I think the Wiggles winning Triple J's Hottest 100 on the weekend was the ultimate testament of my generation's love for their childhood.



Pat smells a RAT

Monday, 24 January, marked the beginning of the rollout of free rapid antigen (RAT) tests to concession card holders across the country but Gladstone chemist shelves are reportedly bare of the sought after items.

More than six million Australians who have a concession card will be eligible for 10 free rapid tests at pharmacies throughout a three-month period, with a limit of five in one month.

Concession card holder Pat Timm, who has lived in Gladstone for 47 years, said 'nobody that she knew of' had been able to access RAT tests locally.

"Anyone that I've spoken to hasn't been able to get any tests at all for the last couple of weeks," she said.

"My local chemist doesn't have any and nor does the nearest one to them. I was told there was none available in town and they didn't know when they were coming so I've stopped looking.'

A staff member from Chemist warehouse in Clinton confirmed the store had no RAT tests in stock. He said more were on the way but it was uncertain when they would arrive.

Ms Timm said she had seen Treasurer Josh Frydenberg speaking on the news about how RAT tests were now free for concession card holders.

'Even though they're free, if you can't get them there's no point. It only works when you can get them in your hand and use them when you need to.

"It's absolutely useless them being free when you can't buy them anywhere or obtain them anywhere."

She said if people suspected they had Covid and couldn't access a test, their best option would be "just go home and stay there and avoid other people".

ALP candidate for Gladstone Matt Burnett said concession card holders 'absolutely' needed access to free rapid antigen tests.

"But so does everyone. The fact is, no-one can get access to any," he said. "The LNP have dropped the ball on this,

right from the start. RAT tests should be free and readily available for everyone "It's the same story I've heard from locals

right across Central Queensland, from Emerald to Biloela to Gracemere, it's just not good Labor leader Anthony Albanese said the

government ordered rapid tests too late, and then sought to shift the blame. "They got their ads ready before they ordered the tests. Something that characterises

this government is it sits back, waits for something to become a crisis then it blames others for the problem," he told the ABC.

Pharmacy Guild of Australia president Trent Twomey said supply shortages of RAT tests meant the rollout had been significantly impacted.

"There are 6000 community pharmacies in Australia and 804 pharmacies went live this morning," he said on Monday.

"The majority will simply not be going live."

Mr Twomey said 13 million tests were due to arrive in the next week and 22 million in the first three weeks of February just for pharma-

Health Minister Greg Hunt said the hoarding of rapid tests had contributed to the widespread supply issues across the country, but indicated there would be enough stock for pharmacists. However, he warned retailers who were

price gouging tests would be targeted by the consumer watchdog. "There were clear cases where there had

been some hoarding, unfortunately it does include people that were scooping up to resell at inflated prices," he said.

Ms Timm said the Federal Government needed to 'get their act together'.

"You bring in the rapid antigen tests to replace the clinical test and when you don't have enough tests available for the people. Scott Morrison, get your act together.'

Owners on rates notice

Gladstone Regional Council has given 70 property owners three months to stump up the cash on overdue rates or risk having their homes sold.

In a general meeting on 18 January, councillors were informed of a total loss in revenue amounting \$1,018,560.83 was owed in overdue rates and charges as at 5 January 2022.

Although the council's threat to sell these

properties may seem harsh, Section 140(2) of the Local Government Regulation 2012 enables Council to resolve to sell land for recovery of overdue rates or charges where rates or charges have been overdue in excess of three years, or where default judgment has been obtained for vacant or commercial properties.

"If the overdue rates or charges are not paid within three months of the notice, Council may within six months of giving notices of intention to sell, start the procedures for selling the land by auction under section 142," the notice read.

"Section 141 requires that overdue rates and charges must be paid in full in order for sale procedures to be stopped."

The properties with overdue rates are a mixture of land use types, including commercial, residential and vacant land.

Councillor Chris Trevor moved the motion, and said it was the owner's responsibility to pay their rates.

"As we all know it is our duty in life to pay our rates ,it's unfair on other ratepayers who do pay to see others not paying their rates," he said.

"I have a very strong opinion on this."

In a council report, it was revealed this year's number of properties decreased by 148 properties in comparison to the 2020/21 financial year.

It is anticipated that sale of land proceedings with respect to this resolution will be completed by 30 June 2022.

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Hospital staff feel at risk

Staff burnout is on the rise at Gladstone Hospital as Covid cases continue to surge across

With ever-increasing demand, a Gladstone Hospital nurse said staff were becoming burnt out as they continue to navigate through the Covid-19 response.

Since 23 December 2021 until now, the Gladstone Region has recorded 1255 confirmed Covid cases.

As of Tuesday, 61 new cases were recorded in Gladstone, 128 in Rockhampton, 44 in Livingstone, three in Central Highlands, one in Woorabinda and 10 in Banana, with 14 Covid patients in Rockhampton Hospital in a stable condition.

The nurse, who wanted to remain anonymous, said while staff were doing their best to combat the pressure across the public and private health systems, they were feeling stretched to the limit.

"It's happening here," she said.

"The team here is amazing, we are working and taking care of each other so well but burnout is on the rise."

A Central Queensland Hospital and Health Service spokesman confirmed the hospital's workforce was being affected by staff becoming infected with Covid-19.

"CO Health staff have been putting in an extraordinary effort to ensure our patients are safe and well cared for. It is an unprecedented time for us all and extremely busy," the spokesman said.

The spokesman confirmed CQHHS had reduced non-critical services to allow for deployment of staff in more critical areas; however more staff would be available in Gladstone

"We have undertaken a significant recruitment campaign to bring on more staff," he

The CQHHS spokesman said staff who were Covid positive were required to isolate at home as per the Chief Health Officer directions.

"Our workforce is being affected by staff becoming infected with Covid-19, as any other workforce is," he said.

".We are reviewing how this is impacting on services daily and redeploying to assist critical workforce issues where and when needed.

"In high impact areas such as fever clinics we have made improvements to staff's work hours and their conditions to reduce exposure to heat, keep them cool and keep them hydrated.'

The nurse, 23, confirmed CQHHS did not make staff come in on their sick days.

"Obviously if we are symptomatic, we are required to go home and not come to work until we know we are Covid negative," she said.

"With that in mind, and us becoming run down, a few of us are required to take a day or

The nurse said the team at Gladstone Hospital were doing everything they could to help

"Everyone might have different experiences but realistically in this climate our team and leaders are doing an amazing job," she said.

'Super understanding and supportive but it might be due to the small hospital things."

CQHHS said they appreciated the amazing effort of their staff right across CQ Health. Members of the public can play their part in minimising the spread of Covid-19 by keeping their vaccination up to date including a booster when it's due, maintaining social distancing and staying home where possible and keeping good hand hygiene," he said.

Healthy habitat: Fish tracked in new GPC initiative

Black jewfish in Gladstone's waterways are being tagged and tracked, to help gather information for important marine research.

