A new Tannum high school means we have another...

Learning ground

A former local campground will be transformed dramatically when it is turned into a new high school in 2023.

The Tannum Sands-based Clearview Christian College is expected to start development at 1 Canoe Point Road, also known as the former Tanyalla Conference Centre site, as early as this year.

Clearview Christian College executive director Dean Loosmore recently secured Development Approval from Gladstone Regional Council to use the existing buildings at the site for the first stages of the high school.

The current buildings on site will cater for three Year 7 classrooms as well as amenities.

"We plan to commence our building program as soon as possible," Mr Loosmore said.

"Obviously, this will be subject to the relevant guidelines and timeframes for government (State/Commonwealth) capital funding."

Mr Loosmore said the concept for an inde-

pendent local high school was identified as a community need back in 2019.

"A group of passionate local parents in partnership with our local church, MyCity Church, discussed the opportunity of an alternate high school offering," he said.

"School culture, school size and proximity to the local community were raised as valid points of concern."

Deputy Mayor Kahn Goodluck said it was fantastic the community would have another

high school option.

"It's fantastic to see the Tanyalla Centre have a renewed purpose in life," Mr Goodluck said.

"It's been around for a long time and there's plenty of people through generations that have been through that facility on school camps over many years.

"It's got a new lease on life and it will continue to serve our region for years to come. I think that's a good thing."

A bloody good man

Gladstone local Graham Gilmore will make his 300th donation of blood on September 22, marking 32 years of consecutive giving.

Mr Gilmore donates at the Lifeblood Donor Centre, located within Gladstone Hospital, and splits his donations between blood and plasma, both vital to securing the lives of others.

Altogether, Mr Gilmore has made 103 blood donations, and is coming up to 197 plasma donations.

Kerry Myers, the donor centre manager of Lifeblood, praised Mr Gilmore's dedication in a telephone call with *Gladstone Today*.

"Every single fortnight he finds a way to be

in here to donate," she said.

"He's so dedicated to his blood donation."

Ms Myers noted that though donors were relatively scarce, the demand for blood and plasma was substantial.

"Only one in 30 donate and one in three need blood in their lifetime," she said.

"We're always looking for new people to come in and donate blood."

In a conversation with *Gladstone Today*, Mr Gilmore, who turns 68 this year, said he was inspired to become such a committed donor after suffering through a car crash experience with his young children.

Mr Gilmore was driving the car at the time and his son was injured in the accident.

"I could have killed two of my kids and I thought I've got to do something – got to change my attitude," he said.

The experience shook him up and pushed him to become one of Gladstone's most fervent donors.

He has three children, now all grown.

Figures show GP shortage second worst in the state

Labor candidate for Flynn, Matt Burnett, said explosive new data uncovered last week by Labor has revealed the shocking extent of the general practitioner shortage in Central Queensland.

"The Federal Government's own data has revealed that there are less than 10 Primary Care general practitioners per 10,000 residents in Flynn, the second worst electorate in the state.

The figures were released today at a community forum in Moura about the shortage of general practitioners and specialists in Central Ouensland.

"Today a Moura local told me that she has had to move away from the town because she couldn't get the care she needed locally, said Mr Burnett.

"Another told me that not only are the patients missing out on much needed services, but the health professionals are struggling as well.

"Together, we need a positive plan for our region's future, so I asked Senator Green to come to Moura to host the 'Moura General Practitioner and Rural Health Forum'.

"It was a great chance for local residents, as well as local doctors, health workers, and allied associations to tell their stories.

"Our local general practitioners and other health providers in the region work incredibly hard; we've all seen their efforts during the pandemic, and I wanted to put on record my thanks to them." Queensland Labor Senator Nita Green last month called for a Senate inquiry to explore the doctor shortage facing communities across rural and regional Australia. The inquiry has been established and is currently accepting submissions.

"I hear it all the time – people can't get in to see a doctor when they really need it. They're waiting weeks and months and are sometimes driving hours to see a specialist.

"Labor pushed for this inquiry because regional communities need practical solutions to fix this problem which is only getting worse.

"We're experiencing a shortage of general practitioners, and meanwhile in the middle of a pandemic, Scott Morrison is making cuts to Medicare and undermining our health response.

"It was great to catch up with local residents to hear their stories and will be encouraging them to make sure their voices are heard by making a submission to the inquiry; because we should all have access to quality health care regardless of our postcode."

The Senate inquiry will examine the government's current geographical classification system, the stronger Rural Health Strategy, general practitioner training reforms, and the effects of the Medicare rebate freeze. The Inquiry will also assess the impact of the COV-ID-19 pandemic on doctor shortages in outer metropolitan, rural, and regional Australia.



funding to develop hydrogen applications for Gladstone and the wider region's burgeoning hydrogen industry.

Funded through the Federal Government's Regional Research Collaboration Program, the research project will involve collaboration with industry to help drive the adoption of green hydrogen for export in Gladstone and develop zero emissions technologies.

Vice-Chancellor Professor Nick Klomp said the development of research capacity and capability in hydrogen technology was a key research strategy for the university.

"A recent report from ACL Allen states that the global green hydrogen industry represents a \$2bn opportunity for Central Queensland with the potential for 11,000 jobs by 2032 – it's

CQUniversity has secured \$2.1 million in an opportunity that we must capitalise on with a concerted effort across research, industry and community," he said.

> "Developing research capability in hydrogen technologies and applications in regional Queensland is key to providing appropriate future education and training for regional jobs to take full advantage of what this emerging industry has to offer.

> "This \$2.1m project will connect existing research capabilities with new skills and competencies through partnerships with other universities, with about 80 percent of the planned research activity expected to occur in regional/remote areas.

> 'The project activities are focused on existing industry needs and relationships and will encourage further collaboration and

relevance of research and training, providing a platform for skills development for this emerging industry."

In 2020, CQUniversity developed a Hydrogen Economy Capability Statement in consultation with industry and other key players, to better support the needs of this emerging local industry.

"The hydrogen industry is a high priority for the Gladstone region, and indeed across much of CQUniversity's broad regional footprint," Prof Klomp said.

"This project supports not only the advancement of the crucial engineering component required by industry, but also the localisation of workforce skills development so communities can gain from the investment and employment opportunities.

Expected outcomes of the research collaboration include a legacy of regional expertise, skills development, innovation, and technology transfer that support the growth of local manufacturing opportunities (based on green hydrogen, the export of hydrogen blends, and the conversions of industrial machinery to hydrogen power as a means to achieve low or zero emission operation).

Earlier this year CQUniversity joined the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding for a Gladstone H2 Ecosystem with Sumitomo Australia (Sumitomo), Gladstone Ports Corporation, Gladstone Regional Council and Australian Gas Networks as part of the Australian Gas Infrastructure Group.

CQUniversity is also in the final stages of recruiting a Professorial Chair in Hydrogen and Renewable Energies.

