Project job boom

A key project in the impending renewables-led jobs boom in Central Queensland is expected to create 2,000 direct and indirect jobs in Gladstone.

The Hydrogen Utility's (H2U) H2-Hub $^{\text{TM}}$ project at Yarwun was the focus at the Australian Ammonia Energy Conference, held virtually across the country on Friday.

The Yarwun project is planned to be built in stages over the next ten years to produce up

to 3 Gigawatts in electrolysis plant, and up to 5,000 tonnes of ammonia production capacity.

A strategic and suitably-located 171 hectares site in the Yarwun State Development Area (SDA) was secured by H2U under a Sale of Land Agreement with the Queensland Minister for Economic Development (MEDQ) in 2020.

The site will integrate up to eight industrial scale process trains to coincide with Gladstone's port.

Speaking from Gladstone, H2U CEO Dr At-

tilio Pigneri presented to the conference about the future of their multi-billion-dollar project and how local workers stood to benefit from the new jobs that would be created.

Dr Pigneri said Gladstone was leading the pack in terms of the production and potential export of hydrogen and ammonia in Australia.

"Gladstone's proud history as an industry town and its strategic location as a port city means it truly is best placed for this new energy era in Australia," he said.

"The green hydrogen and ammonia indus-

try will be a massive win for the local region and provide ongoing job opportunities for locals into the future.

"Our project alone will create more than 2,000 direct and indirect jobs across the construction and operation phases, and we are just one of many hydrogen projects in the pipeline for the region.

"We are already working to lock in local supply chain partnerships across a variety of sectors to support local employment."

The vandalism of a Clinton school is expected to cost \$20,000 to repair the damages, according to one of the city's top cops.

In an interview with 4CC Breakfast, Sgt Wayne Butcher revealed juveniles were at the centre of a string of vandalism attacks across

On 25 August, multiple buildings under construction at St John's on J.Hickey Avenue were sprayed with graffiti. Sgt Butcher told 4CC's Barry "Hammo" Hamilton the school had suffered \$20,000 worth of damage.

"They spray painted all the security cameras, just being general nuisances and graffiti all over the Clinton, shops and the like," Sgt Butcher said. Sgt Butcher said unfortunately the school and business owners had to foot the bill to remove the graffiti.

"The school and the owners of the shop unfortunately," he said. "You'd like to think the parents would come aboard and approach the school and offer some type (of compensation) but that is all we can offer them.

Sgt Butcher said two 14-year-old boys and a 15-year-old girl were later charged with 14 offences including Enter and Commit, Wilful Damage and Stealing for the vandalism.

Confusion as signs stolen

Tax agent Kerry Anger placed a sign for her business The Gladstone Office on her Beecher property along the Dawson Highway two years ago, and since then it has been stolen twice.

Ms Anger believes the latest theft happened sometime on August 27 or 28.

"I'm at a loss," Ms Anger said.

"I haven't knowingly done anything to upset someone, so the mentality is beyond me."

Ms Anger said the sign was lawfully placed on her own property, and was council-ap-

After it was stolen the first time, Ms Anger had the sign deadbolted for extra protection against thieves.

She said this time round, the thief would have had to use a ladder and tools to remove the sign again.

"It took someone a lot of energy to remove it," she said.

"The first time it happened I thought 'ah well someone has a gripe' and just let the universe handle it, I reported it to the police but there was nothing much they could do.

"I left it for two years and it happened again.

"I naively thought I could just risk it this time round and hopefully people have moved on but it wasn't the case.'

Unfortunately Ms Anger's business was not the only one that had been targeted in the area, with other businesses reporting the same bizarre circumstances happening to them.

One of my neighbours had contacted me saying the same thing happened to them when

they had a sign out of the front of their house and it was ripped out of the ground," she said.

"I think it's somebody with their own set of

Gladstone Police Sgt Wayne Butcher said no one had been charged yet.

"Investigations are continuing and it appears to be a local problem with what appears to be someone in the area not appreciative of the location of the sign," he said.

Ms Anger said she has to resort to installing security cameras, which will not come at a cheap price.

"It's too far away from the house to have wifi access so to put security cameras in it has to be cellular and that's a big expense," she said.

"It's beyond frustrating, this sign had gotten me new clients and it had only been up for two

"Now it's an out-of-pocket hassle."

Ms Anger is asking for community support to help track down the thief.

She asks for any dashcam footage or anyone who might have seen any bizarre behaviour on August 27, August 28 on the Dawson Highway.

"I just think if somebody is doing this I'd hate to think what else they are doing," she said.

