Vax crunch time

Gladstone business owners have shared their biggest concerns regarding Queensland Health's new Covid-19 vaccine restrictions, with staff abuse one of the major fears.

Last Tuesday, Premier Annastacia Palaszc-Queenslanders who have not been vaccinated against Covid-19 by mid-next month.

The measures will take effect from 17 December, or once the state reaches 80 per cent of the Queensland population 16 years and over being fully vaccinated.

The Premier said pubs, clubs, nightclubs, hotels, taverns, restaurants, cafes, bars and provided all patrons and staff are fully vacci-

Concerts, theatres and cinemas also come under these new rules, with restrictions to apply for the private hire of venues, if occurring with unvaccinated people.

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Gladstone's rate higher

With the borders set to give way in a month, 61.3 per cent of eligible residents within Gladstone are fully vaccinated as of November 14, a substantial gap from the state-wide average of 70.2 per cent.

However, Gladstone's 'first dose' figures are more closely aligned with the rest of Oueensland.

State-wide, 82.0 per cent of eligible people

have received one jab.

In Gladstone, the figure is 79.0 per cent.

Across Central Queensland, Gladstone now outstrips every other local government area in terms of first dose rates.

Its closest competitor is Rockhampton, with a first dose rate of 78.2 per cent.

The Gladstone Community Vaccination Clinic at 25 Derby Street is now open seven days a week, from 9am to 4pm.

On Thursday, the clinic is open until 7pm.

Boyce slams 'Big Brother'

Colin Boyce, the LNP candidate for the federal seat of Flynn, has sharply criticised the state government's proposed vaccine regulations, calling them a step towards a 'Big Brother' police state.

"The Queensland Labor Government's Vaccine Rules are a complete departure from the Australian way," he wrote on Facebook last week.

"It signals the imminent rollout of vaccination passports, and an escalation of "Big Brother" police state, totalitarian rule."

The regulations, set to come in on December 17, will lock out unvaccinated Queenslanders from a range of everyday activities.

"Christmas will soon be upon us," Mr Boyce continues.

"So many Queenslanders will now face the prospect of being denied access to pubs, clubs,

sporting, and entertainment venues. What if you have a wedding to go to? One unvaccinated guest means only 20 people can attend a wedding. I wonder if you will be allowed to go to the beach and swim in the ocean, if you are not vaccinated? Who is going to police this? Our police have enough to do, with the increasing crime rates throughout Queensland."


"Whilst I support vaccination, I do not support unnecessary, mandatory vaccination that removes our fundamental right of choice. The threat of losing your job or being unable to enter a business – these are not voluntary choices that anyone can make. For a Queensland government to enforce these conditions on our citizens will simply alienate and ostracise those who choose not to be vaccinated. We live in Australia, not some communist country."

CQ Today understands that Mr Boyce's rival for the seat of Flynn, Labor candidate and Gladstone Mayor Matt Burnett, supports the state government's position.

How to prove you're vaxxed

Had the jab? You'll soon need to prove it to participate in regular life.

From December 17 onwards, the state government plans to lock out unvaccinated Queenslanders from a range of everyday activities, from going to the pub to watching a game at Browne Park or Kev Broome Stadium.

Your ticket to freedom comes in the form of a certificate demonstrating proof of vaccination for Covid.

There are a number of ways you can secure your certificate and you don't need to be tech-savvy to get one.

Even if you don't use the internet or smartphones, a certificate is easy to attain.

Here are the three basic ways to do so. 1. Download a digital copy of your certificate from MyGov.

Log on to MyGov and link your Medicare card to your MyGov account.

Once you have linked Medicare to My-

Gov, you can download a copy of your digital certificate.

It can also be saved to Apple Wallet and Google Play.

2. Ask your vaccine provider for a printed certificate of your vaccination.

If you've had your jab at a pharmacy or GP clinic, ask them to print out a certificate of your vaccination.

3. Call the Australian Immunisations Register

You can call the Australian Immunisations Register on 1800 653 809 to request a printed copy of your vaccination certificate.

CQ Today called this number on Monday and the process was quick and easy.

You will require your Medicare card and from there the operator will ask you a series of security questions to confirm your identity.

Once your identity has been confirmed, give the operator the correct mailing address and your certificate will sent to you.

It might take up to 10 days to arrive by post.

Business 'entry' concern

With Queensland surpassing the 70 per cent vaccination rate, Gladstone businesses have voiced their concern how the new restrictions would affect their establishments.

Last Tuesday, Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk revealed the limits that will be put on Queenslanders who have not been vaccinated against Covid-19 by mid-next month.

The measures will take effect from December 17, or once the state reaches 80 per cent of the Queensland population 16 years and over being fully vaccinated.

The Premier said pubs, clubs, nightclubs, hotels, taverns, restaurants, cafes, bars and music venues will be free from all restrictions provided all patrons and staff are fully vaccinated

Concerts, theatres and cinemas also come under these new rules, with restrictions to apply for the private hire of venues, if occurring with unvaccinated people.

Outdoor entertainment activities like sports stadiums and theme parks, as well as all festivals, will also only allow vaccinated staff and patrons to enter.

Only fully vaccinated people will be able to visit hospitals, aged care facilities, prisons and disability services, except in end-of-life or emergency situations.

As Gladstone lags behind the State average for the first Covid-19 dose administrations, Dicey's Irish Pub Restaurant venue manager Johannes Noordermeer hoped enforcing the new restrictions would not be hospitality staff's responsibility.

"One thing that's going to happen is the anti vaxxers are going to go test our hospitality staff and expect us to know the law and defend it," Mr Noordermeer said.

"Often we find anti-vaxxers take it out on hospitality staff who are only really doing what the government requires us to do."

While he said it was important for people to get vaccinated, Mr Noordermeer said he did not judge those who did not want the jab.

"I don't really agree with forcing people to get vaccinated who don't want to get it," he said

"But then again at the same time it's the only way to get people to get vaccinated.

"It's unfortunate it's come to that but I understand why people wouldn't want to get vac-

Gladstone Cinemas general manager Melissa Struik said she was waiting on official guidelines from the State Government on how to navigate the new health guidelines.

"We're kind of taking a stab at what they are going to implement," Ms Struik said.

"At this stage we have the Queensland check in app and we've been advised it will likely be a similar procedure where you'll check in via the app, and show us evidence you have been double vaxxed and if you don't have the green tick, you won't be allowed in."

While Gladstone cinema staff are well-prepared to handle the new changes, Ms Struik still had concerns if people would abuse staff for following Government regulations.

"I don't think it should be our job (to police) the new rules, it's an uncomfortable situation for me to put my staff in but there is no alternative, we'll just do as we're told and try to play the game right."

"Of course we will have police enforcement but I don't think there are enough resources to go around."

Another concern was also about letting Covid-19 into the community and the repercussions it would have on her business.

"I'm concerned about confirmed cases in Gladstone, we're trying to think about that as well," she said.

"Would I need two teams of people in case we get shut down? We're just trying to figure out all these contingency plans in case the worst does happen."

