to the vision of Shirley holding his hand.

Shirley went back to the hotel and tried to sleep. Hearing nothing from the hospital by about 2.30am, she returned.

Her prayers had been answered. Graham had slept solidly for seven hours, then woken up.

Helen Madell, a psychologist, has a weekly segment on the station to talk about issues relating to mental health issues.

"Paul is a great host and both him and his producer Karyn (ABC Program Producer and Presenter Karyn J Wilson) make me feel very welcome and they give me plenty of time to prepare for the show," she said.

Ms Madell emphasised the importance of the ABC's regional coverage in her conversation with Gladstone Today.

"It means getting local content out to the people in the region, to issues that matter to them locally," she said.

"Though there are national and international issues that impact, we certainly see that with Covid, there are also finer logistics that happen on the ground that, and unless known, can cause a huge amount of distress for the public, so I think it's important that we have the grassroots also attended to."

Forest bathing at Mugul

Margaret Worthington, an African-born artist who re-located to Central Queensland some forty years ago, has developed a 'forest bathing' tour for visitors at the innovative Wrapt in Mugul art exhibition near Miriam Vale.

Ms Worthington has printed her own paintings onto eight large-scale medals and then attached the medals to trees around Mt Colosseum.

She encourages visitors to walk through the forest and subsume themselves into the natural world, with the medals and their images serving as a guide.

"Enjoy the energy/feeling of the area, walk and experience, breathing becoming slower," she writes in her personal blog site.

"These trees are our friends, we know their names and habits, we know the feeling of their bark smooth, tessellated, or fissured. We love them."

In a telephone call with Gladstone Today, Ms Worthington said she had spent roughly a month putting her vision together.

"I actually worked out the design how I wanted it, on the computer and then I worked with Gladstone printing services and then they printed them on composite aluminium," she said.

"I paint environmental images all the time and those were just ones that I thought would look nice on the trees and would have some meaning for the area."

Ms Worthington once lived at a copper mine in North Zambia, near the Congo border, and said she recognised some similarities between her home at the mine and the Gladstone region.

Both are highly industrialised centres surrounded by entrancing flora and fauna.

Her work traverses both fields: industry and nature.

Ms Worthington's career has been concen-

trated into a book by Sue Smith.

Titled 'Margaret Worthington: Land, Air, Sand, Sea, Spirt. 40 Years in Queensland', the 108-page illustrated book was published by Central Queensland University and serves as the first major study of Ms Worthington's art.

The book provides an overview of her life and work over the past 40 years and the intellectual processes which underpin her creative endeavour. In regards to her Mugul display, Ms Worthington said she was satisfied with the outcome.

"I was very happy. And I think it's got potential to use it again," she said.

Learning how to communicate with a marine radio

Last time we spoke about different types of marine radios and how to contact Marine Rescue to ask for a radio check to make sure that your radio is working.

Now that you know your radio is working, how do you use your radio to talk with someone else?

The first step is to make sure you are using the correct channel.

It's important to remember that there are two types of channels in use, calling channels and working channels. Calling channels are used to establish communication between yourself and the other boat or land based marine radio you would like to talk with.

Once you have established communication, you then move to a working channel to have your conversation. Channel 16 is used as a calling and Emergency channel and most other channels can be used as a working channel. In the Gladstone region also keep in mind that Marine Rescue Gladstone operate a repeater channel on channel 82. So, if you need to contact Marine Rescue Gladstone use channel 82 as this channel can transmit and receive over much longer distances than other channels.



If they hear you, they will answer and confirm that they have received your transmission.

Once they've acknowledged your call, you want to move onto a working channel, for example channel 72, to continue your conversation. So, you will simply say, "(their boat name) this is, (your boat name) please move to channel 72."

The other boat should confirm that they



Once you have selected your channel, it is straightforward to contact another boat. Below is an example of a how you might contact another boat:

Select the Working Channel if you know it, otherwise use the calling channel 16.

Listen to make sure no one else is transmitting.

Press the transmit button and say "(other boat name, other boat name, other boat name, this is (say your boat name)." have received your transmission and are changing channel.

You will both then change to the nominated working channel where you will follow the above process to re-establish communication and then continue your conversation.

We can also look at another simple example. Before going anywhere in your boat, you should always log on with Marine Rescue so that someone will know if you don't come back and will also know where to look for you! Of course, when you get back you should also log off.

