Covid cases rise

Central Queensland residents are looking at the New Year with uncertainty as Covid-19 cases rise across the country.

As of Wednesday, 29 December at 11am, 14 new confirmed cases were recorded in Central Queensland, in addition to the 15 previously recorded over Christmas.

Nine cases have been confirmed in Rock-

hampton, three in Livingstone and two in Gladstone.

Gladstone MP Glenn Butcher advised residents could come into contact with Covid at 'anytime'.

"This is now a timely reminder; if you're thinking about getting vaccinated, then go and visit your local GP, chemist or our vaccination hub in the old TAFE site sooner rather than later." Mr Butcher said.

"Please use masks when out and about to limit the contact, especially when there are larger groups of people, use hand hygiene frequently and stay at home if you are unwell.

"All Central Queenslanders, no matter where you live, should be tested immediately if you have any Covid-19 symptoms, no matter how mild."

New exposure sites have also been identified following the increase of cases, in addition

to the seven identified last week.

Central Lane Hotel Bowling Alley and Suga XO were added to the list in addition to The Precinct, Gladstone Yacht Club, Auckland House and Big W which were identified as casual exposure sites on 20 December.

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Paradise restored

Farmers have breathed a huge sigh of relief, with the announcement Paradise Dam will be rebuilt to full capacity.

Queensland's Water Minister Glenn Butcher made the announcement in Bundaberg on Christmas Eve, with the relentless campaign to save Paradise Dam raging since September 2019, when the then Water Minister announced Sunwater would be releasing 100,000 megalitres, in order to lower the wall of the dam, due to safety concerns.

Early indications suggest construction will start in 2024, although further details on the rebuild timeline will be released in 2022.

For the last two years, the Queensland Government oversaw safety works at the dam and put together the Paradise Dam Options Evalu-

Mr Butcher and Bundaberg's MP did promise another form of infrastructure if the dam couldn't be rebuilt.

The Queensland Government promised an announcement about the dam's future would be made by the end of 2021.

From the start of this process we've said the solution must deliver water security and safety for the people of Bundaberg – this option delivers both," Mr Butcher said.

'We've heard from the Deputy Prime Minister and other Federal Government representatives that they're open to providing funding for

"We've been working with them collaboratively and will continue those discussions.

'This has been a real team effort, and I'd like to thank the local member for his strong advocacy on behalf of his constituents.'

Bundaberg Fruit & Vegetable Growers managing director Bree Grima said farmers are happy with this vital commitment.

They did push the boundary in terms of when they'd deliver that but they have come through," Ms Grima said.

"They have indicated the first shovels will be in the ground in 2024. 'We understand Government seem to work

at a much slower pace then the commercial

"We don't think it really needs to take that long but we're happy to keep working with

"We will keep the pressure on them to make sure they stick to the timeframe they have put

Michael McMahon, who operates a 250 hectare macadamia farm locally, welcomed the announcement, saying farmers are getting back the dam they originally had.

"It's very welcome, we've been chasing this for the last two years, looking for some certainty about our future ," Mr McMahon said.

"The challenge now is how we make it through the next six-seven years on the Minister's timeline from today, until the dam is

"It would've been devastating for Bundaberg if the alternative was to leave it where it is or take it down further.

"It wouldn't of been good for farmers or any other businesses or communities who rely on

"I don't know why it has to take two years to turn a sod of soil, it's hard to swallow.

"Hopefully they can work faster than that but it is Government, so who knows."

Ms Grima said the concern now shifts to the upgrading of existing water delivery infrastructure which complements the dam.

"What we're still concerned about is the fact that delivery infrastructure needs upgrading because it was originally built for cane farming," Ms Grima said.

"The high intensity horticulture sector puts a lot more pressure on that system.

"Even though we'll have water in the dam there'll still be a lot of regions and farmers that can't tap into that water, simply because Sunwater can't deliver it.

"At the moment much of the infrastructure is at capacity and we have to find ways to deliver more water to more farmers."

Bundaberg MP Tom Smith thanked the Bundaberg community for its patience.

"I know this has been a tough time for our community and the agricultural sector," he

"I'm really proud of how our community has come together to work with the Government to find a solution on this project.

"I can also confirm today that irrigators will not be asked to pay the cost of returning the dam wall to full height.

"These works, once underway, will be a significant undertaking that will also create hun-

dreds of jobs in our region.' Shadow Water Minister Deb Frecklington, says she cautiously welcomes the announcement, saying without the full details, it is difficult to know how or when the restoration will

"The devil will be in detail and we are yet to see how the restoration of Paradise Dam will be funded, or the timeframe," Ms Frecklington

"However, this is the right decision.

"The failure of Paradise Dam has been a complete debacle and it must be restored as soon as possible to help give our local primary producers certainty.

"The experts have always said that the dam could be restored to its full height, so it is good to see the Government have finally accepted this advice.

CQ covid numbers on rise

As the year comes to a close, Covid-19 cases have escalated within Central Queensland.

As of Wednesday, 29 December at 11pm, 14 new confirmed cases were recorded in Central Queensland in addition to the 15 previously recorded over Christmas.

The 14 cases have been identified as nine in Rockhampton, three in Livingstone, and two in Gladstone*.

Keppel MP Brittany Lauga advised that the exposure sites in Central Queensland have been updated to include nine new casual contact sites in addition to the seven that were identified last week.

"I understand that brings us to a total of 37 active cases in Central Queensland which are spread across Rockhampton, Gladstone, Livingstone, Central Highlands and Banana Shire," Ms Lauga said.

"I am advised that some patients are from outside Central Oueensland or have returned to quarantine at their home outside of the region, which affects the total number of active cases.

"This number will become more fluid as more cases are diagnosed, cases recover, and positive cases quarantine elsewhere."

Glenn Butcher advised Central Queenslander's that no matter where you live, you should be tested immediately if you have any Covid-19 symptoms, no matter how mild.