Back in business

After almost hitting rock bottom a few months ago, Gladstone Newsagency is now bouncing back in sales and foot traffic.

After the delayed construction of a civic footpath revitalisation in Goondoon St had deterred shoppers from entering the premises, the limited public access dilemma has since disappeared when the project finished on Friday 27 August.

Owner Sonya Sims said her business' sales performance last week indicated that they had served about 75 to 80 percent of the pre-works

"We found the first week that Goondoon Street was open again, our sales were back to pre-work figures (but these numbers were actually down on what they should have been for that particular week as it had been the lead-up to Father's Day)," she said.

Ms Sims presumed a number of their clients have been forced to shop elsewhere for the last six months, which she predicted had prompted them to adopt new shopping habits.

"As there is still no greater parking facilities, which has always been the biggest access problem for our customers, we do not expect the footpath works would bring more customers to the area," she said.

Ms Sims believed it would take a period of six months for them to rebuild the business to its full potential.

"Research shows it takes about five to six months for customers to develop shopping habits," she said.

In July, Ms Sims told Gladstone Today the business had suffered a 90 per cent sales de-

For a fair and accurate depiction of the issue, Gladstone Today reached out to Gladstone Regional Council for their response which is as

Works within the 101 Goondoon St Council Forecourt Area, forming part of the CBD Civic Precinct Footpath Renewal Project, commenced on 16 March 2021. The scope of works included the replacement of existing pavers, revitalisation of the area with streetscape and landscaping works, and replacement water main works. The existing brick paved footpath was progressively replaced with coloured concrete sections, with other visual enhancements including tree and garden bed planting, additional lighting and seating, and the installation of phone charging stations also taking

Works on the project were staged in progressive sections due to the nature of the project.

The initial scope of work, conducted on the western side of Goondoon St (between Roseberry and William Streets), involved major upgrades to the underground water network, which was installed in the 1930s.

Gladstone Region Mayor Matt Burnett said these works also required major concrete ex-

"During the process of replacing the water main, work crews identified high voltage electrical cables that were both in poor condition and non-compliant with current building leg-

islation," Councillor Burnett said.

"This work was not in scope and had potential to interrupt power supply for the CBD traders for an unknown period.

"These unforeseen major infrastructure works placed additional time pressures on work crews and project timelines needed to be extended as a result.'

Hutchinson Builders carried out the project, jointly funded by Gladstone Regional Council and the Queensland Government's 2019 to 2021 Local Government Grants and Subsidies Program.

Gladstone Region Mayor Matt Burnett said the CBD Civic Precinct Footpath Renewal Project will revitalise Gladstone's main street, providing a vibrant hub that will attract more

"The CBD Civic Precinct Footpath Renewal Project will generate greater levels of amenity and will support increased movement along Goondoon Street," Cr Burnett said.

"The project will also provide further benefits in the form of updated and improved major infrastructure.

"The underground infrastructure improvements including replacement of water mains and electrical cabling, while not visible from the surface, will provide a greater deal of reliability into the future.

"This project was made possible with funding from the Queensland Government's Local Government Grants and Subsidies Pro-

Gladstone set to see benefits of projects

The state government has outlined its infrastructure development ambitions out to 2025 with Gladstone set to benefit handsomely from a number of projects marked for funding.

The Queensland Government Infrastructure Pipeline (QGIP) details yearly funding allocations for projects across the state, traversing everything from road construction and schools upgrades to energy production and healthcare.

Altogether, the pipeline encompasses a \$52.2 billion capital works program.

Gladstone Ports Corporation's ship loader replacement project will receive \$1.25 million in 2021-2022 and then some \$31 million out to 2025. The port will also receive substantial allocations for a number of other projects.

A new hall facility for Gladstone Central State School, a \$5.175 million project, has been allocated \$252,000 for 2021-2022, \$728,000 for 2022-2023 and then some \$4 million for 2023-2024.

Rookwood Weir has been allocated \$140 million for 2021-2022 and then \$21.2 million for 2022-2023 as the weir edges towards completion. New water infrastructure across the region will be crucial for supporting Gladstone's incipient hydrogen industry.

Planning for the Gladstone Fitzroy Pipeline project has been allocated \$2 million across 2021-2022.

In his foreward to the OGIP. Deputy Premier and Minister for State Development, Infrastructure, Local Government and Planning Steven Miles heralded the capital works program as a boon for jobs.

"Our massive building program is about creating jobs for Queenslanders, with the expenditure expected to support around 46,500 jobs - nearly 30,000 of these in the regions," he writes.

According to CoreLogic, Gladstone Central has seen a 161.1 per cent increase in the volume of properties sold in the past twelve months with

While this positive statistic could be the product of a number of prosperities in the region, a spokesperson has revealed the latest trends and statistics for both homes and units in the reef city.

The median value of a home in Gladstone Central is \$247,453 while 19 sales were made in the suburb throughout the past 12 months.

With a 17.6 per cent change in 12 months, the median rental value was \$336.

The median value for units is \$202,675 which made a 12.8 per cent change in index value in the past 12 months; and the median rental value is \$272 with a 12.9 percent change in rental index.

Down the road in Biloela, the house median price is lower than that of Gladstone Central's with \$197, 225 which was down seven per cent in index value over the past 12 months.

On the other hand, the rental value is \$338 which increased 9.4 per cent in the rental index over the past 12 months.

New route for Skytrans lands in Rocky

The first Skytrans plane arrived in Rockhampton this week and airport management are already excited at the opportunities the new route will bring.

The Cairns-based airline will operate return flights five times a week between Rocky, the Whitsunday Coast Airport and Cairns, with flights on Mondays and Tuesdays departing at 2.40pm and flights on Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays departing 10.40am.

Rockhampton Airport manager Marcus Vyke said the arrival of the first flight on Monday, 12 September, at 2.40pm was a big moment for the airport.

"This is magic, it gives us so many options," he said.

"Intrastate travel will be big in future, especially with Covid and lockdowns. It's a good coup for the airport to allow people to travel to the Whitsundays and Cairns, but it also allows for northern travellers to come here and experience the Rocky region as well as the Capricorn Coast."

Fares are \$149 for Rockhampton to the Whitsundays and \$199 for Rockhampton to

"Now that we have these flights, we really need locals to support them. You don't want to say use it or lose it but we need to ensure the route is viable into the future."

Airport chairman Cr Neil Fisher said the service would open up marketing opportunities for Rockhampton and the greater CQ region, as well as expand opportunities for business travel.

"The plane that came in on Monday is the newest in the Skytrans fleet and it's like a lounge chair inside," he said.

"The business opportunities going forward are going to be phenomenal.

"For so many businesses there this has been a bit of an Achilles Heel so it'll make a big difference to have that faster connection

without having to go to Brisbane."