"Police are investigating but without evidence I don't think any of the charges will stick.

"I hope with the highway traffic going past, I'm hopeful someone saw something or had dashcam footage."

Ms Anger thanked the community for the support she's received on social media.

Lots of people have reached out wishing me all the best in resolving it."

The young and young-at-heart enjoyed some serious fun at World Science Festival Queensland's Gladstone community day on Sunday 29th August, with 1754 guests finding their fascination with science in a welcome return to the Central Queensland region.

Headline events included The Kids Variety Hour with Big Bang Education and Dr Karl Kruszelnicki, who answered science questions virtually via a live stream to the event, missions to Mars with CQ University and live experiments with STEM Punks.

The City of Science returned by popular demand featuring science innovations, drones, virtual reality and robots, Queensland Museum scientists, archaeologists and palaeontologists who delighted crowds with demonstrations, fossils and live specimens.

Queensland Museum Network CEO Dr Jim Thompson said the organisation was really excited to have the festival return to Gladstone in 2021 after Covid-19 cancelled the event last year.

"It's been two years and Gladstone always welcomes the World Science Festival," he said.

"This year, we have got more science, plenty of activities for kids and for adults, plus a range of different things to do and see that the whole family will enjoy."

Mr Thompson said at its core, Queensland Museum was a science and natural history museum, so it tried to promote science at every opportunity.

"We value partnerships like the one we have with Shell's QGC business to foster STEM subjects and learning throughout Queensland," he said

"We want to inspire the scientists of the fu-

ture, and World Science Festival is a great way to do that."

Toolooa State High School teacher Dave Capill spoke with event organisers regarding the festival's impact on budding science enthusiasts

"Events like the World Science Festival are an awesome, authentic opportunity to see science in practice," he said.

"Coming from a high school perspective, it is also an opportunity for students to have a look at future careers."

Innovation key part of growing our food production

Central Queensland is home to a diverse range of food from beef and seafood to sugar cane and mangos. However, the agricultural economy relies heavily on science and innovation to support growth and sustainability.

As part of National Science Week, CQUniversity's CQ Festival of Food showcased the scientific processes involved in the production of food through a series of engaging experiments for primary school students.

CQUniversity Senior Lecturer, Australia Pacific LNG STEM Central Lead Dr Linda Pfeiffer collaborated with industry experts to develop relevant and engaging science experiments that provide students with a unique opportunity to explore the science behind food.

The series of experiments included four different themes: Cane Train (Mackay), Meet the Meat (Rockhampton), fishing industry (Gladstone) and Ag-Tech and dairy (Bundaberg).

Dr Pfeiffer said the themes chosen were significant to the agricultural and food technology industry in Central Queensland.

"It is important for students to understand the connection between science and food production and agriculture," Dr Pfeiffer said.

"We developed these innovative programs

to imprint skills of agricultural concepts and increase knowledge of tools and systems."

Dr Pfeiffer and her team worked closely with Northview State School in Mackay, the Advanced Technology and Innovation Centre in Rockhampton, St Francis Catholic Primary School in Tannum Sands and Elliot Heads State School in Bundaberg to record demonstrations of the experiments for future use.

"Leading up to National Science Week, we visited four schools and with their participation we recorded experiments which are available on our website, along with the downloadable resources for each experiment." Dr Pfeiffer explained.

Experiment materials are available for teachers to borrow at Mackay, Rockhampton, Gladstone and Bundaberg campuses until the end of the year.

CQUniversity's CQ Festival of Food was awarded \$16 800 in this year's round of the National Science Week grants.

Dr Pfeifer said active participation by schools will cement the long-term sustainability of the program, as teachers gain knowledge and develop their skills on the scientific experiment process and implement these experiments in the classroom now and into the future.

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Bill passage recommended

Parliament's Health and Environment Committee has recommended the passage of the Voluntary Assisted Dying Act 2021 following a three-month of inquiry into the controversial bill.

The bill, designed by the Queensland Law Reform Commission (QLRC), will permit eligible Queenslanders to access voluntary assisted dying (VAD) from 2023 onwards.

In order to be eligible for VAD, a person must have a terminal illness which is expected to cause death within 12 months. Furthermore, the person must consider his or her suffering intolerable, possess decision-making capacity in relation to VAD and act voluntarily and without coercion.

The committee heard submissions from over 6000 people and organisations and conducted five public hearings in regional and Southeast Queensland and has concluded that the bill should be passed in its present form without amendments.

