Hydrogen power

Three new hydrogen projects could deliver the next LNG-style boom to the Gladstone region.

The port city was the topic of discussion last week, with the announcement the world's largest green energy hydrogen manufacturing facility to be built in Gladstone.

Premier Annastacia Palaszcuzk was in Gladstone on Sunday with Fortescue Metals Group CEO Andrew 'Twiggy' Forrest to announce the \$1bn hydrogen development facility, destined for the Gladstone State Development Area at Aldoga.

The \$115 million manufacturing facility is

expected to double the world's green hydrogen production and bring thousands of jobs to the region. In the first stage of the operation, the facility is predicted to generate two gigawatts of energy.

Two other hydrogen projects, Yarwun's Hydrogen Utility H2-HubTM and Aldoga's Central Queensland Hydrogen Project, were also flaunted at the 2021 GEA Major Industry Conference and CQH2 Hydrogen Forum on Thursday, October 7.

When off the ground, both projects are expected to create more than 8000 jobs collectively.

The announcements come as the federal

government remains yet to set a target of net-zero emissions by 2050.

Australia has faced increasing international pressure to agree to the 2050 goal after the US and UK sought assurances of a sufficient reduction in emissions.

Premier Annastacia Palaszcuk said hydrogen was a huge part of Queensland's future and the announcement secured the state as "a green energy powerhouse".

She said the news was almost as significant as getting the Olympics.

Member for Gladstone Glenn Butcher said the projects were a great opportunity to get hydrogen into Queensland and into Gladstone. "What we're seeing now is a new explosion of projects coming to Gladstone," Mr Butcher said.

"We've set up a state development area in Gladstone for specific reason to attract new industries to our area.

"Now we are seeing the fruits of that labour under a Palaszczuk Government delivery on these new projects just like we've seen with the LNG industry previously in Gladstone.

"Now we are seeing hydrogen facilities start to come forward and start to prosper in years to come."

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Doctor speaks out

A top doctor in the Gladstone region has shared his grave concerns for a leading Central Queensland health body's management of the Gladstone Hospital, calling for immediate

BITS Medical Doctor Gaston Boulanger has criticised Central Queensland Hospital and Health Service, saying it has failed to provide residents with satisfactory health care.

Last Tuesday Dr Boulanger, Gladstone Mayor Matt Burnett, Deputy Mayor Kahn Goodluck and Maxine Brush met with Member for Gladstone Glenn Butcher and Queensland Health Minister Yvette D'Ath to discuss ways a level four hospital and an Intensive Care Unit could be brought to the region as soon

Currently Gladstone Hospital is operating as a level three facility by stand-alone organisation CQHHS, which only permits operations of a limited complexity, by sufficiently qualified doctors to be conducted locally.

Dr Boulanger said in 2009 Gladstone Hospital was operating at a level four capacity, but in 2019 CQHHS had decided to strip back the facility to a level three, resulting in a lot of qualified and talented specialists to move on to other health services in Australia or overseas.

Dr Boulanger said the rally for upgraded hospital care started a decade ago, when Rio Tinto started the Here for Health initiative.

"The community and I have been talking to CQHHS for more than 10 years requesting a level four hospital," he said.

"In 2009 we were doing well to have an anesthetist who had all the stuff he needed to perform at a level four hospital.

"Then COHHS Rockhampton decided to downgrade Gladstone Hospital from a level four surgery to a level three.

"Overnight it meant doctors all left because they couldn't do their operations anymore and everyone had to go to Rockhampton to have

Dr Boulanger said despite the community's fight for a level four hospital, CQHHS created a plan called 'Destination 2030', which stated they wanted to develop Gladstone into a 'centre for emergency care' for Gladstone Hospital's population catchment of 70,000 people.

That actually meant a downgrade of the current hospital, despite what CQHHS said their services have been decreasing and specialists have been leaving the area for that rea-

to Rockhampton because they need our numbers to make their hospital sustainable.

"But most people I know don't want to go to Rockhampton and Bundaberg. They want services in Gladstone."

Mr Boulanger said Ms D'Ath promised to visit Gladstone within 12 weeks and review the policies surrounding a hospital upgrade.

"In my opinion the CQHHS and its (board) chairman Paul Bell has failed and I would really like to see a new chairman," he said.

However, Steve Williamson, chief executive of COHHS, said Gladstone Hospital already offered some level 4 services.

"Gladstone Hospital plays a vital part in the provision of health services across Central Queensland. It continues to grow and improve and now provides a wider range of specialist services than ever before," Mr Williamson said. "Gladstone Hospital already offers level four services in cardiac rehabilitation, medication, medical imaging and pathology, and level five services in mental health outpatients.

"The Clinical Services Capability Framework is an overall health service planning tool and its key purpose is to increase the services provided locally where it is safe to do so.

"Health service development is guided by

health service planners and service delivery experts. CO Health will be guided by expert advice in the development and delivery of services that are both safe and sustainable.'

Mr Williamson said completion of the new \$42m emergency department at Gladstone Hospital reflected CQHHSs commitment to growth in health services in the city.

'The old ED was refurbished into a Specialist Outpatients Department, which opened early this year," he said.

"Work is under way on the former Gladstone Mater Private Hospital, now named the West Wing, to create a single integrated hospital facility on the Gladstone campus.

"Works to upgrade the operating theatres and sterilisation unit are expected to be complete next year. Destination 2030 is our overarching strategy for the future, intended as a gradual program, with more services coming on line when it is safe and sustainable for their introduction.

Dr Boulanger hoped Tuesday's meeting was a step in the right direction to get those services back as soon as possible.

I know Queensland Health is looking at CQHHS to do better, my hope is in 12 weeks time the Minister comes back with a very clear pathway to upgrade our hospital from

'World's biggest' facility

The world's largest green energy hydrogen manufacturing facility will be built in Gladstone.

Premier Annastacia Palaszcuzk was in Gladstone on Sunday with Fortescue Metals Group CEO Andrew 'Twiggy' Forrest to announce the \$1bn hydrogen development facility, destined for the Gladstone State Development Area at Aldoga.

The \$115 million manufacturing facility is expected to double the world's green hydrogen production capacity with the first stage of the operation expected to generate 2 gigawatts and bring thousands of jobs to Queensland's energy industry for years to come.

The plant will be manufacturing green energy infrastructure and equipment — such as electrolysers, cabling and wind turbines — to create green hydrogen that will be exported across the world.

Mr Forrest said the announcement marked the first stage of a "billion-plus dollar", six-step operation.

In its initial stage, which is expected to be completed early next year, is set to create 120 construction jobs and 53 operational jobs.

"We will not allow the world to keep on cooking — we will not allow our children to inherit a much-less stable environment," Mr Forrest said at East Shores on Sunday.

"I'm convinced we have thousands of times more energy available than we'll ever need.

"The world absolutely can and, therefore, must move on from a polluting future."

Earlier this year, Mr Forrest estimated the green hydrogen market could generate revenues of \$US12 trillion by 2050.

He said his company had committed to going carbon neutral by 2030.

The announcement comes as the federal government remains yet to set a target of net-

zero emissions by 2050.

Australia has faced increasing international pressure to agree to the 2050 goal after the US and UK sought assurances of a sufficient reduction in emissions.

Premier Annastacia Palaszcuk said hydrogen was a huge part of Queensland's future and the announcement secured the state as 'a green energy powerhouse.'

She said the news was almost as significant as getting the Olympics.

"Our close proximity to Asia, our great trad-

ing relationships but, in terms of manufacturing, this will mean there will be ongoing jobs ... into the thousands into the future," she said.

The Premier said 300 jobs would be created in regional Queensland over the lifespan of the facility.

"Now we are moving to the next level. The next 11 years leading up to the Olympics will transform our state," Ms Palaszczuk said.

Member for Gladstone Glenn Butcher said the announcement would see a return of manufacturing in Australia.

"We have said for a long time that people of Australia are sick and tired of getting their equipment, their solar panels, their wind farms, their electrifiers from overseas, now it's time to bring it back to Queensland," he said.

Queensland Resources Council chief executive Ian Macfarlane said the announcement was another gem in the Gladstone's crown as the engine room of Queensland's industrial economy.

"Queensland has long been recognised as an essential source of energy for key trading partners like Japan, Korea, China, India and Taiwan through our exports of coal and gas.

"Gladstone has the most readily expanded port in the Southern Hemisphere, so it is the natural home for these exciting new developments"

It's planned that the first hydrolysers will roll off the plant by 2023.



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Exporting 'green' hydrogen

The location and facilities of the Port City of Gladstone are luring in hydrogen heavyweights from across the globe.

Hydrogen Utility (H2U) along with industry leaders and key stakeholders including Gladstone Ports Corporation (GPC), discussed the future of hydrogen at the Gladstone Engineering Alliance's CQH2 Hydrogen Forum last Thursday and Friday. .

The Australian green hydrogen company plans on building the export precinct of H2U's proposed H2-HubTM Gladstone green hydrogen and green ammonia Project at Yarwun, enabling access to global markets for their products. As one of several mediums of transport for hydrogen, ammonia is emerging as an option as a fuel source for power generation, shipping and heavy machinery.

H2U's founder and Chief Executive Officer Dr Attilio Pigneri said the Port of Gladstone was in an ideal location for green ammonia exports and would create an exciting hub in the global transition to decarbonized shipping fuels.

"We see great potential in this project driving the global transition to a new internationally tradeable, decarbonized energy," Dr Pigneri said.

GPC's Chief Operating Officer, Craig Walker, confirmed a Letter of Intent had been signed between GPC and H2U to advance discussions on ammonia export facilities.