"This is now a timely reminder, if you're thinking about getting vaccinated then go and visit your local GP, chemist or our vaccination hub in the old TAFE site sooner rather than later," Mr Butcher said.

'Mask wearing is now critically important in shopping centres and businesses while you're out and about."

In a press conference held on Tuesday morning, Health Minister Dr Yvette D'Ath thanked Queenslanders for their patience.

Queensland can process over 60,000 tests per day, with 90 per cent of the test results being released within 44 hours," Minister D'Ath

"We have 123 Queensland Health testing sites that were operating yesterday [Monday], with some places having no wait times, such as in Central Queensland and Mackay.

"There are 230 private testing sites within Queensland that will be opening over the next couple of days.

"I can report that Queensland has 1158 new cases over the past 24 hours, which puts us at 4779 active cases with 257 Omicron cases.

"I am pleased to say that there are no people in ICU because of Covid; however, there are six people receiving care in hospital.

It was also announced on Tuesday that Day 5 testing has been lifted, freeing up testing clinic capacity for those who need it most.

"Like with all of our health measures in Queensland, we take a cautious and measured approach to protect our community, based off expert health advice," Minister D'Ath said.

"The primary goal of day 5 testing was to catch Covid-19 cases as early as possible in travellers from hotspots.

"Thankfully, we've seen very few positive Covid-19 test results from testing asymptomatic people. We sampled around 24,000 Day 5 tests and only 0.6 per cent were positive.

"It's for this reason we are confident in removing the requirement to have a Covid-19 test on Day 5 after arriving in Queensland."

In Central Queensland, there have been about 121,678 doses of vaccinations administered, with 86.11% of Queenslanders fully vac-

Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk announced in a press release on Monday that from 10 January 2022, children aged between 5 to 11 can book to receive their Covid jab.

"I want to make sure that Queenslander's get their boosters and see our children get their first dose before they go back to school,' Ms Palaszczuk said. "It is important that our children get vaccinated, although it is your choice the more, the better.

"I want to reassure Queenslander's that although we are seeing an increase in cases as we have expected, we are not seeing it impact our hospitals.

"I would also like to remind everyone of the importance of mask's especially in crowded places."

Gladstone resident Paulla Eveille-Coleman responded to the updated Covid rules in a Facebook post.

"I am happy to wear a mask and keep taking the precautions in place if it can help stop more cases in our town," she said.

"We have to look after each other and see the big picture whether you are anti or pro-vax.

"It's about keeping each other safe in our

An urgent rescue call (November 4)

The rescue services provide the fastest and most efficient means of rapid deployment of medical and rescue teams to major accidents, incidents, inter-hospital transfers, counter disaster and search and rescue missions across Central Queensland.

RACQ Cap Rescue community engagement officer Kim Moss said it was crucial for the organization to receive support as it was not fully government-funded.

Vax crunch time (November 18)

Gladstone business owners have shared their biggest concerns regarding Queensland Health's new Covid-19 vaccine restrictions, with staff abuse one of the major fears.

Last Tuesday, Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk revealed the limits that will be put on Queenslanders who have not been vaccinated against COVID-19 by mid-next month.

The measures will take effect from December 17, or once the state reaches 80 per cent of the Queensland population 16 years and over being fully vaccinated.

As Gladstone lags behind the State average for the first Covid-19 dose administrations, Dicey's Irish Pub Restaurant venue manager Johannes Noordermeer hoped enforcing the new restrictions would not be hospitality staff's responsibility.

Blair Athol sold ahead

Cargoes from TerraCom's Blair Athol (BA) thermal coal mine near Clermont have been fully sold out to mid-May 2022.

In a pre-Christmas ASX statement, the company said that:

"The Company recently finalised a sale of four cargoes in the period March to June 2022 with its main Japanese off-take partner. The total tonnes to be delivered by BA under this agreement is approximately 320,000 metric tonnes, with the globalCOAL Newcastle Index used as the basis for an agreed pricing formula."

Blair Athol's coal is shipped primarily to the Japanese and South Korean energy markets and to the Indian sponge iron market.

The company is going through an upswing after muddling through a difficult early 2021. On March 1, its share price crashed after the release its half-year results for the period ending December 31, 2020.

In late March, its Blair Athol mine was raided by the Australian Securities and Investment Commission over possible corruption in the company's coal testing procedures. The investigation is ongoing.

Since then, the company's position has improved, propelled by healthy sales, a refinance program and surging thermal coal prices.

Its stock has reflected the brighter outlook, moving from a low of 8 cents a share in March to hover at roughly 18 cents a share as of December 24.

Police praise safe drivers and gift risk-takers fines

Police are thanking the majority of Queenslanders who drove safely over the Christmas break with no loss of life on the state's roads and urge all motorists to make safe decisions while behind the wheel for the remainder of the holidays.

Across the state, police have been out on the road cracking down on dangerous driving as part of Operation Tango Mistletoe.

Between December 23 and December 27, police detected more than 1,855 driving offences across Queensland.

During the same period, more than 1,028 on-the-spot fines were issued for speeding, 19 for using mobile phones while driving and 45 for not wearing a seatbelt.

Police also detected 129 drink drivers and 44 drivers driving under the influence of drugs.

No lives were lost on Queensland roads this Christmas period, compared to five during the same time last year, however a man remains in a critical condition after a crash in the state's Far North on Christmas Day.

Over the long weekend, police recorded 74 injury-related crashes resulting in 89 injured people compared to 187 people who were injured across the same period last year.

Acting Chief Superintendent Ray Rohweder thanked motorists for driving safely across the break.

"Thanks to those good decisions made on our roads, families across Queensland were able to spend quality time with those they love.

"While the majority of motorists obeyed the rules, highway patrol officers taking part in Mistletoe continued to detect dangerous drivers on our roads.