"In considering all the evidence to this in-

quiry, to the inquiry by the Health, Communities, Disability Services and Domestic and Family Violence Prevention Committee of the 56th Parliament (the former committee), as well as the QLRC Report, the committee has formed the view that this Bill should be passed without amendment," the report reads.

In a telephone call with GladstoneToday, Committee Chair Aaron Harper, the state Labor member for Thuringowa, said he was confident he understood the views of Queenslanders and that a majority of the people supported legalising VAD.

"I'm of the firm view we've listened to Queenslanders," he said.

"I'm really looking forward to getting in and debating this."

The committee report is extensive, coming in at over 200 pages. It details every aspect of the bill and the arguments, positions and complexities that intersect with its various sections.

A central tension coursing through the bill revolves around achieving an appropri-

ate balance of rights between two competing

The bill introduces a new right; namely, the right of an individual to choose the time and manner of his or her own death.

In certain circumstances, this new right conflicts with pre-existing rights ostensibly guaranteed by law, notably the right to freedom of speech and freedom of conscience.

The bill acknowledges that these traditional rights will be impacted and even undermined the new law, but nonetheless preferences the right to access VAD over them.

"The QLRC considered that by allowing health practitioners to make a conscientious objection, but requiring practitioners who do so to provide information about a health practitioner, service provider or navigation service who is likely to be able to provide the requested assistance, the Bill attempts to ensure 'the exercise of a right to refuse to participate should not hinder or deprive a person of their right to access a process that is lawful'," the report reads.

The committee supports the reasoning of the QLRC:

"While the provisions in the Bill that enable an individual's conscientious objection to participating in voluntary assisted dying impose obligations which may the limit the right to freedom of conscience and belief, those obligations promote the rights of others to access health care, and to promote the values of dignity and autonomy and as such, the committee considers the limitation reasonable and justifiable."

Committee members were not unanimous in their support for the bill.

Stephen Andrew, the state One Nation member for Mirani, and Dr Mark Robinson, the state LNP member for Oodgeroo, prepared dissenting reports.

Rob Molhoek, the state LNP member for Southport and deputy chair of the committee, meanwhile, offered a statement of reservation.

Parliamentarians are expected to debate the bill in mid-September. State Labor member for Gladstone Glenn Butcher has previously expressed support for legalising VAD.

Hydrogen to be job boom

The Hydrogen Utility's (H2U) H2-Hub™ project at Yarwun is expected to create 2000 direct and indirect jobs in Gladstone.

The facility was the focus at the Australian Ammonia Energy Conference, held virtually across the country on Friday.

The Yarwun project is planned to be built in stages over the next 10 years to produce up to 3 Gigawatts in electrolysis plant, and up to 5000 tonnes of ammonia production capacity.

A strategic and suitably-located 171 hectares site in the Yarwun State Development Area (SDA) was secured by H2U under a Sale of Land Agreement with the Oueensland Minister for Economic Development (MEDQ) in

The site will integrate up to eight industrial scale process trains to coincide with Gladstone's port.

Speaking from Gladstone, H2U CEO Dr Attilio Pigneri presented to the conference about the future of their multi-billion-dollar project and how local workers stood to benefit from the new jobs that would be created.

Dr Pigneri said Gladstone was leading the pack in terms of the production and potential export of hydrogen and ammonia in Australia.

"Gladstone's proud history as an industry town and its strategic location as a port city means it truly is best placed for this new energy era in Australia," he said.

"The green hydrogen and ammonia industry will be a massive win for the local region and provide ongoing job opportunities for locals into the future.

"Our project alone will create more than 2000 direct and indirect jobs across the construction and operation phases, and we are just one of many hydrogen projects in the pipeline for the region.

"We are already working to lock in local supply chain partnerships across a variety of sectors to support local employment.

"Importantly H2 Hub™ Gladstone will be powered by 100 per cent renewable power supply, creating even more construction jobs in the process.

Earlier this year, H2U announced a partnership with multinational German-based energy company RWE to import green hydrogen to Germany.

At the conference on Wednesday they announced they were putting together a consortium to access some of the \$2 billion H2Global funding set up by the German government to help expedite the development of export-scale renewable hydrogen projects.

Dr Pigneri said green ammonia was to be a key part of the global energy distribution chain, providing value for money for Australian production and export companies.

"The predicted growth in this industry is being driven by demand from potential export markets in Asia for power generation and zeroemission shipping," he said.