"Hydrogen is an exciting opportunity for the region and GPC is readying to position Queensland into the global markets," Mr

"As well as discussions with H2U, GPC is working with a number of other proponents to facilitate hydrogen trade in the region," he

Minister for Energy, Renewables and Hydrogen Mick de Brenni, who is opening the CQH2 Hydrogen Forum on Friday, said renewable hydrogen was a multi-billion dollar opportunity that would create decent, secure jobs for Queenslanders, particularly in region-

"We know Queenslanders have what it takes to create new industry," Mr de Brenni said.

"Gladstone is a powerhouse that was at the heart of creating our LNG export industry and can do it again with renewable hydrogen, with new, decarbonised industry and the jobs for Oueenslanders.'

Manufacturing and Member for Gladstone Glenn Butcher said Gladstone was an industrial powerhouse.

'What we're seeing now is a new explosion of projects coming to Gladstone and I think Gladstone is set up perfectly to make the most of these opportunities," Mr Butcher said.

"What we want to now see on the back of these projects is a new pipeline of opportunities for local manufacturers to become part of the supply chain supporting the hydrogen industry and created good, secure long term regional jobs.'

The proposed H2-HubTM Gladstone project will be a major regional economic development, and the first, export-oriented green hydrogen and ammonia manufacturing facility, using 100 percent of renewable energy from solar and wind developments in Oueensland.

It is planned to be built in stages over the next 10 years to produce up to 3 Gigawatts in electrolysis plant, and up to 5000 tonnes of ammonia production capacity.

A strategic and suitably-located 171 hectares site in the Yarwun State Development Area (SDA) was secured by H2U under a Sale of Land Agreement with the Queensland Minister for Economic Development (MEDQ) in

The two-stage project is expected to drive more than \$4 billion dollars in investment and create thousands of jobs.

The site will integrate up to eight industrial scale process trains to coincide with Gladstone's port.

Dr Pigneri said the project alone would create more than 2000 direct and indirect jobs across the construction and operation phases.

"We are just one of many hydrogen projects in the pipeline for the region," he said.

"Developing flexible technologies for integrating renewable energies into green hydrogen and derivative products will deliver new exports and industries for Australia and drive further investments, economic growth and most importantly stable long term employment opportunities for generations to come."

Central Queensland leads the way in clean energy



Hydrogen projects 'boom'

A key project in the impending renewables-led jobs boom in Gladstone is expected to create 5,,000 direct and indirect jobs.

Speaking with Gladstone Today, New Energy Projects general manager Phil Richardson said the Central Queensland Hydrogen Project in Aldoga was expected to employ local industry workers when construction begins in 2024.

"We're definitely looking at local employment opportunities," Mr Richardson said.

"We can see there are a lot of skill sets already in the region from other industries like the LNG industry and power generation industry where we can skill people up to the hydrogen space so our priority is local employment."

In June this year, state-owned electricity generator Stanwell secured a 236-hectare site at Aldoga, 20km west of Gladstone, for the proposed 3,000 MW renewable hydrogen electrolysis facility.

When it commences production in 2026, the project is expected to generate \$4.2 billion hydrogen exports and \$10 billion for the Queensland economy over a 30-year period.

When built, the proposed renewable hydrogen project would be the largest in Queensland.

Mr Richardson said the demand for renewable hydrogen was growing, particularly for Japan and Korea.

"We are seeing growing demand especially in economies like Japan and Korea which are looking at reducing their carbon emissions and don't have the access to renewable energy we have in Australia," Mr Richardson said.

"We are expecting to export to Japan but there are other countries we are looking at as well, especially Rio de Janeiro and Germany who are looking at hydrogen exports as well."

Last September, a consortium between Stanwell and Japanese hydrogen supplier Iwatani Corporation.was announced.

The announcement of the consortium members, which included Japanese companies Kawasaki Heavy Industries, Kansai

Electric Power Company and Marubeni, and Australian energy infrastructure business APA Group, displayed international confidence in Gladstone's growing reputation as an ideal location for renewable hydrogen projects.

Comprising expertise across the hydrogen supply chain, renewable energy, hydrogen production, liquefaction, shipping and potential offtake, the consortium then commenced a detailed \$10.4 million feasibility study into the development of the project.

Stanwell Acting Chief Executive Officer Adam Aspinall said Queensland's relationship with such high quality international and Australian counterparts would be critical in further developing the state's emerging hydrogen industry and putting Queensland on the map as a reliable renewable energy exporter.

"Queensland has a unique advantage in the production of renewable hydrogen, with our close proximity to Asia, renewable energy resources, established infrastructure and recognised manufacturing capabilities," Mr Aspinall said.

"Exploring opportunities for collaboration at commercial scale and investing in hydrogen production is vital if Queensland is to harness the significant economic benefits and job creation opportunities hydrogen would bring to our local communities."

Minister for Regional Development and Manufacturing Glenn Butcher said the MOU represented another opportunity to cement Gladstone's position as Australia's hydrogen capital.

"Gladstone has already proven a powerhouse when it comes to LNG exports and the emerging hydrogen industry represents the next phase in the region's long-term future," Mr Butcher said.

"As the industry continues to grow it will provide secure jobs in renewable energy in Gladstone and huge supply chain opportunities for manufacturers across the Central Queensland region."

Pending the successful outcome of the feasibility study, the consortium will complete a Front End Engineering Design phase, with a view to reaching a Final Investment Decision in 2022.

While they are confident the project would go ahead, Mr Richardson said they were still looking at different funding options.

"We are working with a range of partners so we've got five other companies joining us in the consortium, which is a number of potential investors," he said.

"We are looking at becoming an investor ourselves, and we're looking at financing and grant funding as well."

"It's an exciting opportunity for the region and we are really looking keen to work with the local communities and levels of government and stakeholders to make it a success."

Cinemas sign 10-year deal

Gladstone Cinemas have signed a ground-breaking 10-year lease at their current Dawson Road site, despite its previous plans to relocate to Yaralla Sports Club.

The Struik family revealed on Sunday night their decision to renew their lease for an additional 10 years at Gladstone Central Shopping Centre.

"We have committed our support to centre owners, Alceon PL, and are proud to announce an encompassing refurbishment, renewal and repurposing of existing facility as part of the newly signed lease," the family wrote.

Plans for Gladstone Cinemas to relocate to Yaralla Sports Club were originally flaunted in September 2019 and were approved by Gladstone Regional Council in a meeting in 2020.

However the landlords of the existing cinema took the matter to court and appealed the development last year.

In late 2020, a new development application for a material change of use and short-term accommodation variation request was lodged with the council earlier by Yaralla Sports Club.

In June this year, all councillors voted in favour of approving the new cinema development but the council had also voted to reject the request to increase accommodation at Yaralla

According to a Gladstone Regional Council report, Gladstone Cinemas had intended to relocate to the new facility from its existing site in the Gladstone Central Shopping Centre.

The new cinema was expected to have eight

rooms, including two gold class, and was going to seat up to $468~\mathrm{patrons}.$

It also included a foyer, games room, amenities, lounge, bar, candy bar and ticketing area.

Gladstone Cinemas said it was ultimately Covid which changed their position on relocating.

"Although we had initially supported the

building of a brand new site at Yaralla Sports Club, the pandemic continues to amount to catastrophic consequences for the cinema industry as a whole, and Gladstone Cinemas' position has changed as a result.

"Our heartfelt thanks and gratitude are extended to Will Schroeder and the Executive Board of Yaralla Sports Club, along with the Gladstone Regional Council for their unwav-

ering support of our family-owned and operated business.

"We look forward to bringing you the best in big screen entertainment for many years to come and thank you for supporting cinema."

Future development of the Yaralla Sports Club cinemas remains unclear.

Yaralla Sports Club CEO Will Schroeder declined to comment.

Mum in tears after son with disability is shown the door

A mum and her son with a disability were allegedly kicked out of a South Gladstone supermarket because they were accompanied by a support dog.

Angie Smith said she was so 'devastated' she wasn't sure she could even put it into words after her and her son Jenson were denied entry to South Gladstone Foodworks due to having their support dog, Shaun, in the store.

"Shaun was wearing his official vest and even after telling both the owners it is illegal to deny entry to an Assistance Dog, we still had to leave," Ms Smith said.

"As if that wasn't bad enough, they allowed us to be verbally assaulted and humiliated by a customer as we were leaving the store.

"He says 'ya know most people tie their dog up outside! What are you retarded?' I spun around and said I beg your pardon! So he repeated 'well, are you retarded?'."

Ms Smith said she had bursted into tears before running out of the store.

"My 6-year-old son has multiple disabilities and thank God he doesn't understand the disgusting insult thrown at us by that man," Ms Smith said.

"We returned home without the grocery items we needed because I am far too upset and humiliated to enter another business.

"To the owners of South Gladstone Foodworks, please educate yourselves on the laws regarding Assistance Dogs and don't make anyone else go through this for the sake of a bottle of milk."

South Gladstone Foodworks owner Sam Pao said he never meant to offend Ms Smith or her son, who were regular customers.

"We are so devastated, we never meant to hurt anyone," Mr Pao said.

Mr Pao said there was a misunderstanding due to a language barrier.

"They entered the store as they usually did, but I didn't see them come in and then I heard a dog barking and there are no dogs allowed in the store," Mr Pao said.

"If we were seen to have dogs in the store by the council or anyone like that, we would get into serious trouble.

"As soon as I saw it was her and the dog was a support dog I said "oh okay" and walked away, but she must have taken offence or misunderstood and thought that I was angry."



Mr Pao said he had suffered emotional trauma from how the event played out since, even claiming to have suffered face-to-face racial abuse.