Logging on with Marine Rescue is easy, all you have to do is:

Select the repeater channel, channel 82. Listen to make sure no one else is transmitting.

Press the transmit button and say "VMR Gladstone, VMR Gladstone, VMR Gladstone,

this is (say your VMR Membership number if you have one or Boat Name if you don't)."

Someone will answer and confirm that they have received your transmission.

Once they've stopped talking, simply tell them that you wish to log on and proceed to tell them how many people on board, where you are going, what time and where you are returning to.

If you are using a VMR Gladstone Membership number that is all the information they need. If you are using a Boat Name they will ask you for more details.

Once the VMR radio operator has all the information they need, they will say something like, "Member Number or Boat Name, this is VMR Gladstone you are on the Log enjoy your day" and you are good to go.

It's straightforward, takes less than a minute and is one of the best things you can do to look after your safety and the safety of everyone with you.

In the next edition we'll talk a bit about using your radio for emergencies.

Kerrie Sinclair says climate change is like a buffalo charging at us.

About that Buffalo, Bill?

My great-uncle Bill had a farm near Bajool. Like him, it was wild, tumble-down and fun to be around. He had a large herd of dun-coloured horses.

He loved duns - the most common colour of the ancient wild horse breeds - almost as much as he loved not giving warnings. Warnings about a water buffalo, for example.

My cousin and I, with our mothers, were visiting Uncle Bill one day and when the adults were content to sit and have a yarn, my cousin and I asked to go off for a walk to see the horses.

Uncle Bill said, "Sure."

But he failed to tell us something.

Mum had just plated up some cakes she had made for morning tea, so we were all distracted. My cousin and I stole slices to take away. Uncle Bill's face became glazed with anticipation, which would happen if lemon icing was involved. This perhaps explains why he failed to provide his young great-nieces with some essential information. Which is that he had just taken possession of a water buffalo.

I don't know why he did that - why he got a buffalo. But I didn't stand around asking unnecessary questions when that buffalo emerged, with its giant, angry, horned head and stomping hooves, from behind some trees and gunned for me and my cousin.

Stop standing around or hiding or blaming. For too long different groups have blamed different groups for why we've not decarbonised in the past four decades.

When I was a kid, in the 80s, Rockhamptonbased senator Stan Collard was saying we have to talk about and plan for ending use of fossil fuels.

We failed then because there wasn't enough care and attention focused on decarbonisation. But that was then, and this is now.

The world's biggest asset manager, Black-Rock, is buying a renewable energy developer in South Korea as it turns from fossil fuels. There is progress but we need to push for more to exit fossil fuels. And we need to shift to healthier diets, cutting out beef, lamb and dairy products.

Regarding the race to a sustainable economy, BlackRock CEO Larry Fink recently said, "We are investing in products and technology to help investors capture the opportunity presented by sustainable factors."

He sees scope for sweet opportunity, not a source of sour complaint.

Remember that Rockhampton's biggest single employer is CQ Uni, and its biggest employer by sector is health services. We are not beholden to the ghosts of coal and gas, both of which now so clearly represent the past. No. We can't be held back by what's passed.

Our future must be golden. We have community spirit, ideas and dynamism to apply to rapid decarbonisation. We need everyone involved now. Everyone talking about solutions, we need families and friends, we need faith organisations, school communities, business networks. It's a bonding thing, not a fragmenting thing.

It's building more jobs derived from goods and services that meet lasting needs, involvg repair and recycling, creat ng prod the long term.

Kerrie Sinclair says the uptake of renewable energy like wind power isn't moving fast enough.

It's very important now that everyone knows how valuable they are and how important are their actions and intentions regarding moving fast now to a sustainable economy.

We need everyone's ideas and all hearts in this. My Great-Uncle Bill didn't have a mansion. He didn't own much. That didn't matter. He did. He mattered to his family. And my mother and her little brood mattered to him. And he was a hero to me. So, we all had just what we needed. (I don't know if the buffalo did.)

We needed each other then and we all need each other now. Especially when facing big challenges. But it's important to know this decarbonisation challenge is entirely manageable and we've already, as shown by the huge take-up of renewable energy including rooftop solar panels, made a great start.

Now we just need to all pick it up, to pick up our responsibilities to slash emissions from buildings, transport, agriculture, aviation. With the right policies from governments matching community will, together we can run with it.