"Our Gladstone project is currently moving through the approvals process and is expected to be operational by 2025'

"Given the existing workforce and skills are already available we expect to not only be operational by 2025, but to be expanding by

No market for rebuild of Callide exploded turbine

Queensland will have enough generation capacity to meet our forecast electricity demand for the next decade, according to the Australian Energy Market Operator's (AEMO) annual Electricity Statement Of Opportunities (ESOO).

Queensland Conservation Council Director, Dave Copeman, says AEMO's modelling confirms that Queensland has an oversupply of coal units and does not need to rebuild Callide C4, which exploded in May.

"This AEMO report demonstrates we have enough capacity without rebuilding C4. Why should we waste government money rebuilding a carbon polluting, coal burning turbine when it could be better spent on renewable energy or storage," Mr Copeman said.

Callide C4 will definitely be out of action for the peak period of summer 2021-22. AEMO's forecast shows that its absence will have a negligible impact on the reliability of Queensland's electricity supply. AEMO's report also shows that Queensland's cur-

rent oversupply of coal fired power stations will make it harder to operate the system securely as minimum demand plummets

"The renewable energy future is already here and the transition is progressing faster than previously predicted. Queensland's coal power stations will need to be phased out and we will need to invest in more flexible technologies such as batteries to allow our state to achieve the longer term benefits of green export industries," Mr Cope-

Residents who went to the event enjoyed entertainment from DjB, a fashion show choreographed by Lynda from Runway 7 as well as a twilight market.



How Covid has taught our leaders empathy

COVID-19 has been one of history's biggest disruptions to the workplace and has led organisations of all sizes and types to reassess how they operate. It has also led many leaders to leave behind pre-pandemic management practices and has forced them to adopt a more emotionally intelligent and empathetic style of management.

Here's 5 ways COVID has taught our leaders

Where is the water?

Green hydrogen is the latest alternate energy solution touted by the State Government to meet it's 50 per cent Renewable Energy Target by 2030.

Many industry and business representatives are on board as they aspire to meet commitments to decarbonize Australian industry.

The Gladstone Hydrogen Ecosystem is part of the overall plan.

What is green hydrogen? Put simply, it is the process of splitting the water molecule (H2O) into its basic elements, hydrogen and oxygen, using renewable energy. This is water electrolysis and involves passing a huge electrical current through water via a machine called an Electrolyser.

The electricity comes from energy produced by solar, wind or hydro generators, hence the term "green hydrogen".

You can argue all day as to the viability and economics of such proposals, but rather than do that I would like to point out some issues and questions that have yet to be answered. There is an old adage in politics, "Don't ask any questions unless you know what the answers are". Given that, I will pose some questions and then present some answers.

It takes around 10 litres of fresh water to produce 1 kilogram of hydrogen. If you expand that out to producing industrial quantities of hydrogen, I'm talking millions of tonnes of it,

require hundreds of thousands of megalitres of fresh water - so where is the water going to come from?

Water is a necessity of life. We live in the driest country in the world, and water is our most precious resource. Our state relies on flooding rains to continue our production of clean,

fresh food, fibre, and fodder, with dam storage and underground water supplies being replenished in these large, seasonal downpours. To make the Gladstone Hydrogen Ecosystem viable, there needs to be an abundance of water.

It is my understanding that both Awoonga Dam at Gladstone and the new Rookwood Weir water is already fully allocated to other industries and household use. I have recently written to Queensland's Minister for Energy and Minister for Water, asking for their answers to this question.

My answer is to build Nathan Dam, between Taroom and Theodore in Central Queensland. Nathan Dam is the largest shovel ready water infrastructure project in Australia with all approvals in place. It is an 880,000 megalitre dam situated on the Dawson River approximately halfway between the small rural towns of Taroom and Theodore in Central Queensland.

If Nathan Dam was built, downstream flows to the Rookwood Weir would enable the water to be pumped to Gladstone via water pipelines thus providing a water source for a future hydrogen industry at Gladstone. Without water, the hydrogen ecosystem will not succeed.

Beware rule by scientists

continue to conduct eulogies for sometime.

It would be better to have zero COVID than some COVID. Coronavirus is a serious disease and Australia has been fortunate to escape significant outbreaks here compared to almost any other country in the world.

We have pursued our own lives unhindered during the pandemic but for a short, almost novelty lockdown at the start, and for the odd closure of our state borders. We have taken glee in comparing our unrestricted existence to that of many less fortunate countries, at times viewing it as vindication of our moniker as the "lucky country".

Now the shoe is on the other foot. As other countries open their borders, fill football stadiums and return to work we are the ones locking people in their homes in futile desperation of a return to the mirage of zero cases.

