\$300-million aluminium smelter project secures Gladstone as ...

The world beater

Alpha HPA, a manufacturer of sustainable high purity aluminium (HPA) products, has purchased a 9.2ha site in the Gladstone State Development Area to build a new \$300 million high purity alumina industrial plant.

The project, which is expected to create 120 full time jobs in the operational phase and more than 300 during construction, will be one of the largest single HPA refineries in the world.

Rimas Kairaitis from Alpha HPA said it was an exciting time for the Australian Company as it fast tracks construction of its Stage 1, Precursor Production Facility (PPF).

"We've operated a Brisbane demonstration plant since July 2019, and we are confident in the demand for high purity alumina," Mr Kairaitis said.

"Stage 1, which is fully funded, will enable us to commence commercial production from August 2022, tapping into this demand quickly.

"Stage 2, the full scale project, will commence in parallel with Stage 1, and is scheduled to be commercially operating by 2024".

The 10-hectare, state-of-the-art facility will leverage the latest in process control systems and automation, and will be capable of producing 10,000 tonnes of HPA equivalent per year.

Member for Gladstone Glenn Butcher said the extensive infrastructure and port facilities in the Gladstone region, an established industrial sector and skilled workforce all helped at-

tract Alpha HPA to the Gladstone.

"Gladstone is a world-best location for existing industries with a proven track record of growing successful new industries – like the emerging green energy manufacturing sector," he said.

"Alpha HPA are joining other global companies, who have also recently chosen Gladstone to establish their manufacturing hubs and create local jobs."

Schooled in energy

Hydrogen is the new kid on the block of low-emissions energy, but students at Gladstone State High School leaned on Tuesday that it is likely to play an important role in powering homes and industry in the years ahead.

Students had a great time building their own mini-hydrogen fuel cell cars in a hands-on workshop conducted by the Queensland Minerals and Energy Academy, the education arm of the Queensland Resources Council.

Australian Gas Industry Trust was the event sponsor.

Industry representatives from Origin Energy dialed into the workshop to share information on their careers and roles within Origin Energy – Future Fuels.

Teachers weren't left out of the equation either with a new workshop customised for them.

AGIT executive officer Dr Jen Thompson said new hydrogen industries were tipped to create more than 7000 new, highly-skilled high-tech jobs in Queensland by 2040, many

of these in Gladstone.

"This is why it's important to inform students and their teachers of this new industry, and the career opportunities it might offer," she said.

QRC director skills and education Katrina-Lee Jones said this was especially important with the city gearing up to be the state's hydrogen hub.

"One of the world's largest hydrogen equipment manufacturing facilities is planned for Gladstone as part of a new partnership between the Queensland Government and renewable energy and hydrogen company Fortescue Future Industries," she said.

Gladstone State High School acting principal Dave Romagnolo said the workshop was timely given the Premier's recent announcement of a \$2 million grant for training facilities targeted at the hydrogen industry for the school.

"It's very helpful that this workshop is linked to the science of hydrogen and its use as a clean

energy source within the Australian Curriculum for students in years 9 and 10," he said.

"Bringing their classroom work to life in a real-world context is extremely effective in encouraging students and enhancing their learning experiences.

"It's also very beneficial for the students to meet industry people and learn about their careers to help them with decisions on career choices."

Australia's largest and most successful industry-led education and skills training initiative, the QMEA seeks to broaden student and teacher knowledge of career opportunities in resources.

The academy encourages a talent pipeline of employees into VET and STEM-related careers, with a focus on female and Indigenous participation.

The QMEA currently engages with 80 schools and is a partnership between the QRC and the Queensland Government under its Gateway to Industry Schools program.

Cafe's cuppa for a cause

A new Gladstone cafe's pay it forward incentive has proven so popular, the owner has had to give away hundreds of dollars worth of free meals and coffees.

Simon and Sarah McClintock opened Slow Ln Cafe in Sun Valley last month.

After living in the region for nine years, the couple wanted to create a space where people can slow down and relax, as well as make a difference to other people's lives.

The non-for-profit cafe works like this:

People can buy a ticket for one free coffee, a food item, or a meal to pass on for someone in greater need.

Mr McClintock said he was completely blown away by residents' generosity, with residents raising more than a hundred dollars worth of free meals in the cafe's first week of operation.

"Honestly I've had to give away free meals and coffees, I've been trying to give them away

but people keep buying them," he said.

"All we did is put a board on the wall, it's the community who has proven how generous they are...hundreds of dollars has been paid for by other people."

Mr McClintock said he and his wife had thought about opening a cafe for a long time.

"Doing life without purpose is very empty," he said.

"We figured if we are going to work, why not do something which helps others.

"This is just one of the ways we came up with where we can have an income.

"We thought why not make a place where people want to go, and make it a place where they make a difference to someone's life."

The couple hoped their new space would also help eradicate loneliness.

"We wanted to provide a space where people can come together and be loved and valued," he said.

"My life has been very full and I'm very

good at filling my life up.

"I asked the questions what could I do to help people slow down and take a breathe

"It made sense to create a space where people can stop and take a breath and can support other people."

Mr McClintock said it was only from the generosity from Lifestyle Church that they were able to create a space to help the community.

However Mr McClintock said all the profits made from the cafe did not go back to the church.

"The space was given to us by Lifestyle Church, they also paid to set the cafe up," he said.

"They believe wholeheartedly to our cause but the money does not go back to them.

"They just saw an opportunity on how to give back to the community.

"It's only from the generosity of Lifestyle Church and the community, that has made this possible."

\$300m project: Alumina plant secures land in Gladstone

A \$300 million high purity alumina industrial plant is a step closer for Gladstone with Alpha HPA purchasing a 9.2 hectare site in the Queensland Government's State Development Area.

The project, which is expected to create 120 full time jobs in the operational phase and more than 300 during construction, will be one of the largest single HPA refineries in the world.

Alpha HPA stated it was committed to commercialising new, smarter technology to meet the growing demand for high purity alumina (HPA) using the most environmentally responsible and efficient methods.

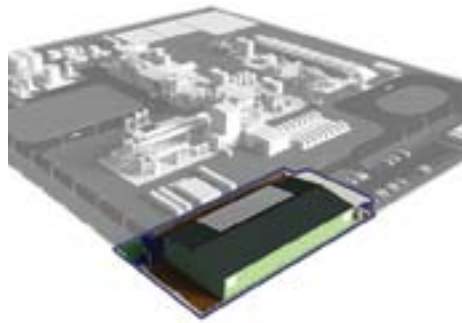
"Our Gladstone facility will be a platform to demonstrate new, greener opportunities—through our product, our processes, and our self-sustainable main administration building," the organisation stated via its website.

"Central to our business is the development of our new Gladstone based HPA First Project where we will produce a range of low carbon footprint high purity aluminium products for a myriad of applications whilst creating opportunities for local communities."

"Gladstone is a city with a strong industrial framework and one of the busiest multi-commodity ports in Australia. This will be the global hub from which we commercialise our Smart SX Technology, with a forecast delivery of 10,000 tonnes of HPA per annum, creating new opportunities for the local community.

Rimas Kairaitis from Alpha HPA said it was an exciting time for the Australian Company as it fast tracks construction of its Stage 1, Precursor Production Facility (PPF).

"We've operated a Brisbane demonstration plant since July 2019, and we are confident in the demand for high purity alumina,"

Minister for Energy, Renewables and Hydrogen Mick de Brenni said these opportunities were a result of the Palaszczuk Government's investment in making sure the world knows Queensland is the place to be for renewable energy and decarbonising industry.

"Renewables are a massive opportunity to decarbonize industry and bring manufacturing back to Queensland," Mr de Brenni said.

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Former Nipper praised

A former Tannum Sands Surf Lifesaving Club nipper has been recognised for his rescue efforts for a West Australian shark attack victim.

Hayden Sharpe was one of the boys who alerted beachgoers of a fatal shark attack, which claimed the life of 57-year-old Paul Millachip.

Mr Millachip was swimming at Perth's Port Beach, just 50 metres from shore after a run with his wife when he was attacked by a large shark about 10am.

Hayden was out on the water in a boat with a group of other teenage boys when they 'saw it unfold', according to The West Australian.