Meanwhile Mieplace Niteclub owner Aodhan McCann told the Courier Mail he thought the new regulations could change everything.

"At the end of the day it is a decision they've made, I don't think it's a good decision for our industry," he said.

"If people are unvaccinated and not allowed in that potentially harms my business, if staff are unvaccinated they can't work."

Mr McCann said he was worried the State Government had gone the wrong way about getting people vaccinated.

"I think they should have said 'if you choose to go unvaccinated, then you have to deal with the financial repercussions of specialist care in the ICU'," he said.

"Forcing people to do it is not the right answer"

Mr McCann said it was unclear how the government expected businesses to police the new rules, and what the fines were going to be for anyone who does breach the regulations.

A Queensland Police Service spokesman said police would work closely with local businesses and the community to ensure everyone was aware of the new public health direction.

Customers entering venues will need to check-in to the venue and show evidence they are fully vaccinated.

"Throughout the pandemic, the Queensland Police Service has maintained a communication and compassion approach to achieve compliance," he said.

"We encourage businesses to clearly display the new rules to help inform their customers.

"While we do not expect business owners and employees to act as police, we do ask that they understand and abide by their obliga-

"If business operators experience difficult customers who refuse to comply with the rules or leave the premises, they can contact

police and we can assist.

"The QPS will continue to take an educative approach to compliance around COVID 19 measures, however, if blatant breaches are detected, we will take action."

The QPS spokesman said there would be fines up to \$1,378 for individuals and \$6892 for businesses which fail to comply with the public health directions.

"Further action can also be taken, depending on the circumstances of the matter.

"QPS officers will continue to work closely with partner agencies including the Office of Liquor and Gaming to undertake compliance operations."

Mr Noordermeer said it should citizen's own responsibility to follow the new rules.

"In the end we're not trained to deal with those kinds of questions, and we're learning as well," he said.

"I'm fully vaccinated but I don't hold it against anyone who is not vaccinated.

"Unfortunately there is nothing we can do about (the new rules), those who are unvaxxed just won't be allowed in the venue.

"I just ask for people not to take it out on staff.

"Most of them are just out of highschool, and people can get pretty aggressive about it and it's just not fair on them."

Alleged Assault

Roadworks

Gladstone Regional Council will undertake an asphalt resurfacing project along various Gladstone CBD streets, commencing from Wednesday 24 November.

The project will upgrade existing road surfaces that provide access to residential, business and commercial premises.

Works will occur along sections of six streets in and near the Gladstone CBD area, with works expected to be completed by early December 2021, weather permitting.

Upcoming asphalt resurfacing will occur along: ? Railway Street (Glenlyon Street to Bayne Street) ? Scenery Street – Two sections (Kent Street to Railway Street) (Tank Street to Fisher Street) ? Short Street - Two sections (Toolooa Street to Auckland Street) (Auckland Street to Oaka Street) ? William Street - Two sections (Auckland Street to Goondoon Street) (Goondoon Street to Glenlyon Road) ? Yarroon St (Auckland Street to Glenlyon Road)? Goondoon St (Tank Street roundabout to Eden Street – these works will require closing of the roundabout).

Gladstone Region Councillor Chris Trevor said the project would resurface about 2.8km of road using approximately 3000t of asphalt. "These upcoming works will renew priority road areas within the Gladstone CBD," Councillor Trevor said.

Support in self-expression will be an additional key feature as participants learn and develop technical skills in drawing, based on their own personal experiences in relation to






sustainability and self-expression when immersed in and surrounded by the 'Silly Season'.

The story of Kyrle

This week I had the pleasure of talking to Kyrle, born Frances Kyrle Reimer (nee Pitman), who turns 96 years old on 26 February.

Born in Mount Morgan in 1926 to Charles Leslie Pitman and Frances Louisa Inglis, Kyrle arrived at Goovigen when she was six days old.

Goovigen is a small rural village located in the Banana Shire with a population of about 200 people.

Their property, Mottley, was about 800 acres on Old Prairie Road at Lake Pleasant, now known as Lake Pleasant Road, Goovigen.

It was granted to Kyrle's father in 1922 as a soldiers settlement block, granted to soldiers involved in active service during World War One.

Kyrle's life has been filled with adventures and memories within the Central Queensland

In April 1928, a tropical cyclone near Mackay resulted in significant floods to the Callide River.

"I was only two years old at the time, but I still remember vividly the water rising, and it was inches from the floorboards." Kyrle said.

"There were 13 people cramped in our small house that night.

"We lost all our cotton crop, potatoes, and pigs."

In early 1931, the family shifted to a property across the road, called Cooleighba, presumably due to the coolibah trees.

Kyrle was the only girl alongside five brothers Leslie, Henry, Reginald, Charles, and Edward - so she was determined to prove that she should be treated equally.

"I remember having to work in the paddocks and milking the cows and doing all the farm work with my brothers," she said.

"But being the only girl, I was also expected to help mum in the house as well, but the boys

were never made to help.

"I soon learnt how to fistfight against my brothers as I did not think it was fair."

Kyrle's childhood memory included her and her younger brother Reggie noticing that the fire had gone low in their old wooden stove.

"We poured kerosene onto the still-hot coals and struck a match," Kyrle said.

"The result blew my brother and me clear across the room.

"Luckily, we were both uninjured because my dad heard the explosion from out in the paddock half a mile away."

Kyrle grew up riding horses with some of her fondest memories on horseback.

"We had Australian stock horses, and we only knew two speeds, flat out and dead stop," she said.

"I could even ride two horses at once, standing up with one foot on each horse doing tricks around the cattle yards."

By 1939, Kyrle had finished primary school at Lake Pleasant School, and it was decided that she attend Saint Faith's all-girls boarding

school in Yeppoon.
"It was a real shock, the Sisters and I clashed sometimes," Kyrle said.

"I didn't like the constraints of being at school after the freedom of living in the country."

So at 13 years old, Kyrle took the opportunity to leave school and cook for her dad, who was dam sinking out west.

In 1940, World War Two had broken out, and men from the district left the farms to join.

"Dad wanted to sell the farm, but mum wouldn't have it, so I said that I will help run Cooleighba," Kyrle said.

"I learnt to drive at 14 and drove a Ford 10 utility.

I was the first girl in the district to drive a car, and you could say I had a lead foot."

In February 1942, a tropical cycle hit north Queensland near Cardwell and travelled down the coast to the north of Mackay.

The flood resulted in the loss of life in the Dawson and Callide Valleys with widespread property loss.

The devastation was said to be more severe than the 'big flood' of 1928.

"We had 18 inches of water under the house," Kyrle said.

"I remember all of us carrying mum's new kerosene fridge up the stairs to save it.

"We also managed to get all the cattle and horses to higher ground.

"We didn't lose any stock; we were very lucky."

Kyrle's older brothers, Leslie and Henry, were called to join the war effort in 1942.

"Dad and Reggie went to Townsville to work on the defence road between Longreach and Townsville," Kyrle said.

"Charlie and Eddie went to Saint Brendan's boarding school in Yeppoon.