Thanks to Skytrans connections, the route will also open up travel to the Torres

"I was talking to a couple who are from the Torres Strait who work here at the university, they see that this is going opportunity for family movement," Cr Fisher

"It also opens up tourism opportunities. The best reef fishing is in the Torres Strait and Rockhampton has the maddest fishing community in the world, they love going fishing, love having those new experiences.

"Imagine a long weekend fishing experience in the Torres Strait. And of course Rockhampton has some of the best river fishing

Cr Fisher said Skytrans had given the Rockhampton region a 'fantastic gift'.

"And now it's up to us as a community to support Skytrans," he said.

"This has been the toughest time in the history of aviation but the team at the Rockhampton Airport has never lost that focus. Yes, we've had to make our airport operate with limited flights but our focus has remained on working with the airlines, engaging with the airlines, building the business of Rockhampton Airport.

"The new relationships that will come out Covid will put us in a much better position than other airports."

The next step, Cr Fisher said, would be to work with the federal government and airlines to expand regional routes without having to travel through the capital cities.

"We already have a huge head start, with a \$52.2 billion infrastructure investment that will turbo-charge more growth and jobs for Queenslanders.

"The draft State Infrastructure Strategy sets out our approach to connecting our regions and creating liveable communities with essential services and infrastructure across Queensland like the schools, hospitals and roads that our growing state will need into the future.

Mr Miles said, along with the draft State Infrastructure Strategy, the Queensland Government Infrastructure Pipeline (QGIP) was also released today.

The pipeline includes the four-year \$52.2 billion capital program and potential future proposals currently under development by the Queensland Government.

The SIS follows on from the previous State Infrastructure Plan and its annual program of updates released between 2016 and 2020.

Burkett leads swim charge

It was four days before Christmas on the day of his CQUniversity Bachelor of Engineering graduation back in 1985.

What should have been one of the most memorable days of his life for all the right reasons, turned out to be quite the opposite.

On December 21, 1985, CQUni student, aspiring engineer and footballer Brendan Burkett was involved in a hit-and-run accident while riding a motorbike in

"On that afternoon I received my final results indicating that I had completed my degree," Burkett recalled.

"At CQU I played rugby, ended up captain, coach of the U19 and president of the rugby club, so was keen on playing football in Europe, so a mate and myself were working two jobs to save up to head to Europe in the new year.

"Then I had the accident, so life took a different course.'

Burkett's leg was smashed in 13 places and resulted in amputation 10 days later.

While his aspirations were shattered, instead of letting adversity get in the way, Burkett turned it into opportunity.

"Living in regional Queensland we played football in winter and swam in summer," Burkett explained.

"I really enjoyed swimming, was the age champion at school and ironman champion in the surf club.

"After the accident I couldn't run anymore so just focussed on swimming...the rest is history."

Only two years after the accident, in 1987, Burkett represented Australia at the Pan Pacific Para-Swimming Championships and continued on to become a champion swimmer, winning five medals at four Paralympics and a silver medal at the 1994 Commonwealth Games in Canada.

"I was lucky enough to lead the Australian team into the opening ceremony in the Sydney 2000 games as the flag bearer, then post 2000 to be on the team staff for the next five Paralympic Games," he said.

Three years ago, he was appointed Australian Paralympic Swimming head coach.

"It was a great honour to be part of any Australian team and it is great to be able to give something back to the sport you really

Burkett has just led the Australian Paralympic Swim team in an incredibly successful Tokyo Olympic campaign.

"It was an outstanding performance by the swim team, and of equal importance, the culture within the team was awesome, so hopefully that will inspire the next generation," Burkett said.

Burkett has been recognised for his achievements and contribution to the sport including receiving an Order of Australia (OAM) in 1997.

When he's not focussing on the swimming duties, Burkett is busy working at the University of Sunshine Coast (USC) as the Director of High-Performance Sport and as a Professor in Sport Science (Biomechanics).

He has fond memories of his time as a student at CQUni's Rockhampton campus and says it helped him be where he is today.

"CQU had a good reputation for engineering which was the key reason for enrolling. I really enjoyed university, playing football, swimming, surf lifesaving and a bit of study," he said jokingly.

"COU prepared us well for the workforce."

Mars mission for students

This year's World Science Festival saw Gladstone primary school students join CQUniversity on an educational expedition to Mars.

As the only event of its kind in the Asia Pacific region, the World Science Festival helps enhance Queensland's international profile as a leader in STEM and captivates audiences by bringing together great minds in science and the arts to produce live and digital content that explores the wonders of science and the thrill of scientific discoveries.

CQUniversity's Mission to Mars provided boarding pass holders with a fun and engaging experience as they journeyed across the Red Planet's surface in the Mars Rover using augmented reality, built helicopters with the team from Cool Aeronautics and learnt about surviving on Mars.

CQUniversity Senior Lecturer, Australia Pacific LNG STEM Central Lead Dr Linda Pfeiffer coordinated the University's presence at this year's event and was thrilled to see so many possible junior scientists in attendance.

"While it may seem like fun and games – and it is very enjoyable – through these events we aim to spark kids' interest in STEM at a young age because you never know who may be there," Dr Pfeiffer said.

"You could be inspiring the next Neil Armstrong or Albert Einstein to follow a career in STEM"

Kicking off the expedition, students immersed themselves in the fascinating world of aerospace by exploring the scientific achievements of flying an aircraft on another planet for the first time, including the Mars helicopter, ingenuity.

Cool Aeronautics National Coordinator Olga Hansen said by showing students a scale model of Ingenuity, which stands at only 0.49 cm tall, they were able to appreciate just how incredible this achievement was.

"With an atmospheric pressure less than that on Earth, traditional lift cannot be generated for flight," Ms Hansen said.

"Students learnt why rotary flight has proven to be the best option for scientists, and when they built their own helicopter, they observed rotary flight in action and the importance of engineering design processes, espe-

cially when their helicopter didn't fly."

Ms Hansen said it was encouraging to see not only the high level of interest from children and parents but also just how much they already knew about Mars and the interesting questions they were asking.

"Based on the large number of photos being taken at the Mars Selfie screen, we may have inspired many keen future astronauts and space tourists." Ms Hansen said.

While students learnt how to get to Mars, Coastal Marine Ecosystems Research Centre (CMERC) Director Associate Professor Emma Jackson and her teams' mission focussed on how to survive on Mars, particularly the potential for growing seaweed.

"Our mission utilised potential frozen subterranean saltwater, recycling astronaut waste products (nutrients and CO2) and sunlight to grow seaweeds as a source of oxygen, food, fuel, medicine and bio-plastics," A/Prof Jackson explained.

"We threw in a bit of seagrass restoration research too since most kids agreed looking after our own planet should come first. They learnt about what marine plants need to photosynthesise and grow, circular systems and the various bioproducts from seaweed.

Associate Professor Jackson expressed her gratitude towards CMERC Postdoctoral Research Fellow Joana Costa and her efforts in organising their mission and said they plan to return for next year's festival.