Gladstone Ports Corporation's (GPC) team are assisting with the deployment, download and retrieval of data from two receivers, as part of the project.

It's all part of a collaboration between James Cook University (JCU), the Queensland Department of Agriculture and Fisheries (DAF), the Australian Institute of Marine science (AIMs), and CQUniversity (CQU).

GPC's data will provide researchers with important information about the species, including a timeline of movements, residency, aggregation behaviour and habitat use.

The tagged fish are detected by acoustic receivers deployed in waters along the Queensland coast including in Gladstone - a key region for the project.

Fisheries Oueensland Executive Director Dallas Dsilva said the research being done in GPC's project would complement work already underway to help protect the sustainability of black jewfish.

"We know black jewfish are vulnerable to overfishing and stock collapses have been previously documented in Australia and overseas," Mr Dsilva said.

"That is why in May 2019 the Queensland Government introduced a total allowable catch limit for black jewfish, and, in 2020, Queensland Government scientists commenced a three-year priority research project to better understand stocks and manage the species.

"Data from these projects will provide crucial information to guide future management actions to help protect the sustainability of black jewfish, and support the Sustainable Fisheries Strategy's aim to ensure healthy fish stocks to support thousands of Oueensland jobs."

Chief Operating Officer Craig Walker said GPC is proud to be part of the project with its environmental team deploying two acoustic receivers in the port.

"Our environment team will then download the data which will assist DAF with any management strategies for black jewfish outlined under Queensland's Sustainable Fisheries Strategy," Mr Walker said.

"Economic, environmental and social sustainability underpin everything we do at our port," he said.

"This project by JCU, DAF, AIMs and CQU is another opportunity for GPC to rise to the occasion and contribute to important research from the data our team collects,'

"It's also a win-win for us to continue to care for Gladstone's Big 6."

Member for Gladstone and Minister for Regional Development and Manufacturing, Minister for Water, Glenn Butcher, said local waterways have long been the home to critical marine information and this project is no different.

'We know that Gladstone is home to a range of Queensland's beautiful flora and fauna, so it is vital that GPC and the State Government do what we can to assist in the research, tracking and preservation of our natural wonders.

"I applaud GPC, JCU, DAF, AIMs and CQU for their efforts in this project," Mr Butcher said. The receivers will form part of a larger coastal array of more than 150 receivers in coastal waters. The tags come with long life expectancy and will provide a long term method to monitor the species.

JCU Researcher Adam Barnett said Port areas were key habitats for jewfish and the research would give important insight into jewfish movements.

"The assistance of GPC in maintaining receivers provides infrastructure in determining both local habitat use patterns and larger scale migrations along the Queensland Coast," Mr Barnett said.

"It will help us determine connectivity between other jewfish hotspots such as Yeppoon and Mackay," Dr Barnett said.

CQU Research Fellow Dr Nicole Flint said the Gladstone Harbour provided important habitats for many economically and ecologically important fish species.

"The data obtained from these receivers will improve knowledge of black jewfish movements and activity in and around the

EOI 'next step' for project

Gladstone Area Water Board (GAWB) has released the Fitzroy to Gladstone Pipeline construction Expression of Interest via QTenders.

The release of the EOI is the next step in pre-construction activities for the project, which are being delivered by GAWB as the pre-construction Delivery Management Proponent appointed by the Department of Regional Development, Manufacturing and Water in August 2021.

Minister for Regional Development and Manufacturing, Minister for Water and Member for Gladstone, Glenn Butcher, said local businesses will be given every opportunity to be awarded work, during the project.

"This pipeline is about securing Gladstone's future and that encapsulates boosting business and getting people into work, during the construction phase."

GAWB Chief Executive Officer Darren Barlow said the project is vital to secure Gladstone's long-term water security and will require an experienced construction delivery team to ensure the project's success.

"The Fitzroy to Gladstone Pipeline project is an important piece of the puzzle in securing Gladstone's economic and industrial future and has the potential to provide water for the emerging hydrogen industry in the region," Mr Barlow said. "Should the Queensland Government decide to proceed to construction, a decision that is during early 2022, the project will need the right people on the job, working collaboratively to deliver the project to schedule, to budget and in a way that benefits the local community.

"We're committed to engaging with the market to source the best parties through a competitive EOI process and early contractor involvement, so we're ready to hit the ground running once approval is given by the government."

GAWB's pre-construction contracting strat-

egy includes partnering with local suppliers and obtaining local services where practicable to deliver tangible benefits to the Gladstone region such as jobs, supply contracts and local capability raising. Local suppliers were invited to an information forum, about the project, on Wednesday 19 January.

Jump in native hawkmoths

Visitors and staff at Heron Island may notice an increase in numbers of the Australian native hawkmoths and hawkmoth caterpillars on the island over the next few

Rangers from the Queensland Parks and Wildlife Service (QPWS) are tracking a natural phenomenon in Capricornia Cays National Park, during which hawkmoth numbers increase for a short period of time.

Following recent steady rain in the area, the hawkmoth larvae drop from the Pisonia trees which grow in the park.

This, combined with the annual seabird nesting season which increases the amount of A lizard on a tree branch

Visitors and staff may also notice a dropping of leaves from the Pisonia forests; however, this is also part of a natural process, and the trees will regenerate.

Native hawkmoths are protected and play an important role in cycling nutrients within the national park by increasing turnover rates of the high-nutrient environment.

QPWS tracks the occurrence of these outbreaks under the QPWS Island Watch and Health Check systems.



Recycling facility to open

A new recycling facility will open its doors in Boyne Island to provide locals with a convenient collection point to exchange their eligible containers for cash.

CQ Recycling & Recovery Boyne Island will open on Monday, 31 January and will trade seven days a week as the third facility of its kind in the Gladstone region.

The business has operated in Gladstone and Calliope since the Queensland Government introduced its Containers for Change

CQ Recycling & Recovery co-owner and operator Kevin Vickers said customer demand in the area and support in existing facilities has demonstrated community willingness to re-

"We have been running a mobile [in Calliope] for three years as well [and] from customer demand, we went to a full-time facility and operate six days a week," Mr Vickers said.

"We have been accepted very well by the community and we have a very steady base of customers at this stage."

The new facility is located at 16 Dennis Street in Boyne Island.

The Containers for Change scheme has collected more than 4,285,870,084 containers through its refund points since 2018.

An additional 1,021,932,468 containers have also been recycled through kerbside recycling programs.

Containers can be verified for recycling eligibility by checking the label contacts a 10 cent refund icon in the relevant state or territory, or by using the Containers for Change app to scan the container barcode.

The recycling facilities request that the lids are removed and there is no contamination inside the containers.

Sorting the containers prior to drop-off is not a requirement but will improve loading

times and there is no limit to the number of containers that can be recycled.

Mr Vickers said the scheme has led to many positive outcomes for the community, even through the pandemic.

"[The scheme] is really beneficial for the environment [and] it supplies employment for many people.

"We have been supporting many people who have been hard hit.