"Mum and I ran the farm during the next two years.

"Some of the farmers didn't take kindly to a 16-year-old girl giving them orders, but they didn't last long."

After the war in 1949, Kyrle left the farm to marry Kevin Reimer and has six children Ron, Greg, Karen, Garvey, Harvey, Leonie, and Deb-

From listening to Kyrle's story, it is clear that she has lived an exciting life and proved the strength of women many times over.

In a follow-up chat, I asked Kyrle what her best life advice was; she replied, follow your dreams because today's dreams are tomorrow's reality.



Coal's dim forecasts

By Duncan Evans

The value of Australia's coal production is expected to fall by 50 per cent out to 2050, according to modelling from the federal government released last Friday.

The modelling, which underpins the government's commitment to net zero emissions by 2050, says "global demand shifts beyond Australia's control" will depress coal's prospects, though the value of mining exports overall is expected to rise by 5 per cent with demand for critical minerals leading the rise.

"This shift is projected to occur over several decades, not as a sudden shock," the report

Coal's fall will be driven primarily by expected changes in energy production.

"If countries take action to achieve their 2030 and 2050 targets, there will be a corresponding reduction in the global demand for traditional energy sources. This reduced demand will impact Australian production, as Australia is a major exporter of traditional energy sources such as coal and gas," the report

Lake renewal project moves onto final stage

The final stage of the Lake Awoonga Water Mains Renewal Project will begin from 21 November, encompassing Auckland Street from Tank Street to Short Street.

Residents have been notified of these works in advance that are expected to be completed by mid-February 2022.

The Lake Awoonga Water Mains Renew-Project has been conducted over three stages as part of Gladstone Regional Council's 2021 works program.

Works involved include the removal of existing water mains, installation of temporary above-ground water lines, installation of new water main, new water main connection, testing and activation of the new water main and removal of temporary wa-

Stage 1 of the project started in July at New Auckland (encompassing Sandpiper Avenue from Lorikeet Avenue to Cockatoo Drive), with Stage 2 beginning at Clinton in August servicing Aerodrome Road from J. Hickey Avenue to Clark Street.

Stage 1 works were completed in August and Stage 2 works are expected to be completed by 10 December.

Gladstone Region Councillor Chris

Cameron said water mains in these areas were identified as ageing water infrastructure requiring replacement.

"The Lake Awoonga Water Mains Renewal Project aims to deliver a more reliable water supply for our residents with the new infrastructure expected to help reduce unplanned water interruptions," Councillor Cameron said.

"Construction times will be Monday to Friday 6.30am-6pm and 8am-4pm Saturday and Sunday, although some night works may be considered.

"These works may also impact footpath access with ramps in place to protect temporary above-ground water lines where they cross residential driveways and road-

"As always, Council's commitment to safety and quality ensures that all works will be undertaken with the highest practical levels of safety for workers, residents. pedestrians, motorists, cyclists and users of the area, but please exercise caution when travelling through this area."

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

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Fiery escape from plane

Stories from the journals of Gladstone's Family History Group (GSGD Inc)

Thomas Henry Keen was born in Townsville in 1915 but was living in Gladstone when he enlisted in the RAAF in 1940.

In Jan 1942, he was serving on Royal Australian Air Force Catalina Number A24-9. These were flying boats.

They were lightly armed with vintage World War I Lewis guns, they had no fighter protection and were at the mercy of the agile Japanese Zeros.

The captain was US Navy pilot Lt George Leland Hutchison. They were operating from Port Moresby, New Guinea and Catalina A24-9 was brought down by Zeros near Lae about noon on 21 January, 1942.

Their skipper had managed to obtain nine parachutes for this trip. Previous missions had not carried any parachutes. Only one man survived, thanks to his parachute, Thomas Henry Keen

The crew was LAC Meadow, the wireless operator, on the bow gun, Lt Hutchison at the controls. LAC Downes and Sgt. Coote on the radio, Murphy up in the engineer's seat under the fuel tanks, LAC Craigie on the twin guns portside and Pilot Officer Tommy Rowe, the second pilot, between the Perspex blisters to act as fire-controller. Cpl Tom Keen was with the twin Lewis guns on the starboard side and newly arrived Sgt Jack Wyche on the single gun in the rear tunnel compartment.

That day their mission was to deliver radio gear to Salamaua on the north coast of New Guinea. They took off at 0735 hours and at about midday the klaxon horn blew 'action stations'.

The wireless operator hurried through and reported, "We've been recalled to base, the Japanese are attacking Lae and Bulolo so we're getting out of danger."

While they were retracing their course along



the coastline only this time closer inshore. The intercom announced: "13 or more enemy aircraft on the port bow about five miles."

Soon all hell broke loose as explosions burst very close. Flames and smoke were everywhere and it was impossible to see overhead.

The plane was alight with a third of it's wing gone.

The Captain told Tom on the intercom that everyone up front was dead and Tom told him, everyone else in the rear was also dead. Tom then realised everyone else was dead when the Captain's voice cut off after another clatter of bullets and the plane went into a steep dive. They were about 4000 feet above the coastal range.

Tom saw the parachute and harness jammed between the seat and hull where he'd stowed it earlier. He slammed it on.

Tom was leaning out of the hatch when he was suddenly sucked through and the parachute pack tore loose from the harness as he fell. He panicked when he thought the chute was gone, then he saw it above him still in its envelope.

The webbing straps had been ripped out of their press clipped tabs and the parachute was streaming above him.

Tom climbed up the straps hand over hand until he got his chin over the pack, then he grabbed the ripcord and pulled. It was a fall of some 1500 feet before there was a flash of white silk and the chute finally opened. Looking down he saw Catalina A24-9 in flames,



with the engines still at full throttle, smash at a steep angle into the mountains below. It was followed by a sudden blast and updraft which tore at his body and skin.

Several of the Zeros were circling above with the leader diving directly at him.

Tom pretended to be dead and the zeros roared past not firing. Tom noticed a hole in the canopy below him and aimed for it, he ended up hanging about 15 feet above the ground.

He turned the release lever and dropped out of the harness, hit the soft ground with a thump and rolled down a slope until he collided with a small tree trunk.

The 15th annual Agnes Blues, Roots & Rock Festival is looking better than ever with two new acts joining the lineup - Linc Phelps and the Round Mountain Girls.

The iconic annual festival will return to the Discovery Coast from Friday, 18 February to Sunday, 20 February and will be held at the SES Grounds, Captain Cook Drive, Town of 1770.

Linc is an artist who wears his heart on his sleeve, never more evident than in the lyrics of his original music.

The Round Mountain Girls have played on Australia's biggest stages at the nation's biggest festivals alongside some of the world's biggest names, including opening the main stage at the iconic Bluesfest for Zac Brown and Santana, where they'll be performing again in 2022.

If Mumford and Sons, The Pogues and Metallica had a three-way love child, it would be one of the Round Mountain Girls, coined in

the press as the 'finest purveyors of Celtabillypunkfolkrootsgrass in the Southern Hemisphere' and 'heavy metal folk'.