I just read a writer claiming humans will never be able to work together to achieve rapid decarbonisation. That makes me as mad as Uncle Bill's buffalo.

For anyone who thinks words are not important, this is German scholar Max Mullel quoted in a lecture series instigated by Scottish judge, Lord Adam Gifford. Gifford himself chose to work on commercial cases. He refused to judge criminal cases, believing those guilty before the law were too often people who had themselves been previously wronged by society. Muller wrote: "And if a study of language has revealed to us the true growth of the human mind, from its fossil period onward to the days of Shakespeare, it has taught us at the same time that this development of language was the work of myriads of human beings (and we are) even now building up new coral islands of words and thoughts for future generations to live on". CO, together we can make a healthier world. Here are two songs for us: John Farnham "Reasons"; "Have a Little Faith (In Us).

We ran. As did the buffalo.

The safety of the fence line was too far away. Something unexpected happened. And it saved us. One of my cousin's shoes fell off. The buffalo was distracted. We kept running and threw ourselves over the fence. When we looked back, the buffalo was stomping all over the shoe, then put its horn through it and wore it, as it wandered off to graze, like a happy pirate with an earring.

We laughed, almost as loud and hard as the storm-force lashing of words our mothers served Bill for letting kids roam unprepared into the path of a buffalo.

I tell you this story because the buffalo is like climate impacts barrelling at us. And we must gather ourselves and really respond now.

Here is the point of my story. My cousin and I could have tried to ignore the buffalo. But the buffalo was not going to ignore us. It had no intention of leaving us alone.

It's wrong to leave our kids with a crisis. We adults must now do the right thing. We need speedy decarbonisation now so we can give our young a manageable planet with good jobs that have a lasting future.

Big business is moving but it's nowhere near enough. And no government's decarbonisation polices currently are enough. As an example, BP and Shell are investing in solar, wind projects, EV charging networks and also hydrogen for trucks, but oil and gas has to be wound down fast and it looks like they will not allow that.

We need government policies supporting or enabling business and society as we all work as hard as we can to tame that buffalo and make sure we create a healthy, manageable place for our voung.

No one is saying we have to take the cake away. Because if we listen not to the voices who say, "Ignore the buffalo", but listen instead to those dedicated to creating a safe, decarbonised way of life, we can have our cake and eat it, too.

Remember how some people attacked the US Capitol Building after the US election? There was one person there wearing a buffalo head-dress. It was a frightening moment to see even through a TV screen.

I wonder how much of that was because those people felt left behind and abandoned. They didn't feel valued.

This biographical historical drama charts India's transition into independence in the 194Os, with the dependable Hugh Bonneville portraying the last Viceroy of India, Lord Mountbatten, and Gillian Anderson playing his wife, Lady Edwina (both pictured right). Director Gurinder Chadha ticks all the right boxes, highlighting the religious and cultural disparities of the partition. It looks extravagant, and Chadha manages to weave the personal into the political. The romantic subplot (represented by Manish Dayal's and Huma Qureshi's characters) may be slightly sentimental, but it goes to show that even geopolitical stories are human stories after all.





TUESDAY THE HUNDRED WITH ANDY LEE NINE, 845pm

Could this new show be the most of-themoment comedy of recent times? The brainchild of comedian Andy Lee, and hosted by him too, it's an ingenious set-up for a world now accustomed to connecting through screens. A celebration of 50 years

As Covid-19 wreaks havoc across Queensland for event organisers, the Gladstone Eisteddfod committee were thankful they were able to celebrate their 50th anniversary.

Hundreds of Gladstone residents and students will perform at the Gladstone Entertainment Convention Centre for the Gladstone Eisteddfod throughout August and September.

President Elizabeth Jones said this year's event was 'stressful' with lockdowns across the nation.

"It's really a case of dancing on a slippery floor for everyone to put anything on at the moment," Ms Jones said.

was able to do that," Ms Horneman-Wren said.

Ms Horneman-Wren said this year's standard of students was good but unfortunately numbers were down..

Other celebrations included a traditional smoking and dance celebration, Naidoc activities, food stalls and BBQ's.

Mayor of Banana Shire Council Nev Ferrier said the day was a very significant celebration that brought everyone together through healing and connection.

The Star of Taroom was pulled from the earth 45 years ago.