Most are waking up to that myth now. A poll this week found that just 27 per cent of Australians thought that Australia will ever get back to zero COVID cases.

I wrote a month ago in the Australian Financial Review that we have to move on from the lockdown approach. It remains a scandal that 18 months into this pandemic we do not have a single cost-benefit study of the merit of lockdowns or any particular restrictions for

A marked feature of the coronavirus pandemic is that it has found a way to humble almost all governments.

Hitherto, we (along with perhaps some other island nations) have been an exception but if we continue with our blind loyalty to rigid policy responses, we may soon join the club of humbled countries that have lots to be humble

The former Chairman of the Productivity Commission, Gary Banks, made this point clearly in an article this week. As he pointed out our policy responses have not had a clear objective (remember "flatten the curve"), there

COVID zero died this week, although many will has been little consultation on the impact of the restrictions and no cost-benefit analysis done. Gary makes the perceptive conclusion that a lack of due process and transparency is undermining legitimacy for the measures, highlighted most starkly by the use of the army to enforce orders in Sydney.

To the extent that there has been a public rationale for the lockdown it has been based on the authority of "science" - although science that remains hidden from public view.

CS Lewis warned us of the tyranny of scientists 63 years ago writing that the powers that be "must increasingly rely on the advice of scientists, till in the end the politicians proper become merely the scientists' puppets ... government involves questions about the good for man, and justice, and what things are worth having at what price; and on these a scientific training gives a man's opinion no added value. Let the doctor tell me I shall die unless I do so-and-so; but whether life is worth having on those terms is no more a question for him than for any other man."

The lack of clear and rigorous cost-benefit analyses during COVID has been regrettable, but our deficiencies are not technical in na-

We know how to conduct cost benefit analysis and we do it successfully in many other areas such as vehicle regulation.

No, our COVID mistakes are much more the result of our shapeless and formless modern philosophy than a deficiency in science per se. Dethroning our hapless scientific ruling class does not require better scientists.

We need to resurrect our belief in the rights of the individual and the mutual respect for the different decisions that our fellow humans

Only then will we free Australia from the grasp of COVID zero.

The cancer comes back and the battle begins again

This week CQ Today continues looking at cattleman Sir Graham McCamley's recollections from his book, *Roads in the Sky*.

In our 33rd excerpt, Graham continues his recollection of his cancer battle.

It was several months before Graham sought medical advice. The lump under his left armpit had come up at a difficult time, when 'all hell was breaking loose with the family and the business'.

On 5 December 2012, Graham finally visited a different GP in Rockhampton, who sent him to a radiologist who performed a biopsy to see if the lump was another cancer.

The biopsy showed that Graham did indeed have another SCC (squamous cell carcinoma). An infection delayed things further.

"With the operation on top, it overloaded the lymphatics system of my right arm, and today I still have ongoing problems and can't lift heavy weights with it.'

The second operation was carried out by a different doctor, recommended by the Princess Alexandra's radiation oncologist, Dr Matthew Foote.

On 4 December 2012, Shirley's birthday, Dr Mark Smithers operated on Graham at the Mater Hospital, Brisbane - and he did 'get all

"He had found a very nasty melanoma on the outside of my arm above the elbow, which he suggested he remove as well at the time of the surgery - how 'blessed' was I for this early finding.

They took the cancers out and they wanted me to have radium but initially, I refused.



We made up lists of pros and cons and after consulting Dr Foote and my naturopath, I agreed to have a short dose of radium at a much lower than recommended dose, commencing on 21 January, 2013, just a short course of 15 days.'

Graham stayed at the Chino Hotel near the Princess Alexandra Hospital and walked up from his treatment every day over that

Each day he went in, he talked with a different person about the cancer they had.

"I learned a lot about the different cancers and about other people's varying attitudes to terminal cancer. It was a dreadful time though, because everything was falling down around me then and my wife, Shirley, wasn't there - while most of those having the treatment had someone with them."

Graham had spoken with Allen Smith's brother Ken, who had suffered with similar cancers to Graham and had effectively been given a death sentence by the doctors.

"Ken had told me that to stop those cancers, I needed to talk to his naturopath, Adrian Jones, an ex-Seventh Day Adventist pastor. So I did.

"So, before the second operation, I'd already started to go to Adrian and had taken medicine he had recommended: I started on the natural medicine 'cansema', taken inter-

Adrian advocated spiritual cleansing as well as his healing medicines - Amazon tonic from Ecuador, selenium and gumby gumby capsules from here in Central Oueensland. as well as natural organic foods and supplements, like garlic, olive leaf extract, mushroom and coconut oil.