According to Sam Fell of Rhythms Magazine, "They play like they own the place, never has a band seemed so comfortable on a stage."

The Round Mountain Girls and Linc Phelps and his band The Next Best Thing will join already announced acts Devil's Kiosk and Innocent Eve on the Marquee Stage.

Race that stops a nation

Today's View

The Melbourne Cup – this great race is held on the first Tuesday of November and is Australia's best recognised horse race. First run in 1861 by the Victorian Turf Club, this two mile handicap race was introduced to show up their rival the Victorian Jockey Club.

Archer was the first racehorse to win the cup and backed that up again in 1862.

It has been followed by some equally great winners, Carbine in 1890, Phar Lap in 1930, Peter Pan in 1932 and 1934, Rain Lover in 1968 and 1969, Might and Power in 1997 and the great Makybe Diva in consecutive wins over 2003, 2004 and 2005. Bart Cummings the master horse trainer has the most cups win with

Phar Lap, commonly called the people's champion has been the shortest-priced winner in the history of the cup to date, with odds of 8/11 and there have been four horses that have won with odds of 100/1, these being The Pearl in 1871, Wotan in 1936, Old Rowley in 1940 and the Prince of Penzance in 2015.

The Melbourne Cup is one of the world's richest and most prestigious horse races and in Australia its standing is such that it is called the race that stops the nation. The attendance for the inaugural cup was 4000 people and the

highest recorded attendance was in 2003 with 122,736 patrons. In 2021 due to covid restrictions the crowd attendance was capped at 10,000.

The 100,000 number of people attending the Melbourne Cup was first broken in 1923 and for the most part has been consistently over 100,000 for over 90 odd years.

If you cannot attend the actual event in Melbourne, there are plenty of Melbourne Cup parties throughout the nation.

It would be rare to find a community or a place that would not celebrate this race, lunch among friends, a reason to wear your best outfit and enjoy. To help celebrate a half day public holiday was granted to the public servants in 1865 and then officially gazetted in 1873.

This race has been so ingrained in the Australian psyche that it is seen as a badge of honour to have picked the winner in the yearly cup. Most know of a non-punter who will back every horse for a dollar to win, just so that they can declare that they picked the winner. For one week a year the opening question of most conversations will start with "who do you like in the cup" or "did you pick the winner"?

Where placing money on the outcome of a horse race is usually considered as gambling, this race changes that, betting on the Melbourne Cup is just the done thing. The Melbourne Cup sweep has also become a stable program for most businesses on that first Tuesday in November along with fashion parades and cold chicken lunches.

This three-minute race held at 3pm AEDST would be one if not the most watched event in Australian television each year and reinforces that this great nation's residents love their sport.



'Passport' divides society

This week some businesses in Yeppoon organised a meeting to express concerns about the Queensland Government's introduction of a mandatory vaccine passport. With just four days of planning, around 600 passionate and concerned people crammed into the Yeppoon town hall. I have never seen a political reaction

The outpouring of concern has confirmed for me why we are wrong to divide our society by requiring people to show medical papers. The vaccine works (to reduce the risk of a severe reaction) but these vaccine mandates do not work because the vaccine does a poor job at stopping transmission. Why take away people's jobs and businesses for something that will not work?

There are not many details of the Queensland Government's plan, they have yet to issue the full regulation. The basic plan is that when Queensland hits an 80 per cent vaccination rate (currently scheduled to be on 17 December) it will be mandatory to show your vaccine passport to enter hotels, pubs, restaurants and entertainment venues. Weddings will be capped at just 20 people unless everyone attending is vaccinated. These restrictions are in addition to the already announced policy of making all Queensland health workers get vaccinated.

The Queensland Government only gives one reason for the removal of people's freedom to decide what medical treatment they receive. Their explanation document says, "To ensure we don't overwhelm our hospital system when we have outbreaks, some restrictions on unvaccinated people are necessary."

The Queensland Government revealed that five per cent of nurses have left their jobs rather than get the vaccine. So how does a policy that has caused us to have 4,000 fewer health workers help in stopping our hospital system becoming 'overwhelmed'?

Because we have not had widespread coronavirus cases, Queensland can benefit from looking at what other countries have done, and compare what works and what does not. It is clear that vaccine mandates do not work.

Germany, the Netherlands, Austria, Belgium, Bulgaria, the Czech Republic and Serbia all have policies that require vaccination to

enter venues. They all have high vaccination rates. They have all experienced record numbers of coronavirus cases over the past month. Vaccine mandates do not work.

Bill Gates, someone who has been supportive of vaccination, revealed why they do not work in the past week. He spoke the truth when he said that vaccines only 'slightly reduce transmission'. Even after you are vaccinated, you can still catch coronavirus and you can still pass it on.

There is no health justification to make people get a medical treatment, if that treatment does not significantly benefit anyone else. Further, the Queensland Government's proposed mandates apply to anyone over the age of 16. Yet, Taiwan has just suspended Pfizer doses for children aged between 12 and 17 due to concerns over side effects that impact the heart. Why are we making young people take a vaccine with such side effects when the risk of Covid to young people is so low?

So why would the Queensland Government be doing this? In my view, they are just trying to boost the vaccination rate that had flatlined in Oueensland. I noticed on the weekend. after the announcement of mandatory vaccination, that there were more people at the walk-in vaccination clinics than at Bunnings. The Queensland Government says they are not forcing us. They are just taking away everything until you consent.

This will probably work to lift Queensland's vaccination rate. So once we get to 90 per cent and above the Queensland Government should remove these mandates that are causing people to lose their jobs and their livelihoods. The vaccine mandates are cruel and inhumane.

And, if we do not fight back to stop these mandates now, what is next? Will we be made to get booster shots every year? Will they make our kids get the jab to attend school?

I do believe that the vaccines work to reduce the risk of the coronavirus to the person getting the vaccine. That is why I got the vaccine and that is my choice.

We have lost a lot through the coronavirus. Let's not lose our free country too.

What's in a name? A clear identity for your customers

Remember though, the less of these elements that you incorporate, the more work you are going to have to do and money you are going to have to spend developing brand awareness and communicating your value to potential clients. Keep in mind that if:
- Your business name is not memorable; you might have to expose potential customers to your branding more times before they start to become consciously aware of you.
- Your business name is not easy to remember, you will lose sales because people who would have bought from you end up buy-

ing from a competitor who's name they can

- Potential customers can't tell what you do from your name you will miss some cus tomers who never stop to consider that you have what they need and you will also miss out on some easy organic search engine
- Your business name doesn't communicate what your business is all about at a deeper level, some customers won't relate to you and won't buy from you.

It is ok to have a unique name that requires more explanation. Just remember, if you go down this route, you must then actually take the time and spend the money to communicate what you are all about to potential customers.