"I make no apologies for our ongoing enforcement of the road rules, because they are in place for a reason and that reason is to keep people safe," Acting Chief Superintendent Rohweder said.

"The reality is, dangerous behaviour on the road leads to damaged vehicles, life-long injuries and loss of life."



Acting Chief Superintendent Rohweder said while there were no fatal crashes in Queensland over the Christmas long weekend, now was not the time to get complacent.

"We want motorists to keep making good decisions on our roads," he said.

"No one wants to get a visit from our officers delivering the news that a loved one has been seriously injured or had died because of a crash, especially at this time of year.

"More than 74 crashes causing injuries, in just a few days, is far too many. The lives of those injured individuals may never be the same.

"Queensland police will continue our highvolume efforts to enforce road safety compliance for the rest of the school holidays, so expect to see us anytime, anywhere."

Surfs up, and remember beach safety is no accident

Coastal drowning deaths are 2.4 times more likely to occur on a long weekend, prompting surf lifesavers to remind families visiting the coastline over the holidays to stay safe by finding a patrolled beach and staying between the red and yellow flags.

Boxing Day is traditionally one of the busiest days on Australian beaches, with volunteer surf lifesavers preparing for visitations to swell.

With statistics showing that coastal drowning deaths are 2.3 times more likely to occur on a public holiday and 2.4 times on a long weekend, surf lifesavers are reminding beach goers not to be deterred by busy patrolled beaches.

Surf Life Saving Australia General Manager Coastal Safety, Shane Daw, said while people continue to take social distancing measures seriously and avoid crowds, it's not an excuse for not swimming at a patrolled location.

"We have more than 314 patrolled beaches across the country and people can easily download the BeachSafe APP or visit www. beachsafe.org.au to find their nearest red and yellow flags," said Mr Daw.

Last summer there were 136 coastal drowning deaths, with males accounting for 90% of all drowning deaths.

There was an additional 105 coastal fatalities meaning 241 lives were lost on the Australian coast for 2020-21.

"It's important that if you're visiting the beach to swim between the flags, look out for your mates, and not take unnecessary



Swim between the flags, look out for your mates and don't take unnecessary risks.

risks," he said.

"Over half of all coastal drowning deaths, last year occurred more than 5km from a patrolled location, with 27% occurring less than 1km from a patrolled beach.

"We know alcohol and drugs contributed to 1 in 5 coastal drowning deaths in the last 10 years (18%). When it comes to being in,

on and around water, the simple message is don't mix it with alcohol and drugs."

Mr Daw also took the opportunity to remind Australians of the importance of wearing life jackets when boating, rock fishing and using recreational watercraft (kayaks, PWC etc).

"For those boating, rock fishing and on

watercraft the message is simple – please wear a lifejacket – it could save your life," Mr Daw said.

Shorebirds of a feather flock together

Gladstone and Japan's Saiki City celebrated their 25th anniversary in 2021 with the hope that exchanges between the two cities will resume

To commemorate this milestone, three stainless steel shorebird artworks have been installed at the entrance of Gladstone Regional Council's Civic Centre at 101 Goondoon Street.

The three stainless steel bird shapes created by Margaret Worthington and Clive Rouse represent three shorebird species that are seen in the Gladstone Harbour - a Bar-tailed Godwit, Far Eastern Curlew and Grey-tailed Tattler – and can be identified by their beak shape in this contemporary work.

During our summer upwards of two million shorebirds arrive in Australia from the northern hemisphere where they breed. The birds start to arrive from late August onwards and can frequently be seen feeding in the coastal, tidal areas of Gladstone Harbour.

Shorebirds are used to symbolise how people of Australia and Japan are connected by this amazing migration.

According to the collaboration of Queensland Wader Study Group with Fudan University (China), recent satellite tracking shows a flight path connection between Queensland, Australia and Kyushu, Japan. The tracking shows the birds flying 7000km nonstop in six days to make landfall in Japan, before spending time in South Korea and then the breeding grounds of Alaska, an incredible 13,000km journey!

Gladstone Saiki Sister City Advisory Committee president Wendy Marsh said the Shorebird Artwork Project celebrates the sister city relationship, promotes dialogue and enhances

awareness of the meaningful relationship to the residents of Gladstone.

"It enriches the cultural life of the community and showcases this amazing migration story of our region to help protect the shorebirds for years to come," Mrs Marsh said.

"The artwork demonstrates that if these little birds can make the journey from the Gladstone Region to Japan, then we also will be able to once again meet in person."

What's in a wonderful life

A tradition our family has adopted for the past decade or so is watching the movie It's a Wonderful Life on Christmas Eve. The kids complain about its over two-hour length but it's at least a time where we put the iPads and phones away and spend time together.

I suppose I should put a spoiler alert here, but for a movie that celebrated its 75th anniversary this year, the statute of limitations has probably expired on that.

The movie's themes of redemption, gratitude and love are timeless. The movie takes inspiration from the Dickens' classic A Christmas Carol where the ghosts of Christmases past, present and future present different versions of the world to teach Ebenezer Scrooge moral lessons.

The Scrooge figure in It's a Wonderful Life is Henry Potter the owner of the biggest bank and most of the property in the town of Bedford Falls. He charges high rents that keep many in a cycle of poverty.

Countering his hyper-capitalist strategy is the Bailey's family Building and Loan, that provides affordable lending for people to own their own home.

When the Bailey father suddenly dies, George Bailey, his son, is forced to give up his dreams of travelling the world and becoming an architect to run the small family business. Despite some resentment of being confined to a small country town, George makes a success of his life, marrying his high school sweetheart and having four children. Or at least he does until an error from his assistant sees the bank facing bankruptcy and possible criminal charges.

Facing ruin George spends Christmas Eve on a bridge contemplating jumping until his Guardian Angel intervenes and shows George what the world would be like if he never lived.