The local newspaper stated the boys had been out on the water "being boys" when the horror attack unfolded.

A woman who is close to one of the teenagers said the group "saw it all unfold — the whole thing".

"They then alerted everyone on the beach to get out," she said.

The woman, who did not want to be identified, said one of the boys was "in shock".

The four teenagers have also been praised by police at the scene, with Acting Inspector Emma Barnes describing their actions as "heroic and very brave".

"(They got) everyone else out of the water and notified everyone of what was happening," she said.

Suzette Harding was at the beach just after the attack — and praised the "wonderful" boys for their efforts in ushering swimmers out of the water as well.

"These wonderful young boys in tinnies came zooming down the beach and just gesturing for everyone to get out of the water," she said.

"They were gesturing with their hands, you could tell they weren't mucking about - they were serious.

"(It is) very, very frightening because this is where we come and swim all the time and have done for years.

"It's a terrible terrible tragedy and thank goodness for those boys."



Another beach goer Kaiden Boulton was surfing with his friends near Sand Tracks when the dinghy of boys "came flying at them" and screamed at them to get out of the water.

Seconds after exiting the water Kaiden Boulton saw what he said was a "massive shark".

"We scurried out onto the rocks as soon as we got out to get a look from a high vantage point and as soon as we did we saw a massive shark out in the water," he said.

Leon Tanin and his friend Scott, who were swimming in the water when they spotted what they described as a 4.5m-long shark said one of the two small boats was trying to circle the man in the water.

"(They were) sort of trying to keep the shark away," one of the men said.

"One shot up the coast a bit to try find Sea Rescue and get them down on the phone, trying to get the cops, trying to get others to make phone calls.

"They seemed pretty shaken up by the whole thing."

Acting Inspector Troy Douglas of the Fremantle District Office said all that had been found since the attack was a pair of goggles believed to have been Mr Millachip's.

TSSLC president Mark Bryant said Hayden and his family were long term members of the Tannum Sands Surf Lifesaving club up until recently when they moved to Perth for a work opportunity for Hayden's Father (Stafford).

"When they left the Club Hayden's Father and two older sisters (Maddy and Dayna) were active Bronze Medallion patrol members and Hayden was an active SRC (Surf Rescue Certificate) Patrol member. Hayden's Mum (Cherri) was not a patrolling member but had under-



taken numerous support roles within the club," Mr Bryant said.

"Hayden like many before him had been a Nipper where through his Surf Sports and interactions with senior members learnt all the basic skills and values required to execute our Surf Life Saving mission – prevent people from getting into danger on our beaches and if that isn't possible provide rescue, resuscitation and care until medical professionals can take over (if required).

"Hayden and his friends in their dingy I'm sure wouldn't have felt brave. However they did act in a manner the rest of us can only hope that we would act if faced with a similar situation."

Mr Bryant said Hayden and his friend demonstrated the values that Surf Lifesaving held dear. "That is they, unable to safely do anything for the swimmer, protected all others in the water by warning them of the danger and encouraging all to get out of the water," he said.

"Tannum Sands SLSC is very proud of the actions Hayden and his friend took and of Hayden showing maturity to obviously surrounded himself with friends of real character.

"We are also proud in that in some small way our club community has helped his parents and family to shape a young man that under pressure was prepared to undertake the courageous act Hayden and his friends took."

Developers bold tourism plans for a hotel, marina

A bold proposal for a new marina and hotel is expected to transform the Boyne Island and Tannum Sands tourism sector.

Brisbane-based developers ZenDev have plans to construct a marina and hotel alongside an existing proposal for an aquatic centre on the corner of Centenary Drive and Wyndham Avenue.

The new development will include a hotel, an outdoor sport and recreation facility, cafe and gym.

ZenDev director Jacob Scott said a hotel, marina and boat club development application would be lodged in March next year, and was hopeful construction would follow by mid-2023.

Mr Scott said he was on his way to a potential service station site in the region when he came across the Boyne River site.

"I kind of got obsessed with it and had to find out who the owner was," he said.

"Two years later here we are."

Earlier this year, the group lodged its second development application with Gladstone Regional Council for stage one of the project, an aquatic centre.

The application included an Olympic sized 50m pool with a shaded grandstand, indoor swim school/ aerobics pool, resort-style lagoon pool, kids pool, two water slides and a splash zone, a water play area cafe and gym facilities.

Once completed, the centre has the potential to attract 700,000 visitors to the region per annum and create opportunities for new tourism businesses.

The aquatic centre would also work in conjunction with local events such as the Boyne Tannum Hookup, which attracts 27,000 visitors each year, resulting in build-



ing an identity for the Boyne Tannum precinct as a leisure and adventure destination.

Mr Scott said he was hopeful Gladstone Regional Council would accept stage one of the project.

"Prior to lodging the DA we have had a few meetings with the Council, they've been really great and transparent," he said.

Mr Scott said stages two and three of the project, the marina and hotel, would also add to the region's tourism and hospitality sector.

"This project is definitely outside our comfort zone but we're confident we have the right team and financial partners to get it done and it does go ahead, and the project is what local residents want," he said.

"While we are trying to stimulate and generate the tourism, recreational and hospitality sector for the area, it's got to start with the local community wanting it.

"If they don't want it... well they are not going to use it so there is no point in building it.

"One thing we certainly make clear, we are always looking for feedback, if anyone wants to reach out please do so we are taking on suggestions."

Mr Scott said he had interest from three major hotel identities looking to run the proposed 80-room hotel, however feedback from them suggested they were looking for a larger hotel of about 150 to 180 rooms.

"We are considering accommodating them by splitting the hotel into two different buildings of 120 rooms each or increasing the full print of what we currently have to another 150 rooms."

There would also be a preference for a not for profit community group to operate the boat club.

Mr Scott said the 33,438 sqm complex will have 50 car parking spaces and room for 20 bikes.



The development would employ 80 people during construction and 30 ongoing positions annually and visitor spending is set to generate \$1.3 million every year.

It's understood there have been 250 submissions at least, all of which are positive and include ideas from the community. A Gladstone Council survey had 95 per cent of respondents support the project.

Mr Scott said even without the proposed development, he saw Boyne Island and Tannum Sands as a major investment which would grow in population in years to come.

"Mainly because of the infrastructure and hydrogen and government investment going on in the region at the moment," he said.

"What's happening with Covid, people are migrating from the south, and the Olympics all work in our favour as well.

"If we were to look anywhere for where our next project would be, it would definitely be in the Gladstone region."

Good future for Gladstone

Together with industry and the Gladstone Region community, Gladstone Regional Council is striving to achieve a shared vision for its communities, advocating for strong investment, to build a stronger future.

Council developed its 2021/22 Strategic Priorities publication to advocate for our region to State and Federal governments, including the opposition.

Gladstone Region Mayor Matt Burnett said the publication made sure the Gladstone Region is at the forefront at all levels of government.

"Gladstone Regional Council's role in influencing decision-makers is crucial to future-proofing our region," Mayor Burnett said.

"The 2021/22 Strategic Priorities publication collectively communicates both Council's, and the communities wants and needs to decision-makers to achieve real outcomes.

"It also provides the framework for Council to plan and deliver its activities to support the region's role as a driver of economic growth, resulting in increased liveability and visitation to the region."

Key priorities include:

- Gladstone Heavy Vehicle Transport Corridor
- Inland Rail extension to the Port of Gladstone
- Gladstone Coal Exporters Sports Complex (Marley Brown Oval) upgrade
- Boyne Tannum Aquatic Recreation Centre (BTARC)
- Boyne Burnett Inland Rail Trail (BBRIT)
- Jump Start City Heart – Harbour Arbour
- Ageing in place strategy
- Federal Assistance Grants
- Renewable energy and the transitioning economy
- Manufacturing and skills development.



Council priorities are diverse but tactical and include investment in emerging projects, including renewable energy.

"With several renewable energy projects under development or consideration in the Gladstone Region, supporting investments and policy initiatives are needed to develop an

advanced and sustainable hydrogen industry," Mayor Burnett said.