"Obviously when people lose their jobs and use their income, then they need a traditional income and collecting cans is a very good source of income," Mr Vickers said.



If successful, the brigade will also use the funds to create a laundry facility to decontaminate personal protection equipment worn by volunteers while completing hazard reduction burns and attending emergencies.

Ms Darrach said, "We go out to a big fire and you could be out for more than 12 to 18 bours

"It takes you days to get the smell of smoke out of your skin and hair.

"We don't know what we're walking into when we are out in a paddock... because we don't know who's dumped anything out there

"We just want to be able to have a washing machine and a dryer, to have that option that we can wash our uniform there instead of taking contaminated uniforms home."

The Westowe brigade is lead by First Officer Danny Devers.

Gladstone Regional Council teams with charity to tackle period poverty

Gladstone Regional Council has increased its ability to help people living in period poverty with the installation of a Dignity Vending Machine at the Philip Street Communities and Families Precinct.

The machine, installed by charity Share the Dignity, dispenses free period packs containing six tampons and two pads to women and girls who need them.

Share the Dignity founder and managing director, Rochelle Courtenay, dreamed of finding a way for women and girls who are doing it tough to access free period products without the anxiety and shame of having to ask someone else for help.

"I was shocked to discover that people were using rolled up toilet paper and hand towels to manage their periods," she said.

"We could not believe that people were having to choose between feeding their family or buying period products."

Gladstone's vending machine is located inside the female public amenities building at the Philip Street Communities and Families Precinct and is open to the public from 8am-10pm, seven days a week, to dispense free period packs at the push of

The installation was coordinated by Gladstone Neighbourhood Centre and Council, in collaboration with Share the Dignity.

Prior to the vending machine installation, there was a very generous response from Council

employees to Share the Dignity's annual It's in The Bag campaign that aimed to secure health and hygiene products for women and girls.

Some 800 items were donated, filling 45 assorted bags purchased by Gladstone Neighbourhood Centre (GNC). These were presented to Share the Dignity just prior to Christmas by Mayor Matt Burnett and GNC coordinator Rebecca Griffin.

The donations will be given to schools and charities across the Gladstone Region including St. Vinnies, foster homes, Roseberry House, Anglicare, Women's Health and the Department of Child Safety.







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New record for fuel cost

RACQ has revealed fuel price records had been broken in parts of the State as the cost of unleaded petrol (ULP) reached new highs.

The daily average price of ULP had surpassed records set in November 2021 in parts of the far north, north and central Queensland.

RACO spokesperson Kate Leonard-Jones said prices would likely continue to climb in the coming days.

"There are a number of international factors that have sparked the recent increase in petrol prices across regional Queensland, including a rise in global oil prices and supply and demand issues," Ms Leonard-Jones said.

"Daily average ULP prices in major regional centres have been creeping up slowly, rising between one and three cents per litre (cpl) over the past seven days, and we haven't seen the end of it yet.

"These records are likely to be broken again as prices continue to rise."

Three months ago, CQ Today examined the results found on the RACQ website and compared fuel prices within the region.

The data was initially collected on Monday, 25 October 2021 and has been compared with figures from Tuesday, 25 January 2022.

The price difference in Rockhampton starts with 162.9 at Lakes Creek Servo to 171.9 at Smithys Driveway Service Glenmore Road.

The figures of October show the unleaded fuel prices at 157.7 at Puma Rockhampton Depot, increasing to 172.9 at Smithys Driveway Service on Glenmore Road.

Gladstone has recorded lower fuel prices than Rockhampton, starting at 157.9 at Metro Petroleum and rising to 165.9 at BP Gladstone

The results in October show the cheapest fuel was located at Puma Gladstone Depot at 155.7 and reached 169.9 at BP Gladstone Air-

In January, Caltex Woolworths Emerald recorded their unleaded fuel price at 159.9, with Caltex Emerald coming in at 175.9



The price of fuel has broken records set in November last year.

In October, the price of unleaded started at 159.7 at Puma Emerald Depot and rose to 169.9 at Caltex Emerald.

Ms Leonard-Jones said motorists should

shop around for the cheapest fuel.

"There is still up to 10cpl difference between the cheapest sites to the most expen-

THREE ... about the Mesozoic Era

The Triassic Period

This is the first period of the Mesozoic Era, which ran 248 to 200 million years ago. The Earth had one huge continent known as Pangaea, which began to break up in the mid-Triassic. The most celebrated event was the evolution of the dinosaurs. The dinosaurs shared the space with the archosaurs, which means ruling reptiles.

The Jurassic Period

This period spanned 65 million years and started around 205 million years ago to 135 million years ago. During the middle of the Jurassic period, the continent split, leaving a northern part called Laurasia (mainly North America and Europe) and a southern part called Gondwana (mainly South America, Africa, and Australia).

The Cretaceous Period

The last period of the Mesozoic Era began 145 million years ago and finished 66 million years ago. Although dinosaurs were the dominant animals of the period, many modern animals, including the placental mammals, made their debut during the Cretaceous. A mass extinction event, possibly a huge meteorite, marked the end of the period.



Give all Australians a say

Most mornings (when I remember to) I put up the Australian flag out the front of our house. I feel enormous gratitude for living in this great country and raising the flag is a small ritual to remember how lucky I am.

Just before Christmas I shared a picture of the flag on Facebook, saying how lucky we are. Plenty of people liked the post and shared that sentiment. A significant number, however, felt they could not be proud of Australia given the increasingly draconian and bureaucratic Covid restrictions on their lives.

That saddened me because not all are getting a fair go in Australia right now. We are not a perfect country but one of our aspirations should be to give all Australians a fair go.

This is not just about the vaccine mandates. This week we learnt that Queensland Hospitals have been ripping newborn babies from their mothers because the Mum might be a close contact. Aleasha Pique described how it was "the longest day of my life" when the hospital took her new baby off her. She was told it could be days until she was reunited as they waited for a PCR test.

My office has been contacted by a teacher from Emerald who is facing the loss of her job because of bureaucracy gone mad. She has a medical exemption from the vaccine, an exemption that has been recognised by the Department of Education. However, under the unfair rules she has to get a PCR test every day to go to work! That is not something she can do in Emerald. Now she is being asked to seek an "exemption from the exemption" and has been told that could take months to process.

Meanwhile she is facing weeks without an income.

Another constituent can not attend an Australian citizenship ceremony because she is unvaccinated. There are meant to be online ceremonies available in these circumstances but she is currently being buck-passed between Canberra and the council over who is responsible.

So much of my job is now taken up with trying to get common sense outcomes from the army of Covid overlords that now rule our lives. As US commentator, Bari Weiss, said this week we now have a pandemic of bureaucracy. To get our country back we need



to overthrow these pen-pushers and restore common sense.

You can not deliver common sense outcomes when you are trying to deliver them through the clauses and subclauses of public health orders. These new "laws", which have gone through no Parliament, are not written by scientists, they are written by lawyers. Hence, the spiderweb of red tape that average Australians find themselves in through no fault of their own.