"Gumby gumby is a low-sugar, natural Aboriginal medicine that many people use successfully to fight cancers."

Then, a third SCC came up behind Gra-

ham's ear. Graham and Jacqui returned to Brisbane again to see Maurice Stevens, who had done the first operation and then did the

"That was a very major cancer, a mass behind the left ear and extending down my neck. He looked at all the x-rays carefully and said he believed he could get it, but he said they'd not have much of a margin during the

"The naturopath advised me that if Dr Stevens could guarantee he could remove the cancer, to go ahead and operate and then we would follow up with the natural medicines."

When Graham came too after the operation on 4 September 2012 at St Andrews, Dr Stevens told him they had been able to remove all the cancer - "but it was so close," he said.

Graham had been out of hospital for some time, but felt he had hardly recovered from the operation when another lump came out on his face.



NRL matches deliver welcome boost to CQ economy

The Round 24 National Rugby League (NRL) Telstra Premiership between the St George Illawarra Dragons and the North Queensland Toyota Cowboys held in Rockhampton on Saturday 28 August 2021 was a huge victory and one for the history books.

The two games, the other being battled between the Cronulla Sharks and Wests Tigers, helped bring in 7350 people to Browne Park which not only benefits Rockhampton but showcases our entire region.

Despite plenty of people being disappointed by the cancellation of the Dragons and South Sydney clash, there were still a significant amount of fans comes from around the region, including Biloela, Gladstone, Tannum Sands and other towns.

Advance Rockhampton Executive Manager Greg Bowden said Rockhampton is now on the radar as a viable region to host future NRL premiership games.

"As we have now played host to two successful NRL games right here in Rockhampton, we have put the city and region on the map as a destination to host future games," Mr Bowden said.

"Thousands of Queenslanders secured tickets to both the Sharks vs Tigers game and the Dragons vs Cowboys game, with 11% of ticket holders across the two games coming from out of region.

"Of those 11% of ticket holders, we expect over half of those people spent a minimum of one night's stay in our region's accommodation and would have purchased food and drinks during their stay.

"We estimate the total economic impact to the Rockhampton region from these two games was over \$1.2Million, with visitors

and our local community spending money in region as part of their attendance at the game.

"Again we have proved that Rockhampton can host high-profile sporting matches, and that events similar to these bring great economic benefit to the region overall."

Queensland Rugby League Central's Regional Manager Rob Crow said it's been great to see a real buzz around Browne Park.

"It's been fantastic to see people enjoying a great day out at the footy over the past two weekends with Browne Park really coming to life," Mr Crow said.

The impact that this positive experience had could create more opportunities for local games including looking at venues right across Central Queensland.

We need to have a level of understanding of what is actually happening in Gladstone right now.

These monitors can assist teaching our local children about air quality and prepare

Following the tides

By Volunteer Marine Rescue Gladstone

All boat owners understand that there are high tides and low tides, and most understand that having some idea of what the tides are doing is important. Not being aware of the water depth can cause boats to become stranded until the next high tide and in extreme cases can result in the grounding and sinking of a boat! At the very least, it is important to understand how tides work when attempting to navigate complicated areas of the coast.

When questioned on this topic, a lot of boat owners explain that a high tied happens each day and later in the day a low tied will follow. They believe the whole process is more or less linear, but the times seem to change. This understanding, intuitive as it is, misses some very important underlying processes that are at work.

High and low tides do change each day and are normally semi-diurnal, which means there are two high tides and two low tides each day. What is interesting though, is that in most places the difference between high tides is a predictable 12 hours and 25 minutes and the difference between high and low tide is approximately six hours and 12 minutes. It's important to know this, because it means once you know the date and time of one high or low tide, you can work out each high and low tide that follows with great accuracy. This removes your reliance on tide books which some people forget to take and plotters that can malfunction.

However, tide movements are not linear. While the curve of a tide when plotted will be symmetrical, the rate of rise and fall is not constant. It's important to understand the distinction. The rise and fall are instead best described by what has become known as the rule of twelfths.

If we start at low tide, in the first hour that follows the tide will rise by one twelfth of the range. In the next hour, the tied will rise by two twelfths of the range. Finally, in the third and fourth hour the tide will rise by three twelfths of the range per hour. In hour five the tide will continue to rise, but the rate will reduce to two twelfths of the range and then down to one twelfth again in hour six. After high tied, this whole process is reversed over the next six and a bit hours until low tide is reached again. This can be hard to imagine so it is depicted on the graph below which shows the typical water flow in a typical six hour increase or decrease in tide. Remember, this shows water flow, not tide height.