"The Inland Rail extension to the Port of Gladstone will provide a fully integrated, efficient and cost-effective east coast supply chain, enabling \$15.6B resource investment in regional Queensland and potential to provide

more than 18,000 additional jobs."

Council is now seeking investment in its Strategic Priorities identified in the 2021/22 publication.

Call for First Nations voices on new body

Indigenous leaders who want a greater say on the laws, policies and programs that affect their communities are urged to put their hand up to join Queensland's First Nations Consultative Committee (FNCC).

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Partnerships Minister Craig Crawford today called for applicants to be part of an eight-member committee to lead reforms as part of Indigenous Voice model.

"Queensland is home to the nation's second-largest Indigenous population," Mr Crawford said.

"And their voices must be heard in the decisions impacting their lives, communities and future."

He said the committee will guide the design of Indigenous Voice reforms as part of a state and national agenda.

"It will reflect the priorities, aspirations

and issues that matter most to Queensland's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities."

Mr Crawford said the eight-member committee, including two co-chairs, would represent geographic regions including the Torres Strait Islands, Cape York Peninsula, Far North Queensland, North Queensland, Central Queensland, South-West Queensland, South-East Queensland, Gulf and West Queensland.

"Members will demonstrate the leadership, knowledge and expertise needed to advocate for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander of all ages, abilities, genders and locations across all levels of government," he said.

"The committee members will be asked to draw upon their traditional or historical connection to their region, experience and community support to develop Queensland's preferred Indigenous Voice model informed by a diverse range of First Nations views.

"By establishing a body or process – a "Voice" – Aboriginal people and Torres Strait Islander people to have a greater say on laws, policies and programs that impact them and their lives."

Mr Crawford said community advocacy supported by the Palaszczuk Government had delivered historic achievements such as the recent Daintree land handed back to the Eastern Kuku Yalanji people and the renaming of Fraser Island to its Butchulla language name K'Gari.

"This committee builds upon the Queensland Government's commitment to Path to Treaty and will support self-determination on state and national voice reforms."

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Minister Craig Crawford is calling for First Nations voices.

Virtual Reality training Gladstone employees in safety

Brand-new Virtual Reality (VR) training programs recorded in the Gladstone region are helping Endeavour Foundation train its employees.

Working in partnership with Engage Research Lab at the University of the Sunshine Coast, Endeavour Foundation has developed immersive 3D training simulations for site safety and confidential document destruction.

Endeavour Foundation Service Design Partner Chris Beaumont said they had recorded 360-degree training videos in Gladstone.

"VR is an incredible training tool that enables people to really feel like they're immersed in the virtual activity they're doing," Mr Beaumont said.

"Earlier this year we visited Gladstone with the intention of creating some safety videos with a difference.

"We recorded full 360-degree training videos with our Gladstone supported employees across six different safety scenarios.

"For each scenario, there are three videos of people performing a task but two of those videos show a person doing the task the wrong way.

"Those doing the training have to watch them all and work out who did it the right way."

Mr Beaumont said Endeavour Foundation Gladstone Business Solutions had also featured in a new confidential document destruction simulation.

"For this interactive scenario, we created a 3D model of Endeavour Foundation's Gladstone workplace," he said.

Since 1951, Endeavour Foundation has championed the rights of people with disability to live independently, have meaningful employment and participate in the community.

Today, we're at the heart of local communities, supporting more than 4000 people in QLD, VIC, and NSW.

"It's a lot like a game where the objective is to complete the document destruction process by removing all non white paper and



other objects from the conveyer before the paper goes through to the shredder."

Graham Cross, who features in the 360-degree VR training videos said it felt awesome to be part of them.

"I really enjoyed being part of the of training but felt nervous [when I was doing it]," Mr Cross said, "I get a feeling of pride [when I see myself] and think it's pretty awesome and cool.

"I feel helpful with being part of the training, and the more people that watch or use

the VR training the better. "This means that I had part in helping people learn to be safe."

Site Manager Robert Campbell said it was fantastic to see Gladstone feature in the VR training.

"Our employees will be able to access these powerful learning tools in a new



training room funded as part of the recent \$673,000 redevelopment of our Gladstone Business Solutions workplace.

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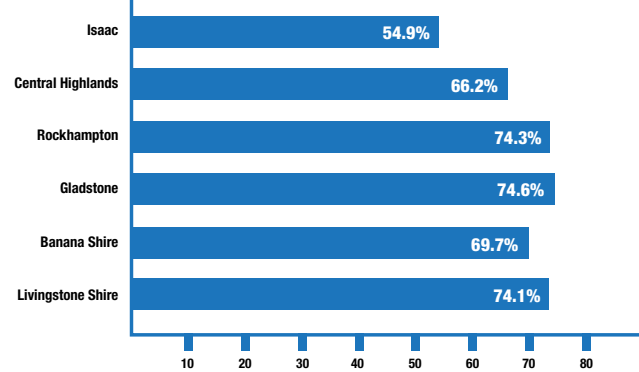
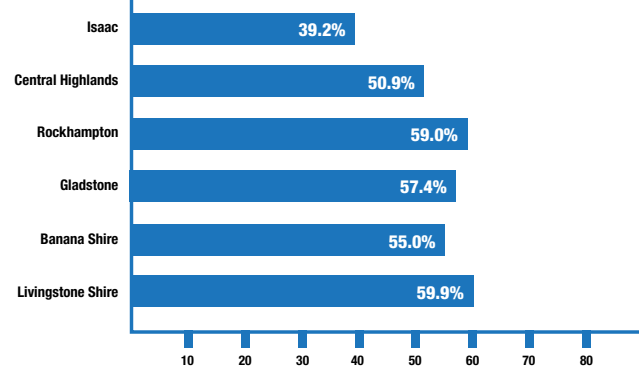

Gladstone's off target

State-wide first dose vaccination rates will hit 80 per cent this week.

As vaccine targets are met, Queensland will begin to return to its pre-pandemic state as restrictions and rules ease.

For one thing, the 80 per cent milestone means masks will be shelved across schools, cafes, pubs, hair-dressers and workplaces.

"This is another small step back towards life as normal," Premier Anastacia Palaszczuk said this week.

"Queenslanders have done an incredible job all through the pandemic and this is their reward. The more of us who are vaccinated, the faster we return to life the way it used to be."

Masks will continue to be mandatory in airports and planes.

As other targets are met, the transformation to relative normality will continue, particularly in regards to travel.

When 80 per cent of eligible Queenslanders are fully vaccinated, the borders will fall and entry into Queensland will not be restricted.

"If you have been in a declared hotspot in

the past 14 days you may travel to Queensland provided you are fully vaccinated and have a negative COVID-19 test taken within the 72 hours prior to arrival into Queensland," the Queensland government states.

"You may arrive by air or road. There is no quarantine required if you meet these criteria."

It is expected that the 80 per cent threshold will be met on December 17 or earlier.

State-wide, 67.4 per cent of eligible Queenslanders have been fully vaccinated.

Across much of Central Queensland, however, the 80 per cent target is some way off.

In Gladstone, 57.4 per cent of eligible residents have been fully vaccinated.

The Central Highlands, meanwhile, has reached the milestone of 50 per cent fully vaccinated.

Isaac, the beating heart of Queensland's coal industry, continues to show lacklustre numbers.

Just 39.2 per cent of eligible residents are fully vaccinated, while 54.9 per cent have received their first dose.

New restrictions for unvaxxed announced for December

While the vaccinated return to lives of relative normality, new restrictions will be placed on unvaccinated Queenslanders from December 17 onwards.

From that date, events at all Queensland

government stadiums including Suncorp, The Gabba, Queensland Country Bank and Metricon will be for the fully vaccinated only including staff.

Hospitality venues including pubs, clubs,

hotels, bars, restaurants and cafes will be open only to vaccinated staff and patrons. Entertainment venues including live music and karaoke bars will be for vaccinated staff and patrons only. Music festivals both indoor

and outdoor will be for vaccinated staff, performers and patrons only and government-owned galleries, museums and libraries will be for vaccinated only. Police will enforce the requirements of the venues.