And the Queensland State Government

behind these laws is reluctant to admit any fault. Just before Christmas the State Government enforced vaccine mandates and have forced thousands of Queenslanders out of work, exacerbating shortages in our hospitals and transport systems. We were promised that this would help us tackle the virus when we opened the border.

The data is in, the vaccine mandates have failed. Before the mandates, Queensland had recorded just 2200 coronavirus cases. In the past month, while we have had to show a green

tick to go out and about, we have recorded 342,586 coronavirus cases. Vaccine mandates have not worked.

The vaccines have worked. While every death is tragic, just 0.04 per cent of coronavirus cases now end in death. That is down from over 3 per cent in 2020, and it is about half the fatality rate of the flu.

Now that vaccines are available we should dismantle the bureaucratic Covid state. That will be the best way to return to the land of the fair go by Australia Day 2023.

Time to flip the script and talk up those expectations

Keeping up with the wine trends



The first thing to acknowledge is that the concept of a trend or the idea of change, has been around for a long time in the world of wine.

I used to associate the word trend with fashion, which appeared to develop a new look for each new season. In the world of social media, if something trends it is the topic of many posts. The world of wine is full of developments and changes that have caused trends

A noticeable trend in society has been the need to know more about and then purchase small-batch food and drink produce. Alongside a growing interest in everything environmentally friendly and sustainable. Farmers markets could be a major trend this year. Offering independent bakeries, coffee roasters and butchers. And of course organic fresh food and vegetables from local farms.

What are you going to sell: Part 3: Is your product viable?

If you have been following along with the last two editions, at this point you will know:

- The product you are going to sell.
- Who you are going to use as a supplier.
- How much the unit cost is (including shipping) to purchase each unit.
- How many competitors do you have and their average sale price.

Now you need to determine if your product is actually financially viable from a business standpoint. The unfortunate reality is that not every great idea makes for a good business.

If you have discovered that competitors are selling the same product for less than you can buy it, obviously you need to find a different product. You simply go back to the start and work through each step covered so far over

If you have learned that you can buy a product for less than your competitors are selling it, the product has potential. However, it still might not be financially viable. The next step is to decide how much you will sell your product for, taking into account your competitors selling price. If the product your competitors are selling is identical, you may need to engage in price-based competition because there may be no other way to differentiate the product. This means pricing as low as you can, at least until you can build up stronger reviews than competitors.

Now you have decided on a sale price, you are going to subtract your total purchase price per unit (make sure you have included shipping costs payable by you when you are purchasing units as discussed previously) from



your intended sale price. This gives you your profit margin per unit.

PROFIT PER UNIT = SALE PRICE -(PURCHASE COST + SHIPPING TO YOU)

Next, you need to figure out how much you want to make each week for your business to

be worthwhile from your own personal perspective. There is no right answer to this question. As a lean startup, if you have no other source of income, you might want to consider how much it costs to pay your bills and put food on the table each week. If you still have

a day job, you can obviously work on a much lower income target.

You are now going to divide your income target by the profit per unit that you calculated above. This will tell you roughly how many units you need to sell each week to make the minimum amount you want to earn. You also need to consider your personal tax situation at this point, because this profit may be taxable at the end of the financial year.

NUMBER OF SALES NEEDED = DESIRED INCOME / PROFIT PER UNIT

Once you know the number of sales you need each week to make the income you want, you will need to estimate if this seems reasonable. This will require some informed guess work.

For example, if you are going to sell a prodet that only a small subgroup of the population will buy and you know that they will buy it infrequently, you may have a problem. You might need to find a way to increase your potential customer base, increase your profit margin, or worst case, start over with a new product.

A great case study is the bedding industry. Many people struggle to understand why mattresses can be so expensive. The markup on mattresses can be 900%. However, mattress retailers also know that on average a customer will only buy a mattress once every 8 years, so they need a very high profit on each sale because the sales are so infrequent.







Looking forward to Feb

February is always one of the most beautiful times of the year in the garden, as it combines the floral displays of summer-flowering plants that are nearing the end of their season, and the beginning of the flowers of the cooler seasons.

A short drive around any town in Central Queensland is all that is needed to see the kaleidoscope of colours currently appearing in our gardens.

The recent mix on rain and high humidity should be a recipe for a fantastic February and don't be surprised if we see some of the best floral displays for many years!

Some of the most spectacular blooming shrubs are about to add every colour imaginable to the garden.

The first plant that comes to mind is the Allamanda whether being the showy, yellow-flowering edging Allamanda hybrid plant known as Sunnee, to the hardy creeper called Golden Trumpet vine or Allamanda schottii. In recent years a number of different coloured Allamanda hybrids have appeared in nurseries. Most of these plants are best described as rambling shrubs, and they all seem to be able to be grown from the coast to the western areas without problems.

The hybrid varieties include Cherry Ripe with a rich pink to red flower, Jamaican Sunset, which has a unique colour, crossed between mauve, yellow and pink and Siam Snow with distinctive white flowers.

If you were to take an evening walk the sweetly perfumed Brunfelsia latifolia is very noticeable at the moment. This hardy and popular highly scented old-fashioned shrub is also known as Franciscea or Yesterday Today and Tomorrow this shrub is easily spotted in gardens by the distinctive purple flowers fading through mauve to white over successive days. Brunfelsia latifolia looks striking when covered with flowers from purple flowers fading through mauve to white and the lush green foliage looks great at any other time of the year.

Making a spectacular display with colour displays of pink, white, orange and even red is the Bangkok Rose or Mussaenda.

This evergreen shrub is a relatively hardy fast growing plant to 2m in height, with a naturally rambling habit, producing many stems. The Mussaenda's beautiful colours are not from the flowers, but from the bracts which surround the flowers. These flowers are small and usually white, orange or yellow. This is the same way colour is produced in other tropical plants such as Bouganvilleas and Heliconias.

Also noticeable at the moment is the New Guinea Bottlebrush or Combretum constricutm. This shrub is actually a native of Af-

rica and produces masses of orange pom-pom flowers.

The Ixora is another plant species that truly suit the season. Ixoras are native to the Pacific Islands and South East Asia, with many new hybrids also being developed.

Some of the best flowering varieties at the moment are the beautiful pink flowering hybrid called Pink Malay and the hardy scarlet flowering Flame of the Woods or Ixora williamsii. Both of these Ixoras can be grown throughout Central Queensland with little fuss.

The trees of February are just as spectacular and are also starting to display their floral

features. Trees such as the Ivory Curl flower, or Buckinghamia celsissima.

While not used to its full advantage in Gladstone, cities like Brisbane have entire streetscapes of this tree, which would be outstanding over the next couple of months. Being of the Grevillea family, it is important that it is planted in well-drained positions.