"We have lost sleep over the incident," he said.

"We just work so hard to make this store the best we can and serve the community but there always seem to be one problem or another.

"We just want to apologise to her face to face, we didn't want to do any harm."

Since her post went viral on social media on Thursday night, hundreds of people have given their support for Ms Smith, with some claiming they would not shop at South Gladstone Foodworks again.

Ms Smith said it was not her intention to boycott the store.

"Before I had my son, I ran my own small business so I understand how difficult it can be and I would never wish for anyone to be forced to close their doors," Ms Smith said.

"I simply wanted the owners to be accountable and learn the laws in Australia regarding assistance dogs.

"He got to stay in the store and purchase his items, without one single person standing up for me, yet we had to leave without any of our shopping.

"That is disgusting behaviour from anybody, let alone a grown ass man."

Vax rate still slow

Covid vaccination rates across Central Queensland's local government areas (LGAs) lag behind the state-wide average this week, though portions of the region are edging towards a fully vaccinated milestone of 50 per cent.

As of Monday, 53.4 per cent of eligible Queenslanders have been fully vaccinated and 70.6 per cent have received their first

In Gladstone, from an eligible population base of 48,845, 44.2 per cent have been fully vaccinated and 60.8 per cent have received their first dose.

Livingstone Shire and Rockhampton, meanwhile, are honing in on 50 per cent.

In Livingstone, 46.9 per cent have been fully vaccinated and 62.2 per cent have received their first dose.

In Rockhampton, from an eligible population base of 64,482, 46.3 per cent have been fully vaccinated and 62.1 per cent have received their first dose.

Across Central Queensland's more isolated LGAs, the numbers begin to fall away and present a substantial gap from the state-wide

In Banana Shire, the portion of Central Queensland to the south of Gladstone, 41.7 per cent of eligible residents have been fully vaccinated and 59.0 per cent have received their first dose.

In the Central Highlands, 37.1 per cent have been fully vaccinated and 52.7 per cent have received their first dose.

In Isaac, the beating heart of Queensland's coal industry, just 25.3 per cent of eligible people have been fully vaccinated and 40.8 per cent have received their first dose.

Central Queensland's comparatively low vaccinates rates may see a lift in next week's numbers with the announcement that hard-

"So not only can you get the vaccine at established Queensland Health vaccination centres, GPs, pharmacies and outreach clinics - you will also be able to get your jab at one of 33 Bunnings stores this weekend," Queensland Health Minister Yvette D'Ath said in a press release this week.

"We're hoping tradies, renovators, DIY regulars, casual shoppers and those there for the sausage sizzle will all come forward to get vaccinated and we thank Bunnings for their help to get these sites operational.'

Within Central Queensland, clinics will be set up in Bunnings carparks in Gladstone, Yeppoon and Rockhampton. Last week, Minister D'Ath visited Rockhampton's prime vaccination clinic on Yeppoon Road and warned that the spread of Covid into Central Queensland was inevitable.

"Central Queensland, we need your help. We've got to get these vaccination numbers up," she said.

"Time is up, do not wait any longer. This virus will spread throughout our communities. Once the borders are open, there will be community spread of this virus. It will come, in every single community. The key is, will your town be ground zero?"

Those aged 12 and over are eligible for the Pfizer vaccine at all Queensland Health vaccination locations.


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Albo's Australian pledge

Federal Labor Leader Anthony Albanese will prioritise small and medium-sized businesses in federal government procurement contracts as part of a 'Buy Australian' policy designed to boost Australia's industrial capacity.

Mr Albanese made the commitment in a speech to the Labor faithful at the NSW Labor State Conference on Saturday, promising to establish a Future Made in Australia office within the Department of Finance to help realise the ambition.

"Labor will provide opportunities for mid and small tier Australian companies to participate in the infrastructure pipeline helping to build and strengthen our sovereign capability," he said.

"This will be done by packaging tenders where appropriate, into multiple packages that allow smaller companies to bid for them."

"Taxpayer funded procurements across Government have been worth \$200 billion over the last 3 years," he added.

"This plan will ensure that the Australian Government is backing Australian workers and Australian businesses.'

Alongside procurement, the 10-point plan includes a commitment to First Nations businesses and a defence industry development strategy that maximises local content.

The policy may come as welcome news to local businesses across Central Queensland, who have expressed concerns to Gladstone Today that the major infrastructure projects set to transform the region over the coming

decade are dominated by Tier 1 and Tier 2 contractors largely external to the region.

At present, there are no Tier 1 firms native to Central Queensland, or the kind of enterprises with the scale and expertise necessary to take on multi-million dollar infrastructure

In a statement released to Gladstone Today, Gladstone Mayor and Labor's candidate for the federal seat of Flynn Matt Burnett said Buy Australian would have a direct and positive effect on businesses across Central Queensland by boosting manufacturing and uplifting local

"The Buy Australia policy is all about improving local capability and giving regional businesses the support to become leaders in manufacturing," he said.

"A federal Labor government will open the door to more government work for more small and medium businesses by decoding and simplifying procurement processes.

Mr Burnett also said the Future Made in Australia office would actively support local industry to take advantage of government purchasing opportunities.

Labor's Buy Australian policy is part of a broader ambition to enshrine manufacturing as a new pillar of wealth for the regions.

In a telephone call with Gladstone Today in August, Mr Albanese touted his party's \$15 billion National Reconstruction Fund as a conduit to more jobs in Central Queensland.

"We want to make more things here," Mr Albanese said.

"We've established our National Reconstruction Fund, \$15 billion to look at how do we transform existing industries, but how do we also create new industries."

"So for example, at the aluminium refinery there run by Rio Tinto in Gladstone. They're looking at using solar to power the refinery. And when I visited there, we had a briefing about that, and that's about, that's not about ideology, that's about reducing their costs, and allowing them to operate more efficiently. So there are a range of potentials that are there in terms of high-value jobs."

Watt questions Nationals

Labor Senator Murray Watt claims Matt Canavan has 'let the cat out of the bag' about the Nationals' plan to deal with climate change, warning Australians could be hit by a new mortgage tax.

Morrison government, with Liberal MPs labelling the Nationals' plan as 'Argentine-style policies' and resembling the Pyramid Building Society collapse in Victoria.

Senator Watt said the Nationals' climate change plan was a 'clear and present danger to Australians'.



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BHP imposes vax mandate

Mining behemoth BHP will impose a Covid vaccination mandate on its workforce from January 2022 onwards, promising to lock out workers from its sites if they fail to get jabbed.

"Following a thorough review of the effectiveness of its Covid-19 health and safety controls, the latest scientific evidence and expert health advice, BHP will introduce vaccination as a condition of entry to its Australian sites and offices effective no later than 31 January 2022," the company said in a press release from October 7.

"All workers and visitors seeking access to BHP workplaces in Australia will be required to be fully vaccinated against Covid-19."

BHP Minerals Australia President Edgar Basto said the mandate was the right path forward to protect the health of the company's workforce and the communities in which it operates.

"We know this raise will questions for some, and we will work closely with our workforce as we go through the process of implementing these controls at our workplaces."

BHP's operations are an essential pillar of economic activity for Central Queensland, with multiple sites spread across the region.

Altogether, the company mines for metallurgical coal at nine sites across the Bowen Basin, including at its Blackwater mine southeast of Emerald and the Caval Ridge and Peak Downs mines near Moranbah.

The ASX-listed company has a market capitalisation of some \$180 billion.

Across Queensland, the company's workforce numbers at some 10,000, including contractors.

BHP's mandate comes as Central Queensland's Covid vaccination rates continue to lag behind the state-wide average, particularly in the Central Highlands and Isaac local government areas, the zones in which much of BHP's operations take place.

State-wide, 53.4 per cent of eligible Queenslanders have been fully vaccinated as of Monday.

In the Central Highlands, 37.1 per cent of eligible residents have been fully vaccinated.

In Isaac, just 25.3 per cent of eligible people have been fully vaccinated.

BHP's decision has been met with support from some quarters and opposition in others. Some have taken a more neutral position.

Queensland Health Minister Yvette D'Ath visited Central Queensland on October 8 and Gladstone Today asked her whether she supported BHP's decision to impose a vaccine mandate.

Minister D'Ath replied: "It is a decision for individual industries and businesses."

The CFMEU has come out strongly against the mandate, arguing that incentives and other methods should be employed to scale up vaccination rates rather than a mandate.

"We have strongly advocated to government and industry that Covid-19 vaccinations should be voluntary for mineworkers, with the high rates we need to protect safety better achieved through education, access and incentives," Mining and Energy Union Queensland District President Stephen Smyth said on October 7.

In a statement released to Gladstone Today, LNP candidate for the federal seat of Flynn Colin Boyce said he did not agree with BHP's decision and does not support vaccine mandates as a general principle.

"Covid-19 is here and it is here to stay," he said.

"Vaccines are available and free and I would encourage people to be vaccinated. However, there are exceptions, for example health, age and personal reasons as to why people don't want to be vaccinated and these people must understand their responsibilities and the consequences of not being vaccinated versus being vaccinated. As such, I do not support mandatory vaccinations."

Mr Boyce will front up against Gladstone Mayor Matt Burnett for the seat of Flynn.

Gladstone Today reached out to Mr Burnett to ascertain whether or not he supported BHP's decision, but Mr Burnett did not offer a clear response on the matter.

"When it comes to issues about your health, I recommend you direct every question and concern you have to your GP for professional medical advice to assist you in the decision as to what is best for you and your family," he said.

The Queensland Resources Council (QRC), a peak body representing the commercial developers of the state's minerals and energy resources, has lent its support to BHP. BHP is a member of the QRC.