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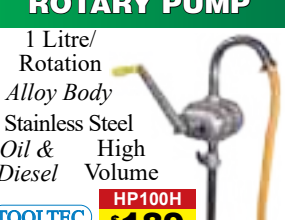
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Banana Shire needs firies

Looking to make a difference in your regional community? Queensland Fire and Emergency Services are looking for new auxiliary recruits in the Banana Shire.

Theodore Fire and Rescue Station Auxiliary Captain Donald Dale said there was a need for more firefighters and emergency service volunteers across the Banana Shire, with positions available at the Biloela, Theodore, Baralaba, Moura and Thangool Fire & Rescue Stations.

“Members of the public most likely think that in an emergency, firefighters and volunteers are readily available, but the reality is that’s not always the case in some towns,” he said.

“Recently in Theodore, at times we have had to call upon our neighbouring towns to assist in emergency coverage due to limited staffing levels. We are currently actively recruiting members, to ensure if something bad happens, like a house fire, or car accident we will have sufficient crews in our town, so we don’t have to rely on people from neighbouring towns to provide coverage.”

The Theodore Fire & Rescue Station currently has six firefighter positions vacant, that they are looking to fill.

“Another two or three officers would be good, but six would be fantastic and would bring us up to full complement. A real challenge is finding people who are in town during the day and available if required,” he said.

“We’ve had some really good firefighters over the years however, the reality of small country towns is people come and people go, and we need to replace them.”

“Some places would have a waiting list but others you actually have to actively recruit people to join.”

Auxiliary firefighters are fully trained, part time paid employees that respond to structural and grass fires, road traffic crashes and a variety of rescue situations.

They also promote community safety and emergency preparedness by contributing to

community education activities and engaging in community events.

“It’s a lot more than fighting grassfires,” Mr Dale said.

“QFES volunteers and staff are essential

grown to cover a population of some 300,000 and an area of some 350,000sqkm.

On average, 1.3 tasks are completed each day.

Annual operating costs are roughly \$10

million a year. The cost to deploy the helicopter alone comes in at \$8000 an hour.

Some 60 per cent of funding comes from the Queensland government and the remaining 40 per cent is sourced from multiple part-

nerships, sponsors, events and donations.

A striking aesthetic of the helicopter, in addition to its signature blue and yellow colour scheme, is the range of logos that mark it from the propellers to the body.

CQUni hopes for Cairns

CQUniversity has warmly welcomed Federal Labor's \$50m commitment to establish a new state-of-the-art university campus in the Cairns CBD.

The commitment, announced by shadow treasurer Hon Jim Chalmers MP at an Advance Cairns event this morning, will go ahead if an Albanese Government takes power at the upcoming federal election.

In Cairns for today's announcement, CQUniversity Vice-Chancellor Professor Nick Klomp praised Federal Labor's support for the long-discussed project and Cairns' future as an education city.

"Today's announcement represents a massive shot in the arm for Cairns and the Far North

Queensland region," Professor Klomp said.

"A new CQUniversity Cairns campus will not only create 330 construction jobs in the short term, it will inject \$500 million into the Far North over the next decade and double the number of local students from 2000 to 4000.

"Cairns is in the grip of a significant skills shortage, with a growing demand for degree-qualified workers and barriers to attracting workers from other regions.

"Around a quarter of all jobs advertised in Cairns are for qualified graduates in allied health, engineering, accountancy, and cyber security, with many roles going unfilled due to lack of supply locally.

"We need to grow our own talent pipeline in

Cairns, and the only way to do that is by building new teaching infrastructure to support the growing local demand for tertiary education and training."

CQUniversity Cairns Associate Vice-President Jodie Duignan-George also welcomed the announcement, particularly now that CQUniversity has almost outgrown its current campus in Cairns.

"Since CQUniversity opened its doors in Cairns back in 2015, we have seen student enrolment growth of roughly 20 per cent year-on-year, every year," Ms Duignan-George said.

"While this growth is nothing short of phenomenal, we simply cannot accommodate our growing student cohort in our current facilities

for much longer.

"The new CQUniversity Cairns campus will ensure up to 4000 local students per year can access world-class education and training, right here in the heart of the Cairns CBD."

Professor Klomp thanked local business leaders and the wider Cairns community for their longstanding support of the project, as well as Federal Labor for its \$50m commitment.

"The Cairns community has been nothing short of incredible in the way they have supported the new Cairns campus project from the day it was announced. I want to thank them for their unwavering belief in Cairns' future as a leading education city," he said.

Call for Gladstone to give generously

Australian Red Cross Lifeblood is calling on locals to roll up their sleeves and give the precious gift of blood.

In Gladstone, 50 blood donors are needed over the next two weeks.

This is because blood demand is at a 10 year-high and 'no shows' have risen to half of all blood donation appointments.

Lifeblood's reserves of O Negative blood are in a precarious state, with the number of O Negative donors falling by 1000 during the pandemic.

O Negative is the universal blood type and

can be given to anyone in an emergency like those involved in road accidents, when there isn't time to find out their blood type. In the event of a serious accident, more than 100 donors may be needed to save a life.

"Only nine per cent of Australians have O Negative blood, but it makes up 16 per cent of orders from hospitals because it saves lives in emergencies," Executive Director of Donor Services Cath Stone said.

"There is no alternative for patients in need of blood and we'd like to remind donors, and anyone who has thought about becoming a donor, just how critical they are. They are literally saving lives," she added.

In September, CQ Today featured the story of Graham Gilmore, the legendary Central Queenslander who has made over 300 donations, split between blood and plasma.

Mr Gilmore said he was inspired to become such a committed donor after suffering through a car crash experience with his young children.

Mr Gilmore was driving the car at the time and his son was injured in the accident.

"I could have killed two of my kids and I thought I've got to do something – got to change my attitude," he said.

In Gladstone, donations can be made at Gladstone Hospital on Kent Street.

Bridge to receive upgrades

Gladstone Regional Council will soon perform important bridge safety upgrade works on the Matthew Flinders Bridge located near the Gladstone Marina.

These works are scheduled as part of the Council's 2021/22 capital works and will improve safety for workers during times of maintenance and repairs.

Modifications to comply with current standards and general improvements for public safety will also take place.

Works will be carried out in two stages:

- Stage 1 from 8 November 2021 until early December 2021
- Stage 2 from 27 January 2022 until late February 2022

Gladstone Region Councillor Glenn Churchill said the main change that pedestrians and road users would notice once the project was completed is the installation of balustrades to protect pedestrians from vehicle movement and traffic calming devices to reduce vehicle speeds over the bridge.

"The majority of these works will improve safe access for maintenance employees to meet modern standards," Councillor Churchill said.

Cr Churchill said Council is mindful of ensuring works are undertaken with as minimal disruption to the community as possible and that all practical efforts will be made to provide early notification of any disruptions to bridge operations.

"Work will occur between 6am to 6pm Monday to Friday, with disruption to bridge access for marine vessel operators and/or vehicular traffic and pedestrians expected," he said.

"Due to the nature of the works the bridge is required to be in the closed, lowered position for extended periods while works are being carried out, resulting in restricted access for tall marine vessels.

"While road vehicles and pedestrians will be under traffic control as required, small marine vessels should be unaffected and able to travel underneath the closed bridge. If the bridge is raised while works are being carried out it will be closed to vehicular traffic and pedestrians, but marine vessels both small and tall will still be able to navigate through the area."

Cr Churchill said motorists wanting to access the Gladstone Marina Parklands will need to take an alternative route and travel via Alf O'Rourke Drive during closure periods.

"This alternative route will only be applicable during weekdays when the works are in progress," he said. "The bridge will return to full operation on weekends and outside the working hours nominated below."