One final thought, just because you come up with the perfect business name doesn't mean you can use it. If the name you like is already in use you will have to come up with a different name, or at least alter the name

you like enough so that there can be no confusion between you and the other business that already owns the name. It's important to confirm the name you want is available and register it before you commit too much time, energy and money to a name you can't use. This is a common mistake and even seasoned veterans occasionally get so excited they forget to check. Just ask Mark Zuckerberg and his team who got so excited about rebranding the Facebook Group of companies as Meta that nobody checked if the name was

available before announcing the new name and showing the new logo to the public. Now the business that actually has the rights to this name has asked for \$20 million to make the name available!

Rose by any other name

What is Rose Wine?

Rose is interesting to discuss, because Rose is not a specific type of grape! It's a genre of wine like white wine and red wine. Rose can be produced from any red/black grape and cultivated from any wine region. Although it has become a recent favourite in Australia. It has been a mainstay in France for centuries. In particular in the region of Provence. It is also popular in in Italy where it is called Rosato. And in Spain, where it is called Rosado.

Rose can be a single varietal or blend. The

Research gives vital clues

An innovative partnership to further understand Gladstone harbour is underway with Gladstone Ports Corporation's (GPC) environment specialist Dr Megan Ellis, joining CQUniversity's research team.

For the past four months, Dr Ellis has been working with the CQUniversity's researchers at the Coastal Marine Ecosystems Research Centre (CMERC) to develop a research strategy to address some of the key environmental challenges facing the harbour.

Dr Ellis said so far the unique experience has been rewarding for both GPC and CQU as well as herself.

"It's been great to meet with CMERC researchers and discover more about the research they are undertaking, both by talking with them and getting involved in the research," she said.

"Last month I kayaked adjacent to Fisherman's Landing to collect sensor data with PhD student Rory Mulloy, whose scholarship is cofunded by GPC and CQU.

"Rory's project is all about using 'working with nature' approaches to increase biodiversity on and adjacent to the seawalls.'

Chief Operating Officer Craig Walker said GPC and CQU share a geographical footprint in Rockhampton, Bundaberg and Gladstone and are key contributors to the community, with combined expertise.

'Connecting industry with a research and education partner means that young people from Central Queensland don't need to leave the region to study, especially when we have excellent facilities," he said.

"The secondment of our environmental specialist Megan is an ideal collaboration between GPC and CQU's CMERC research team to identify and address challenges.

"This would not be possible without a strong relationship between our organisations that has been built on a willingness for excellence in this region."

"Our common goal is ensuring sustainable and healthy Port operations through economic, environmental and social research that's focussed on delivering practical solutions.'

The research aligns with the partnership's

strategy of taking a holistic view beyond purely environmental research and connecting it with other aspects of GPC's business and CQU's economics and social science research.

The research partnership follows after CQUniversity and GPC signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) last June, to work together in becoming world leaders in port research and operations.

Brussels sprouts get tasty

As a child my father grew brussels sprouts to supplement our sheep feed during winter.

Mum would make us pick some of the bigger ones to boil to mush to supplement the human's diet.

Nobody got sick from mums cooking but there were no requests for recipes to go into the local CWA cookbook or prizes at the local show.

But this vegetable has come into its own given the right treatment!

Picked young and green they are a delicious base for this meal.

Ingredients:

- Olive oil
- 1 x onion diced
- Chilli (optional to taste)
- 2 cloves garlic
- 4 rashers of bacon thinly sliced
- 250g Brussels Sprouts ends trimmed and quartered
- 1/4 cup white wine or chicken stock
- Salt and pepper
- Parmesan cheese grated to serve.

Method:

 Cook onions, garlic and chilli in olive oil until soft. Add bacon and brussels sprouts, fry for a couple of minutes then add the wine/stock. Reduce liquid. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Serve with gnocchi, pasta, noodles and top with parmesan.

Being that lemons are available in abundance right now, I thought a tasty Lemon Jelly Slice would be the perfect recipe of the

It's easy. It's yummy. So let's cook!

Lemon Jelly Slice

Ingredients: Base

- ¼ cup Sugar
- 1.5 cups Self Raising Flour
- ½ cup melted Butter
- 1 Egg, lightly beaten



Mmm Tasty!!

Topping

- ½ cup Sugar
- 3 heaped tablespoons Custard Powder
- ¾ cup Lemon Juice
- 1 cup Water

Method:

- Base
 Preheat oven to 175°
- Grease and line a slice tin.
- Place dry ingredients into a bowl. Mix in beaten egg and melted butter until it comes together.
 Add a little more melted butter if it's too dry.
- Press mixture into prepared tin.
- Bake for 15-20 minutes, or until lightly brown.

Topping

- Whisk all ingredients together in a medium size saucepan.
- Place over medium/high heat.
- Stir constantly until it boils and thickens.
- Pour over the base while both are still hot.
- Leave to cool. Cut into squares and store in the fridge.

Tips & Tricks:

- I like to add ½ cup of coconut into the base dry ingredients before mixing the butter and egg in.
- Grate lemon zest into the base to boost the lemon flavour.
- You can use any combination of lemon juice, lime juice or passionfruit pulp in the topping. Just passionfruit pulp on its own is delicious as well.

Providing opportunities

EQIP (Education Queensland Industry Partnership) is a world-class non-profit initiative, providing a central point of contact to facilitate the collaboration between Education Queensland, local community organisations, business and industry to provide alternative education opportunities and career pathways for students in the Gladstone Region.

EQIP's objectives are to:

- Provide opportunities for students to develop skills and knowledge for entry into the workforce
- Connect work-ready young people with the community and prospective employers
- Engage industry and education to ensure training aligns with industry expectations and employment needs
- Seek, promote and sustain partnerships with employers and service providers

EQIP's small team of four staff (Nicole Allison, Melanie Kent-Ford, Jessica Driessen and Linda Vale) work to these objectives by facilitating seven Authentic Workplace Learning Programs, Work Experience, and coordinating the Gladstone Careers Expo.

Throughout 2021, EQIP coordinated seven VET programs designed to provide pathways into a wide variety of industries, including civil construction, engineering manufacturing, process plant operations, automotive mechanical, building construction, hospitality, tourism, health and business support services.

These programs included:

- EQIP Health Support Services (EHSS)
- EQIP Business, Industry and Tourism Skills Centre (EBITS) onsite at Boyne Smelters Limited.
- EQIP Engineering Skills Centre (EESC) onsite training at NRG Gladstone Power Station.
- PREQIP Year 10 Indigenous program providing individualised career development and case management.
- EQIP Process Plant Operations (EPMA) onsite training with Queensland Alumina Limited.
- EQIP Technical College Gladstone Region (ETCGR) onsite training at local small to medium businesses.
- EQIP Doorways to Civil Construction (ED2CC) onsite training at McCosker Contracting.

In 2021, a total of 245 students from Toolooa, Gladstone and Tannum Sands State High Schools completed vocational qualifications and developed work-ready skills in an authentic workplace environment (14 classes across seven programs).

ers Limited, McCosker Contracting and CQUniversity continued to host four of these programs in specialised onsite learning facilities.

A simulated Health Hub was also set up in the Gladstone State High School Trades Training Centre to deliver EQIP's Health Support Services program.