"The QRC supports member companies making their own decisions about safe work practices including how to best protect employees and resources communities from Covid-19," QRC Chief Executive Ian Macfarlane said in a statement released to Gladstone Today.

"Many QRC members are running with their own campaigns at on-site operations and online. Some members are also incentivising employees to get vaccinated. Whatever the approach, the best defence we've got is to encourage vaccinations and maintain strict hygiene protocols as we're all in this together."

BBRF's new boost for CQ

Round Five of the federal government's Building Better Regions Fund (BBRF) will funnel millions of dollars to projects across Central Queensland.

Grants range from \$20,000 to \$10 million and cover 50 per cent or more of an eligible project cost.

The Gladstone Auto Club will receive \$380,908 to construct a speedway track and facilities at the Gladstone Auto Club at Benaraby. The total cost of the project is pegged at \$761,816.

The Brothers Australian Football Club, an AFL club, will receive \$79,958 to install floodlights and lamp posts at Kele Park in West Rockhampton.

Tennis Rockhampton will receive \$34,350 to replace the current halogen tennis lights with LED lamps.

Central Highlands Regional Council will receive \$108,500 to construct a skate park and shade structure at the Gemfields. The total cost of the project is \$217,000.

Isaac Regional Council will receive \$187,500 to develop a 'regional trails strategy', identifying and tourism experiences for the Isaac region.

Rockhampton Regional Council, meanwhile, will receive \$1.5 million to construct a formal entrance and gathering space for the Rockhampton Zoo.

The funding will form a part of the Rockhampton Botanic Gardens and Zoo redevelopment program, a set of projects designed to transform the zoo over the next ten years.

The Ivy Anderson Home Committee Inc. will receive \$4,094,727 to construct a nine bedroom self-contained aged care facility for medium-level care aged care residents in Springsure, a small town south of Emerald at the intersection of the Gregory and Dawson highways. The total cost of the project is pegged at \$4,394,727.

Under Round Five of the BBRF, the government has committed almost \$300 million to support 298 projects across regional Australia.

Over its history, the BBRF has funnelled \$1.38 billion to nearly 1,300 projects.

Labor Candidate for Flynn Matt Burnett said he was keen to to see how Central Queensland could benefit from the 2032 Olympics.

"It would be great to see CQ and the Flynn electorate host some of the world's best athletes, whether that be competitive or for training prior to the games," he said.

Grant Cassidy, who will facilitate November's meeting, said the aim was to make our region stand out from other areas in the run-

"The formation of the task force is a great first step for that, there's nothing like sport to really unite people," he said.

"I think we're going to see a very strong, united group of people who are going to be incredibly enthusiastic and passionate about the great role that we can play and how we can actually go about attracting activities here in the region, leading up to and hopefully including the Olympics in 2032.

"With the facilities we have here we could host a range of different sports and teams here. We've got great temperatures and 300 days of sunshine, which is perfect conditions for training."

Toyota Australia Vice President Sales, Marketing and Franchise Operations Sean Hanley said Toyota was a firm believer that hydrogen fuel cell technology could play a central role in reducing emissions and it was committed to helping drive towards a cleaner society.

"When we launched the Prius hybrid 20 years ago, we started a drive towards helping reduce emissions from our vehicles through a process of electrification," Mr Hanley said.

"Today, we offer hybrid powertrains in seven vehicle lines and we have sold more than 200,000 Toyota hybrids over the past two decades."

"With the introduction of the zero-emission Mirai FCEV and its use by pioneering organisations, Toyota is continuing that journey as we aim to achieve zero emissions from our

vehicles by 2050 under the global Toyota Environmental Challenge 2050," he said.

The new Mirai is being offered on a 36 month/60,000km lease contract costing \$1,750 per month for three years, which includes fuel.

The launch of the new Mirai follows a small-scale trial program that was initiated in 2018 with ten examples of the first generation Mirai

Those trials were conducted in collaboration with local Melbourne councils and utility companies with the cars refuelled from a mobile hydrogen refueller.

The first trial partner was Hobson's Bay City Council in Melbourne's west, which used the three vehicles for council staff to carry out their work in the community with other organisations to trial the Mirai including energy companies AusNet Services and Mondo and Moreland City Council in Melbourne's northern suburbs.

With the new generation Mirai launched in Japan late last year and the development of Victoria's first permanent hydrogen production and refuelling facility at the Centre of Excellence in Altona, Toyota Australia has moved ahead with a larger demonstration program importing 20 examples of the new car.

The new Mirai is a sleek and stylish, fiveseat, rear-drive four-door sedan that uses an advanced hydrogen fuel cell powertrain that generates zero carbon emissions.

Its coupe-like aesthetic is both stylish and functional with the long low front end, tapered roofline and short rear end helping to contribute to a low drag co-efficient of 0.29cd.

At the heart of the car is an advanced fuel

cell powertrain that comprises a 128kW 330-cell fuel cell stack, three compressed hydrogen tanks, a lithium-ion battery and integrated electric motor and rear transaxle.

Mounted under the bonnet, the 128kW fuel cell stack draws in air that is purified and fed into the fuel stack where the oxygen combines with hydrogen in a chemical reaction to produce electrical energy, with water vapour as the only emission.

The hydrogen is stored in three carbon fibre reinforced plastic (CFRP) tanks that have a combined capacity of 5.6kg giving the Mirai a range of approximately 650km1.

Electrical energy generated by the fuel cell stack is fed to either the battery, that is mounted behind the rear seat, or directly to the electric rear-drive motor, depending on requirements

The electric motor is housed in a rear transaxle that combines the motor, transmission and differential in a lightweight, compact, integrated unit. Maximum power output is 134kW with a peak torque of 300Nm.

Clever packaging of the driveline components has ensured that the car now seats 5 and is slightly longer, wider and taller than the current generation Camry.

Inside, the stylish contemporary design denotes the new Mirai as a premium sporty sedan with a broad sweeping soft-touch synthetic leather dash with all controls, instruments and switchgear located for easy ergonomics and visual clarity.

An 8-inch digital instrument cluster incorporating a 4.2-inch multi information display (MID) offers all essential speed, fuel and vehi-

cle operation information with easy access to a variety of functions via the steering wheelmounted controls.

Sitting atop the centre console is a large 12.3-inch touchscreen display that, in addition to the switchgear on the steering wheel, provides control of the latest generation multimedia system that incorporates satellite navigation2, Bluetooth®3 connectivity and Apple CarPlay®4 and Android AutoTM5compatibility.

A premium 14-speaker JBL®6 audio system delivers outstanding sound reproduction. As a premium sedan, the new Mirai is very well equipped for comfort and convenience with dual zone climate control, keyless smart entry and start, refined synthetic leather upholstery and trim, and power adjustable front seats.

Complementing its sports styling is an equally dynamic driving experience with multilink front and rear suspension, electrically assisted steering and ventilated front and rear disc brakes providing an optimum balance of handling, stability and ride comfort.

A tribute to his dad

Thomas Richard Sims has devoted a large fraction of his life to the education of many young men and women.

Along with his wife, Lorna and four of their six children arrived from Mount Murchison near Biloela to Wowan before he filled the role as the ninth principal of Wowan State School between 1971 and 1982.

Mr Sims was was born in 1929, still going strong albeit frailty which has begun to set in.

Now enjoying word games, bingo and the NRL tipping competition from the comfort of his aged home in Rothwell, Mr Sims hasn't long his ability to teach others his knowledge.

"He was teaching everyone what side the indoor bowls they have there should be placed to make them go down the carpet correctly," said his son, Mick.

"They get him to sing as well, although he says his voice is long gone."

Mr Sims was born the eldest son of his family, and still has all of his siblings alive; aged 97, 90, 79 and 77.

Adding their ages with his (92), they accumulate a wealth of experience worth 435 years.

The former educator was raised around the Kenilworth and had grown up on a dairy farm where he helped his father before he boarded at a high school in Gympie.

During his secondary studies, World War II broke out which saw him join the Volunteer Air Observers where he plane spotted.

In 1950, Mr Sims graduated as a teacher and accumulated 20 years of experience by the time he'd arrived in Wowan as a seasoned

Both Tom and Lorna enjoyed playing bowls; they'd even won championships at Wowan and at a district level.

Always keeping active, Mr Sims served as the junior golf patron and chaired the dawn and morning services on Anzac Day even though his birthday had arrived the day prior.

During his educational tenure in Wowan, all of the children had either left for their university studies or to commence their working life.

Mr and Mrs Sims moved to Maryborough in 1982 before Tom retired from the industry in 1988 when Lorna was

diagnosed with cancer. Sadness came in 1991 for Mr Sims and his family when their beloved Lorna passed away from her illness.

Years later in 2016, Tom returned to the region he had served.

He'd visited the Wowan State School centenary celebrations with his daughter Christine which he found to be a beneficial opportunity to catch up with a large portion of ex-pupils and their parents. There, Mr Sims sat proudly on his wheelie walker where he enjoyed a beer or two as a lot of people stopped by to

Proud son, Mick reflected on his father's contributions to the Wowan area.

"My recollections of dad in Wowan was having sung at every concert that was put on at Wowan; he sang with Jimmy Olsen quite often," he said.

"Dad also was a volunteer fire fighter, an ambulance officer and held positions in the

"His community spirit is something that has run in his family at Kenilworth.

"Seeing dad having a few beers with for-

mer students at the pub once they were over 18 showed the type of person he was; even though those past students may have been given the cane in Year 6 or Year 7, they would still have a drink with old Tom."



QRC chief's assessment

Oueensland Resources Council Chief Executive Ian Macfarlane sat down with Gladstone Today for a wide-ranging conversation on developments in the state's pervasive resources sector.