One more member of the Grevillea family that creates a lot of interest during February is the Wheel of Fire or Stenocarpus sinuatus. This bushy pyramid shaped tree produces spectacular clusters of red flowers during the warmer months of the year. The flowers are unique in

pattern as they look like they have been arranged like the spokes of a wheel.

Another extremely spectacular flowering tree is that of the Illawarra Flame Tree, or Brachychiton acerifolius, are now in full bloom.

Being a semi-deciduous tree, they almost give the appearance that its entire canopy is engulfed in flames. This is a hardy tree, which you would expect to grow no more than tem metres in a local garden.

These are just a sample of the beautiful blooming away of plants that can be seen growing in the Gladstone region.



Bandits ready to cash in

It's more than 150 years since bushman Henry 'Harry' Readford (who was in part the inspiration for the 'Captain Starlight' character in the novel Robbery Under Arms) pulled off what was then one of the biggest cattle thefts in the world – driving 1000 head of stolen cattle from Bowen Downs Station in western Queensland to South Australia for profit.

'Harry' has since become a notorious hero of sorts, with his campsite at Nogo Station outside Longreach still popular with tourists to the region.

It's Henry Readford's other legacy, however, we could do without – that of illegal livestock movements.

But with our State's wide-open spaces and current high prices per head across a range of animals, the incentives and environment for this continuing unlawful trade are, unfortunately, tempting.

Recent reports of a rise in goat theft have coincided with revelations that stolen goats have been sold to some kangaroo chiller box facilities, prompting AgForce to announce its support for tighter regulations on wild game harvesting made by Safe Food Production Queensland – placing greater accountability on wild animal harvesters and processors.

Less than 12 months ago two men were convicted of stealing 944 head of cattle from remote north-west Queensland in crimes that took place over more than two years – a timely reminder that this most frequent form of livestock theft hasn't shown any sign of stopping.


The cattle in this instance were not recovered and the impact on the producers both in terms of the dollar value and the emotional toll will be significant and long lasting.


It's why AgForce is imploring producers to exercise vigilance of all their livestock and to immediately report suspicious activity to police to investigate.

The name of the game

A new documentary allows Australian cricket great Shane Warne and those closest to him to tell his own story, his own way, writes **Kathryn Roberts**

ou know you've made it when you are known by just one name. Even more so if you are universally and affectionately referred to by a nickname.

Say the name "Warney" and everyone knows you are talking about former Australian cricketer Shane Warne.

And, everyone knows "Warney" – all-time cricket great, loveable larrikin, Aussie legend, ladies man, beer-skoller, balcony dancer.

So it is somewhat telling that the new documentary about Australia's greatest-ever Test wicket-taker is simply called "Shane".

The documentary, streaming on Amazon Prime Video, takes a more personal look back at Warne's sporting career and life in the limelight through interviews with the man himself and those closest to him, as well as some cricket greats.

"It's the first time my children have spoken, my parents," Warne told fellow Fox Cricket commentator Mark Howard during the fourth Ashes Test at the SCG.

"A lot of the things were quite difficult to talk about. From a long time ago, but still quite difficult to talk about.

"But you know, for most of my life, there's been some wonderful things happen.

"As an Australian cricket team we became the best side in the world for over 15 years, we beat every team, home and away, and I played with some of the greatest cricketers who have ever played the game, so I was very, very lucky to do that.

"And along the journey I did a few pretty good things myself too."

This is not the first time Warne's life has been documented. His trials and tribulations have been a constant focus of newspapers, magazines, books, TV shows and even a stage musical since he bowled "the ball of the century" to England's Mike Gatting almost 30 years ago.

"I know, look, I've been very very lucky in my life – I'm very grateful for the life I've had. I've had over 13 books, I think, written about my life, a stage musical and now a documentary," Warne said.

"I think when you grow up, you think fame could be pretty cool. When I was 21 or 22 years of age, I had my first, I suppose, exposure

"And there's no school you can go to to learn about it. You've just got to sort of try to do the best you can to deal with it. Being followed by half a dozen photographers a day, everywhere you go.

"The Gatting ball changed my life. That was the real turning point from that side of things where I suppose the media side of people and that side wanted to know everywhere I spent my time.

"I sort of resented it a lot but over time I understand how it works, I understand there's a job to do."

The film highlights Warne's relationship with his family, particularly his children.

"There's lots of happy memories, lots of sad memories," says daughter Brooke in the trailer.

"We only ever saw him as Dad."
The documentary delves into
the well-known betting and drugs
scandals and also what Warne
describes as his "lowest point" - the
2005 separation and subsequent
divorce from wife Simone, due to
his extra-marital affairs.

The 2005 Ashes in England saw Warne produce one of the best individual performances in a

Test series, taking an astounding 40 wickets.

But it wasn't enough, as Australia lost the Ashes, and Warne lost his family, with his wife and children returning to Australia just before the series began.

"I would play cricket and go back to the hotel room and raid the mini bar – just sit in my room by myself and just drink," Warne says in the documentary.

"In my hotel room crying, on the floor... just berating myself for some of the things I did."

Warne talks about how he missed his children and just tried to put all his focus into cricket.

"I think that was the lowest because it had nothing to do with anything else. The impact it had on my children, I couldn't get to see my children and they couldn't get to see me and it was my fault," Warne said.

But Shane is not all raking over the coals of the scandals in Warne's life. It also looks at his extraordinary feats on the cricket field and the huge admiration he receives off it.

"He's larger than life. He's Shane Warne," says England great Sir Ian Botham.

Warne's fellow Victorian bowling legend Merv Hughes laughs: "I've got my hand up. I want to be Shane Warne."

Shane boasts interviews with the likes of cricket greats Botham, Sachin Tendulkar, Allan Border, Mark Taylor and Ian Chappell. Warne's good friends singer Ed Sheeran and Coldplay frontman Chris Martin also feature.

"They're not just in there to fill a head space – they're my friends," Warne said

"Chris Martin's one of my top four, five mates. I met him in 2000, I've known him for 21 years. He knows my family, he knows my children.

"We've got a really good relationship. People sometimes forget, whether you're a sports star or a musician, you're human. You have feelings and you're just like everyone else. We're sort of a sounding board for each other which is pretty cool."

The team in charge of the documentary says it "approached the storytelling through a series of interviews with Warne's insiders".

"We assembled them as though they are at a pub round-table chat, each trying to better the other with their story of a Shane moment. The documentary's chorus rises and falls with the great times and the bad."

So what does the man who has seen his life documented every step of the way hope viewers get out of the latest offering?

"I hope it inspires you, I hope you enjoy it," Warne said on Fox Cricket.

"I hope it makes you understand me a little more and shows the love I have for my children, my family and how loyal I am."


VERA ABC TV, Sunday, 8.40pm


It's an unlikely premise - two drifters travelling through the desert stumble across the biggest gold nugget ever found - but what follows is an incredibly bold, tantalising and visceral thriller that toys with the nature of greed and the lengths people will go to in order to survive

Big plans for Lily Place

By Matthew Pearce

The former Central Queensland Cement site on Yaamba Road has been completely transformed, with the iconic location set to become a prestige industrial estate, Lily Place.