A Veterinarian Jim Danalis was working on a cattle station in the early 1970's when the large and interesting rock caught his eye.

He wrapped a chain around the 160kg stone and pulled it from its resting place with a tractor and took it back to Brisbane where it stayed for 45 years.

Jim Danalis wanted to return the Star back to its original home, but unfortunately died of cancer in 2019.

He discussed returning the stone with his son Johnny who took up the challenge.

Jim's son Johnny Danalis led the walking trek from Brisbane to Taroom carrying the

DYING TO KNOW – ARE YOU PREPARED?

Tough questions to ask

There are some questions that need answering, no matter how difficult they might be. When a loved one passes it can be difficult to decide how they would like to be honoured for their funeral if no instructions have been left. Here are a few questions to consider when thinking about planning your end of life journey. **Burial** or cremation

The number of people in Australia choosing to be cremated is steadily increasing. Whilst there is some variance between states and territories, cremations now outnumber burials. Cremation funerals are much higher in city areas where crematory facilities are available. Rural and remote regions predominately choose burials.

People have a choice of either burial or cremation.

In certain cultures cremation is not favoured (or may be prohibited within the relevant faith belief). In other cultures the opposite may occur, with cremation being the custom, for example in the Hindu tradition.

Ultimately, this decision is a matter of personal choice.

Future trends may see higher instances of cremation due to increasing limits on cemetery space within or convenience to population centres.

How much choice does the family have in arrangements?

The family has absolute choice with certain exceptions as in the case of coronial investigation in some murder cases, where permission may be given for a funeral by burial only.

A funeral director can volunteer options cial worker or relevant government office.

to a family but ultimately it is the family's right to choose whatever they wish, providing necessary legal requirements are met.

There may be some variation between states and territories within Australia, however, in most instances relevant health departments require the deceased to be placed in a coffin or casket for burial or cremation. In the case of cremation the coffin or casket must be combustible.

Again in certain states funerals may be government assisted in the event of insufficient funds.

Such funerals have limitations on choices. Advice, when necessary, should be given in the first instance by a funeral director, social worker or relevant government office.

What is embalming and when is it required

Essentially, embalming is the process of replacing bodily fluids with chemical fluids for the purposes of: preservation of the body, infection control, and enhancing the presentation of the deceased.

Embalming can be minimal or unnecessary in some instances; partial for the benefit of families wishing to 'view' and/or when the funeral may be within a week; or full embalming as may be expected in some cultures or when the body is to be repatriated interstate or overseas.

Is a viewing of the deceased necessary

A viewing gives loved ones the opportunity to see and spend time with the deceased

prior to the funeral.

Again, in some cultures it may also occur during the funeral. An identification viewing is necessary in coronal reported details and occurs at the coroner's facility prior to funeral arrangements.

In some states it is also obligatory for a person who knew the deceased to view and sign an official identification form which must be sighted and retained by the crematorium authority prior to cremation.

In a general sense, otherwise there is not an obligation to view, however, the therapeutic benefits of a viewing to the grieving process are well regarded and recommended. It is nonetheless a matter of personal choice and requires sensitivity in approach, the physical environment and setting. Provided explanations are given to children in language that they can understand, there is no reason why they should not have the opportunity to be involved - however, allow them to decide.

Viewings can offer these chances we wish we had to bring an end to unfinished business, confirm the reality of death, and to say the "I love you", "I'm sorry", "If only" words we may wish to say.

What are the ashes and how will I receive them

After the cremation process only the heavy bones of the deceased are left. They are granulated to provide the "ashes".

Each funeral home or crematorium will have a different process.

It is best to discuss these details with your funeral director.

reflects strongly on your employer.

I'm not sure that employees understand that wearing a branded uniform comes with responsibilities (uniform and no uniforms for corporate/business is completely another debate).

Those responsibilities are part of a very valuable aspect of any business and that is community perception. I understand that perception is just that 'perception' and that the judgement people make on other people may not be factual, nevertheless a person's perception is their own reality. When we the public see or observe someone in a corporate uniform behaving in a manner that is unfriendly, rude etc then we make judgement on that organisation not necessarily on the person alone.

I understand that part of good leader-

ship within an organisation, is having your employees wear a branded uniform and feel part of something good and lasting. That employee becomes part of that organisation's marketing tool, an opportunity to turn around someone's perception about your organisation to become positive. Leadership comes from every aspect of an organisation not just from the top brass.