To begin with, Gladstone Today pressed the former Howard government resources minister on whether commodities other than coal might one day match coal's capacity to generate large-scale wealth for Queenslanders.

Mr Macfarlane replied in the affirmative if traditional metals such as aluminium, bauxite and copper were included in the assessment alongside the emergence of critical minerals, or the minerals expected to underpin a global shift towards emerging technologies and renewable energy.

"You are going to see a move towards those critical metals and when you add in their strategic importance, in terms of military and defence and the like, and just general demand in terms of renewables and lowering emissions, yes, it is more than feasible that that will happen," he said.

Referencing the new vanadium mine in the north-west, Mr Macfarlane said the first steps towards this new avenue of wealth had been

Mr Macfarlane also said it was likely that Queensland possessed sufficient deposits to sustain the industry moving forward.

"We've seen an enormous increase in exploration, predominantly in base metals and rare earths," he said.

"A little bit of brownfields in coal and gas. So people are looking, to see how much is there. And you'd expect based on the geology, that it is certainly there, so it's just a matter of finding it, commercialising it, processing it, getting it out, so a long way to go yet.'

Mr Macfarlane said promising job opportunities in the critical minerals space centred on developing a native processing and manufacturing capacity rather than simply organising extraction and export.

"And when you talk about jobs, the opportunity with rare earths is that we don't just dig it and ship it, we actually process it. So some of those jobs that are currently involved in mining, may transition into processing and mining. So again, some good opportunities there."

The emergence of autonomous haulage trucks on mine sites in Central Queensland hints at an industry disconnected from workers and Gladstone Today asked Mr Macfarlane whether he believed the advent of automation would entail steep job losses.

"Not necessarily," he replied.

"The big issue with automation is to ensure that the automation centres aren't in Brisbane. So Moura, Rockhampton, Moranbah. But to be

realistic, you've got to look at towns with reasonable capacity.

"And if you've got an automated dozer, it's still going to need fuelling, servicing, repairs. So the person driving the machine may not be sitting in the mine anymore, and from a workplace health and safety aspect that's something we aspire to. And secondly, the jobs may be higher paid. They will be sophisticated jobs, some of them will require degrees. The industry is up for that. As long as we manage it and as long as we don't say, 'well this is a way of not having people out in the regions.' And that's completely doable."

"I don't see significant changes in job numbers," he added.

"And you still need your GEOs and the next opportunity will be for processing. As long as they have the energy. A lot of that processing will be done on-site because it allows you to put your tailings back into your pit.'

Gladstone Today then directed the conversation towards industrial relations.

The CFMEU has sharply criticised what it sees as an escalation of casualised workplace arrangements in the sector and the Labor Party

looks set to make the issue of worker insecurity a key plank of its campaign to win back voters across the seats of Flynn and Capricornia.

Mr Macfarlane said the issue had been

"The issue that we are critically interested in is safety and there is no correlation between casualisation and safety issues," he said.

"And that is statistically proven. I think the unions do overstate the amount of casualisa-

Mr Macfarlane said the handsome salaries that characterise the sector counter claims of exploitation.

"We don't do industrial relations, but I think the normal forces of supply and demand will look after the situation. In the resource industry in Queensland where the majority of workers earn more than \$100,000 a year, you can't argue exploitation. I'm confident enough that whatever the industrial relations framework is, there will be plenty of jobs for workers and plenty of well-paid jobs for a long time.'

Mr Macfarlane also expressed confidence that the coal sector would thrive under a Labor

"I think there are a lot of lessons learned in the last federal election, including by the state government," he said.

"People like Cameron Dick and his proposal for the Queensland Resources Industry Development Plan, those sorts of things that will give the industry certainty, mean that regardless of which government, or which colour, and even sub-colours within governments at times, I think the industry is on much firmer ground than it was as little as two or three years ago.

Finally, Gladstone Today asked Mr Macfarlane whether he had noted improvements in the approvals regime over the last six months, a key area of concern for QRC members.

"I think we have, but it's still early days," he

"So part of the Resources Industry Development Plan is streamlining those processes, not short-cutting them, but streamlining them. Giving us more certainty around them.

"I think it's part of an overall change in mind-set, perhaps reflective of the federal election. But generally, we are making better

Planting near powerlines

After a couple of electric shock close calls with members of the public in recent times and the gardening season now here, Ergon Energy Network is urging people not to plant tall trees or bamboo near powerlines.

According to Ergon Area Manager Matt Hilder, tall vegetation near powerlines is one of the primary causes of outages in Queensland and could easily be avoided if people only planted appropriate species in their yards.

"Fast-growing plants like bamboo can quickly shoot up to 20 metres in no time and the wrong species of tree can cause serious safety risks when planted under, or too close to powerlines," Mr Hilder said.

"Likewise, people may think something like a jacaranda will look great on their footpath but in a few years the tree will be interfering with the area's power supply and our crews will need to cut it.

"This is why gardeners need to consider a plant's maximum mature height, then plant it even further than that from power infrastructure to preserve supply and keep everyone safe in the event the vegetation clashes with or comes down on powerlines during severe weather."



Mr Hilder said if property owners in an area with overhead powerlines wanted to know what trees are safe to plant and won't touch the network Ergon has a list on their website along with recommended distances to keep plants away.

We're not telling people they cannot beautify their yards with plants and trees, we'd just like them to ensure they plant appropriate species that won't adversely affect the power network potentially causing a safety hazard.

"If people go to the Ergon website and search for 'safe trees' they will see an extensive list of tree species that are safe near the power network and how far away they should be placed."

Proposed high school at Tannum Sands

Both streets that surround the site are completely unsuitable for increased traffic and need full width sealing with kerbing etc., one of the roads is narrow and one way!!.

Originally the land on the opposite side of the street from Tanyalla was proposed for a high school but Council approval was not forthcoming.

I understand that 1 Canoe Road is not subject to Council approval as it comes under the existing "education category "and subsequently no signs were required to be erected on site to give the public the opportunity to object . I also understand that the Council Planning Scheme is reviewed and possibly amended every 3 to 5 years so lets hope that

this loop hole is stopped so all future development will be subject to "on site "signs and public objection irrespect to whichever development is proposed on any land.

I should also mention that the Gladstone Regional Council have selected a strategically located site for a future high school on the corner of Tannum Sands Road and Pioneer Drive which is only 1.3 klms from Pacific Ranch Estate turnoff . This site would offer many hectares of space . Pioneer Drive will eventually connect to the second bridge over the Boyne River .Students from Benaraby and Miriam Vale district could be very interested in this easy to get too location . Eventhough the Council chose this site it can be a recommendation only.

It would be ideal if 1 Canoe Point was to remain as is and focused on youth activities including school camps and outdoor sports and conference centre etc and the High School was to be located on Pioneer Drive which would offer several hectares af land with expanding opportunities for the next 50 years and at the same time causing no traffic congestion to the surrounding residential areas.

Just look at 1 Canoe Point Road, it is a bottle neck destination with only 1 way in and 1 way out.

True costs of Net Zero

For most newspapers, news reporting is not really a thing anymore, so it was no surprise to see the nation's News Limited papers be devoted to advertising in favour of what they termed 'mission zero' this week.

Their goal was to convince people of the merit of signing up to a net zero emissions goal. After reading through the propaganda, I was almost convinced to change my mind, after all, by the way it was pitched, I should be receiving a new set of steak knives if I did.

Removing all use of coal, gas, oil, cattle (they produce emissions too) is such a monumental task that will cost a fortune. But nowhere in the propaganda did it describe what this cost would be.

The 'economic analysis' only described potential jobs in new industries, some of which do not currently exist like hydrogen electricity.

There was not even an attempt to estimate the costs of making such a huge change to our economy.

Others have estimated the cost, however, and those costs are huge. Before the last election, Dr Brian Fisher, a respected Australian agricultural economist, estimated the costs of reducing emissions by 45 per cent.

These costs showed that reducing emissions would cost Australia 336,000 jobs, electricity prices would increase by 58 per cent and wages would be \$9000 a year lower. A carbon price of \$326 per tonne would be needed to cut emissions by just half.

As Brian Fisher said on the release of the modelling: "As a state, Queensland is likely to be hard hit given its heavy reliance on fossil fuel production, mining and metal smelting."

Central Queensland would have the most to lose. The thermal coal sector would drop by 44 per cent and metallurgical coal by 13 per cent. The aluminium industry would fall by more than a third.

For the beef industry, a carbon price of \$326 per tonne would be a huge impost. Each cow emits around 100 kg of methane a year. According to the accepted science, methane is 23 times more potent as a greenhouse gas compared to carbon dioxide. So in carbon dioxide terms, each cow emits around 2.3 tonnes a year. For a grazier with a 1000 head, they would be up for a \$326,000 carbon bill every year.

Those extra costs would be passed on to all Australian consumers through their shopping bills. At those level of carbon prices, the cost

of mince could rise by more than \$7 per kilogram, almost doubling the cost of a spaghetti bolognese.

And what are we bearing all these costs for? Any attempt to limit our emissions will only help the environment if China reduces their emissions too. China accounts for a third of

the world's emissions and shows no signs of trying to reduce them.

If we cannot trust China to adhere to its trade obligations, if we can't trust them to allow independent inspectors to discover the origins of the coronavirus, how could we trust them to comply with a global climate agreement.

Worse, if China does not comply, but we saddle our own industry with increased costs, then we just lose more jobs to China.

That would make our country weaker at a time when the real news this week was that China has flown a record number of warplanes into Taiwanese airspace.