Knight Frank Rockhampton principal Neal Crow said he was proud to have been involved with the Lily Place development from the beginning, when Jason Thomasson from JRT acquired the site from Sibelco three years ago.

"The important thing about Lily Place is that it's a heavy impact zoned estate, which allows for the big industries to come to town.

"We have 12 lots here but there are only three on the market at the moment - the rest have been taken up before being developed.

"As of last week the titles have been issued and now we'll see the development coming forward."

Mr Crow said the position close to the planned Rockhampton Ring Road meant that the estate was in high demand.

"It's a very strategic position for any company to expand, particularly with the development that's been going on in Central Queensland - the industrial sector has really exploded," he said.

"It was Jason who had the vision for the site and the staff of Knight Frank worked through that vision with him. Since then we've quietly gone about our business and found buyers and its amazing to see how far we've come today."

The 12 sites at Lily Place range size from m10,000 square metres to 24,000 square metres.

JRT executive manager Brad Neven said the JRT group had kept one of the lots at Lily Place as a base, with a variety of different businesses filling the other sites.

"We haven't advertised really, the sales have really been through word of mouth so to only have three left is amazing," he said.

"The sites have been purchased by a variety of local and national businesses, with a big international tenant looking to buy one of the remaining sites.

"One of the earliest lots sold was for a service station - the owner has stations all over Australia."

He said when people 'see the location and the opportunity, it just sells itself'.

"It's zoned heavy industrial and the ring road's going to come out 300m down the road. People have access north, south and west, so it's a perfect spot, especially as the town's expanding north."

He said the change in the formerly derelict site had been incredible.

"Everything's being recycled on the site as much as possible, with the concrete recycled into road base material.

"All the old buildings and all the old infrastructure has been demolished and removed

to a stockpile on site. Then we crushed it to produce a product now that is usable in all council infrastructure in Rockhampton.

"What Jason has done is shown here is the model for repurposing, recycling and reenergising what could just be a derelict site.

"This is the northern entrance to Rockhampton and now it's going to be a new industrial precinct where you're going to have a rural service company, a trucking franchise, a major truck stop service station, storage shed, precast yard and, of course, JRT."

Mr Thomasson said the old cement works site had sat derelict for 10 years without being utilised and was on the market for nine months.

"The JRT group of companies took a massive risk buying the site, but now the contracts just need to be finalised. We're going to see shovel to ground here in the next six months."

He said every business that had purchased a lot at Lily Place was '100 per cent committed'.

"The trucking company has been waiting here for six months, they're keen to get in and start building."

He said JRT's working relationship with Rockhampton Regional Council had been critical over the past three years.

"There were a lot of things here that were new for everyone, it wasn't just a standard site. We've had to work with council and external consultancies to ensure the land and water quality.

"The council's done a good job with us, right from the start through to getting our approvals and then working through that process to utilize the material on site, crushing the concrete down to roadbase level."

Rockhampton Regional Mayor Tony Williams said it was fantastic to see the completion of the Lily Place development, right in the heart of the North Rockhampton growth corridor.

"The development is perfectly positioned in the northern corridor, which is where our industrial precinct and population will grow in the future," he said.


"This new development aligns with Council's industry development focus areas of defence and its strategic location is well placed in relation to Shoalwater Bay with many other resources and construction service industries already located in this area.

"This creates more opportunity for expansion for current industry players and for new investors to the region."

Six silos have been left on site from the former cement factory and Mr Neven said JRT's goal was to have them painted by Yeppoon artists Bill and Luke Gannon

"From the start we've had the vision, that as the northern most entrance to the Rockhampton region and the gateway to the Capricorn Coast, the six silos should have murals put on them.

Tape reduced

The length of time it takes for Defence to approve large acquisition projects will be cut by up to a quarter under a range of contracting changes introduced by the Morrison Government to reduce red tape and save the industry millions of dollars.

The major overhaul of Defence procurement follows the completion of the Australian Standard for Defence Contracting (ASDEFCON) and Defence Procurement Review.

Minister for Defence Industry Melissa Price, who ordered the Review, said it had identified significant opportunities to reduce red tape, saving industry time and money in supporting the delivery of capability to the Australian Defence Force.

"The implementation of the Review's recommendations will significantly improve the way Defence does business," Minister Price said

"It will also improve how Defence works to fast-track the delivery of capability to the ADF and how it communicates with industry."

Member for Capricornia Michelle Landry congratulated Minister Price for ordering the review.

"I welcome the completion of the Australian Standard for Defence Contracting (AS-DEFCON) and Defence Procurement Review," she said.

"I'm looking forward to seeing the implementation of the Review's recommendations and seeing the positive effects in Central Queensland."

"The 2017 socio-economic study found that \$50.3 million in income and almost 600 jobs were created during development. Once fully operational, an additional \$20.5 million in income and a further 147 new jobs would be created."

Under the changes, Defence will focus on reducing the time it takes to progress large materiel acquisition activities from the identification of a capability need to the signing of a contract.

"For a project that would have previously taken four years, or possibly even longer to get the point of a contract signature, these changes will reduce that period by up to 12 months," Minister Price said.

"This change and other the initiatives introduced following the Review will help industry be better prepared and ready to respond to the needs of Defence and Government."

Defence will focus on strengthening its communication with industry as part of the procurement overhaul, with a particular focus on the tender process.

This means:

Defence will now allow industry to brief its project teams on tenders they submit to further clarify the offer proposed in support of Defence's evaluation;

Defence processes will be amended to require tender debriefs to be offered at the time a tenderer is advised it has been unsuccessful, rather than after the process is concluded. This will give small businesses feedback on unsuccessful tenders up to six-to-12 months more quickly in some cases, helping

them improve their tender responses;

There will be greater transparency of upcoming procurements through its Annual Procurement Plan on AusTender;

There will be an assessment of how a centralised contractor accreditation framework could be adopted to cut red tape for industry;

There will be an improvement of probity practices, guidance and training for procurements in order to reduce communication barriers between Defence and industry;

Industry will be kept better informed as to the status and progress of tender processes, especially where delays occur.

"The ASDEFCON and Defence Procurement Review is one of the Five Pillars that I announced in August 2020 as an improvement priority for Defence, to better support industry," Minister Price said.

"I have mandated specific, measurable, and enforceable Australian Industry Capability and Content commitments in the body of contracts under a new contracting framework in Defence, which has been rolled out this year on future projects above \$20 million."

"The Review completes the delivery of the Five Pillars that I set out to support Australia's defence industry."

"Our strategic environment is deteriorating and creating new challenges for us to overcome, so we must have a more agile procurement system that delivers capability for our ADF more quickly and treats industry as a fundamental partner in the delivery of this capability."

Michelle Landry is optimistic that this plan will have a positive impact on the local community and encourages local businesses to get on board.