In addition to these training facilities, host employers provided students with structured workplace learning aligned to their vocational studies and career pathways.

EQIP has been guided by the cumulative knowledge of our five Advisory Committees.

These committees are made up of school, business, and industry representatives; these committees meet quarterly to discuss insights into education and industry and emerging trends.

Along with EQIP board members, our advisory committees help shape programs design and delivery to ensure students receive relevant skill development aligned to local needs.

EQIP facilitates Work Experience on behalf of nine schools within the region (including Education Queensland and private schools).

EQIP has seen strong participation from all schools, host employers and students, and as of November 2021 - EQIP had organised 1114 work experience placements for the year.

Through work experience, 285 host employers provided 845 Year 8-12 students an opportunity to learn about occupations and industry, develop skills and experience, and observe people at work and the work they do.

Of these students, 241 were enrolled in Structured Work Placement, completing one day per week or fortnight throughout the year and 93 of these were part of an EQIP Program.

In 2021, two workshops were also provided to students – including a Fusion Welding workshop in partnership with Weld Australia, CQ Manufacturing Hubs and the Department of Small Business and Training; and an Innov8ors entrepreneurship boot camp in partnership with Startup Gladstone.

On Wednesday, 12 May 2021, EQIP Coordinated the annual Gladstone Careers Expo in partnership with CQUniversity Gladstone and Gladstone Regional Council.

The event was a massive success, with 44 exhibiting stalls present on the day from

business, industry, government, training providers, universities and community services.

Over 950 students visited the expo from over 12 schools, including those outside the region.

It was great to see the return of this event after its cancellation due to Covid last year.

EQIP thanks the members of its Management Committee, Advisory Committees, Sponsors, Program and Work Experience partners who have supported the development of students, programs and opportunities.

We would also like to acknowledge the hard work of Program Coordinators, Senior Schooling teams and community members.

Through collaboration, shared objectives, and a desire to support student outcomes, EQIP continues to operate successfully for the benefit of our young people and the next-generation workforce.

We congratulate all of our graduating students on your successes this year and wish you the very best of luck as you move onto a new and exciting chapter in your lives.

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Varied careers in Health

This year saw the re-commencement of EQ-IP's Health Program, thanks to a partnership with Registered Training Organisation Bluestone Medical and Professional.

The program welcomed 15 students from years 10-12 at Gladstone and Toolooa State High Schools for this year's program.

Students joined the program with varied career interests from nursing and midwifery, occupational therapy, massage, aged care, phycology and pharmacy, to social and community work.

A simulated Health Hub was set up in the Gladstone State High School's Trades Training Centre for this year's program, aligning with EQIP's model for providing Authentic Workplace Learning.

In addition to beds and equipment provided by Bluestone, EQIP received grant sponsorship from Wiggins Island Coal Export Terminal (WICET) which allowed for the purchase of additional items to increase the authenticity of the space – this included anatomical models, a defibrillator trainer, germ kit, and life-sized mannequin the students named 'Penelope'.

Students completed 12 units of competency as part of a Certificate II in Health Support Services each Tuesday over three terms, with Bluestone trainer Lorraine.

These included units in communication, food preparation, infection prevention, workplace health and safety, legal/ethical work practices, patient transportation, bed preparation and manual handling. Students also received their First Aid qualification.

There is still a large shortage of healthrelated work experience opportunities available in the region, particularly with Covid

restrictions still in place, though some students were able to secure placement, including: Tage Bergstrom - Boyne Tannum Occupational Therapy, Khiya Moore - Roseberry Dignity Hub and Jake Beling with the GRC Community Engagement Centre.

The graduation for the program was held on 10 August 2021 with High Attendance Awards being presented to Ashlei Biancucci, Kaitlyn Elsdon, Joyce Abrea, Tage Bergstrom and Emma Inman. The student of the Year finalists were Tage Bergstrom, Taurie Aldwell and Joyce Abrea with the award going to Tage from Toolooa State High School Student.

The 2022 program is in process of being finalised, with enrolment expected from students across Gladstone, Toolooa, Calliope and Mount Larcom Schools.

Learning in 'workplace'

Established in 2006, the EQIP Business, Industry and Tourism Skills Centre (EBITS) offers the opportunity for Year 10, 11 and 12 students to learn in an authentic workplace environment.

Students complete their certificate courses onsite at Boyne Smelters Ltd (BSL) for one full day per week with exposure to industry mentors, activities and tasks.

This assists youth in transitioning into careers or further education and/or training by providing real work learning opportunities.

EBITS prepares students for further learning, assists with expanding career choices and equips them with well-developed employability skills.

The longevity of the program (16 years and over 600 students) is a testament to the relationship between BSL, EQIP and Tannum Sands State High School.

While students often go into further study, networking has also seen many embark on traineeships, apprenticeships and other employment options within the industry

In 2021, a total of 46 students received qualifications of Certificate II in Business, Certificate III in Business, Certificate III in Business, Certificate II in Tourism or Certificate II in Active Volunteering. As a team, there were also over 750 hours of volunteering achieved, encouraging ongoing community involvement and networking. Students would agree that the opportunities offered to them are endless.

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End of a powerful era

2021 is the end of an era, concluding a 19year collaboration with NRG Power Station for students of EQIP's Engineering Skills Centre

The program has recruited up to 30 new students annually for a two-year program, with 20 Year 12 students recently finishing their time with the program at their graduation event on Thursday, 11 November.

A further seven students left the program earlier this year to commence an apprenticeship and more than half of those graduating have accepted apprenticeship offers so far.

10 students received 100% attendance awards at the graduation, with EQIP student awards being presented to Saxon Smith, Lainey Goss and Jake Devine.

Skills Centre students study a Certificate II in Engineering Pathways in an authentic industrial work environment with access to industry-standard manufacturing equipment including milling machines, lathes, guillotines, oxy-acetylene and welders.

The students were under the guidance of CQUniversity Trainers – Paul Higgins and Alan Pead, and EQIP program supervisor

Melanie Kent-Ford. In addition to the 12 units of competency, students completed additional pledge work for NRG, and various individual projects from concept, design and production.

Each student has rotated fortnightly spending a day each fortnight at the Skills Centre, and the alternate day is structured workplace learning in a vocation aligned to their career interests. Students have also completed Career Development Training, been involved in many after-hours volunteer events and completed mock interviews with industry representatives.

EQIP Congratulates our 2021 Skills Centre Graduates and wishes them the best of luck on their exciting new challenges as our region's next apprentices.

Students peruse career options in personalised way

PREQIP is an individualised Career Development and Case Management model for Year 10 Indigenous students to investigate potential career opportunities in the region.

Students undergo a personal evaluation report and career investigation (information, opportunities and pathways) in their school SET plan.

As part of the program, students are offered training, mentoring, work experience and other opportunities to align with their chosen career pathway to a university course, apprenticeship, traineeship or full-time employment.

The program saw a record number of students participate during 2021, with 42 Year 10 students from Gladstone State High School, Toolooa State High School and Tannum Sands State High School.