Grants fund local projects

Local Indigenous groups have been given new funding to help respond to domestic and family violence faced by First Nation's people.

Eleven grassroots organisations will share in over \$100,000 to provide culturally appropriate domestic and family violence support in eight communities across Queensland.

It comes as a National Women's Safety Summit last week agreed to develop a specific plan to halt violence against Indigenous women and children with an emphasis on locally led initiatives.

Minister for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Partnerships Craig Crawford said domestic violence statistics in First Nation's communities were alarmingly high and part of a

"It is important that we empower grass roots organisations to provide on the ground support for those people most impacted by domestic and family violence, particularly women and children," Mr Crawford said.

According to the Changing the Picture report developed by Our Watch, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women are 11 times more likely to die from assault.

It also found Indigenous females experienced 29 times the rate of hospitalisation for non-fatal family violence assaults compared with non-Indigenous females.

Mr Crawford said the \$10,000 grants will support organisations to work with young people, Elders and community workers to improve awareness of safe behaviours, healing, and community and family wellbeing.

"We know domestic and family violence is

a complex issue, and these grants will build capacity and upskill community workers to support families, young people, and build perpetrator programs to prevent the cycle of domestic and family violence," he said.

"It's about reframing relationships with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples through self-determination and communityled responses to eliminate domestic and fam-

These grants support efforts as part of Queensland's Not Now, Not Ever response to domestic and family violence to build safer families.

Attorney-General and Minister for Justice, Minister for Women and Minister for Prevention of Family and Domestic Violence Shannon Fentiman said we need to change how society views and treats women.

'The stark reality is that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women are over-represented in domestic and family violence statistics and we need to look at what more we can do to support our First Nations families in this space," Ms Fentiman said.

'The successful organisations will be delivering some fantastic initiatives in our communities across the State to raise awareness about respectful relationships, what domestic violence is and how we can work as a community to call out violence.

How martial arts could give a lift

It's known for teaching people how to break boards with their bare hands, but could martial arts be the key to lugging heavy objects without breaking your back?

University of Southern Queensland PhD student Sherrilyn Walters is breaking new ground by investigating the benefits of martial arts training in occupations that work with heavy loads.

"Around 30 to 40 per cent of workplace injuries in Australia are muscular stress-related, with upper and lower back cases accounting for almost half of these," Mrs Walters said.

"Load carriage tasks require increased strength and endurance and can lead to longterm injuries, chronic pain and reduced physical performance.

"This is a major concern for soldiers, firefighters and other emergency service workers who are often required to carry heavy equipment and supplies during training and opera-

The study will focus on the effectiveness of controlled breathing techniques used in traditional martial arts

Mrs Walters said the idea for the research project came from her recent study, which examined pressure levels within the body which martial arts practitioners were able to use to increase the amount of force that they could resist or produce.

Published in the European Journal of Applied Physiology, Mrs Walters found that during a set of physical tests, trained martial artists resisted 38 per cent more force and produced 32 per cent more force than participants who were not trained in martial arts but had the same levels of physical activity.

"The results indicate that trained martial arts practitioners had greater isometric strength than untrained adults and could increase their abdominal pressure to assist in force production and body stability," she said.

Mrs Walters said abdominal pressure levels were closely related to breathing.

"Breath control training is integral to traditional martial arts and involves slow, deep and controlled breathing exercises performed whilst controlling the diaphragm, abdominal and pelvic floor muscles," she said.

Mrs Walters wants to find out if a 12-week martial arts training program could help people utilise internal pressures to improve load carriage performance and reduce spinal com-

If proven effective, such a program could provide a simple, cost-effective approach to overcoming problems caused by carrying heavy loads in physically demanding occupations.

Health students step up

The Australian Rural Health Education Network (ARHEN) today acknowledged the efforts of rural health students to protect themselves, their patients and rural communities from COVID-19 by getting vaccinated ahead of their clinical placements.

The chair of ARHEN, Christine Howard, said health students play a vital role in the delivery of clinical services in many rural and remote communities and can help ease the burden on already stretched services.

"It is pleasing to see so many health students from a range of disciplines step up and get vaccinated and join the fight against CO-VID-19 in rural and remote communities. Around the country student nurses, pharmacists, paramedics, physiotherapists and occupational therapists have been recruited by state health services to support the vaccine roll-out.

Student psychologists and social workers are also supporting many people during lockdown to look after their mental health and to cope with the disruptions to daily life caused by the pandemic.

Many other health students are helping to carry the load in hospital, aged care, disability care and Indigenous health settings so that rural and remote people can continue to access essential health care and support".

Mrs Howard said that the University Departments of Rural Health were committed to protecting the health and wellbeing of rural and remote communities.

"As future health workforce professionals, it is vital that our students adopt evidence-based practices and model positive health behaviours that put the care and safety of patients and the community first.

We know that the risks and consequences of transmission in vulnerable people and settings such as Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander

communities or aged care facilities is high and the virus can have devastating consequences.

Many health services are now mandating vaccinations for health professionals and students in recognition of the highly contagious nature of the delta variant and the serious risk it poses to the health sector as a whole.

ARHEN supports the efforts by our rural and remote health service partners to mitigate the risk of transmission and to protect patients, clients and co-workers across the wider health, aged care, mental health and disability care sectors."

Final year speech pathology student Olivia

Wong did not hesitate to get vaccinated prior to her eight-week clinical placement in Katherine through Flinders University, Rural and Remote Health South Australia and Northern Territory.

"I received both of my COVID-19 vaccinations prior to leaving for Katherine. It is important I did everything I could to keep myself and the population that I was about to work with safe from COVID-19. This was especially important knowing I would be entering vulnerable communities."

Mrs Howard said students also need to protect themselves from the risk of becoming seri-

ously unwell when away from home.


"We do not want to see a situation where a student on placement may be unable to access the intensive medical, family and social supports they may need while they recover.

Health insight during Covid

A new report into the health effects of CO-VID-19 on Australians during 2020 and early 2021 includes analyses of the years of healthy life lost, international comparisons and impacts on population groups, mental health and the health system.

The first year of COVID-19 in Australia: direct and health effects was released today by the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare

The report includes data from a range of sources covering 2020 and some which cover up to June 2021. It does not include data from the latest wave of cases that began in June 2021, dominated by infections of the Delta variant.

"As the COVID-19 situation continues to evolve rapidly and we face challenges such as the emergence of new variants of the virus, it is important we look holistically at the direct and indirect health effects of the pandemic on Australians," said AIHW spokesperson Dr. Lynnelle Moor.

As at 20 June 2021 there had been over 30,000 confirmed cases of COVID-19 and 910 deaths from the disease.

International comparisons

During the first year of the pandemic, Austra-

lia avoided the level of health impacts seen in many other countries, where there were large numbers of severe cases and deaths.

'We closely compared COVID-19 case and death rates in Australia with four other countries that have similar proportions of people over 65; similar life expectancy at birth; and similar health systems and expenditure on health care,' Dr. Moon said.