At this stage, Council will limit or prevent access to the Matthew Flinders Bridge between 6am to 6pm on the following dates:

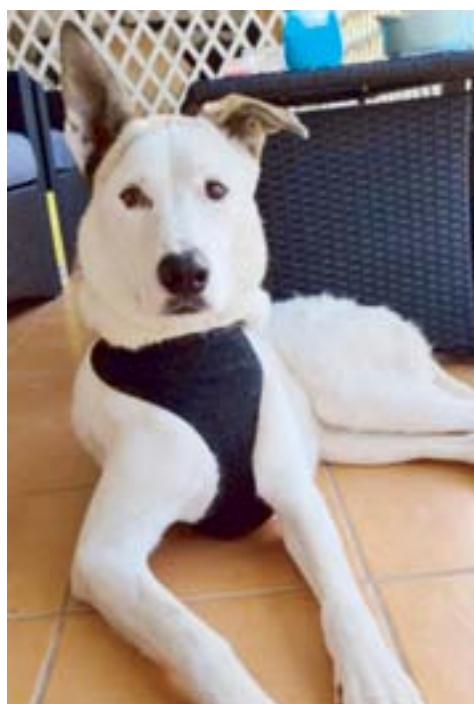

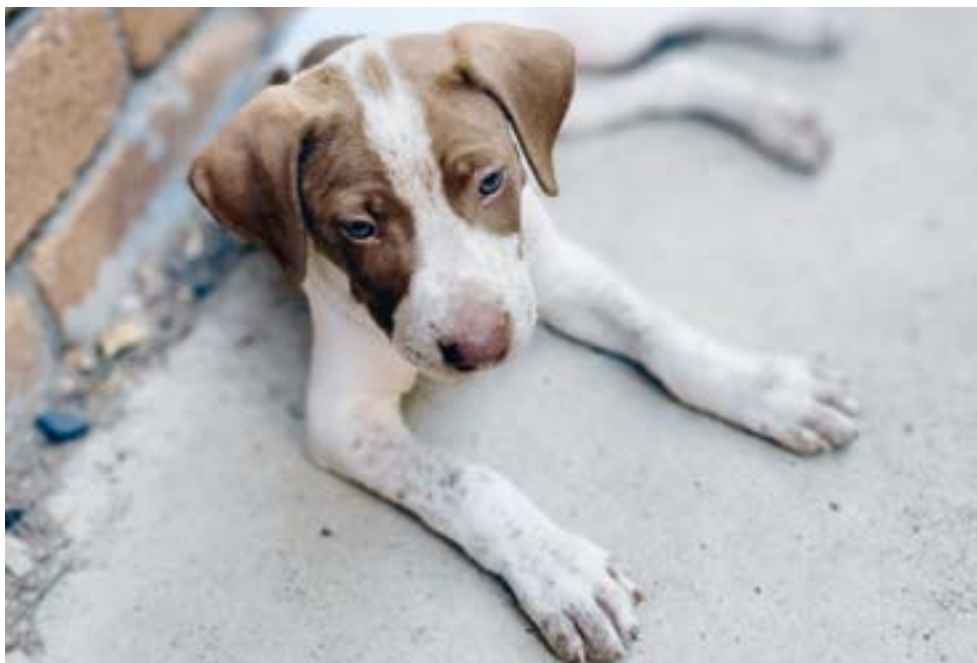

Artist sings lockdown blues

Gladstone region artist Kissing The Flint will launch her new single this Friday, which re-counts the frustration felt during the first 2020 Australian lockdown.

Leah Chynoweth-Tidy penned the single, 100 or Less, in an hour when she was living in Agnes Water.

Leah said she was frustrated about the lack of support artists received during the pandemic, as the Australian music industry screeched to a halt with little support from the government.

“Those in power don’t truly understand our industry and its value, despite the widespread, positive effect it has on so many,” Leah said.

“What does it take to be heard in a world where sporting events are regularly valued above other live entertainment? Music lifts mood; empathises with how we feel. There’s an ongoing lack of respect for these precious, positive outlets and if we’re not careful, we could lose them altogether”.

“The song is a call to arms reminding people how valuable arts are to society.”

Currently based in her father’s native Scotland, Leah said living in the UK during a pandemic was certainly an ‘eye-opener’.

“When we arrived in October last year, we had to go into mandatory two weeks isolation, two days before that finished Britain went into lockdown and we only came out of it in April

this year,” she said.

“They are taking things carefully, it’s one of the viruses you have to work out how to beat it.

“But the Britain spirit is to just get over it, it was interesting coming from a place like Gladstone into UK...it was a real eye opener.”

To record the song, Leah – an Australian Celtic Song of The Year nominee – teamed up again with Dave Beacon of High Lion Studio, who also co-produced, mixed and mastered her 2019 debut EP ‘Unconditionality’.

After being delayed for more than a year, Leah and her husband were finally able to relocate Scotland in October last year to provide some long overdue family support. With live gigs gradually returning to the UK after a

lengthy hiatus, Kissing The Flint are already wowing brand-new audiences in the Northern hemisphere.

The official video for 100 or Less, shot in the South of France last month with musician and film-maker, Jason Carter, pays vibrant visual homage to the song’s powerful narrative, namely government indifference to the plight of an undervalued Arts Industry. Faceless masked men in suit and ties menace a despairing but defiant artist struggling to make a living.

100 or less is the first single to be lifted from Kissing The Flint’s forthcoming album Standing On The Fringe of Rooms.

Labor attacks PM

I have been in politics for a while but until last week I hadn't heard of the rule that a nation's leader must tell other world leaders everything they are doing.

Or at least The Prime Minister was strongly criticised last week by the Labor Party for not telling the French President, Emmanuel Macron, that Australia had been negotiating to buy nuclear submarines from the British and US Governments. Anthony Albanese accused Scott Morrison of 'gaslighting' the French and Labor's Foreign Affairs spokesperson, Penny Wong, accused the PM of "vandalism".

Is this the new standard that Australian Prime Ministers must follow? I hope not because I expect our Prime Minister, whether Liberal or Labor, to stand up for Australia's interests, not the French people's interests or anyone else interests.

And when you are standing up for your interests you do not always disclose everything to everyone. That is not being dishonest, it is just being hard headed about the basic realities of the world.

Most of us have not had to negotiate arms deals with world leaders but most of us probably have negotiated to buy a house. Ask yourself, when in these negotiations, do you tell the agent the maximum price you are willing to pay? Of course not, you have to negotiate for your best interests. You should not lie but you do not need to disclose every detail of your strategy.

There is a direct parallel with relations between countries. We have friendly relations with France but we are under no obligation to tell them about our relations with other countries. That is a matter for us and I would not expect France to disclose all of their dealings with other countries either.

Perhaps the Labor party are just taking France's side to embarrass the PM ahead of

the looming Federal election. However, there is the possibility that it is another example of the Labor party not being able to compute the hard realities of life.

Let's say that a Labor Prime Minister had told the French Government that we were looking at buying nuclear submarines from the US and the UK. What would have happened? Well, people respond to incentives and almost certainly the French would have leaked this information to the press and that possibly would have scuttled the whole deal. That

would have benefited the French because it may have saved the diesel submarine contract for them.

What was remarkable about the nuclear submarines deal was that it remained a secret right up until the announcement. Hundreds of officials in three countries knew about it but the secrecy was key to the settlement of the deal. Without that we probably would not be joining the six other countries in the world that have nuclear submarines.

The common opinion in the mainstream

media is that Scott Morrison was embarrassed on the world stage because of the French President's scorn. David Crowe from the Sydney Morning Herald called it "the worst trip overseas for an Australian prime minister in living memory".

In talking to average Australians though they back Australia over France. The trip was a proud moment for an Australian leader who has stood for Australian interests. Whatever side of politics our Prime Minister is from, that is what we expect from our leaders.

Buy local to create regional jobs

What could be more Australian than supporting your mates?

On the battlefield, on the sports field, or when the chips are down, Australians pride ourselves on helping our mates.

It's one of the reasons we love to Buy Australian. Buying local creates jobs in our own communities and keeps the tills ringing in local businesses.

Sadly, our Federal Government hasn't got the message.

Scott Morrison and his LNP Government have spent \$190 billion buying goods and services over the past three financial years. Around 95 per cent of the Government's top 20 multi-million-dollar infrastructure projects were delivered by contractors with foreign ownership.

In Central Queensland, we see big Federally-funded projects, like roadworks, bridges and military base redevelopments. But what are our local firms and workers getting out of them?

Only a quarter of Federal Government contracts were awarded to small to medium-sized businesses in the last financial year. The Federal Infrastructure Department recently told Senate Estimates that it doesn't even keep track of how many local workers are employed on big regional projects.