The movie is still watched by millions every Christmas because of the contrast between the world of Bedford Falls and that of Pottersville. Pottersville is what the town is renamed when George Bailey is not there to check the malign intentions of Henry Potter.

The town's main street of family businesses is converted to speak-easies and dancing girl

And George's friends are consigned to live

in the slums of "Potter's Field", a reference to the land Israel's Chief Priests bought when Judas threw his 30 pieces of silver into the temple. Frank Capra, the movie's producer, said that he made it to combat the growing trend towards atheism.

Without George, the Building and Loan would have gone bust during the bank runs of the Great Depression. George saves the day with an impassioned speech to the desperate people who want to withdraw their money

that "your money is not here, it's in Joe's house, the Kennedy house, Mrs Mecklin's house and a

After seeing how many lives his own life touches George declares he wants to live again even if that means personal ruin. His angel returns him to Bedford Falls where he finds that his wife has organised his friends to donate money to save the Building and Loan after all.

The key lesson for us remains the same as it did 75 years ago at the end of World War II. Will we live in a world that supports small, family businesses over large corporate interests? Will we support families and community over rampant individual lust and greed?

And most importantly, the choice between Bedford Falls and Pottersville is determined more by the actions of each of us as individuals rather than distant organisations or governments alone. The new year always offers us the choice and our traditions are so important to remind us of it.

What products should I sell: Part 1, costing products

We've had several questions over the last week about starting online businesses, and how to select products to sell, so we want to spend some time on this topic.

The best place to start is generally figuring out what product you will be selling and how much it will cost to make it. For small start-ups, this will always fall into one of two categories:

- Products you have designed and manufactured or had manufactured yourself.
- Products you buy wholesale and resell.

This is a big topic, so this week we will talk about costing products you have designed yourself, next time we'll talk about products you buy and resell.

There are many exceptions, but this first category often involves products with something of an artistic element. The people who make and sell these items often regard themselves as artists or creative people. Some of the businesses that we have worked within this category include businesses that make unique floral arrangements, businesses that make cakes, businesses that make sculptures, businesses that design and sell t-shirts and even a business that makes 'African Donuts'. The only limits are your imagination and your ability to make what you imagine.

You need to ask, can I actually make it myself? If you can, fantastic. You can then move on to calculating how much it costs to make

which will mean shipping or postage costs from the supplier to you. If you can't make the product yourself, you need to identify who can manufacture your product and reach out to several manufacturers to find out how much it will cost to produce your product. There are several things to be aware of here. The first is protecting your intellectual property. Suppose

you have come up with a truly unique prod-

uct; you need to seek out professional legal

advice. This will cost money, but there is no

getting around this. You also need to be aware of minimum orders. If you must order many units, you are increasing your risk significantly because you may end up with a lot of money tied up in products you don't know if you can sell.

sidering include the cost of the raw materials plus the cost of obtaining the raw materials,

The simplest solution is to keep looking for someone who will manufacture a small run of products at a low cost so you can obtain a commercial proof of concept.

The third thing to be aware of is shipping costs again. When you are working out how much it costs to have your product manufactured, vou need to make sure your unit cost includes the cost of having the units shipped to you. This will be as simple as dividing the total shipping cost by the number of units and then adding that number onto the unit cost for each unit.


I'm not a huge fan of 'resolutions' that have

Northern Australia universities launch new alliance

Under the newly signed MoU, Charles Darwin University (CDU), Central Queensland University (CQUniversity) and James Cook University (JCU) will partner on projects that support the social, environmental and economic development of Northern Australia.

The three universities will seek joint funding opportunities, share knowledge, deliver integrated education and training courses, and work on research projects that benefit agriculture, regional health, water security, renewable energy, and indigenous leadership outcomes in the north.

CDU Vice-Chancellor Professor Scott Bowman said the partnership between the three universities would explore and progress strategic opportunities to benefit Northern Australia significantly.

"We know that there is real benefit in working together with other universities in the north to deliver positive impact for Northern Australian communities," Professor Bowman said.

"By creating a collaborative alliance, we can achieve our vision of being Australia's most connected University and making a difference in communities in the Northern Territory and Australia's north."

As a part of the NAUA, a Northern Australian workforce strategy will be developed to address labour market needs across the north in health, social services, education, agriculture, mining, renewable energy, the environment, disaster resilience, tourism, and digital capabilities.

JCU Vice-Chancellor Professor Sandra Harding said the new alliance would harness the collective knowledge of all three universities to benefit Northern Australia into the future.

"Our aspiration is to grow and deploy our collective strengths, expertise and presence to develop and retain the skills and capabilities of industry and community across Northern Australia," Professor Harding said.

"Being based in the north, all three universities share both the context and operating challenges that are unique to Northern

Australia to deliver for these communities for years to come."

CQUniversity Vice-Chancellor Professor Nick Klomp said the partnership was a strong example of institutions working together for the future of Northern Australia. "Northern Australia possesses agricultural, mineral, cultural and environmental riches that are the envy of the rest of the country," Professor Klomp said.

"It's time that we put our combined academic and research expertise behind North-

ern Australia to really supercharge its potential for growth and development.

This Sticky Onion and Cheese pizza pull apart is perfect for an afternoon in watching the football or a movie on television or just to use up the onions in the cupboard or the garlic bread in the freezer.

Quick and easy to make, this will have the kids coming back for more.

STICKY ONION AND CHEESE PIZZA PULL APART

Makes: 2 Serves: 6 Prep: 10 mins Cook: 15 mins Ingredients:

- 1 brown onion
- 1 red onion, peeled

Sticky Onion and Cheese Pull-apart.