There are two important implications to remember that result from the way tidal flows work. The first is that in hours three and four of a raising or lowering tide, the tidal flows will be at their strongest and will be much stronger than in hours one and six. In an area of particularly strong tides, this must be taken into consideration when deciding where to anchor and how to anchor. The specifics of that will be an article for

The other implication is that a tide will begin to drop slowly but by hour three the rate of drop will be three times faster than it was in hour one. This must be taken into consideration when making decisions about when to leave and when to try and navigate shallow water. If you looked at the rate of drop in hour one and assumed you could wait until hour three to leave based on the change you observed, you could very easily end up running aground because you may significantly overestimate the depth of the water three hours later.



So what are Bromeliads?

If there is one plant that has a love hate relationship with gardener it would be the Bromeliad. Over the last few years many high profile landscapes have featured these plants for their colour displays. Yet it would be right to say that the Bromeliad would still be one of the most underutilised plants in Rockhampton landscapes.

Aechmea Shining Light

So maybe it is time to investigate the benefits of Bromeliads. This weekend at the Rockhampton Show Grounds the Rockhampton Bromeliad Group are conducting their annual Bromeliad and Tillandsia sale this Saturday from 8am - 2pm and Sunday from 9am - 12pm.

For a gold coin entry you can come and gain advice and information about these unique plants from our sellers and guest speakers. Richard Cornale on placing Tillandsia on mounts and potting Tillandsia, Kathryn Fraser on useful tips on growing Bromeliads, Mike Miller on Tillandsia for the beginner and their growing requirements and finally Nigel Thomson on the importance of fertiliser and light in growing Bromeliads.

Bromeliads are perfect in those locations underneath old trees or palms that throw shade where there is always a dense mat of roots that can make it hard to establish other plants. Bromeliads grow very well in these conditions as they don't feed from their roots. Bromeliads basically feed from the water debris that falls into their central cup.

Most Bromeliads grow well on tree trunks and in tree branches. Lava rock or scoria is recommended as a potting medium. If you plant Bromeliads directly into your garden it is best to build up the soil with rocks, gravel or scoria to ensure good drainage. Bromeliads are particularly good for shade areas that are fairly dry from root competition.

Bromeliads need good light to maintain their beautiful colours. There are several varieties that will survive in all-day sun but most need protection from midday sun. Bromeliads are hardy plants native to South America that enjoy the humidity of the tropics.

Bromeliads will produce coloured leaves around flowering time which attracts the insects or birds required for pollination. Bromeliads will flower only once in its lifetime and then produce off shoots, usually from the base and finally die. The cup of the bromeliad should be kept full of clean water and the cup flushed out completely once every month.

Most Bromeliads use their roots for stability and feed through trichomes on their leaves. Their main requirement is to drain well but they can survive being too wet.

Bromeliads mainly need phosphorous and potassium and have a low requirement for added nitrogen as it will only make the leaves long and green. An orchid flowering fertiliser or a bloom booster is the closest to the plants

required NPK ratio.

Remember to flush out the water regularly that sits in the central cup, otherwise mosquitoes can breed in these Bromeliads.

Some Bromeliads varieties to look for:

Aechmea will come in many shapes, varieties and colours, both in leaves and flowers. The flower rises up from the centre on a scape with colourful bracts. After flowering, berry-like fruits form which last up to several months.

Canistrum are large plants, 60-90cm in diameter. The inflorescence nestles in the centre of the rosette, a compact flower head surrounded by colourful bracts, like a basket of flowers.

Guzmania are soft-leafed, with exquisite inflorescence rising from the centre in yellow, orange or red with white or red flower petals. They need to be kept under shade.

Neoregelia†are Bromeliads that are grown primarily for their showy foliage with bright colors and interesting patterns, and they are among the most widely hybridized types of bromeliads. Small flowers appear inconspicuously inside of the leaf cup when the plants bloom.

Tillandsias or Air Plants can appear quite

alien and can vary in size and shape. Most are saucer-sized but some can grow up to 3 metres. Normally a grey-green plant Tillandsias may change colour when coming into flower. Tillandsias need regular watering and good air movement to survive. Tillandsias are mainly tree dwellers and can be attached to almost anything.

Rural Matters

Managing wild dogs well

AgForce CEO Michael Guerin

Wild dogs and sheep don't mix – that's something we can all agree on.

Far too many sheep and cattle producers have had the misfortune to witness firsthand the trail of devastation caused by wild dogs left to roam free.