It's no wonder our manufacturing industry has been in decline. Around 40,000 manufacturing jobs have been lost in Queensland since

this government came into power in 2013.

It's not good enough and Prime Minister Scott Morrison could fix it tomorrow, by getting his own government to Buy Australian.

But whether it's this, the bushfires or the hopeless vaccine rollout, he just never takes responsibility. For Scott Morrison, whatever

the issue, he always blames someone else.

And Central Queensland's local LNP MPs do nothing to fix it.

That's where Labor will step in. Rather than spending taxpayers' funds buying goods and services offshore, let's Buy Australian. Let's bring manufacturing back home to places like

Rocky, Gladstone, Moranbah, Emerald and Biloela.

This is a huge issue for Labor's leader, Anthony Albanese. Albo's Buy Australian plan will use the Federal Government's purchasing power to rebuild regional manufacturing and create more good, blue collar jobs in our regions.

We want to use more Australian contractors for big road, defence and other infrastructure projects. We'll make procurement processes simpler, so that small and family businesses can get a bigger slice of government spending. What this means for Central Queensland is more local jobs and more money kept in local communities.

We've seen Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk do this by building trains in Maryborough, with work to flow through to the revamped Rockhampton Rail Workshops.

It's a far cry from what we're seeing from Scott Morrison, or LNP State Governments, who've bought their trains and ferries from overseas.

Now we need to see Queensland Labor's approach adopted at the Federal level.

Central Queensland deserves more jobs in more industries. When we Buy Australian, that's what Anthony Albanese and Labor will deliver.

All eyes on the big Game

Central Queensland's leaders, sporting organisations and community groups have their sights set on the 2032 Olympics and the Gladstone region will be part of the pitch.

Member for Capricornia Michelle Landry hosted a meeting on Wednesday, 3 November, at Rocky Sports Club in Rockhampton, with the goal of forming a Central Queensland Olympic and Paralympic Games Taskforce to facilitate opportunities in the region.

Regional Development Australia Central and Western Queensland chair Grant Cassidy said the event was attended by '80 very passionate CQ locals' who were keen to see Central Queensland get our piece of the Olympics action.

"This is about the great opportunities we've got leading into 2032, all of the options that we have in Central Queensland to be an active participant in the games," he said.

Participants were asked to give feedback on four key questions, including 'What do we want the 2032 Games to achieve for Central Queensland?', 'What activities would a Central Queensland taskforce undertake?', 'Which existing sporting facilities in CQ are suitable for Olympic training?' and 'Who should be involved in the taskforce?'

The next steps will be to establish a working group to draft Terms of Reference for the CQ Olympics Taskforce, conduct an Expression of Interest process to form the taskforce and provide opportunities for community engagement.

The Terms of Reference is expected to be ready in about a month, with the group reconvening in February 2022.

Mr Cassidy said a wide range of views were heard at the forum.

"We had sports people and other interest groups, people from different support services... Not just from Rockhampton and Liv-

ingstone Shire, but right from Gladstone right through to the Highlands, really the whole of Central Queensland," he said.

"But while it's great to get so many people in the room, the other important thing is having all three levels of government attending, as everyone working together is key to this collaboration."

Member for Flynn Ken O'Dowd has backed Ms Landry's call to form a Central Queensland Olympics Taskforce, saying people in the Gladstone region prided themselves on the achievements of the younger generation.

"Facilitating an Olympic event in our region would allow our upcoming young athletes an experience that may only come along once in a lifetime," he said.

Add avocado for energy

Looking for the perfect energy snack without all the nasties?

These avocado-cacao energy bars are nutrient-rich and energy dense and perfect for a

Avocado-cacao energy bars

Prep: 15 mins

Makes about: 10 bars

Ingredients:

- 1 large Hass avocado, pitted, flesh scooped out and coarsely chopped
- 250 gm (1 ½ cups) pitted dates
- ¾ cup mixed toasted nuts, such as almonds, pista-

post-workout snack for those of us getting out and working on slimming down after winter!

Quick and easy to put together - this recipe created Australian Avocados uses Hass Avocados and will keep in the fridge in an airtight container for up to two weeks.

- chios and pecans, coarsely chopped
- ¼ cup (60g) melted coconut oil
- ½ cup chia seeds
- ½ cup cacao powder
- ½ cup coconut flakes, plus extra to sprinkle
- ½ cup mixed seeds, such as sunflower seeds, flaxseed and pepitas
- ¼ cup cacao nibs

Method:

1. Lightly oil a 20cm square cake tin, then line with baking paper, allowing the paper to overhang the sides by a few centimetres (this will make it easier to lift the slice from the tin).
2. Pulse Hass avocado, dates, nuts and coconut oil in a food processor until smooth, scraping down the sides if necessary, until incorporated. Add chia seeds, cacao powder and coconut, pulse to com-

bine. Transfer to a bowl, add mixed seeds, cacao nibs and ½ tsp sea salt, mix well then press evenly into prepared tin. Smooth the top, scatter with a little extra coconut and press into the surface. Refrigerate overnight until firm.

3. Use the paper to lift the slice from the tin, then cut into bars and refrigerate in an airtight container for up to 2 weeks.

purely on the fact of how easy and quick it is to put together.

So, without further ado.....let's make cheesecake!!!

- 1 tablespoon gelatine powder
- 2 x 250g packets cream cheese
- 250ml thickened cream
- ¾ cup caster sugar
- 1 tin passionfruit

Method:

1. Grease and line with baking paper a 20cm springform or 16 x 26cm slab pan.
2. Crush biscuits finely and mix with the butter. Press into the prepared pan and chill while preparing the filling.
3. Put hot water into a small heatproof bowl and sprinkle gelatine over.
4. Place into a saucepan with enough water to come halfway up the side of the bowl. Bring to the boil and lower to a simmer and stir until the gelatine has dissolved.
5. Remove the bowl from the water and let cool slightly.
6. Place cream cheese, sugar and cream in a bowl and beat with electric beaters until smooth.
7. Strain the passionfruit through a sieve over a bowl. Reserve the seeds and pulp.
8. Pour the juice into the cheese mixture and beat until combined.
9. Pour gelatine in and beat thoroughly.
10. Pour the mixture over the base.
11. Drizzle the seeds and pulp over and swirl with a knife.
12. Refrigerate for around 3 hours until set.

Tips and Tweaks:

- You can use any fruit you like in this cheesecake. Substitute apricot nectar or mango juice for the passionfruit juice and decorate with apricot halves or mango slices. For a tangy flavour use lemon or lime juice and decorate with kiwi fruit and strawberries.

- Use other biscuits if you like. Butternut snaps or scotch fingers are good options.

I hope you enjoy this recipe and I'll see you all next week. Happy cooking. Stay safe!

RIDLEY ROAD
ABC TV, Saturday,
8.20pm

Based on Jo Bloom's hit novel, you can expect an edge-of-your-seat thriller that ticks all the boxes, featuring romance, a period setting and espionage. To top it off, the story is loosely based on real events. It's the kind of show that you could easily find yourself bingeing on all four episodes in one sitting – you've been warned. Starring Rory Kinnear (*Black Mirror*), Tamzin Outhwaite (*New Tricks*) and captivating newcomer Agnes O'Casey, *Ridley Road* is soapishly compelling from the get-go. In 1960s London, a young, soon-to-wed Jewish hairdresser risks her life when she joins an underground movement trying to stop the rise of the far right.



BLITZ SPIRIT WITH LUCY WORSLEY
SBS, Friday, 8.30pm

The saying “keep calm and carry on” – seen on tea towels and posters in kitchens and living rooms worldwide – is simply a motivational phrase for some. Indeed, it may be a shock to learn the saying's origins in this gripping documentary presented by historian Lucy Worsley (pictured). Used in British propaganda material during Hitler's relentless bombing campaign in the UK, known as the Blitz, the words take on a much darker meaning. Worsley explores the lives of six real people who lived, worked and volunteered during the Blitz, using archive material to reveal the myth behind the Blitz spirit.