- 2 tbs olive oil
- 1 tbs brown sugar
- 2/3 cup pizza sauce or tomato paste
- 2x 270g packet garlic bread slices
- 125g sliced pepperoni
- ½ cup pitted kalamata olives
- 2 cups grated pizza cheese
- Dressed rocket or baby spinach, to serve, optional

Method:

- 1. Preheat oven 200°C fan forced.
- Peel, halve and thinly slice the onions. Place onto a microwave-safe plate. Cover with damp paper towel. Microwave on High/100% for 3 minutes.
- 3. Heat oil in a medium frying pan over medium heat. Drain the onions then add to the pan, sprinkle over the sugar. Cook, stirring for 10 minutes until light golden and sticky. Stir in the pizza sauce.
- Lightly grease two baking trays. Arrange one pack of garlic bread, buttered side up on each tray.
- 5. Spread onion mixture evenly over top of each bread slice. Top pizzas with pepperoni, olives, then cheese.
- 6. Bake for 15 minutes, swapping the trays over after 10 minutes or until cheese is melted and bread is crisp. Serve topped with rocket or baby spinach if you like.
- 7.Tip: Make ahead you can make the pizzas to the end step 3 up to 8 hours ahead. Cover and place on the fridge. Remove from the fridge 10 minutes before cooking to allow the trays to come back to room temperature.
- 8. Variations: Replace the pepperoni with shaved ham and olives with chopped fresh pineapple; replace the pepperoni with 600g sliced fresh mushrooms sauted in olive oil until soft and increase olives to 1 cup.

Try a pre-prepared holiday favourite in a light portion

Hi all

Who is looking forward to welcoming friends and family for the holidays?

It's been a while since I've seen family from down south so here's hoping they can make it up.

I'm planning some easy dinner parties with a lot of things that can be prepared earlier so I'm not stuck in the kitchen while everyone else is catching up on lost time!

So today's recipe is one that can be made a day ahead and put in the fridge until needed.

CREAMY CHOCOLATE AND CARAMEL MOUSSE

Ingredients:

Chocolate Mousse

- 1 cup thickened cream
- 200g dark chocolate, melted2 egg whites
- 1 tablespoon caster sugar

CUT OUT AND KEEP RECIPE

GRANNY GAY

It's fairly easy to make but looks very impressive.

So let's cook!

- ¼ cup slivered almonds, toasted Caramel Mousse
- 250g Jersey Caramel Iollies
- 1 tablespoon milk
- 2 eggs, separated
- 2 teaspoons gelatine1 tablespoon water
- 1 cup thickened cream
- 1 tablespoon caster sugar

Method:

Prepare chocolate mousse:

- 1.Beat cream until soft peaks form. Lightly fold cooled melted chocolate into the cream.
- 2.Beat egg whites in a small bowl until soft peaks form, add sugar, beat until dissolved. Lightly fold into chocolate mixture in 2 batches.
- 3. Divide mousse into 8 glasses.
- 4. Place in fridge.

Prepare caramel mousse:

- Combine jersey caramels and milk in a pan. Stir over low heat without boiling until caramels have melted.
- 2. Transfer to a large bowl and stir through egg yolks.
- 3. Sprinkle gelatine over the water in a cup. Place cup in a saucepan with simmering water that comes half way up the side of the cup and stir until the gelatine dissolves.

- 4. Stir into caramel mixture and cool until almost set.
- Beat cream until soft peaks form. Fold into caramel mixture.
- 10.Beat egg whites until soft peaks form, add sugar, beat until dissolved.
- 11.Gently fold egg white into caramel in 2 batches.
- 12.Remove chocolate mousse from the fridge.

 Divide caramel mousse on top of chocolate mousse in glasses.
- 13.Refrigerate several hours or overnight.
- 14. Sprinkle with almonds before serving.

Tips and Tweaks

The only thing I would suggest to tweak this recipe is adding raspberries or strawberries on top before serving. It is just delicious and decadent as is.

New SA restrictions in play

The South Australian premier has moved to tighten density limits and reduce family gatherings after the state posted a record 774 new infections.

Steven Marshall said he would move quickly to ensure new daily infections wouldn't descend into the thousands over the coming days and weeks.

"It will overwhelm our health systems right across the country if we don't take action," he said on Sunday.

"We've got to swing into action to save lives."

Indoor hospitality will go to a one person per four square metre rule and outdoor activities will be allowed one person for every two square metres.

Gyms will be restricted to one person for every seven square metres.

Family gatherings will be reduced from 30 to 10 people.

People arriving from interstate won't need to take a PCR test before arriving but are being told to take a rapid antigen test after entering SA.

The premier ruled out sending the state back into lockdown at this stage.

"There is no doubt this is going to be a very tough time for South Australia," Mr Marshall said.

"It's not our intention to have a lockdown in SA but it is our intention to significantly reduce mobility at this time until we can get more shots into the arms of South Australians," he said.

Chief Health Officer Nicola Spurrier said three jabs were needed to achieve the same level of protection against Omicron as two jabs against Delta.

"What we need to do now is put everything, every effort we can in our state to get the third dose into everybody as quickly as possible" she said

The time frame for booster shots will be brought forward on January 4 to four months after your second dose and will then be brought down again on January 31 to three months

The early data indicated around 84 per cent of the state's new cases were vaccinated and 16 per cent were unvaccinated, which mirrors the state's vaccination rate.

Of the three people in intensive care, one is not fully vaccinated and two are. The remaining seven people in the state's COVID-19 ward - not in intensive care - are not vaccinated.

"You can see a bit of a differential," Professor Spurrier said.

"Even though these are small numbers (of) people that have been hospitalised, there is a high representation of people that are not vaccinated."

Professor Spurrier said there had been exposure from a positive case in 40 aged care facilities and transmission in a further eight.

There are 35 aged care staff and 16 residents who have contracted the virus.

Thirty two disability care sites have been exposed and four additional sites have expe-

rienced transmission. One is an Indigenousspecific site

Forty staff and their disability care clients have contracted the virus.