"The ASMTI is delivering advanced training areas for use by the Australian Defence Force and Singapore Armed Forces. At its mature state, up to 14,000 Singapore Armed Forces will be training in QLD."

"The Local Industry Capability Plan for the Shoalwater Bay Training Area expansion is ensuring local communities can take advantage of economic benefits arising from the initiative."

"If any business is seeking to gain access Defence supply chains, I recommend undertaking the Becoming Defence Ready online tutorial series to learn more about how to put your best foot forward in tendering for subcontract opportunities under the ASMTI."

Defence will continue to engage with industry to inform and educate it on relevant changes to the ASDEFCON template suite, and procurement processes and policies, as they occur.

Defence industry and industry advocates were consulted on the Review via a survey in December 2020. About 250 survey responses were received, with 144 of those from industry across all stakeholders groups, from micro businesses to large primes.

Targeted engagement was also undertaken with industry and Defence.

Implementation of the recommendations will start in 2022.



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2022 is to be our year

Local businesses are in demand and it is not by accident.

Enormous effort has been expended by business owners, member organisations and political leaders in this region and across regional Australia over the last couple of decades that started as a whisper, became a roar and has now successfully put local businesses in the box seat.

We all have stories of the scars left by the multi-million dollar construction of the three gas projects in Gladstone in the last decade. Local businesses were not ready and many were screwed.

The promises saw businesses over-invest, recruit and put too many eggs in one basket. Sure, some businesses benefited from that frantic period and we saw the birth of new local businesses. Sadly though many watched their businesses fold or shrink as foreign owned competitors rocked into the region, put their shingle up in Goondoon Street and pushed local businesses aside as they not only took over the newly promised contracts with the gas companies but they also enticed employees away and grabbed several of the traditional contracts on offer in other sectors.

The same story can be told in our mining towns, Emerald, Mackay, Rockhampton and Yeppoon.

Across regional Australia, we realised the comfort our forebears had that people needed local businesses were disappearing fast due to technology, transport and infrastructure that enabled competitors to appear overnight and scoop the contracts. We quickly found we could not just talk the talk or wave the Buy Local flag alone. Chambers of commerce, economic development groups and committees provided a forum for the voices to unite. Political leaders started to hear the noise and some became strong advocates for Buy Local. We saw Councils introduce tender weightings

for local content, the State Government legislating local content for contracts over certain values and the Australian Government mandating local procurement in major projects.

We had to pull our socks up quickly to compete with our competitors, being local might open the door but to stay in the room we needed to prove conformance to quality, safety, environmental standards and the ability to deliver. And that we did. Across Australia, local businesses have successfully secured contracts that would have otherwise gone to city based or foreign companies. Travel restrictions due to COVID reinforced the benefits of having local businesses provide services and there is a growing realisation that local businesses genuinely care and are invested in delivering quality services for the long term viability of their clients and in turn their business

2022 is the year for local businesses in the CQ region. The local content requirements for the Rocky Ring Road and the Fitzroy to Gladstone Pipeline have Tier 1s chasing our services. Rookwood Weir and the Dept of Defence Shoalwater Bay Training Area ASMTI project are still bringing on contractors to complete those projects, new and expanding coking coal mines are popping up and tourism projects like Great Keppel Island will be ramping up in readiness for the 2032 Brisbane Olympics.

We have done the hard yards, we are in the box seat, competitors are regrouping, get ready and get the job done for the future of our region.



Rookwood Weir funding

Central Queensland farmers are tapping into a \$1.2 million initiative, which will assist them in bidding for water, from the new Rookwood

Minister for Water Glenn Butcher said 44 Lower Fitzroy landholders had successfully applied for the Rookwood Weir Landholder Support Program, to better understand the opportunities available to them from the \$367.7 million piece of infrastructure.

"Rookwood Weir will deliver improved water security and available water supply in the region, allowing farmers to expand operations and put on more workers," he said.

"This program offers farm and land use planning, agronomy assessment, irrigation design and commercial feasibility assessments.

"It will provide numerous benefits to local irrigators, including the ability to transition to higher value crops, so the Palaszczuk Government wants to make sure Queensland farmers, who are so valuable to the state's economy, have everything they need to make informed decisions.

With the second tender for water from the weir taking place this year, it's important Central Queensland farmers can put their best foot forward as part of the process

A minimum of 7,500 megalitres will be released in the second stage of the tender, with bidders able to apply for lots of up to 500 megalitres. This follows the successful sale of 30,000 megalitres in December 2020.

Member for Rockhampton Barry O'Rourke welcomed the announcement, which is set to boost the agricultural sector and in-turn, the CQ community, as a whole.

"This Queensland Government initiative will be an incredible injection for our region.

"As landholders expand their opportunities, jobs will no doubt be created through farming and the supply-chain," Mr O'Rourke said.

That sentiment was echoed by Keppel MP Brittany Lauga.

"The Queensland Government will continue to support regional jobs through its multimillion-dollar investment in this project.

"Rookwood Weir is about our future, about iobs in construction and also future jobs, as business and industry use this water to expand and create more jobs and opportunities for local suppliers," she said.

The Landholder Support Program is being facilitated, on behalf of Sunwater, by Advance Rockhampton, the economic development, investment, and industry growth unit of Rockhampton Regional Council.

Successful applicants can receive an onsite agricultural report, business plan support, and subsidies for independent financial advice to assist in taking part in the second stage of wa-

Rockhampton Mayor Tony Williams said a wide variety of landholders from the region were taking part in the program.

"We have landholders looking at commercial cropping, such as grains, as well as tree crops ranging from dragon fruits to macadamias. There is also interest in accessing water to support livestock production."

The applicants are from a range of locations across the Rockhampton, Central Highlands and Livingstone council areas and are interested in parcels of water from 10 megalitres right up to 500 megalitres.

The program commences this month and will run to May 2022.

Out-of-river activities are continuing at the weir site, including work on right riverbank and development of fish lock for the weir.

In-river works will ramp up again following the wet season.

The Rookwood Weir project is jointly funded by the Australian and Queensland governments, delivered in partnership with Sunwater.



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Busy times for Rescue300

Rescue300 has had an epic start to 2022 with their crew performing numerous missions and spending over ten hours in the air across Central Queensland.

The new year started off with their crew in the air around Dingo after the Queensland Police Service requested their assistance in searching for individuals believed to be involved in a motor vehicle accident. After a brief search the persons were located by ground crews, and Rescue300 returned to base.

The following day, Rescue300 was called to Rainbow Falls, in the Blackdown Tablelands after an elderly woman reportedly fell, fracturing her ankle. After a brief recognition of the area, the on board Rescue Crew Officer (RCO) was winched into the scene to retrieve the patient. Both the RCO and patient were winched back into the aircraft and the patient was taken to Rockhampton Base Hospital in a stable condition.

Three days into 2022 and their crew were tasked to Great Keppel Island after a 51 year old patient was reportedly suffering chest pains. The on board Doctor and Critical Care Paramedic (CCP) attended to the patient before stabilising him prior to the flight to Rockhampton Base Hospital.