Better equipped: Tips for getting job ready

EQIP Gladstone has seen its busiest year yet in terms of work experience with a record-breaking number of students going out into the workforce to experience a career/vocation that interests them.

So far in 2021, EQIP has facilitated more than 1100 work experience placements for students in the Gladstone region.

This includes more than 850 students across the 9 different high schools in the Gladstone region. These students are afforded an opportunity to learn about occupations and industry, develop workplace skills and experience as well as receive valuable connections and references for when it comes time to apply for employment.

The success of the work experience program is reliant on the overwhelming support it receives from local businesses and industry in Gladstone.

EQIP has seen more than 290 host employers in the region actively taking students on board this year in a variety of different occupations.

Now that we are coming to the end of the year many of these students are starting apprenticeships, traineeships or other employment, sometimes with their own work experience hosts.

It's wonderful to see how the students do in their placement, what they learn from it and where it takes them.

The feedback we receive from their supervisors or colleagues is one of the

most rewarding parts of the program. We encourage students who are unsure of what they want to do or who want to know more about their potential career choice to apply for work experience throughout the year.

Completing relevant work experience and related certificates

Students are able to complete up to 30 days of work experience per calendar year and there are many benefits for students who complete work experience, including:

- Learn more about a specific industry and occupation
- Explore potential career pathways
- Develop and demonstrate technical and behavioural skills and knowledge
- Extend the theoretical learnings from school/VET qualification into practical applications in the workplace
- Prepare for the demands and expecta-

tions of the working world.

Getting Job Ready

It is important to be involved in and include extra-curricular activities on a resume.

This can include sporting activities, after school activities, volunteering regularly for a group or adhoc volunteering at on off events. For recent school leavers with limited work experience, extra-curricular activities can demonstrate important transferable skills that are highly valuable in the work place. They also illustrate an individual's ability to manage their time and often show a well-developed soft skill set in regard to leadership, training, community. Being involved in the community demonstrates that you care about the community, you have great work ethic and that you aren't just motivated by money.

Your Resume should catch the readers' attention (ie. recruiter or hiring manager) within the first 2.5 to 6 seconds. The Career Summary/Overview is the most important part of your resume – enabling you to provide a summary of your background, qualification/s and skills that you can bring to the job; and needs to be tailored by using key words / phrases for each job that you are applying for.

Work Experience and Employment History should have details of the name of employers/work experience hosts, position titles, dates, duties/responsibilities and any achievements. List your employment in descending chronological order (ie. with your most current employment first).

Make sure your resume uses consistent language and style throughout the document (ie. use present and past tense respectively for current and past employment); and use bullet points to list your duties or responsibilities.

Keep it Short – your resume should be no longer than two pages.

Your cover letter should be engaging – you want to capture the interest of the person reading it so that they turn to your resume to find out more.

It's also about showing the employer how your skills and experience are a good match for the role. That's why you should always create a cover letter especially for the role you're applying for – it shouldn't be a generic letter. Use your cover letter to show how your skills and experience relate to the Key Selection Criteria of the advertised position.

Rather than writing 'To whom it may concern' or 'Dear Sir or Madam', find out who to address your letter to; you could phone the company to ask. It's more personal that way and shows you've taken initiative.

Triple check your spelling and grammar. Try printing your letter out then coming back to it fresh, or get someone with a keen eye to look over it for you.

Keep your letter to around 250-350 words on a single page.



Alternative pathways

The EQIP Technical College is located in Boles street and provides a two-year alternative education program for Year 11-12 students who enrol through Gladstone State High School.

Students study an individual pathway identified for opportunities for employment in the region - from hands-on trade pathways, traineeships, or full-time employment across a variety of sectors.

Students also have the opportunity to complete a school-based traineeship.

In Year 11, students study Math Essentials, Essential English, Certificate II Business (moving to Certificate II Work Skills for 2022) and Certificate II Skills for Work and Vocational Pathways.

Students have been off-site two days each week engaging a CQUniversity funded TAFE course one-day-per-week, as well as up to 30 days of associated work experience one-day-per-week in a small to medium local business.

In Year 12 students continue their Math and English studies, as well as Social and Community Studies, a Certificate II in Information Digital Media Technology (IDMT) and their one-day-per-week work placement.

There is 17 Year 12 students graduating from the College this year, with another two Year 11 students finishing their apprenticeships.

These students have pursued varied pathways in Engineering, Tourism, Aged Care, Construction, Warehousing, Real Estate and Automotive.







Shady characters

One of the biggest problems encountered by owners of established gardens is finding plants that will tolerate shade from the canopy of the established taller trees and shrubs. In many cases, gardeners are left in a quandary as to what they could plant in this position.

Recently I visited the Mackay Botanic Gardens and one of the Garden's features is the Tropical Shade Garden.

This is a helpful feature for Mackay Regional gardeners especially those gardeners looking for inspiration for the own garden projects.

It can be very helpful to view a plant species in actual shade location. So many times these same plants will very different in plant books. Another feature of the Mackay Botanic Gardens is the labelling of all the plant species growing within the gardens.

So if you are that position and need some very attractive shade tolerant plant? There are a number of very hardy shade tolerant plants that can be grown with a minimum of effort, and will give either attractive flower or foliage colour at some time during the year. The following are some plant varieties that are worth

Artanema Fimbriatum or Koala Bells is an herbaceous perennial with a much-branched habit with bright blue flowers over a long period, from Spring to Autumn. It is quick growing plant has a semi-weeping habit in shade, but tends to be more upright in sun and grows to about 20 to 40cm in height.

This hardy Australian native thrives in humid to sub-humid conditions and is able to withstand water shortages either in the ground or in pots. It is suitable as a pot plant or in a hanging basket and is also recommended as a bedding, rockery or patio plant.

Austromyrtus dulcis or The Midgen Berry is a low spreading shrub with beautiful dark green evergreen leaves and striking copper

coloured new growth. It hardy in most soils in sun or shade positions and is suitable for semi-exposed seaside plantings. White tea tree like flowers are usually produced in clusters of two to five flowers. The Midgen Berry is bush tucker plant produces sweet edible berries that look like tiny speckled eggs in late Summer and Autumn.

Melicope rubra or Little Euodia is not well known by local gardeners but those how have one growing always boast about the attractive flowers. It is a small shrub growing to around 2m high and prefers moist, well-drained sunny

situations. Melicope rubra produces clusters of pink and white flowers along the branches in spring followed by large green capsules.

Melastoma malabathricum or Native Lasiandra is a medium shrub 2m x 2m with large, fleshy rough textured green leaves. Large purplish mauve open petalled flowers appear during summer and autumn. Melastoma malabathricum is a bushy shrub and is suited to loam or clay soils, growing in full sun to part shade for ideal growth.

Pavetta australiensis or Butterfly Bush is a

glossy foliaged understory shrub. Clusters of perfumed white flowers will give a spectacular show from July to November followed by rounded black fruit. The flowers will attract Butterflies and Honey eating birds. Pavetta australiensis is a useful screen plant growing to 3m and drought tolerant but frost tender.