"If Australia had experienced the same crude case and death rates as Canada, Sweden or the United Kingdom, by early April 2021 there would have been between 680,000 and two million cases instead of the 29,000 that did occur, and between 16,000 and 48,000 deaths.

'Conversely, if Australia had the same crude case and death rates as New Zealand, there would have been around 18,000 fewer cases and 780 fewer deaths."

Years of healthy life lost

The report uses burden of disease analysis to look at the number of healthy years of life Australians who contracted COVID-19 may have

'There were just over 8,400 disability-adjusted life years (DALYs) lost in 2020 from COV-ID-19 in Australia and 97 per cent of this disease burden was from fatal cases,' Dr. Moon said.

'This is much lower than the burden due to leading diseases in Australia. By comparison, coronary heart disease (CHD) was responsible for around 312,000 DALYs and respiratory infections for 80,500 DALYs in 2018. COVID-19 would rank about 135th out of 219 diseases in terms of total burden of disease.'

Similar analysis from Scotland also included comprehensive burden of disease estimates for COVID-19 in 2020. The analysis suggests COVID-19 would be the second leading cause of disease burden in Scotland, behind coronary heart disease.

Population groups

Certain groups in the Australian population experienced higher rates of severe disease and death from COVID-19 during 2020.

During 2020, seven per cent of all COVID-19 cases in Australia and 75 per cent of all deaths were in people living in residential aged care facilities. Up to early July 2020, it is estimated that health care workers in Australia were 2.7 times as likely to contract COVID-19 as the general community.

'People living in the lowest socioeconomic areas had COVID-19 mortality rates 2.6 times higher than for people living in the highest so-

cioeconomic areas,' Dr. Moon said.

"The reason for these inequalities are complex, and interpreting this finding is complicated by the majority of deaths being in residential aged care facilities. However, these socioeconomic differences do not appear to be driven by aged care facilities being overrepresented in lower socioeconomic areas."

Mental health

The initial impacts of the pandemic in Australia appeared to have increased levels of psychological distress, particularly for adults aged 18 to 45.

'By April 2021, the average level of psychological distress had returned to pre-pandemic levels, however continued to be higher for young people,' Dr. Moon said.

Health behaviours

Between April and June 2020 (during which time lockdowns and other restrictions were in force in many parts of the country), Australians Bureau of Statistics Survey data shows some Australians increased their physical activity, including exercise. However, a similar number of people decreased their physical activity.

Fire and Emergency Services Minister Mark Ryan said Yellow Ribbon Day (Tuesday, 14 September) was an opportunity to show thanks for the contributions RFS volunteers make to building a stronger and more resilient Queensland.

"The men and women who wear the yellow coat and drive the yellow truck from the more than 1300 brigades state-wide are there for us when we need them most," Mr Ryan said.

"Yellow Ribbon Day is particularly relevant this week, as following a mild start to the bushfire season, many parts of the State are now experiencing an increase in bushfire potential, with high to very high bushfire danger ratings in some areas.

"Under these conditions, we can expect fires to start and take hold quickly, so everyone should have their bushfire survival plans upto-date and be ready to enact them if needed." Mr Ryan said Yellow Ribbon Day, an initiative of the Rural Fire Brigades Association of Queensland (RFBAQ), was now in its eighth year, and the Queensland Government is committed to ongoing safety improvements for all RFS Volunteers.

"In the past financial year, these dedicated individuals spent more than 152,000 hours responding to incidents across the state.

"That's an incredible effort and Queenslanders are fortunate to be able to call upon this support when the going gets tough.

"The safety of all volunteers needs to be constantly reviewed and at the forefront of what we do to protect the people that protect

"Together with the RFBAQ, the government is invested in improving safety and we are currently working through a number of trials, including upgrades to cab chassis and the inclusion of key safety systems such as roll-over protection and crew spray defence systems.

"These men and women spend countless hours away from family, friends and work to willingly give their time to help their fellow community members through some of their darkest hours.

"That's something to be grateful for each and every day so, on behalf of all Queenslanders, thank you."

Queensland Fire and Emergency Services (QFES) Commissioner Greg Leach said RFS volunteers provided a range of services to help keep Queensland communities safe, from frontline firefighting to behind the scenes community education and support.

"We are highly dependent on our volunteers before, during and after incidents, particularly in rural Queensland which represents 93 per cent of the state's land area," Mr Leach said.

"They play a vital role in helping landowners with fire mitigation activities and, with bushfire season now underway, will be called upon to protect lives and property when fire strikes.

"QFES has a long-term commitment to further improve the safety of all members of the RFS and we're working through input from volunteers, and safety and innovation recommendations from a number of sources and engagement with the RFBAQ.

"We want all of our volunteers to come home safely each time they are deployed, and we are committed, together with the RF-BAQ, to ensuring this happens by investing more in safety for our volunteers."

As well as being on the frontline of emergency response, Mr Leach said volunteers also dedicated countless hours to training and upskilling.

"Our volunteers are the backbone of their communities," he said.

"I cannot thank them enough for their selflessness, time, dedication and commitment to Queensland."

Rural Fire Brigades Association General Manager, Justin Choveaux, said Yellow Ribbon Day was a time to pay tribute to selfless volunteers.

"The members of the 1,400 Rural Fire brigades defend 93% of Queensland, $\,$

and Yellow Ribbon Day is when you stop to say 'thankyou' for what they do," Mr Choveaux said.

Government on right trail

Cyclists, horse riding and walking enthusiasts in the Gladstone region will benefit from a new 32km rail trail as part of the Palaszczuk Government's Rail Trail Local Government Grants

Gladstone Regional Council has been awarded \$80,000 to undertake restoration works on the rail trail surface and essential drainage on a section of the Boyne Burnett Inland Rail Trail (BBIRT) between Golembil Siding and Barrimoon Siding (Dawes Range Tunnels section).

The tunnels provide an outstanding example of railway tunnels and the presence of six in a very short section is probably unmatched on an Australian rail trail.

A matching \$80,000 investment was gifted to the BBIRT by the Bradley Wolfe Braveheart Association. This joint investment will be dedicated to enabling disabled access from the car park to the first tunnel.

The additional funding builds on the existing \$429,000 already committed to this trail by the Palaszczuk Government.

Member for Gladstone Glenn Butcher said use of the historic line for recreational activity means a part of Queensland's rail history will be preserved.

'Cycling, horse riding and walking enthusiasts in Central Queensland are going to love the BBIRT - a 270km link from Taragoola to Gayndah. Queenslanders can depend on us to continue working cooperatively with local councils and bike-riding groups to prioritise and build projects the community wants and needs," Mr Butcher said.

"The BBIRT committee have empowered




so many locals to assist with this project and much of the work on the trail is being completed by enthusiastic local volunteers from communities from Gladstone through to Gayndah.