Calves, sheep, goats, and native animals – not eaten whole, but played with and left with horrific injuries. Euthanasia the only choice to avoid a slow and incredibly painful death.

These are sickening sights, but, fortunately, thanks to the roll out of subsidised cluster fencing, these scenes are now less frequent.

Another weapon in the war against the dogs – one just as powerful and important – is the 'good neighbour' programs that operate in parts of Queensland to help ensure the responsibility and cost for pest animal management is shared across the community – with everyone required to play their part.

The benefits of this 'nil tenure' approach are clear: they address a problem shared by many of us, easing stress levels for producers and reducing the impacts on the land, livestock, and native animals from wild dogs and other pests.

Of course there's a legal requirement to do your bit too, under the Queensland Biosecurity Act (2014).

And don't be fooled into thinking that because you produce cattle you're immune to the potential menace of wild dogs either.


As Middlemount cattle producer and Ag-Force Board Director John Baker recently told me: "When wild dog numbers build up, they begin to hunt in packs and will pull down and maim half grown cattle and eat large numbers of calves – which comes at a substantial financial and emotional cost."

That's why AgForce is imploring all producers to take the 'good neighbour' programs seriously – from paper to paddock – to protect our landscapes and our livestock from wild dog predation.

The announcement last week by State Minister for Agriculture Mark Furner that 46 local governments will soon receive \$370,000 in funding over three years to buy 1080 solution, used in the baiting of feral pests, is welcome news, and it helps.

But with the State Government 1080 supply all but depleted, it's vital that councils work closely with their producer-led Wild Dog Advisory Committees to ensure continued success of current wild dog control programs.



The Central Queensland Swimming Association (CQSA) has come up trumps after winning the inaugural Duel in the Pool.

The Duel in the Pool came at the start of the swimming season and saw our CQ team take on a North Queensland side in a two-day competition in Mackay.

It helped pit our best swimmers in the region - including those from Rockhampton, Gladstone, Yeppoon, Emu Park, and Emerald against the strongest swimmers from the more northern cities of our state.

On a points system, our Central Queensland squad notched up 569 points to North Queensland's 468, giving our swimmers the first-ever Duel in the Pool trophy.

Jack Kelly and Emma Doherty accepted the award on behalf of their region, etching our squad's name into the history books.

The idea and concept of the meet stemmed from the major organisers of the event, Central Queensland's Michael Borg, North Queensland's Theresa Manning, and Swimming Queensland Development Officer Barry Prime who all played a hefty part in bringing this brilliant opportunity together.

President of CQSA Neal Thomsen said it was a terrific experience for the kids.

"It was a feeler event, as we hadn't done anything like this in the region before," he said.

"It's been done down south, and between the states of New South Wales and Queensland, but not ever in CQ and North Queensland. So it's something we really wanted to push and help grow the region.

"We've been making some good headway, so it's something to get our elite swimmers and our top-end swimmers in our region, from that 12-year-old to 17-year-old bracket, to get them competing against the more elite athletes in

"It is sort of at the start of the main season and it works in really well with the calendar. We have state short-course championships in

Brisbane in three weeks.

"Plenty of our CQ swimmers will be heading down there so it's a good lead up for them. It was in a short course pool, which is a 25-metre pool, so a really good hit out and to test your mettle against the best in the region and the best in North Queensland.'

Thomsen said it was good to see kids from all over Central Queensland come together in unity for a challenge, instead of having to face off against each other like they do in most events across the swimming season.

"It's not something they have done too often and it's something they only really do at the state championships in December each year," he said.

"There were swimmers from Gladstone,

Rocky, the coast of Yeppoon, and Emu Park, we even had swimmers come in from Emerald.

"We had a good number of swimmers from right across the park which is excellent to see."

And it wasn't just our kids who came together, CO had coaches from all over the region helping out which not only benefited our athletes but helped some of our younger coaches learn from CQ's best mentors.

"Head coach Shane Kingston from Rocky City was there, we had other coaches like Jodie Shanks from Caribeae, Fiona Johnson from Emu Park, Gracie Wellspring from Yeppoon, Jodi Sprought from Emerald as well as Kate Jones and Jared O'Hanlon. And a couple from Gladstone, Adam Eisman and Theo Fuchs,"

"It's a really great atmosphere with all those coaches. We had a mentor role as well, so we had head coaches and mentor coaches all playing a role in the event.

"There were coaches from the region that could learn from these more experienced coaches and how things work in the representative scenarios.

"We have some really experienced coaches in the region so it's good for them to pass on some of their knowledge."