Call to create Biloela jobs

Labor Senator Murray Watt visited the Banana Shire Council for a doorstop in the hub of Biloela on Wednesday to fight for ways to increase jobs and investment in the district.

Conforming to Labor calls on the federal government to get behind new ideas to achieve this goal, he was also joined by Gladstone Region Mayor and Labor's candidate for the electorate of Flynn, Matt Burnett along with Banana Shire Mayor Nev Ferrier.

Mayor Burnett has pushed for federal investment with a proposal from the Banana Shire Council to build a new industry precinct which will support new jobs in Biloela and the region as a whole.

"Federal Labor is all about creating more jobs, in more industries and the council's proposal is spot on," a spokesperson said.

"This new precinct would support the creation of new businesses in the region to service the region's industry strengths like mining and agriculture and its new ones too."

The project would allow local entrepreneurs to compete for more industrial work, leading to more skilled employment for local workers.

Whether it's servicing projects in the generation of new energy and transmission, machining and fabrication through advanced manufacturing or equipping local businesses for future export opportunities through Inland Rail to Central Queensland, Labor wants to see more jobs in more industries in Biloela.

"We want to look beyond the short term and build a stronger Central Queensland," a spokesperson said.

"The Labor Party's plan for a stronger Australia focuses on jobs – more jobs with better pay and greater job security.

"This precinct would back up Labor's commitment to create a \$15 billion National Reconstruction Fund to rebuild Australian manufacturing, especially in our regions."

Gladstone Region Mayor, Matt Burnett supported the Banana Shire Council's proposal.

"I'm fighting for more jobs, in more industries across the whole of Central Queensland," he said.

"Towns like Biloela have a proud history in mining, power generation and agriculture and ideas like this from the council will help the town continue to grow; that's why I'm backing this 100 per cent."

Upon his visit to the region, Senator Murray Watt criticised the contributions of the federal government in their policy decision making.

"We need (them) to really gets behind our regions, and not just shovel money into the big cities like Sydney, Melbourne and Brisbane," Senator Watt said.

"People in Central Queensland are tired of Scott Morrison's empty promises; they want to see real action that takes the region forward."

Federal Member for Flynn, Ken O'Dowd responded to Labor's endeavours.

"Our government is committed to sustainable reliable jobs throughout rural regional Queensland," Mr O'Dowd said.

"We work closely with all eight councils in my electorate of Flynn, this is why we delivered \$700,000 to the Industrial Hub in Biloela through RJIP in 2018."

Mr O'Dowd told *Gladstone Today* that jobs were his government's top priority which was why his party had supported the coal industry in Flynn; which he compared "un-



No more looking for volunteers or becoming unconstitutional because your organisation can't fill volunteer positions. As for the volunteers, you don't have to be tied down week after week, no more arguing about little details or feeling guilty that you're not helping out this week.

Well, I'm not sure about it because if we had to have commercial enterprises running everything, they would need to pay staff and overheads and that would increase the cost of all these community-driven activities.

The cost could put it out of the reach for the families earning an average wage and make these activities elite.

As for the volunteer, people often volunteer because they have a passion, want to meet people or just want to help others. I think it would be a crime if these opportunities weren't available to people as outlets or connectors.

So, the not-for-profit sector can only operate if there are volunteers, and without volunteers the fabric of our society may collapse or change to the point of isolating people.

My issue is that we all talk about the lack of volunteers, but I'm not sure we are doing anything different to make, entice or encourage people to volunteer.

I have been working in this field for over 30 years and I haven't really seen great changes.

The not-for-profit sector usually waits for someone to come along and volunteer and there are those great people that do that, but very few.

Sure, there are the few organisations that get out and target people to volunteer and sure the tiers of government have put in some strategies to assist volunteers, but nothing that has really worked on a strategic level.

We just hope and pray that people will continue to volunteer or we keep the same people in volunteer positions until they can no longer do the job; or, even worse, we keep them there even when we know they can no longer do the job.

I really believe that a not-for-profit sector run predominately by volunteers IS critical to everyone's personal wellbeing. I have some ideas that I hope to share with you over time about how we can build our volunteer army up and support it so it's not always under pressure.

BEEF AND LEMON MYRTLE PHO

Feel free to replace the beef with cooked chicken, tofu, seafood or more vegies. The lemon myrtle adds a delicious fragrance to the pho that works perfectly, replacing where you would usually add lemongrass.

Ingredients

- 1L beef broth
- 2 tbsp 6mm cut dried lemon myrtle
- 2cm piece ginger, thinly sliced

- 150g beef sirloin, frozen for at least two hours

- 1/3 cup sliced shallots
- 1 cup each picked coriander & mint
- 1 lemon

- 1. Place the broth into a pot and add the lemon myrtle, ginger, soy, palm sugar and bring to just under a simmer for 10-15 minutes, to infuse the lemon myrtle and ginger then strain into another pot and keep hot, covered over a low heat so it doesn't reduce.
- 2. Thinly slice the sirloin while partially frozen then lay out on a plate. Freezing makes it easier to thinly
- 3. Bring a medium saucepan of water to the boil, season with a pinch of salt and add the broccolini for 20 seconds then remove with tongs into ice water to refresh, drain and set aside.
- 4. Cook the rice noodles according to packet instruc-

tions in the same boiling water then refresh in cold water and drain well. Set aside.

- 5. Keep a pot of water boiling to reheat the noodles.

Makes one 24cm cake

Ingredients:

- 2/3 cup coconut oil, melted
- 1 cup caster or coconut sugar ■ 3 eggs, room temp
- 1 ½ tsp 1mm ground lemon myrtle leaves
- 1 ¼ cup coconut yoghurt
- 1 ½ cups plain flour, sifted
- 2/3 cup (almond meal) ■ 2 punnets of strawberries, green stem removed
- 1 tbsp 6mm cut dried lemon myrtle leaves
- 2/3 cup water
- 1/2 cup caster sugar
- Extra coconut yoghurt to serve

Strawberry and Lemon Myrtle and syrup cake.

Method:

- 1. Preheat an oven to 180C and grease and line the base of a 24cm springform cake tin with baking
- 2. Cut half the strawberries in half for the cake and set aside.
- 3. Cut the other half of the strawberries into guarters for the topping and syrup. Set aside.
- 4. In a mixing bowl whisk together the coconut oil, sugar and 1 tsp of the ground lemon myrtle, until the sugar is dissolved then whisk through the yoghurt.
- 5. Add the flour, almond meal, baking powder and eggs, and mix to just combine.
- 6. Spoon half the cake batter into the cake tin and push half of the halved strawberries into the cake mix, spoon over the remaining batter to cover and

- press the remaining halved strawberries over the
- 7. Bake in the preheated oven for 35-40 minutes.
- 8. For the syrup, in a small pot combine the ingredients with 4 of the quartered strawberries and place over a low heat to infuse and cook for 10 minutes then let sit for 10 more minutes and strain off and keep warm.
- 9. When the cake comes from the oven, spoon half the syrup over the hot cake and let it soak in then allow the cake to cool to room temp in the tin before removing the tin carefully and placing the cake onto a serving plate.
- 10.To serve, mix the quartered strawberries with the 2 tbsp of syrup and the remaining $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp ground lemon myrtle.

Serves 4

- **Ingredients:**
- 1 tsp 1mm ground Lemon Myrtle
- 400ml cream

- 1. Preheat oven to 200C.
- 2. Combine the lemon myrtle, cream and garlic into a small saucepan.
- 3. Season generously with salt (as this will season the potato) and black pepper.
- 4. Bring the cream to a simmer, remove from the heat and keep warm.
- 5. Using a mandolin, slice the potato 3mm thick and place into a large mixing bowl. Pour over the cream infusion and mix well through the potato slices
- 6. Make a few layers of the sliced potato into a baking dish then a 1/3 of the cheese scattered over followed by more potato, another 1/3 cheese, more potato and then pour over all the cream.
- 7. Cover with circle of baking paper onto the surface of the potato and then foil.
- 8. Bake for 1 ½ hours then remove the foil and baking paper, scatter with remaining cheese and return to the oven for 15 minutes to caramelise the cheese.
- 9. Serve straight away or cool and store in the fridge for up to two days, reheating in the

It's time to hit our stride

Business Council of Australia president Tim Reed last Saturday declared that business leaders want Australia to halve yearly emissions by 2030, saying, "The purpose of our work is to move forward, not engage in endless debate about issues that the nation and the world has moved past."

But has Matt Canavan? Has Gina Rinehart? Other billionaires - Andrew Forrest, Mike Cannon-Brookes - certainly have. They're not thinking hysterically, like Mr Canavan, but historically and with strategic purpose to help secure a healthy present and future for all Australian communities.

One oil-and-gas executive looked at a recent International Energy Agency report - which called for no new oil, gas or coal extraction approvals - and said, "Well, it's a report on a piece of paper, but how do we achieve it?"

To which Twiggy Forrest, Mike Cannon-Brookes and other heroes (Elon Musk, Bill Gates and more) stepped up and said, "We've got plans. We're up for it."

The net-zero race is well underway. A day after the BCA call, Dr Forrest unfurled plans for a \$1 billion-plus green hydrogen facility, near Gladstone, that will be the biggest of its kind in the world. He says it will mean thousands of jobs. He's moving forward and taking CQ with him.

But Mr Canavan's going some other way.

Mr Canavan has been on social media a lot to type his complaints about the shift to renewable energy, which is occurring globally so current and future generations can have a healthy planet and not a fireball unable to deliver enough food and water, let alone jobs.

Ms Rinehart has been at a school telling kids not to believe their teachers who are covering climate science and climate solutions.