An additional 7km rail trail from Nagoorin to Ubobo was also announced and is now open to the public.

The BBIRT committee said that this is a credit to all who have put in many hours of work with machinery and shovels and bare hands.

Mr Butcher said as Queensland continues its plan for economic recovery during the global COVID-19 pandemic, every dollar invested returns economic benefits to the regions.



Water for hydrogen

Sir.

Colin Boyce, the LNP candidate for Flynn in the next federal election, expressed concern in the September 2 edition of Gladstone Today about sourcing water to make green hydrogen.

As a sitting member of the Queensland state parliament, he has access to researchers and information that most of us can only dream about.

Had he bothered to avail himself of this wealth of information he would have discovered that there are affordable ways to have limitless water, and he should have shared that information with others who have neither the resources nor the time to research it themselves.

If we were to replace all of Australia's annual 88 million tonnes of LNG sales (export plus domestic), we would need to make 32.6 million tonnes of hydrogen (hydrogen has 2.7 times the energy of LNG).

Boyce correctly states that it takes about 10kg of water to make 1 kg of hydrogen, so we would need 326 million tonnes of water per year to make that hydrogen.

Where to source the water?

We don't want to use scarce fresh water. We

have seawater as far as the eye can see. Israel, using renewable energy sources, is desalinating for 0.055 cents per litre, so the 10 litres of water needed to make 1 kilogram of hydrogen would cost less than one cent. Hardly enough to break the bank.

It takes approximately 50 KWh of electricity to electrolyse 10 litres of water to make 1 kilogram of hydrogen. Recently, Portugal let a contract for supply of bulk solar electricity for 0.01114 Euros per KWh (1.8 cents Australian). At that rate, 1 kg of hydrogen would cost 50 x 1.8 cents, plus 1 cent for water, which equals 91 cents.

The desalination plant would cost around A\$1.4 billion.

Considering that the fossil fuel industry has enjoyed \$10.3 billion in subsidies in the 20/21 financial year, the government could easily afford to bankroll the project.

Boyce suggests building the Nathan Dam to supply water for the project. I strongly suspect that the real reason he wants Nathan Dam to be built is to supply water to the coal mines, as noted on the dam approval document:

"Revised dam approved: On 3 July 2008 a revised proposal for the Nathan Dam and an associated pipeline to supply water to coal mines was referred under the EPBC Act (Referral No. EPBC 2008/4313). It was declared a controlled

action and received its terms of reference in 2009. It was approved under the EPBC Act on July 13, 2017."

Further, can he guarantee this dam to supply water during a prolonged drought? I doubt

If the desalination plant was built, it would provide a drought-proof backup for water in the Gladstone region.

We need leaders who can think outside the box if we are to survive and thrive during and after the transition to renewable energy.

Labor's no friend to coal

As a politician you get a little tired and sometimes frustrated during election campaigns.

During the 2019 election I was going through Facebook, to distract myself from a tough day, and noticed a post from Joel Fitzgibbon, the Labor Member for Hunter. He said, "People still ask me why we can't build a new coal-fired power station. The answer is we can, but no one wants to.'



"That's when God started speaking directly to me. And he had to come to me Himself and He said, 'Why are you still doubting after I came to you in a vision?'

"And He reminded me of the time He had come to me in the helicopter dream, which was a revelation of what would happen two months later in 2007 - and it was something I had forgotten about.

"I remembered then, that in the dream, I had vividly seen the dead branch sticking up at the top of the tree, and heard the click when I hit it and the dreadful crashing noise. All exactly as it happend - just as I had been shown.

Graham feels that he would not be showing trust in God if he went through a thorough medical check, with X-rays and consultations. He feels well and completely trusts in God, who is now his doctor.

"I decided I would not have any x-rays or scans and for the last two and a half years I have not gone to a doctor nor had any prescription medicines.


"Recently, however, I had to go to the GP in order to get sleeping tablets and while I was there a full range of blood tests were ordered - the results came back giving me a clean bill

It was also through Graham's battle with cancer, and his growing faith, that he came to know Pastor Clark Taylor.

Like Graham, Clark was a man of the land. So, from the beginning, he and Graham had an

The two men first met at Yeppoon when Leona McCamley took Shirley and Graham to hear Clark speak.

They met again just at the time in Graham's life when Graham needed his faith to grow. Shirley had died two years earlier and Graham had received his cancer diagnosis.

Clark regularly prayed for the sick and he and Graham talked about God and prayed to-

"I found Graham to be a person who needed some help and I got to really like him," he

"We formed a bit of a comradeship and we shared things just as two stockmen. I found him to be very earnest in his faith.

Graham's faith has brought Shirley back to him, he says.

"One night with my evening prayer, I prayed to God that I would be able to hold Shirley's hand again and sing praises to God, as we had done for 54 years on earth together.

"God answered my very presumptuous prayer and brought Shirley to me in a very

clear vision and dream. Because Shirley was at peace, very happy and full of love and compassion, she could only have been with Jesus.

"When I looked into her eyes, they were still full of love for me, but as she was leaving, Shirley gave me a sad look, which I had seen many times before, when I had done anything that had disappointed her.

"I know Shirley was saying Jesus would not let me pass me on Judgement Day unless from now on I only do God's will and complete the plan He has had for my life since the day I was

"By writing this book I am able to tell of the incredible miracles I have witnessed of God's answer to my prayer and show how He will do the same for anyone who believes and puts their complete trust in God."

Abandonding ship safely

VOLUNTEER MARINE RESCUE

Over the last few weeks, we have talked about using a radio, including how to make an emergency call.

While uncommon, some emergencies can lead to the loss of a vessel and the need to abandon ship. The emergencies that can lead to this can broadly be grouped into two categories, fires and compromises to the watertight integrity of the hull.

As in most other emergencies, your chances of survival are often decided long before the actual event. For this reason, we are going to talk a little bit about the sort of plan you should have in place to increase your chances of survival if you must abandon your boat at sea and the steps you should take if you are forced to make this decision.

While you may only have seconds to act, as soon as you have decided to abandon your boat you should make every effort to broadcast an emergency call and at the very least state where you are and that you are going to abandon ship.

It goes without saying, but at this point everyone should have life jackets on and if you are in the habit of not wearing one at sea you might want to consider changing this habit.

If time permits, every loose item that will float should be thrown overboard. This obvi-

ously includes life rings and other safety devices, but also eskies, seat cushions, and anything else you can grab. The basic rule is, if it floats it goes! This will increase the number of things you and your passengers can use for added buoyancy and to get clear of the cold water. A larger debris field is also easier for rescuers to spot from a distance.

As you are leaving the boat you should be activating your EPIRB and this should be securely attached to your life jacket so it can't become separated from you. You should also be

taking your pre-prepared grab bag with you, which is where your pre-planning comes into play.