Remember first impressions matter, for good or bad. It means the difference between a positive or negative reflection on your company. Positive first impressions lead to social cohesion rather than bias or prejudice against the logo you wear.

So, I challenge employees wearing uniforms to be the opportunity for their employer, be the one that changes someone's perception about your organisation.

Welcome Azalea blooms

It must be close to a change of season, because that is always when you start seeing the beautiful displays of Azaleas when driving around the streets of our towns at the moment.

Azaleas would be one of the most popular of all garden shrubs grown around the world and is one plant that does stand out from the crowd, with its spectacular flowers.

There is always debate as to whether an Azalea is a Rhododendron or not.

While it is true they are both from the Rhododendron family I am of the group that believe they are separate Genus of their own and not a sub-group within a Genus.

Either way I love their flowers at this time of the year.

For many years the spectacular Azalea garden of Gertrude Camm formed a picture of floral beauty. Her Lilly Avenue garden contained over 200 different varieties of Azaleas.

Over the years Ms Camm won many Garden Competition prizes and inspired a whole new generation of Azaleas enthusiasts. Her garden proved Azaleas are very water-wise, genuinely hardy and will grow in most parts of Central Queensland, even on a hillside, with only a little bit of effort.

Probably the most important point to remember when planting azaleas is that they need an acidic soil type, that is, a soil pH of between 5.5 and 6.

To successfully grow azaleas around new homes, brickwork or where any form of concreting has been constructed, it is usually best to add a handful of sulphur per square meter to the garden area and work well into the soil.

As soon as your Azalea has finished flowering, the shrub should be pruned back by about

one third

Always remember when transplanting from a pot to the garden, that you never place the top of the root ball any deeper than the top of the garden soil.

I wouldn't recommend the use of any fertiliser just at the moment, but, from when the flower blooms finish, usually in mid-spring, I would fertilise regularly, every three weeks with a good organic fertiliser such as blood and bone, with a suitable slow release fertiliser and cease around Easter.

No more than a tablespoon of fertiliser per plant is required, as there is truth in the saying that "a little and often is better than a lot at once". You can also liquid feed your Azaleas with Charie Carp, through the warm months to supplement your initial Spring feed. Liquid fertiliser can be poured or sprayed over the entire plant for either foliage or root feeding. barley straw, and even pine bark, are the most suitable types of mulching to use, but never use peanut shells. While this is attractive mulch, it will slowly kill your plant as it turns your soil alkaline, that is, it increases the pH. One of the biggest mistakes made with mulching is placing the mulch too close to the stems of the plant, which effectively creates an incubator for disease (this goes for any tree or shrub in your garden, not just azaleas).

soil and also prevent the roots from becoming

overheated.

Azaleas are shallow rooted and prefer a well-drained position, but never allow them to dry out. A couple of deep waterings per week is preferable to a light daily sprinkling.

A drip watering system is ideal for them as it saves water, really soaks the ground.

Always be mindful to never position your plant where the reflective heat from a wall or fence can retard new growth and dehydrate the plant, a position with morning sun is best. ance and often there are little red spots on the underside. With a magnifying glass it is possible to see the red spider mites and the little lace fly. Red Spider Mite, Thrips and Azalea Lace Bug are the main problems, from now right through until mid to late autumn.

As the new season's growth appears, keep a

close check on the foliage, both sides, looking

Damaged leaves take on a silver

If your azaleas leaves are yellowing, with the only green showing prominently in the veins, and the tips of the leaves beginning to burn, this is the first sign that your soil is starting to become alkaline, and this is a death sentence for your azalea.

Indicas originate from China, are evergreen and are the largest and most popular varieties. They generally have larger leaves and flowers than kurumes.

Gumpo are very low growing compact azaleas. They tend to bloom well after the main azaleas season is over. Useful for edging a garden beds.

Rural Matters Science mixed in politics

Scientists should never seek to hold themselves above scrutiny.

But in his Letter to the Editor in QCL on 22 July, 'Let's keep politics out of science', Dr Ross Hynes of The Royal Society of Queensland seeks to shoot down AgForce and other industry groups calling for the creation of an independent Office of Science Quality Assurance, stating repeatedly that "peer-reviewed" publications are, well, peerless.