NOUGHTS AND CROSSES
ABC TV, Sunday, 9.35pm

Sometimes, it's hard to know whether to cringe or be thrilled by another series based on a great book. *Normal People* recently proved how expertly the tricky adaptation process can be done, but the jury's out on this reworking of Malorie Blackman's acclaimed book in which racism is inverted. The premise of an alternate world where Europe has been colonised by black people is arresting but this six-episode series never seems to shift gear out of the young adult genre. In the second instalment, the *Romeo and Juliet*-esque Callum and Sephy (Jack Rowan and Masali Baduza, both pictured) are desperate to be alone together.



THE BACK SIDE OF TELEVISION
SBS Viceland, Monday, 9.20pm

Here's a great new three-part series that dusts the cobwebs off the weird and downright misjudged moments in Australian TV history. It's not a celebration of the most terrible soundbites, but rather an insightful and humorous exploration of what happened, and why. Hosted by comedian Mitch McTaggart (pictured), it's a shrewd look at the worst on the box throughout the past 70 years. In this premiere episode, many things are explored including how true crime has gotten worse, how psychics are never much help, and which network is preoccupied with missing British tourist Peter Falconio. It's fascinating stuff.

What you need to carry

What equipment do boats that are required to be registered need to carry?

Last time we introduced a question that sparks much conversation and confusion among boat owners, "What equipment am I actually required to carry on my boat?"

We looked at Marine Safety Queensland's (MSQ's) official guidance on this topic, which is broken down into boats that are required to be registered and boats that are not

We have already examined this topic from the perspective of boats that don't need to be registered. Now we'll look at boats that do need to be registered. For simplicity, this is any boat with a motor that produces more than 3kW (4hp).

If your boat requires registration, Marine Safety Queensland requires you to carry:

- An EPIRB or Personal Location Beacon (PLB) if you go beyond partially smooth waters. If you are going to use a PLB instead of an EPIRB there are additional specific requirements relating to the selection and use of a PLB that you should make yourself aware of. This information can be obtained from MSQ.
- Two red and two orange handheld smoke flares if you go into partially smooth waters or beyond partially smooth waters.
- Firefighting equipment.
- A signalling device (torch, glow stick, lantern etc.).
- A V sheet if you go into partially smooth waters or beyond partially smooth waters.
- A life jacket for each person onboard. There are specific requirements for life jackets depending on where you are going, and you should confirm with MSQ that your life jackets are suitable for your intended use.

While not listed as required, the following equipment is recommended:

- An anchor with appropriate line.
- Relevant charts if you go into partially smooth waters or beyond partially smooth waters.
- A compass if you go into partially smooth waters or beyond partially smooth waters.
- Drinking water.
- A handheld electronic navigation device if

you don't have charts and a compass, if you go into partially smooth waters or beyond partially smooth waters.

- Oars or paddles (if your boat is less than 6m in length).
- Pumping or bailing equipment.

To echo the warning from last time, you should be aware that while MSQ describes some equipment as recommended (should be carried as opposed to must be carried), they clarify this by noting that recommended equipment is the equipment necessary to meet the general and enforceable safety obligation applied to all boat users by the Transport Operations (Marine Safety) Act 1994.

Observant readers will have noticed a glaring omission to this list and the previous list relating to boats that don't require registration. That omission is a marine radio.

While MSQ describes marine radios as essential pieces of safety equipment in other documents, they are not actually included in the official list of safety equipment that must be carried, and should be carried, respectively.

Without getting bogged down in how this situation has come about, it is probably self-evident to most people that they should not even consider taking a boat out without a functioning radio, regardless of the current published requirements.

However, we also understand that some people are apprehensive about using a marine radio because they feel that they don't have the necessary training to use one properly.

To help with this, Volunteer Marine Rescue Gladstone is working with community partners to facilitate radio courses for members of the public.

Impact of border closures

It has been over four months since the Premier announced the immediate hard border closure on July 23.

Many Callide residents are still stuck in NSW unable to drive back to their homes in Queensland.

Will was attending the Marcus Oldham Ag College when the border closed, and NSW became a hotspot. The college moved to online study and sent their students home, but Will was unable to come back to Queensland.

Young Will is a great bloke. He has beaten cancer many times since he was two and has a fantastic attitude. Instead of sitting around feeling sorry for himself he headed off to help other families on their farms while waiting for the Health Department to process his exemption request.

Will was eventually invited to be part of the home quarantine trial. Unfortunately, having a completely isolated property in Central Queensland was not good enough – it was too far from the two hours travel window allowed from Brisbane.

He can't get an agricultural exemption - because he originally went into NSW to study.

He can't get a study exemption either – they are only for boarding schools, not universities.

There are others whose stories are just as ridiculous. One mother who desperately waited over a month to have her child's border pass approved, despite a court ordering the child's

return to Queensland.

A truck driver left without transport at the border due to his Covid test being one day out. Then making it worse, his wife and child drove into NSW to take him for a test and now they are all stuck, living out of their car.

Nurses, last year's heroes, who are now not essential enough to be prioritised for exemptions and border passes to enter Queensland to fill vacancies in regional areas.

Families who travelled to bury their loved ones, now homeless on the wrong side of a line on a map.

With the Premier announcing the end of restrictions at 80 per cent and the border re-opening on 17 December, wouldn't it make sense to allow these fully-vaccinated Queensland residents to cross the border now and head straight to their homes for 14 days of quarantine.

Not only would it help reduce the inevitable traffic jams on December 17, but it would also show compassion for our residents who have suffered for far too long under these conditions.

Enough is enough. Let them come home.

The second race was a 1000 metre run which was the Ethereal QTIS Class one Handicap.

Once again just four horses lined up in the barrier as Bagger Twisties was scratched to race later in the day.

It was Rogers who doubled her winning streak when she jockeyed her trainee Avision to a 1.3 margin victory from barrier two.

Dyan Phoenix was the \$8 outsider but finished in second as favourite Krispy Kev and Better Chill'em ended in third and fourth respectively.

The Gurners Lane Class B Handicap ran over 1194 metres was taken out by the Lee Kiernan-trained, Cody Collis-jockeyed Clusterfest as Twogoboom came in second and Monterey Lad ended in third.

Scratched from the second race, Angela Stephens-trained Bagger Twisties came into the Comic Court Maiden Plate race with a vengeance.

The \$7 outsider, ridden by Matthew Grey, took out the maiden plate by a massive 4.5 lengths ahead of pre-race favourite Best Dressed and Zomboombah.

The fifth and final race came after the Melbourne Cup saw Verry Elleegant notch up a famous victory.

And in a first for the day the on-odds favourite, Bevan-Johnson trained and Dakota Graham-jockeyed Froze, ran out as the winner from barrier three.

Russian Missile and Ourlastpenny finished as second and third respectively as Froze rounded out the day with a strong victory.

We can't move forward unless we move together. We can't construct a supportive society if we are too busy engaging in destructive behaviours.