This bag can in practice be any watertight receptacle that will float and should contain items you may need to survive including:

- Extra water
- Suitable food
- Sunscreen
- Blankets and waterproof sheeting
- First aid supplies

- Charts, notebooks, pens
- Ropes
- Portable marine radio
- Torches
- Flare

Looking back at 1890 from 1929 ...

A Peep at the Past Gladstone in 1890

Scene is Changed To-day (1929)

A correspondent writing on June 11th 1880 said: Gladstone, one of the oldest ports (known at first as Port Curtis) is situated on a ridge between a very fine open harbour (protected from the sea by several large islands) and Auckland Creek and its adjacent mud flats.

The main portion is on this ridge, which is stony and moderately steep at its extremity.

It is very backward in its buildings, most of them being very shabby, mere humpies, though there are a few fair sized public buildings.

"The scenery around Gladstone is very different from what we re used to, being very mountainous. Immediately opposite Glad-




stone, to the west, lies the large mountain known as Mount Larcombe, with a peculiar shaped rock on top, likened to a crouching lion.

"The harbour is very pretty, with its islands rising to a good height on the sea side, Mount Larcombe to the west, and over the comparatively level country near Gladstone rise the various mountain ranges, prominant amongst which are the many peak ranges. The country around Gladstone is for the most part very thickly timbered, with stony ridges.

"The municipality cannot be congratulated on their streets. In wet weather the mud street is a disgrace. Gladstone is essentially a pocket borough for old identities. The government has been very good to Gladstone in constructing a road along the seaside for lovers to walk out on, and in making a good pier for the Izaac Walton brotherhood to fish from. The reason why they did this was that fishing is the amusement most fitted for the slow going community settled there."


Small bird loves seeds and insects

Helping vulnerable women

The Palaszczuk Government has launched a new range of information and awareness resources for women with disability who may be experiencing domestic and family violence.

Minister for the Prevention of Domestic and Family Violence Shannon Fentiman said the resources formed part of the government's commitment to addressing women's safety and domestic and family violence prevention for more vulnerable Queenslanders, including people with disability.

"We know that women with disability are almost twice as likely to experience domestic and family violence, and this is simply not acceptable," Minister Fentiman said.

"In many cases, when women with disability experience domestic and family violence, it is at the hands of their partner or relative who also acts as their primary support carer.

"We are invested in the safety of Queensland women, and particularly ensuring that more vulnerable women have access to the help and support they need.

"These resources have been developed in consultation with women with disability and the disability and domestic and family violence services sector and aim to raise awareness of what domestic and family violence looks like and how to safely reach out for support."

Minister Fentiman said the resources would be available online, with printed materials also being made available through a pilot program at participating GP clinics in Brisbane South, Darling Downs and West Moreton Primary Health Networks.

"Materials being made available through selected GP clinics will include a poster, easy read booklet and brochure," she said

"The easy-read booklet and online content have also been developed in consultation with an accredited easy read communication specialist to support health professionals to support women with disability experiencing domestic and family violence."

Minister Fentiman said the Palaszczuk Government was also making available domestic and family violence training for the disability sector workforce.

"The disability sector workforce is well positioned to engage with people with disability

at risk of, or experiencing domestic and family violence," she said.

"We are committed to supporting the disability sector workforce to respond appropriately, which is why we are making available

online a number of training modules and supporting resources.

"This training will equip the disability sector workforce and organisations to effectively identify and respond to domestic and family violence experienced by women with disability."

Funding secures new era for Queensland art sector

"It is so exciting to welcome brand new entrants including First Nations led Digi Youth Arts, Inala Wangarra, and Aboriginal Art Co; performing arts organisations including The Little Red Company, indelibilityarts, shake & stir, Dead Puppet Society, Belloo Creative, Casus Circus, and Cluster Arts; dance companies The Farm, Phluxus 2 and Everybody NOW! and the return of Vulcana Circus.

"Queensland's visual arts are also well represented, with Outer Space now also accessing Organisations Fund 2022-2025 investment, and the return of NorthSite Contemporary Arts to the fund.

This long-term Palaszczuk Government investment in the state's vital small to medium arts sector will support future planning, artist employment, recovery from the impacts of COVID-19 and the delivery of important arts-led social and economic outcomes across the state.

Minister Enoch said the 46 successful companies focus on a range of arts priorities including addressing the needs of young people, people with disability, supporting communities and elevating First Nations

"Moving forward, it will be these companies that will deliver world class arts experiences on the global stage as we look to the exciting arts and cultural opportunities the Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games present for Queensland," Ms Enoch said

Catarina Hebbard, Co-Artistic Director of indelabilityarts said as a small not-for-profit company, ongoing organisational funding will play an important role in cementing indelabilityarts' future within our arts land-scape.

"This funding will allow us to focus on our grassroots work which is to provide creative opportunities for Queensland artists with disabilities," Ms Hebbard said.

"Ongoing funding takes some pressure off the day to day running of the company and will make way for us to deliver more quality programs and better outcomes for diverse artists in Queensland."

Naomi Price, Artistic Director and Co-Founder of The Little Red Company said, "we are delighted to receive multi-year funding through the Organisations Fund 2022 to 2025."

"The tinnitus of uncertainty has reverberated through our industry over the past 18 months

"Multi-year funding provides us with stability and reassurance as we navigate the next four years, enabling us to continue our commitment to generating employment opportunities for arts workers, creating dynamic new work for audiences, and elevating Queensland artists.





Those views can make it difficult for a young person carving out their path in this world – doubly so when it comes to seeking a future in agriculture.

Limited opportunities to own property, tough conditions like drought and flood, and a lack of business training to keep you afloat if you do get there – all deterrents to making a go of life on the land.

Fortunately, AgForce had the foresight to

establish its Young Producers' Council earlier this year and, despite some COVID-related setbacks to events we had planned, we have been able to start asserting our influence on industry.

Our council of 10 men and women aged under 40 is always looking for opportunities to connect with Queensland's new and existing producers, to find out what it is that matters most to them.

We are likewise conscious of engaging at the coalface of existing and developing industry issues, to ensure a diverse range of opinions are considered, not only well-established views.

We have also been actively engaged in cultivating new networks with governments at all levels to encourage renewed examination of the current problems with regulation and to establish programs that fund and support un-

der 40s hoping to enter the industry.

Sweeter sugar outlook sees rise in farmer confidence

A 'sweeter' sugar price has helped fuel an upswing in Queensland farmer confidence, with sentiment in the state's ag sector reaching an 18-month high, the latest quarterly Rabobank Rural Confidence Survey has found.

Released today, the survey found close to two-thirds of the state's sugar producers are expecting conditions to improve in the year ahead, the most positive outlook for the sector in 12 years.

With strong confidence also reported among cotton, beef and grain producers, investment in the state's ag sector is set to increase, with the Queensland 'investment intentions index' – measuring farmers' plans to invest in their own businesses over the next 12 months – now at its highest level in the survey's 20-year history.