Phaleria clerodendron or Scented Daphne is a bushy tall shrub to small tree. The feature of this tree is the flowers and large red fruit are born along the branches and stems. During the warm months of the year Phaleria lights up with masses of fragrant white flowers the scent of which permeates through the garden. The large red fruit will attract a variety of birds to the garden including Cassowary's if you lived in far north Queensland. The flesh of the fruit is stringy and reputed to be poisonous to humans.

Plumbago zeylanica or Native Plumbago is a hardy evergreen, scrambling shade loving plant that will grow up to 1m high. Small white to pale mauve very slightly scented, phlox-like flowers will occur almost all year round. Plumbago zeylanica prefers a welldrained position and is suitable for shaded coastal positions but in frost tender. Prune lightly after flowering to promote strong new growth, otherwise it may become woody.

Syzygium wilsonii is an attractive spreading shrub 1.5 - 2m x 1.5m with broad leaves and deep pink new growth. Beautiful deep crimson 10cm pom-pom type flowers are borne during spring, followed by white fruit. It grows well in light or heavy shade in a well-watered position and is very attractive to honeyeaters.

The Mackay Botanic Gardens was designed by Laurie Smith one of the country's best Landscape Architects. Laurie has designed a number of Botanic Gardens across the country including the Gladstone's Tondoon Botanic Gardens, Longreach Botanic Gardens and the Roma Street Parklands.

Optics not ethics

It might seem ironic to some that banks these days have a set of principles they hold potential customers to when deciding whether or not to lend to them – or even to keep them as

These 'Environment, Social, and Governance' (ESG) standards cover areas that include environmental sustainability, affordable housing, and financial well-being.

Recently, ANZ published their ESG Supplement for 2021, which includes a set of animal welfare principles.

ANZ formed these principles with almost no engagement with the livestock industry or any of Australia's state farming bodies, including AgForce, instead choosing to seek input from Animals Australia (AA) and RSPCA.

AgForce has previously publicly supported a position of "zero tolerance for animal cruelty in Australian agriculture."

In fact, this country's animal welfare standards are one of the main reasons we produce food and fibre often considered the envy of the

There are regulations at a Federal and State level, and AgForce has its own animal welfare policy, aligned to these and to the National Farmers' Federation's policy, which we helped

What ANZ's ESG Supplement seeks to do, however, is not only see that these welfare standards are adhered to, but that customers "exceed" them - without any further explanation as to where exceed starts and ends.

The ESG also states that ANZ "received over 2,000 emails in 2020 and 2021 supporting AA's position, all of which we responded to explaining our work to consider the issues and offering discussion with the complain-

Which seems to indicate that ANZ is prepared to appoint themselves judge, jury, and even executioner on nothing more than hearsay from animal activists when it comes to deciding whether or not to financially support a farmer's business.

Surely though, if there is an animal welfare issue, then it is government's place to investigate and take action – not a bank's



The next generation is coming and they'll lead the way in Rockhampton and in Central Queensland.

The sport is alive and well and for a sport to stand up and survive the tough times that basketball has faced in the last couple of years that's terrific to hear.

We saw it in the NFL with Aaron Rodgers and everything going on there and how big of a fuss has been made about it.

And so it should be. It has already made a bigger problem over there because he caught Covid and wasn't vaccinated.

So imagine if that happens in the NRL. There will be absolute shambles and we don't need that.


We need it to move smoothly.

This **ALLSTARS** fishing column we talk about arguably the most sort after reef species to be found on the East coast of Queensland... the mighty Red Emperor.

Red Fever fishing frenzy

A red-hot bite on the Reds can see grown men sweat profusely, shake at the knees, and giggle like a young schoolgirl.

It is a well-known condition called Red Fever. After all we are talking about the pinnacle of reef species due to their incredible fighting capabilities and their amazing eating quality.

These fish have an unmistakable fighting pattern that sees them shaking their head profusely at the same time as they are pulling like a freight train.

The Red lets an experienced angler know right from hookup they've hooked a Red. In addition, these fish don't give up easily, because they will give it to the angler all the way to the surface.

This is probably part due to the fact they don't suffer too badly from barro trauma. If you watch a Red coming up, you see a trail of bubbles as they vent the built-up gas. So, this means that catch and release is okay with this species.

However, the one fish shark love to prey on is Red Emperor. Many a tear has been shed over a shark's favourite snack. On the ALL-STARS social media we recently posted a few photos of sharked Reds that entrants had sent in prior. These posts caught the attention of our followers and it made a few of them cry in sympathy.


A couple of lads quick enough to beat the sharks and get their catch onto an ALLSTARS brag mat have been Richie O'Brien and Corey Bruton. Richie took out the 1st quarter with an 81cm (10.5kg) fish and Corey took out the second and third quarter with both fish 86cm (12.5kg) in length. Both Richie and Corey fish off Gladstone.

The best part for us as an online fishing competition is the quality of the promotional #fishbragwin photos these guys submit.

They have taken the time to take the photos while the fish is still kicking, used quality cam-




Anthony Goulding's great 77cm Red Emperor off Yeppoon.

eras, got the sunlight, and got the fish angles perfect.

Photos last a lifetime and it's great to have proof of your fishy tales, because in today's

world if you haven't got a photo it didn't happen. And for some other people if it's not on social media it doesn't count.

In accordance with Queensland Fisheries

rules, bag limits of 5 per person apply to Red Emperor with a minimum size of 55cm. Even though there is not a huge recovery rate on Reds due to their big head, this is a generous limit as a fish over 55 still has enough flesh to feed a small family.

So, if you're a novice and keen to catch a Red, pick your weather and head out to the reef areas into the 30 to 50-meter mark and look for gutters with steep faces, pinnacles and structure with red fern and weed. Find the bait balls associated to these areas and the Reds will show up on a quality sounder, often off the bottom.

It's just a matter of positioning your boat so your line hits the mark. An outfit with 50lb line or bigger is advisable. Dead cut baits like pilchards, squid, yakkas, and mackerel are just a few to name.

But, like anything, you need to basically experiment and don't be afraid to cut up bycatch like hussar and strip bait them as well. Fresh is best for Red Emperor, which is just how we like them on our dinner table.

Allow your bait to drift around the fish holding depth by having a decent leader length between your sinker and the bait and hopefully that elusive Red Emperor of a lifetime is there and ready to be attracted to your offering. From here it's all up to the angler and his or her ability to beat the sharks and deal with the dreaded Red Fever.

Seng's LBW took the score to 5/63 and led to a nervous walk for Steven Pugh who had to face the bowler's potential trifecta ball.

Pugh showed the straight bat of respect as he blocked the hattrick ball, leading to a sizable sigh around BITS Oval.

However, seven runs later Seng got his third wicket when Jacob Mills got caught swinging with Levitt taking the catch despite slipping in the process.

The score read 6/70 which brought Mat Fawdrey to the crease but he could only manage a five-run partnership with Pugh before the latter was dismissed by Cameron Howard who tore through the gate and bowled Pugh.