Maybe Mr Canavan should stop typing on Twitter and call Mr Reed at the BCA who can tell him about not just the G7 group of political leaders and their decarbonisation actions, but the B7 group of business associations who have done their homework and, unlike Ms Rinehart, are heeding scientists' advice that we need a net-zero global economy as soon as

In fact, the B7 has set out a to-do list for governments late with their homework on how to decarbonise fast enough to hold near 1.5 de-

grees Celsius of warming. Tipping its hat to the B7, the Business Council of Australia is getting to work and has good news for regional Australia.

It says the regions have much to gain because jobs will not move away from the regions, but increasingly move to it.

The net-zero economy needs regional powerhouses such as CQ for your skills, for the abundance of renewable energy, minerals and land needed to feed the world's hunger for climate-safe energy, goods and food.

These climate-safe industries mean kids won't have to move away because these are long-term industries. Responsible political leaders would, as US President Joe Biden is doing, work to ensure that unlike in the current coal and gas industries, with what some mayors have described as a 'pandemic' of casualisation, jobs are unionised, that companies are embedding ethical values. Which can happen because of greater community involvement.

For example, the BCA urges a taskforce to manage the national economy's reshaping, so regions' plans can be a result of cooperation between governments and businesses. There is scope for real teamwork, for community-business-government collaboration securing economic growth in a way that is good for people and planet.

Economist Nick Stern this month said round-the-clock renewable electricity is now cheaper than fossil fuel electricity in many places and can slash emissions while powering growth. UK annual emissions fell by 44 per cent between 1990 and 2019, while its gross domestic product rose by 78 per cent over the same period.

He said developing countries (Australia's fossil export markets) have clocked the fact that growth powered by renewable is cheaper and healthier for citizens.

The BCA's UK equivalent is the Confederation of British Industry. Its director general, Tony Danker, says decarbonisation is an economic opportunity, especially for regions because business leaders want "vibrant world-class clusters (of climate-safe industry) in every region and this means better jobs, closer to home".

Not just 'vibrant'. Try 'epic'.

As in the world's largest zinc producer, Korea Zinc, saying customers in the US and Europe are already prepared to pay a \$US5-\$10 dollar-a-tonne premium for green aluminium.

As a result, Daniel Kim, CEO of Korea Zinc subsidiary Ark Energy this month said Queensland-based refiner and sister company, Sun Metals, could be producing 100 per cent renewables-powered zinc in 2025 as part of "epic" plans, including green hydrogen at the SunHQ hydrogen hub being developed.

"As we look to build that out, together with the load from the green zinc, it will be epic. For us, green zinc and green industrial products, it's about ensuring we remain competitive," Kim told this month's Australia-Korea New Energy Forum. He said "SunHQ is on track to commission. As I said, huge opportunity for the region (because of) renewable energy."

Mr Canavan could speak with BCA's Mr Reed if he has questions about decarbonisation. Or Sun Metals. Or speak with BP joint-venture Lightsource BP.

BP was born out of the riches of the fortune made from mining at Mount Morgan. That mining rush left a terrible legacy of pollution behind. But we can see leaders showing they've learned and are now taking time - amid the decarbonisation race - to respect workers, our communities and the environment we rely on.

For example, Lightsource bp, a global leader in developing and managing solar energy projects, says its Wellington North solar project, alongside its Wellington solar farm, may become NSW's largest renewable energy power hub. It followed meetings with the local community. It's meant good jobs.

And it involved great care in its design, such as respecting Aboriginal heritage. This included guarding two scarred trees which give Aboriginal people an important link to their culture and their past. This is the kind of partnership we need - listening to each other, embedding care and attention to fine detail as part of the big picture.

It's 'big country' thinking, as the commissioners of the Black Summer Bushfires Inquiry called for in their final report. We are seeing more and more business and community leaders answering this call for big thinking and at the same time sensitive attention to detail.

At Stanwell Corp, chief executive officer Richard Van Breda recently said: "Over coming years, Stanwell will respond to the renewable energy needs of our large commercial and industrial customers through new low- or zero-emission generation technologies. We will also strive to play a central role in the emerging

green hydrogen industry."

"The plans our host communities develop in partnership with government, local councils and industry ... will ensure the long-term economic resilience of their regions. While the communities themselves must own these plans, we will engage with them throughout the planning process, playing a supporting role and sharing our plans," MrVan Breda said.

Historian John Roberts, looking at the climate challenge amid the troubles our democracies have and are facing - as respect for truth, as the struggle to base our policies on facts and evidence has been so tested - was mostly optimistic about our future.

Prof Roberts said that humanity faced the challenge of the ice ages with far poorer resources, both intellectual and technological, than those it can deploy today against climate change.

He said, "The human being remains a reflective and tool-making animal and we are still a long way from exhausting the possibilities of that fact."

We have the ability and capacity. We just have to get on with it, or get left behind, as the BCA's Tim Reed says.

Matt Canavan is not serving current and future generations by telling us what we can't do, telling us to put our heads in the sand.

Leaders don't do that. Leaders lift your head up, show you what you've achieved and can achieve. Already, the progress made so far is remarkable in many ways; a foundation to be proud of and one upon which we can build so much more if political leaders step up, partnering with responsible business leaders.

My granddad bred racehorses near Rockhampton. And I like to think, in this decarbonisation race, that we're all a syndicate and our racehorse is called Rainbow Destiny - multiple colours because we need everyone on board (all persuasions and allegiances, be it politics, religions, cultures, industries and so on).

Our winner's stride is deeper even than the great Black Caviar, stamina exceeding that of Think Big who won the Melbourne Cup not once, but twice.

Big business is on board re decarbonisation, in many cases way out front of politicians, such as Mr Canavan.

We must get on and win this. It's not a race against each other, it's a race we run as one, so we get home on time.

"You know what your breasts are normally like so you're most likely to notice any changes," she said. "Doing regular self-checks is quick and easy, but it's very important. Flooding is most likely to be a result of a collision or a grounding.

Most collisions avoidable

We've seen previously that two of the key reasons to abandon ship are fires and the uncontrollable ingress of water.

While flooding can occur as a result of a sudden structural failure, it is far more likely to be a result of a collision or a grounding so this week we are going to look at these two emergencies together. We will simply say collisions from this point on.

Marine Safety Queensland (MSQ) has observed that most collisions are preventable and occur because of a simple lack of awareness.

As always, the best defence is avoidance and the key is to be aware of where you are, what is around you, and the current water depth at all times. You should also be thinking ahead to predict possible collision risks that may occur.

If at any time you find you are distracted, you should consider stopping your boat until you feel you can concentrate and maintain sit-



uational awareness again. Better to lose a few minutes than to lose a boat!

However, if despite your best efforts your boat collides with an object, including land, there are some steps you need to be ready to take immediately.

The order of these steps may need to be changed as dictated by circumstances, however they are:

 Check for injured passengers and if you have collided with another boat, you also need to check for injured passengers on the other hoat.

- Check the structural condition of your boat and if you have collided with another boat the condition of that boat.
- If you observe the inflow of water on either boat, you need to try and stop the flow.
- Use wooden plugs, tarps, plastic sheets, rags, cushions, anything you can find to block every hole through which water is entering the boat.
- You also need to activate any bilge pumps if they are not automatic and start bailing out water. If there are several people on board, this can be done at the same time as the holes are being blocked.
- If anyone is seriously injured or you cannot control the inflow of water, you need to make a May-Day call, otherwise you should consider a Pan-Pan call. Even if you believe you can get your boat safely back to your de-

parture point, it is advisable to contact your local Marine Rescue and let them know you location, your situation, and your intentions.

- Be mindful that if you have collided with another boat and one boat has become impaled in the other, any attempt to separate them may cause immediate and catastrophic flooding. In this case you will need to seek expert advice and assistance before attempting to separate them.
- If you are not able to stop the inflow of water, after making a May-Day call, you will now have no choice but to follow the steps we discussed previously to abandon ship.

However, wait as long as possible before you do this to increase your chances of survival.

Tough coastal shrubs

Probably one of the hardest gardening tasks you will ever have to do is establishing a garden on the beachfront.

From the start, the selection of plants wasn't as easy as just going to a nursery, looking at the label on the plant and saying this looks good.

Many of the plants recognised in gardening books and local nurseries can be complete duds in coastal conditions.

The following some really tough coastal Shrubs all have specialised features to enable these plants to grow in those difficult positions in the garden and are able to be successfully grown in coastal gardens.

Arctotis acaulis or African Daisy is an evergreen groundcovering shrub that can spread up to a 1m across.

The dense silver foliage and colourful blooms of the Arctotis make an eye-catching feature in any garden.

The flowers range in colours variations of red, white, yellow, pink, orange and mauve that will have contrasting centres.

It should be noted that on cloudy days, or even as the afternoon shadows fall upon the plant, the flowers will close up, and sometimes they will tend to flower on the sunnier side of the garden first.

Carissa Desert Star is an attractive shrub with dense thick glossy green foliage and small

During the warmer months this plant is scattered with star shaped lightly scented white flowers that appear at the end of each branch. Desert Star is ideal for pots and tubs, dry borders and rockeries and will require little maintenance.

Gardenia Ocean Pearl is a miniature gardenia that has been promoted as growing to half a metre high, for either a sunny or partly shaded position that is protected from the wind.

Ocean Pearl has beautiful double white, perfumed flowers and is suitable for cottage gardens, flowering hedges, boarders and patio

Metrosideros Springfire is an attractive and very hardy medium sized silvery-leafed evergreen shrub.