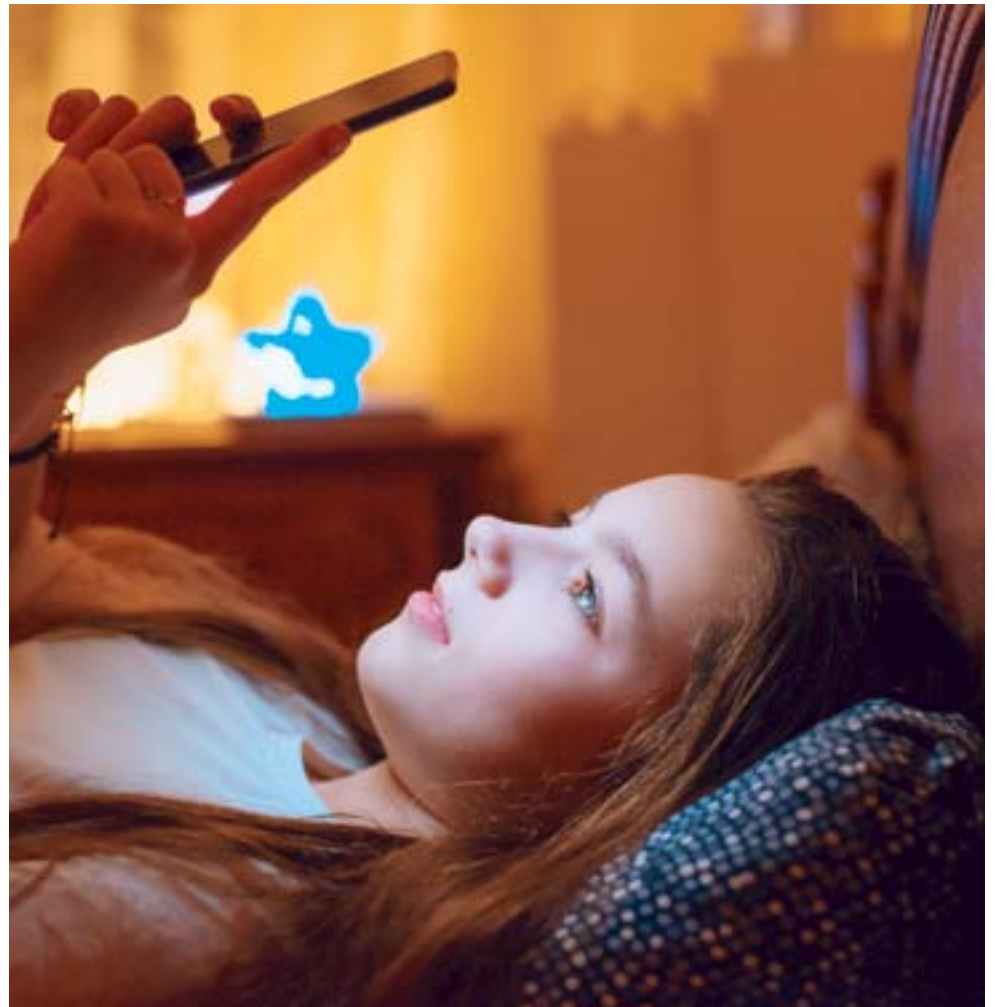

Symbol of victory

Over the last few weeks you may have noticed a very unusual golden flower on a small tree in parks and gardens around the Gladstone Region.

This small tree has heart-shaped leaves and bright yellow spikes of flowers that look like fingers.

What you may not know is that this tree has a direct like to our Anzacs.

The flowers of this small tree were arranged in laurels of gold is a symbol for victory and handed to the troops on the First World War 1 troop train to Brisbane.

The unique finger of gold flowering tree is actually a local native and Gladstone's very own Floral Emblem called *Barklya syringifolia* or is commonly known as the Bajool Rose or Crown of Gold.

It is a bushy, very ornamental tree for moist soils and will grow from only a short distance from the beach to being able to handle the western heat. *Barklya syringifolia* grows best in full sun but is a little slow growing, with deep green, almost heart-shaped leaves. A height of 6m should be expected with a width of 2 to 3m.

When the tree flowers in late spring, it becomes indeed a 'Crown of Gold', very spectacular as the bright golden fingers of flowers contrast well with the dark green foliage.

This tree is hard to propagate so it can be hard to find in most nurseries but it is well worth investigating, as the tree is truly unique to our region.

To see mass flowering of these trees I would suggest taking a short drive this weekend and view the trees flowering naturally along the hillsides between Bajool and Mount Larcom.

There is another tree with an important history with our ANZACs that can be found growing in Parks and Garden in the Gladstone Region it is the *Peltophorum pterocarpum* or Golden Flame Tree.

This tree has been used in war memorials throughout the South Pacific, South-east Asia and even Australia. This was due to the tree's flowering habit of being in bloom around both Anzac Day and Remembrance Day each year.

The *Peltophorum pterocarpum* or Golden Flame Tree has been used for many years in street and park plantings throughout all of tropical Australia, with its dense shady crown making it highly sought after during long hot summers.

However it is not only the canopy of the *Peltophorum* that draws interest in this tree. Its showy yellow flowers will blossom from August to May most years. This tree is a native of tropical Australia, South-east Asia and the Pacific Islands. The *Peltophorum* will grow to

a maximum height of 8 to 10 metres high, although they have been known to reach 20 metres if the conditions are right.

Christmas. As for our vegies and herbs it could not be a better time to plant.

Rural Matters

Best is yet to come

At AgForce's AGM held last week at Clare in the Burdekin, I remarked that the number and scale of opportunities for agriculture, broader agribusiness, and regional communities continues to grow.

In Queensland's sugarcane heartland we met with friends new and old and heard from passionate farmers itching to take advantage of their sometimes-maligned wonder crop.

Sugar and molasses are well known products derived from cane, but sugarcane ethanol is a clean, affordable, low-carbon biofuel currently underutilised in this country that has emerged as a leading renewable for transportation in other parts of the world.

Bagasse, a fibre formed from crushed sugarcane, is used by sugar mills to generate power, while farmers put mill mud and mill ash – also produced from sugarcane – back into their soil.

Yet for all its unquestionable environmental benefits, many point to the production of sugarcane as a major pollutant of our Great Barrier Reef – despite current science proving Reef water quality continues to improve.

It's no wonder that when I've sat at the kitchen tables of farmers up and down the coast these past several months they and their families talk with frustration – sometimes anger – but mostly despair and confusion, at what

more they have to do before governments and environmental groups sit up and take notice of the significant on-farm improvements many have made to their businesses, usually at great personal cost.

The sugarcane industry – and in particular farmers in the Burdekin – have been deeply affected by increasingly onerous Reef regulations imposed on them – and AgForce continues to fight for justice for farmers who produce this sustainable, abundant crop.

Yet, despite the setbacks, what I took away from last week in the Burdekin was the fantastic sense of enthusiasm about what is in front of us.

Agriculture possesses an almost unlimited capacity to contribute environmentally, socially, and economically to Queensland, the nation, and the entire world – if we continue to share our positive stories and illuminate the truth.

Since cane became part of the AgForce family 18 months ago, I have witnessed incredible comradery and a free exchange of ideas between commodities that perhaps initially seemed unlikely to some.

It's this – the way that we've been able to see past any differences and come together for the good of something greater – that fills me, and anyone associated with agriculture, with optimism that the best is yet to come.

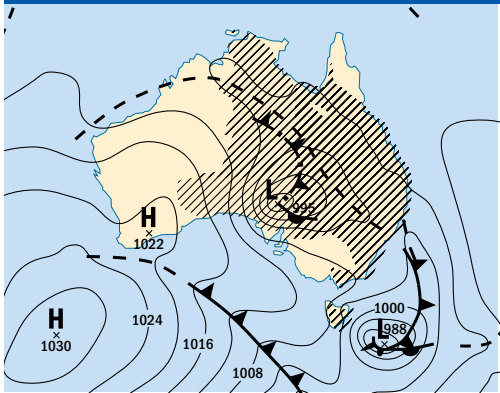

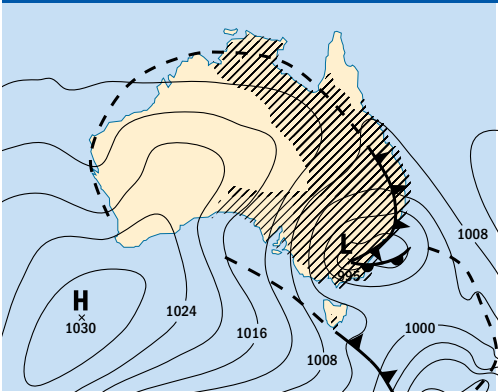

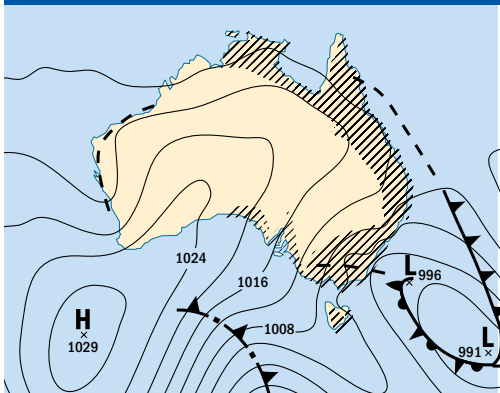

Those ladies, combined with some sharp fielding, helped knock over North Queensland for just 75 runs, giving the CQ side their most dominant victory and their third straight Northern Queensland championship.