There have also been exposures at 21 hospitals and four hospitals have experienced transmission.

"As we start to see these additional cases, particularly in vulnerable settings for us in SA, we will become much more concerned," Professor Spurrier said.

There were almost 20,700 tests taken on Christmas Day.

Drone strike good news for Queensland

A high-tech drone has been used to sow the seeds for a new green corridor for koalas west of Brisbane.

The mission, on a private nature refuge near Ipswich, is one of the first times drone technology has been used in Australia to create koala habitat.

WWF Australia hopes the trial and others to follow will prove drones are a cost-effective, quick way to regenerate degraded landscapes and reconnect isolated pockets of bush.

"We're really aiming to work in different landscapes and try different techniques with the hope we can scale up to perhaps a national scale," Tanya Pritchard, the group's landscape restoration project manager, said.

The drone was used to drop 45kg of seed over a bare paddock that separates two patches of bushland at the Turner Family Foundation's Hidden Vale refuge.

The paddock is a threat to local koalas because when they are crossing it they are at higher risk of being attacked by wild dogs.

The mixed seed contained 40 different plant species that should create a corridor rich in biodiversity, including native grasses and the trees koalas need for food and shade.

"I really hope that when I come back in two years' time, that the trees are going to be well above my head, and that we may even be able to see signs of koala activity as they start moving back into this landscape," Ms Pritchard

"This important wild population here in the Ipswich area really needs us to improve the connectivity of the landscape to ensure koalas have free movement and are able to maintain and even improve their genetic diversity over

The seeding mission at Hidden Vale will involve 11 hectares in total, resulting in an estimated 15,000 new koala food and shade trees.

To the southwest, there are plans to droneseed another Turner Family Foundation property - the Thornton View Nature Reserve in the Lockyer Valley. That mission is expected to result in 40,000 new trees across 30 hectares.

Ben O'Hara, from the foundation, says it's critical to reconnect koala populations given the threats they face from disease, vehicle strikes, dog attacks, land clearing, heatwaves, drought and bushfires.

He's encouraged by the work being done to safeguard 45 koalas that have been individually identified at Hidden Valley over the last three years.

Twenty of those koalas have received lifesaving help including treatment for chlamydia, and 28 joeys have also been detected in the population over that time.

"We're generating what we describe as a koala fountain – a strong source population that can spread out along habitat corridors and bolster koala numbers throughout the region," Mr O'Hara said.

The drone-seeding work is a collaboration involving WWF Australia, the federal government, the Turner Family Foundation and Dendra Systems, which uses technology to aid ecosystem recovery.

Blindsided: Guide dog vans stolen

Vans used by Guide Dogs Victoria to transport puppies in training have been stolen in a Christmas Eve theft.

The six vans, all but one which are heavily branded, were taken from the charity's Kew campus on Saturday night.

The theft means training and services in the new year will be heavily disrupted, and there will be delays for Victorians waiting to be paired with their muchneeded guide dogs.

"We thank our generous donors who continue to support our vital work and condemn whoever is behind this despicable theft," a spokesman said in a statement.

Police are on site investigating.

Opposed apartheid

Archbishop Desmond Tutu, a Nobel Peace Prize laureate and veteran of South Africa's struggle against apartheid who was revered as his nation's conscience by both Black and white, has died aged 90.

Tutu won the Nobel prize in 1984 in recognition of his non-violent opposition to white minority rule. A decade later, he witnessed the end of that regime and chaired a Truth and Reconciliation Commission, set up to unearth atrocities committed under it.

Ever outspoken, he preached against the tyranny of the white minority.

After apartheid ended, he called the Black political elite to account with as much feistiness as he had the Afrikaners, but his enduring spirit of reconciliation in a divided nation always shone through, and tributes to him poured in from around the world on Sunday.

South African President Cyril Ramaphosa described Tutu in a televised address as "one of our nation's finest patriots" adding, "our nation's loss is indeed a global bereavement."

US President Joe Biden said Tutu followed his spiritual calling to create a better, freer, and more equal world. "His legacy transcends borders and will echo throughout the ages."

"Archbishop Desmond Tutu was a mentor, a friend and a moral compass for me and so many others," former President Barack Obama said. "He never lost his impish sense of humour and willingness to find humanity in his adversaries."

Bill Clinton called Tutu's life "a gift."

Tutu died "peacefully" on Sunday morning in a Cape Town nursing home, a representative of his Archbishop Desmond Tutu IP Trust said.

He will lie in state at St George's St George's Cathedral in Cape Town on Friday before his funeral service there on Saturday, it said.

Looking frail and in a wheelchair, Tutu was last seen in public in October at St George's - a one-time safe haven for anti-apartheid activists - for a service marking his 90th birthday.

He was diagnosed with prostate cancer in the late 1990s and was later hospitalised several times to treat infections associated with treatment for it.

In his final years he also regretted that his dream of a "Rainbow Nation" had yet to come true, and often fell out with erstwhile allies at the ruling African National Congress party over their failures to address the poverty and inequalities that they promised to eradicate.

Just five feet five inches (1.68 metres) tall and with an infectious giggle, Tutu travelled tirelessly through the 1980s to become the face of the anti-apartheid movement abroad while many of the leaders of the then rebel ANC, including future President Nelson Mandela, were behind bars.

Long-time friends, Tutu and Mandela lived for a time on the same street in the South African township of Soweto, making Vilakazi Street the only one in the world to have been home to two Nobel Peace Prize winners.

"His most characteristic quality is his readiness to take unpopular positions without fear," Mandela once said of Tutu. "Such independence of mind is vital to a thriving democracy."

Born near Johannesburg, Tutu spent most of his later life in Cape Town and led numerous marches and campaigns to end apartheid from St George's Cathedral's front steps.