That same day, a patient at Emerald Hospital required transport to Rockhampton after suffering suspected pregnancy complications. The patient, aged in their mid-thirties, was airlifted in a stable condition.

Around 11am the next day, a 31 year old woman was involved in a quad bike accident on a property near Dingo. Upon arrival, she was assessed by the on-board Doctor and CCP and was treated for suspected spinal injuries, before being flown to Rockhampton Base Hospital in a stable condition for further scans and treatment.

Shortly after returning from Dingo, Rescue300 was tasked to Biloela Hospital after another patient was suffering a reported blood infection. The patient was swiftly airlifted to Rockhampton for further treatment.

Following this, Rescue300 took another trip to Biloela Hospital for a patient in their twenties that was suffering suspected pregnancy issues and required urgent care at

A patient at Emerald Hospital required the assistance of Rescue300 after they had been deemed to be suffering appendicitis. The aircraft and on board crew made the immediate flight west and transported the 28 year old to Rockhampton in a stable condition.

Following this, an elderly patient was undergoing treatment for a severe lung illness at Moura Hospital before they were transported to Rockhampton in a stable condition for further treatment.

Early on the morning of January 11th, a patient in their late seventies was found unconscious in the vicinity of Ogmore, north of Rockhampton. First responding Queensland Ambulance Service Paramedics provided initial treatment prior to the arrival of RACQ CapRescue to the scene. He was transported to Rockhampton in a stable condition.

The following day, a patient at Biloela Hospital was transported to Rockhampton by Rescue300 following a medical episode. The patient was airlifted in a stable condition for further treatment.

Recently, a young patient at Monto Hospital was taken to Bundaberg after reportedly suffering chest pains. The patient was stabilised before being airlifted to Bundaberg Hospital for further treatment.

With over 400 tasks in 2021, they are already shaping up to have another busy year in 2022. The crew are on track to well and truly meeting their predicted average of 1.3 per day. EASY SUMMER MOJITOS

This cocktail is by far one of the easiest to make and can be made directly in the glass, so you get to avoid any excess cleaning up.

This recipe is for a single cocktail made in the glass.

You can easily add new flavours to it, like raspberry or passionfruit, by adding a few teaspoons of your chosen fruit when you add in the lime juice and sugar.

Ingredients:

- A short glass
- 3 tbsp white rum,
- 2 tbsp lime juice
- 2 tsp granulated sugar
- Mint to taste
- Ice
- Soda water

Method:

- 1. Measure out the alcohol. No eyeballing.
- 2. Add in the lime and sugar before mixing well.
- 3. Smack the mint leaves in the palms of your hands before adding them to the glass.
- 4. Add in enough ice to almost fill the glass.
- 5. Top up with soda water and enjoy.



BALSAMIC STONE FRUIT AND CHICKEN

While it might seem complicated, this salad actually packs a huge amount of flavour into what is a reasonably easy recipe.

Ingredients:

- 4 ripe peaches or nectarines, quartered
- ½ cup balsamic vinegar
- 1 tbs honey
- 4 boneless skinless chicken thighs
- 100 gms thinly sliced prosciutto
- 1 tbs olive oil
- 2 tbs fresh chopped basil
- 1 tbs fresh chopped oregano
- Kosher salt + pepper6 cups fresh rocket

A sure-fire favourite, it has the perfect balance of different flavours and textures and is the perfect way to end a summer's day.

- 1 cup cherry tomatoes
- 150 gms fresh mozzarella cheese, torn
- 2 avocados, sliced
- Toasted pumpkin seeds to sprinkle

Balsamic vinaigrette:

- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 1/4 cup balsamic vinegar
- 2 tbs fresh chopped basil
- 2 tsp dijon mustard
- Salt and pepper

Method

- 1. Add the peaches to a bowl and toss with the balsamic vinegar and honey.
- Add the chicken to a separate bowl and toss with the olive oil, basil, oregano, salt, and pepper.
 Preheat your grill, grill pan, or cast-iron skillet to medium-high and brush with oil.
- 4. Remove the peaches from the balsamic mix and grill them for 2-3 minutes or until light char marks appear, flip and grill another 2-3 minutes. Remove from the grill. Reserve any remaining balsamic mix for the vinaigrette.
- 5. To the grill, add the chicken and prosciutto to grill for 5-8 minutes per side or until the chicken $\,$

is cooked through and the prosciutto crisp. Remove from the grill and let rest for 5-10 minutes. Thinly slice the chicken and crumble the pro-

6. In a large salad bowl, combine the rocket and tomatoes. Top the salad with grilled peaches, chicken, mozzarella, and sliced avocado. Sprinkle the toasted pumpkin seeds all over the salad.

7. Serve the salad alongside the balsamic vinaigrette, by combining any remaining balsamic mix from when you tossed it with the peaches with the olive oil, 1/4 cup balsamic vinegar, basil, mustard, salt and pepper. Taste, and adjust seasonings to your liking.

BUNDABERG INSHORE/OFFSHORE

With the weather report for this weekend not looking very good, the creeks and rivers will be the place to be.

Remember to always check the weather report before heading out!

BURNETT RIVER

The river is starting to clean up, with the fresh water in the river and the big tide at the start of the week.

The bream have been firing. There have been bream caught up in the 40cm mark.

They have been caught right through the river system, from the Town Reach to the mouth of the river.

The bream have been caught on live poddy mullet, prawns and mullet strips.

There have been plenty caught using a lightly-weighted line and float it back in with the current.

The grunter have been caught around the rubble beds and sand bars.

There have been some nice whiting caught towards the mouth with the cleaner water. Fresh yabbies and worms are the go-to baits.

KOLAN RIVER AND BAFFLE CREEK

With the two high tides throughout both days this weekend, the mangrove jack and the grunter will be firing.

Live mullet will be the go-to baits, fished

around the rock bars and fallen timber in the river systems.

If you're looking to fish for them using lures,

the Z'man 3inch paddle tails would be my goto lure in the soft plastics.

In the hard body, the Lucky Craft red and

gold is my personal favourite.

The bream, flathead and whiting can also be caught on the rock bars and sand flats using baits.

LAKE MONDURAN

With the warmer weather around and the spawning season nearly over, the fish have moved back up the dam.

The anglers have been finding that they are still catching them on the Molix 140 shad and

the Jackall Squirell.

The fish have been in the shallows in the morning then moving out into the deeper water when the sun gets higher in the sky.

When the water warms up, we have been finding that the fish like to sit in the thermocline.

he thermocline is normally around 3 to 4 metres deep.

The bait and barramundi sit in the thermocline because the water is not as hot as it is on the surface.

The tops of trees and old river beds have been working well. When working the Squirrels and hard body lures, the small twitches have been producing the bites. Keeping it in their face for longer seems to be the trick.

Just a quick reminder that the salt water barramundi season opens at midnight on 1 February.