In his letter, Dr Hynes states that a new office would "undermine the traditional capacity of the public service to provide trustworthy advice...politicising what ought to be objective analysis."

But from where AgForce, other industry groups, and rural communities and producers stand, science has been in bed with political parties of all colours and stripes for decades.

Agriculture has frequently been on the receiving end of flawed, highly questionable, peer-reviewed science used to devastatingly debilitating effect when legislating on areas including vegetation and the Great Barrier Reef.

Science has in fact, with each passing decade and astonishing advancement, become less trustworthy because of the very 'spin' Dr Hynes would like politicians, commentators, and lobbyists to avoid.

Obvious by omission to this list of people accused of bending scientific facts to achieve their own ends are greens groups. In fact, anyone whose opinions might align with the views of The Royal Society itself. There are countless examples where the rigour of peer-reviewed publications has been questioned in the medi-

cal, education, and environmental fields.

In 2019, Australia's Chief Scientist Dr Alan Finkel identified several issues with the integrity and calibre of Australian research in his article in The Conversation, 'There is a problem': Australia's top scientist Alan Finkel pushes to eradicate bad science'. In July 2020, the Queensland Crime and Corruption Commission released an audit report into reducing the risk of research fraud, often triggered by the scientific requirement to "publish or perish". In calling for a national Office of Science Quality Assurance, AgForce and industry groups are pursuing a reform into 'trustworthy knowledge', untarnished by politics, activists, or funding-dependent scientists.

Why any scientist worth his salt would question that level of independent oversight and rigour should perhaps be the subject of its own independent analysis.





Despite the NRL players quarantined inside of the bubble, the two teams were forced to stay locked down in Brisbane while the NRL desperately scrambled to get the game underway.

Eventually our match, which would have been played in front of a sold-out Rockhampton crowd, was played behind closed doors in the isolated Suncorp Stadium with fake noise echoing around the arena.

What is more infuriating for many fans is the lack of apology from the NRL, Queensland Government or the ARLC, because this has torn out a predicted \$1 to \$2 the current Covid situation and lockdown in South East Queensland.

In a press conference on Tuesday morning Executive Manager of Advance Rockhampton, Greg Bowden touched on the cancellation.

"Unfortunately we did have that cancellation on Saturday morning. With history in our grasp with the Rabbitohs and Dragons. The Rabbitohs had actually landed on the tarmac in Rockhampton but the plane was turned around," he said.

"The Dragons hadn't left Brisbane but having had that cancellation it is a real pity. I feel for all those people attending the event.

"Whether they travelled from far or they were locals it was going to be a great event.

"We have assured people via email and text message yesterday [Monday] that we'd "The refunds don't necessarily mean we won't be getting another NRL game, we want to be very clear on that," he said.

"We are working, as is the Rockhampton Leagues Club as is Queensland Rugby League, to get another game for Central Queensland and Rockhampton.

"Those negotiations will happen over this week and hopefully the Leagues Club and Queensland Rugby League can bring something back to council to see if the council can be involved in that exercise.

"I think the chances (of securing another NRL game) are very, very good. It would appear with what is happening in South East Queensland right now, although unfortunate, could be an advantage for us.

"Because we don't see the NRL leaving Queensland anytime soon. So that means the said the money was still there and on the table for the NRL.

"As a major sponsor, our sponsorship is still intact. We have incurred some ticketing cost, of course, that is a cost for us," said Mr Bowden.

"But on that front, it is the Leagues Club which is the host of the event and the underwriter of the event.

"But from a city perspective, it's really a ticketing cost and some minor marketing costs. Not a huge amount but hopefully that means when the Leagues Club secures another game that the mayor and councillors look favourably on that opportunity."

Despite the Brisbane lockdown and cancellation of the NRL match the Professional Bull Riding event at The Great Western Hotel still went ahead and had a very strong crowd.

"A lot of these kids are 13 or 14, it's a little bit big for them right now but they do get it. It's a big vision for them but I've been talking to them and they've been saying, how good would it be to go," he said.

"And I've been saying to them if you start now and start putting the effort in that's the best way to start.

"So they've come in and all have been a bit more excited and looking for the opportunity and when they announced it was going to be in Brisbane, I think quite a few kids, not just in Judo but in all different sports, are thinking that this could be a great opportunity.

"It's going to be pretty fantastic in the runup to 2032.'