Having officially retired from public life on his 79th birthday Tutu - who once said of himself: "I wish I could shut up, but I can't, and I won't" - continued to speak out on a range of moral issues.

John Steenhuisen, leader of opposition party The Democratic Alliance, said Tutu's spirit would live on "in our continued effort to build a united, successful, non-racial South Africa for all."

In 2008, Tutu accused the West of complicity in Palestinian suffering by remaining silent.

In 2013, he declared his support for gay rights, saying he would never "worship a God who is homophobic."

Archbishop of Canterbury Justin Welby on Sunday hailed Tutu as "a prophet and priest" while Pope Francis offered heartfelt condolences to his family and loved ones.

In a letter to Tutu's daughter Reverend Mpho Tutu, Tibet's spiritual leader, the Dalai Lama, said the world had "lost a great man, who lived a truly meaningful life."

"We are better because he was here," said Martin Luther King's daughter Bernice.

On watch

Russia will continue providing Mali with military assistance through state channels, the RIA news agency has cited a senior Russian diplomat as saying, days after Bamako denied the presence of Russian mercenaries.

France, Canada and 13 European nations last week condemned Moscow for facilitating the alleged deployment of private military contractors from the Russia-backed Wagner Group to Mali, where the government is battling an Islamist insurgency.

Mali's government on Saturday denied the presence of Russian mercenaries, but said "Russian trainers" were there as part of a bilateral agreement between Mali and Russia.

A cargo plane delivered four helicopters, weapons and ammunition from Russia to Mali in October, part of what the Malian government said was a commercial deal with the Russian state.

RIA on Monday quoted Pyotr Ilichev, director of the Russian foreign ministry's department for international organisations, as saying in an interview that Bamako had the right to cooperate with any partners it wanted in its fight with militants.

"We will continue to defend Bamako's legitimate interests at the UN (United Nations) and also to provide active assistance to our Malian partners in the military and military-technical spheres through state channels," Ilichev was quoted as saying.

President Vladimir Putin has said the Wagner Group do not represent the Russian state, but that private military contractors have the right to work anywhere in the world so long as they do not break Russian law.

Ilichev was cited as saying that France's withdrawal from military bases in Mali had the potential to destabilise the region. Paris has previously denied suggestions it is abandoning Mali.

Three BTS members isolating

Three members of the K-pop superstar group BTS have been infected with the coronavirus after returning to South Korea from abroad.

RM and Jin were diagnosed with COVID-19 on Saturday evening, the Big Hit Music agency said in a statement. It earlier said another member, Suga, tested positive for the virus on Friday.

All three took their second jabs in August, the management agency said.

BTS is a seven-member boy band. The four other members are J-Hope, Jungkook, V and Jimin

According to the agency, RM has exhibited no particular symptoms while Jin is showing mild symptoms including light fever and is undergoing self-treatment at home.

The agency said Friday that Suga wasn't exhibiting symptoms and was administering self-care at home in accordance with the guidelines of the health authorities.

RM had tested negative after returning from

the United States earlier this month following his personal schedule there. But he was later diagnosed with the virus ahead of his scheduled release from self-quarantine, the agency said.

After returning to South Korea this month, Jin underwent PCR tests twice — upon arrival and later before his release from self-quarantine — and tested negative both times.

But he had flu-like symptoms on Saturday afternoon before he took another PCR test that came back positive, the agency said. Media reports said he also had travelled to the US.

Suga, who has had a number of personal engagements in the United States during the band's official time off, was diagnosed with CO-VID-19 during quarantine after returning from the U.S., the agency said.

The agency said it'll continue to provide support for the three members for their speedy recovery. It said it will cooperate with the requests and guidelines of the South Korean health authorities.

Since their debut in 2013, BTS has garnered

The bright spot of 2021

As 2021 comes to an end most people would struggle to have a positive to say about this year. Here in the Central Queensland we have had to deal with COVID again, Drought and then the water shortage in Mount Morgan and

But there is a bright light in 2021 and that has been in our garden. Throughout 2021 our plants seem to have looked lusher, flowers better, encountered less Insects and grown faster. Or am I looking at this years through rose coloured glasses?

So here are my top 6 performers of 2021 that were featured in the CQ Today.

MY NUMBER 6 PLANT OF 2021

Located growing in a garden at Barney Point is an unique foliaged Native Rosemary that is well worth a try. Westringea Morning Light is a variegated form of the common Native Rosemary. The tightly crowded leaves of the Westringea Morning Light have a cream coloured variegation along the edges. Growing to 50cm high and 1m across and makes an ideal small hedge. White flowers will appear in abundance several times a year. It is a hardy shrub for inland or coastal situations and is tolerant of salt spray.

MY NUMBER 5 PLANT OF 2021

You can see this magnificent red flowering shrub growing opposite the Gladstone High School. Graptophyllum thorogoodii or Scarlet Fuchsia is a bushy, erect shrub growing to 2m high. It will provide a profusion of red tubular flowers in spring that attracts honey-eating birds. This shrub will grow in sun or part shade in average to well drained soils.

MY NUMBER 4 PLANT OF 2021

I just love seeing the use of Paperbarks as part of streetscapes. And my next selection can be seen front and centre in Bryan Jordan Drive in the Marina Parklands. Melaleuca styphelioides or the Prickly Paperbark is a stately small tree. The leaves are oval shaped, dark green and up to 15 millimetres long, crowned with a sharp point, hence the common name. Creamy flowers form in dense heads at the top of the stems during spring. The prickly foliage provides nesting sites for small native birds. Melaleuca styphelioides attracts both nectar loving insects and bird. It requires a sunny, average to moist position.

MY NUMBER 3 PLANT OF 2021

Growing in the entrance garden of the GECC is a very attractive little groundcover. Ajuga reptans variegate or Variegated Bugle is an evergreen groundcover with leaves of dark green variegated with a grey-green and cream colour. Spikes of blue flowers appear from late Spring through Summer. These flowers can be very attractive to Butterflies. The Variegated Bugle is suited to full to partial sun positions.