It has bright red pompom like flowers in late autumn, spring and summer. Metrosideros Springfire likes a sunny aspect with welldrained soil and is Salt tolerant. It is an excellent shrub for coastal areas, ideal as a hedge and can be shaped and trimmed after spring.

Rhaphiolepis Springtime is a hardy hedging shrub for coastal positions. This vigorous hybrid produces soft apple blossom pink, star shaped flowers in abundance during Spring with lighter flowering during Autumn. Left unpruned this shrub can grow to about 1.5m high and about 1.5m across

Rhaphiolepis Springtime will grow in a variety of soil types as long as it is sunny and not to wet.

Russellia equisitiformis or Coral Plant has made a name for itself for being able to be grown in the beachfront gardens of the coast, to the hot dry gardens of the far west, to the more formal gardens in front of the Gladstone Ports Corp Building in Yarroon Street.

Russellia will display coral red tubular flowers usually borne from autumn to spring, but with mild winters like we had last year, the plant can flower the whole year round. There is also an orange and yellow flowering form

Vitex trifolia purpurea is a stunning large shrub that produces eye-catching purple foliage. The flowers are borne on small spikes and are a soft baby blue in colour. The shrub itself will grow to around 3m high and almost as wide, and will form a great windbreak for other slower -growing shrubs.

Westringea fruiticosa Zena is a dwarf form of the common Native Rosemary. Growing to 50cm high and 1m across makes it not only an exceptional shrub for people with salt water swimming pools, but also ideal for extremely exposed coastal conditions. Flowers are white in abundance several times a year.

Climate champions

Science is a powerful weapon.

Governments, corporations, even environmental groups have all twisted it to their advantage, taking from it only the parts that satisfy their position, while sometimes misrepresenting the facts completely.

In the 1950s, American nutritionist Ancel Keys undertook a study to investigate the cause of the sharp rise in heart disease after World War II.

The answer, we know now, was smoking rates, but Ancel Keys surmised diet was the cause and focused his attention on saturated fat and cholesterol – the rest, as they say, is history.

Eating fat makes you fat made sense to many (and still does) and gave rise to the abundance of highly processed food many of us now include in unhealthy quantities in our diets.

Ancel Keys's incorrect position on fat – established via the use of cherry-picked science in his 'Seven Countries Study', and unable to be confirmed despite repeated follow-up studies – stuck.

Just like the 'scientific' arguments brought

to bear on agriculture often seem to – especially when it comes to climate and the envi-

Despite doing ALL the heavy lifting to reduce our nation's carbon emissions, there are still plenty of critics willing to point the finger and suggest industry – particularly the livestock sector – is the root cause of all our climate problems, ignoring the massive strides made to reduce methane production.

This outdated thinking – based on outdated science – also ignores the huge investment made by farming operations, many of them small family run businesses, to not only sequester carbon, but to improve the land in its entirety

Methane from cattle emissions is part of the natural cycle and breaks down quickly, while carbon dioxide is taken up in crops, pastures, and native vegetation on farms throughout the nation.

A recent report from the Gratton Institute even acknowledges that agriculture uses more carbon dioxide than it emits, while current environmental science demonstrates that Agriculture – at less than 15 per cent of total emissions in Australia (down from 16.5 per cent prior to Kyoto) – is far less impactful than

some critics would suggest.

Much less than the dominant energy sector, with more than 53 per cent total emissions, or transport, at more than 17 per cent – both industries increasing their emissions since Kyoto was ratified in 1997.

It's why as an industry we believe it's well past time we were given our due recognition – to change the rhetoric, to ensure we avoid a repeat of what took place when Ancel Keys and his cherry-picked science was allowed to set the path for the obesity epidemic that has followed.

If agriculture alone is forced to continue to carry the burden of reducing Australia's share of emissions, it will also drive some producers from the industry – at a time when COVID has put the issue of food security in the brightest of spotlights.

Instead, as the figures above show, it is time for other industries to pick up the baton of carbon emissions reduction so that they can take their place alongside agriculture as true champions of action on climate.

Calendar spotlights rural issues

School students from all over Queensland have been congratulated for bringing rural health and safety issues to prominence via the 2021 Farm Safety Calendar Competition.

Timmo Shannon from Grade 6 at Gladstone West State School, West Gladstone, will provide the illustration for March, with the theme Electrical safety (safety switches).

Industrial Relations Minister Grace Grace praised the students for wanting to raise awareness of safety issues on farms and in rural communities.

"The Farm Safety calendar competition gives primary school students the opportunity to share with their communities the common hazards on farms and other rural properties," Ms Grace said.

"The agriculture industry employs around three per cent of state's workers yet accounts for almost a third of our workplace deaths. Tragically, farm vehicles, often with children around, figure in a large proportion of those incidents."

"The published calendar is a great opportunity for safety messages to be displayed at home and rural workplaces all year round further reminding Queenslanders to work and play safely.

"There was massive interest this year with a record 1953 entries featuring creative and colourful drawings about electrical safety, animal safety, tractor and machinery safety, quad bike safety, water safety, and general health and wellbeing."

The 12 winners each receive a \$250 gift voucher, plus another \$500 for their school, with their artwork and safety messages headlining the 2022 calendar.

Ms Grace said 30,000 copies of the latest farm safety calendar will be available from Workplace Health and Safety Queensland in October, which is Safe Work Month.

She thanked the judges from the Queensland Country Women's Association, AgForce Queensland, North Australian Pastoral Co, Department of Education, WHSQ and the Electrical Safety Office again for the difficult job of choosing 12 illustrations.

The annual competition has been running since 2015 with almost 8,500 entries from Queensland kids over the past seven years.

The dozen winners for the 2022 calendar were chosen from nearly 2,000 entries

This is up from 1502 entries for the 2021 calendar.

This week Aaron and Liam discuss the NRL expansion, Caulfield Cup Day at Callaghan Park, Local swimmers diving back into the season and how CQ could become the capital of Pickleball.

We do racing right, there's such a rich racing culture in Rockhampton and across Central Queensland.

And we turn on a big day of racing at Callaghan Park, we do it right.

Liam: We certainly do. I don't know if I got down to the Caulfield Cup celebrations last year but I'm looking forward to it.

I also don't have a tip because I am a terrible punter and I just like to bet off names and colours, and potentially numbers too depending on how I feel haha.

It's going to be a great day and I guess a bit

of relief for people who get to enjoy the races around Central Queensland again

Aaron: Give me a call at the end of the week, I've got some pretty good connections and I'll set you up ok?

Liam: Haha right, sounds good mate. **SWIMMING**

Swimming season starts to ramp up around this time of year, and we had a big meet in

this time of year, and we had a big meet in Gladstone this week, with a record number of kids. What a way to officially kick off the Central Queensland swimming season. Aaron: It came early this year, our pool in the

They are terrific numbers and when we have swimmers as high quality as Ariarne Titmus, and isn't she just a terrific ambassador for swimming, when she's coming to Central Queensland and talking to our kids we know we're a real target for the future.

And let's face it, the 2032 Olympics, the swimmers who are competing then are six, seven and eight now.

Aaron: You know the other thing we have to have the facilities, and we have got some good pools in Central Queensland and hopefully that sets us up for seeing some of those champions in 2032 training in Rockhampton and Gladstone. But we have to make sure those pools are top quality for us and the facilities are right.

There was a challenge laid out on 4RO's sideline view with Aaron Stevens on Saturday afternoon involving Pickleball, but it didn't eventuate, what happened there? **Liam:** You got a little bit scared and didn't want to face me but that's okay, it happens.

Aaron: Oi, hold on, hold on. There was definitely a misunderstanding in times and we missed each other.

I'm ready. I've practised, I went along to World Pickleball Day and had a bit of a hit and I'm ready.

I'm ready for the CQ and Gladstone Today versus 4RO challenge.

But straight away when you've got there it's tennis, it's table tennis, it's all these sports mixed into one and it's so easy to play.

Liam: When you think about it you had the seniors, the older ladies and men playing, and then you had the juniors who are still learning how to play.

That's an introduction to sports like tennis and table tennis, it all works around.

That's all down to Yeppoon Tennis Club and Karen Latinovic and her family who have done a fantastic job out there.

It's an amazing sport and great to watch and awesome to take photos of.

It's all skill-based, it's not about how quick you are or how fit you are.

It was a great day out there and very well supported.

When you got down there, I know you would have seen it, those plans of what they want to do.

That facility there, they believe it would cost an estimated \$600,000.

That's just a bit more than one per cent between the two stadiums we're trying to build in Rocky.

Why not build something like that? What did you think about those plans?

Aaron: You know, you look at those courts and how far they've come.

It's all off the back of Karen and John, they

are just great promoters and they've done a fantastic job.

You look at their plans and you think, with this club, Karen and John, with the support

they have already, with the way they have promoted themselves and really taken pickleball from zero to 100, they are capable of anything. When they were showing me the plans I was

thinking, yup, you'll get it just because of what you two have achieved.

So well done to them, well done to the

pickleball community in Yeppoon and I think we're going to see pickleball championships played right here in Central Queensland and I wouldn't be surprised if Central Queensland becomes a bit of a pickleball meca.

And once you get your hand on that racquet and you hit the ball a couple of times, you're hooked.

Liam: You see what Karen and John have done and if they put their mind to a pickleball stadium, they're going to get it.

You look at the economic boost if you brought a national tournament here, it's going to pay for itself in probably one tournament.

It's a really smart thing that they're doing

and bringing an incredible sport to Yeppoon and Central Queensland, who all love sport. To have a facility like that, one of the best

if not the overall best in Australia, it would be massive for our region.

Aaron: You know what Liam, I'll leave you with

So let's become the pickleball capital of ustralia.

Let's let pickleball lead the way.