The quarterly survey, completed last month, found 43 per cent of Queensland's primary producers have an optimistic outlook for the agricultural economy in the coming 12 months – up from 37 per cent with that view in the June quarter.

Close to half (47 per cent) anticipate similar conditions to last year and just six per cent expect a deterioration.

Rabobank regional manager for North Queensland and the Northern Territory Trent McIndoe said strong and – in the case of beef – record commodity prices, generally good seasonal conditions and the low interest-rate environment were driving much of the positivity prevailing in the sector.

"And then there is the confidence in food and agriculture in general, which is being seen as a pretty safe space to be in," he said. "This is fuelling not only farmer confidence, but also investment in the sector."

The survey found more than a third of the state's farmers (35 per cent) were looking to increase investment in their farming operations over the next 12 months, with on-farm infrastructure, increasing livestock numbers, upgrades to plant/machinery and adopting new technologies the key priorities.

While investment is strong across commodity sectors, Mr McIndoe said "we are starting to see investment ramp up in cane as well and we would expect this trend to continue over the next year or two given the high sugar price."

In the sugar sector, 33 per cent of growers are intending to increase investment in their businesses, up from 24 per cent last quarter. For Queensland's cotton and grain sectors, 44 per cent and 43 per cent of producers, respectively, are planning to increase investment, with 37 per cent in beef also holding that intention.

In the current high-commodity price environment, Mr McIndoe said, "we are seeing farmers and also supply chain partners and industry bodies – such as in the cotton industry – retain earnings and reinvest in technology. And this is driving efficiency gains."

Commodity prices were nominated as the

key driver of positive sentiment by 84 per cent of Queensland farmers expecting conditions to improve, climbing to 91 per cent among those in the sugar sector.

"Sugar prices have crept higher in recent weeks to above \$600 a tonne with some growers locking in 2022/23 forward contracts above \$500 per tonne," Mr McIndoe said.

With sugar prices now "well above the cost of production", he said, this was a welcome development after many years of low prices.

"But as growers are only too aware, the market is at the mercy of developments in key producing regions, such as Brazil and India, but, with a tight global balance sheet, prices are expected to remain elevated and also volatile, emphasising the importance of price risk-mitigation strategies," he said.

Queensland beef producers were also buoyed by the market outlook, Mr McIndoe said, with 83 per cent of those with a positive outlook attributing their view to commodity prices.

"Not only are restockers driving up beef prices, but demand remains strong in offshore markets and also domestically for prime cuts as we continue to see the Eastern Young Cattle Indicator reach new records," he said.

Mr McIndoe said the live export trade also remained very strong, with prices over \$4 per kilo, as demand held up well out of Indonesia and Vietnam.

Across all Queensland agricultural sectors, though, confidence was highest among cotton producers, with 63 per cent reporting a positive outlook on the 12 months ahead, while the majority of grain growers (72 per cent) expected a continuation of current conditions.

"In cotton, it is the season, as well as pricing, that is fuelling confidence with most of the southern areas shoring up water for next year's crop," Mr McIndoe said. "While growers in the Central Highlands had enough water in storage to get their crop going this year, with the Fairbairn Dam at 15 per cent capacity, many will be looking for a wet spring to fulfil planting intentions."

And for the state's grain growers, he said, the outlook was positive, with many receiving good in-crop rain while wheat prices remained around \$350 per tonne.

In line with the strong commodity price outlook, the survey found more than half of Queensland survey respondents (52 per cent) expect to generate a higher gross farm income in 2021 to 2022.

And this, Mr McIndoe said, was assisting many in the drought-recovery process.

"While it is still a three to four-year process, the injection of capital will certainly help businesses be more robust with managing the inevitable seasonal and market vagaries of farming," he said.





Welcome to another column of news and topics on horse racing brought to you by the Rockhampton Jockey Club.

As you're aware I've been telling you over the last three weeks about the complete renovation of the Callaghan Park grass track.

I'm now delighted to report that the work has been completed and we are very excited about the outcome.

Specialist turf farmers from the Sunshine Coast Hinterland completed the works last week

It was a massive undertaking to scarify the whole track as well as carrying out other necessary revitalising procedures.

Then the track was top dressed with a suitable sand.

The RJC's track manager Trent Williams was elated not only with how the works progressed but with the completed results.

All going well everything should be raring to go for the first meeting back on the new look track at Callaghan Park, Rockhampton on 28 September.

The company that undertook the works are racecourse track specialists engaged by Racing Queensland.

The team has undertaken similar grass track renovation works on other northern provincial racetracks.

Currently the team is engaged in a similar exercise at Cairns following completion of the huge Cairns Amateurs races last weekend.

With its revamp completed, our Callaghan Park track will now undergo a rigorous fertilisation and irrigation schedule set out and designed by Racing Queensland.

By the way the Callaghan Park course proper has a circumference of approximately 1800 metres

As Callaghan Park and Rockhampton Jockey Club play such a huge role in Queensland racing, it is a must that our track undergoes its annual maintenance for the busy schedule

Talking of Cairns Amateurs, which was the last of the Northern Winter Racing Carnivals, the Rockhampton horses were out of luck.

For instance Ricky Vale's very good horses Stubai and Namazu finished eighth and 12th respectively in the \$150,000 Amateurs Cup (2100m).

Callaghan Park trainer Jared Wehlow's Battle Plane finished 13th.

Former Rocky trainer Chris Attard's Bering Sea, part-owned by Rocky folk, did best running fifth off a wide barrier.

The only Rocky trainer to earn place-getter's prize money was Benny Crear with Dear Vain (second) and Grand De Lago (third).

However, it must be said that Jared Wehlow's Only Wanna Sing ran a very good fourth in the Cairns Amateurs Sprint.

You can't blame trainers travelling their horses the 1064 kilometres from Rockhampton to Cairns for the Amateurs.

Little wonder really when the two days racing from last Friday and Saturday offered some



\$686,000 in stakes!

Like so many in the Rockhampton racing scene it was upsetting to hear that local trainer Craig Russell will be undergoing major surgery in Brisbane next week.

In layman's terms Craig has a form of cancer behind one of his ears.

As a consequence, after what will be marathon surgery likely next Monday, Craig is expected to be sidelined from his horses for a lengthy period of time.

Craig commenced his racing career in Rockhampton as an apprentice jockey about three decades ago.

Weight was his nemesis but he progressed to work in a number of racing stables in Sydney and around Brisbane.

As training racehorses is Craig's only form of income, his wife Theressa has taken long service leave from her job to help fund the family during his recovery.

In keeping with the ethos that the racing industry looks after its own in times of crisis, fundraisers have been launched to help the family keep afloat during this time of need.

The Rockhampton Jockey Club is playing a pivotal role whereby a massive fundraiser has been launched.

This will culminate at the St Peters Caulfield
Cup Race Day at Callaghan Park on October

This date has been chosen thereby ensuring that the monster raffle will obtain maximum