MY NUMBER 2 PLANT OF 2021

Making a showy display in the Glenlyon Dalrymple Drive round-a-bout is the Callistemon Rocky Rambler. It is a groundcover hybrid form of the Blackdown Tablelands Bottlebrush. Rocky Rambler has striking red brush flowers and golden tips in spring, this plant will always stand out as one of the most attractive new season colour plants in a dry garden. This is one of the hardiest of the bottlebrushes for local gardens.

MY NUMBER 1 PLANT FOR 2021

Russellia Tangarine Falls makes a fantastic feature in front of the Ports building in Yarroon Street. Many gardeners will know the Russellia

or coral plant as a hardy low cascading plant with small red trumpet flowers. Tangarine Falls provides another colour alternative, with beautiful orange flowers. I believe that Russellia is one of the most under-utilised shrubs available for commercial landscaping, as it grows to a metre high, doesn't require a lot of maintenance and survives on the sniff of a wet rag. Why isn't it being used in carparks and other awkward landscaping areas?

While many of these plants may not be available all year round in most local nurseries, they should be able to be ordered from specialist nurseries for this garden.

Pursuant to section 177 of the Transport Operations (Marine Safety) Regulation 2016, Gladstone Area Water Board (GAWB) has prepared a discussion paper and is now inviting submissions from public authorities, industry, interested groups and persons, and the public

The proposed Riverston Bay Marine Zone is located around Riverston Parkland at Lake Awoonga, which is located at 865 Awoonga Dam Road, Benaraby, QLD, 4680 and formally described as Lot 90 on SP275218. See map below with boundaries of the proposed marine zone illustrated



Any form of motorised watercraft is proposed to be excluded from this area, except for emergency services and GAWB personnel in emergency situations. The purpose of creating this motorised watercraft exclusion zone is in response to balancing the amenity experience and safety of different user groups. This proposal will consolidate this area as the first choice for families and users who wish to use the water for general recreation. The proposal has been informed by the Recreation Strategy and Lake Awoonga Master Plan that was prepared in consultation with the Community Consultative Forum.

Catching the coral trout

One of the most sought-after reef species would have to be Coral Trout. They boast tremendous eating quality with perfect white flesh and must be one of the prettiest fish to photograph of the lot. Combine this with a great fighting capability you have yourself a perfect target species. Found along the entire Queensland coastline from the inshore islands to the outer Great Barrier Reef, Coral Trout come in quite a few variations – there's 7 species in fact. Size limits and bag limits apply to all of these.

Trout can be caught in anywhere from 1m to 80m of water. They love structure like coral bommies and ledges. So, this means shallow water fishing in clear water can be done by sight. A quality sounder is the key to finding deep water holding areas like pinnacles, bommies and ledges. If bait schools show, then the Trout won't be too far from them. It's a matter of positioning yourself so your attractive offering is as close to the structure as possible.

Trout are dirty fighters, heading for the closest hole they can find as soon as they are hooked. They are immensely powerful and must be manhandled out into the open water. Once they are turned and heading towards the angler, much of the fight is over. It's then a matter of beating the sharks that happen to love the taste of Trout as much as we do. That said... heavy gear is necessary with 50lb braid a minimum for rod fishermen and a maxed out drag setting.

Trout suffer badly from Barotrauma, especially when pulled from the depths so venting and or release weighting is advised if you decide to go that way.

There are quite a few techniques that are popular with anglers these days to catching Trout from shallow to deep water. One of which is the shallow water reef flat fishing involving casting artificial lures like stick baits and poppers. This form of fishing has really taken off because experiencing a surface strike in clear water on top of a reef is about as spectacular and exciting as it gets for a keen angler. Not to mention the brute strength required to pull them from their lair.

Dropping down Vibes, slow pitch jigs, plastics and prawn imitations on heavy braided outfits is another popular modern technique. This can be done in shallow or deep water. Targeting the structure mentioned above whether it be at anchor or on the drift gets the results.

One of the easiest methods is trolling the shallows from 10 to 30ft with hard body lures. Just choose a lure suitable to the water depth. Deep diving lures can reach 30 plus feet these days. I particularly like this method as it's quite

a relaxing beer drinking exercise and most times results in a fish or three.

Hand lining is an acquired skill most amateurs don't seem to try as much these days. If you study what the commercial guys do, you'll find them up in the shallows of the reef flats and lagoons looking for areas of clear water, coral bommies with lots of life and baitfish often surrounded by sand. They anchor so as they are fishing the pressure points and use view bucket to see what's going on below. Still to this day the professional angler utilize this old school technique accompanied with using 50lb and bigger handlines with very light weighted 8/0 hooks and generally pilchards for bait. It just goes to show when it comes to commercial quota expectations, handlining wins easily from a cost and catch quantity perspective. Just watching these guys at work is an experience in itself. It's worth trying it, but as a novice make sure you find a suitable set of gloves or finger stalls for protection.

Dead bait fishing is probably the most common technique whether it be with a rod and

reel or handline. Trout respond well to burly so it's good to get a bit of stink in the water to get things happening. The worst thing you can do is lose a well hooked Trout, quite often a redhot bite shuts down immediately when this happens. Experienced anglers move on to the next rock

Some of the best dead baits are pilchards, herring, Yakkas, Hussar, Iodine Bream and School Mackerel. When using Hussar and Iodine Bream as cut baits remember to keep the wings and tail. There is something special about these hard baits flapping in the current that Trout can't refuse.

The ultimate temptation to some trout is a live bait. There a too many options to mention, but live Yakkas, Herring and Hardie Heads are up the of the live bait list for me.

So, there's a few options to try out for a Trout. All these techniques can be found on YouTube if you're keen to gather more infor-
